# Telling a tale of two cartoons

The 'cartoon' in the Washington Post sure did.



# President Bush requests \$439.3 billion budget for Department of Defense

President George W. Bush Monday sent to Congress his defense budget for fiscal year 2007. The budget requests \$439.3 billion in discretionary budget authority



for the Department of Defense, a 7 percent increase over enacted fiscal 2006 funding levels. The budget was accompanied by the Report of the Quadrennial Defense Review.

This is the first time the Report of Quadrennial Defense Review and the President's budget for the Department of Defense have been delivered to Congress together.

The QDR, the first conducted during a time of war, reflects the process of change that has been ongoing in the Department of Defense since 2001, and points the way to the future, establishing strategic priorities and identifying key areas for needed investment.

Based on the president's 2005 National Security Strategy, the QDR outlines the mix of forces and capabilities needed to fulfill

the strategy's stated goals and objectives.

While major program adjustments that may result from the QDR will be reflected more fully in the budgets for fiscal 2008 and beyond, the fiscal 2007 budget adjusts some program projections begun in prior year budgets. The fiscal 2007 budget continues the process of funding the Department's ongoing shift in emphasis, away from the static posture and forces of the last century toward the highly mobile and expeditionary forces, and accompanying warfighting capabilities, needed in the century ahead.


"Like the QDR," Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld said, "the fiscal 2007 budget reflects the department's continuum of change as we defend our nation, engage in the long war against terrorist extremism and prepare for future potential adversaries."

# Taking care

## February is National Dental Health Month

While some study results indicate the use of a mouth rinse can be as effective as flossing for reducing plaque between the teeth, the American Dental Association recommends brushing twice a day and cleaning between the teeth with floss or interdental cleaners once each day to remove plaque from all tooth surfaces. Plaque is responsible for both tooth decay and gum disease.

Regarding the studies, the authors concluded that in patients with mild to moderate gingivitis (early periodontal (gum) disease), rinsing twice a day with the antiseptic mouth rinse was as effective as flossing for reducing plaque and gingivitis between the teeth. The studies did not examine whether the mouth rinse had the same effect as floss on reducing tooth decay or periodontitis (advanced periodontal disease). Flossing and interdental cleaners also help remove food debris caught between teeth that may not be rinsed away.

The ADA recommends the following for good oral hygiene:

- Brush your teeth twice a day with an ADA-accepted fluoride toothpaste.
- Clean between teeth daily with floss or an interdental cleaner. Decay-causing bacteria still linger between teeth where toothbrush bristles can't reach. Flossing removes plaque and food particles from between the teeth and under the gum line.
- Eat a balanced diet and limit between-meal snacks.
- Visit your dentist regularly for professional cleanings and oral exams.

Talk to your dentist about what types of oral care products will be most effective for you. The ADA seal on a product is your assurance that it has met ADA criteria for safety and effectiveness. Look for the ADA seal on fluoride toothpaste, toothbrushes, floss, interdental cleaners, oral irrigators, mouth rinses and other oral hygiene products.


Replace your toothbrush every three or four months or sooner if the bristles become frayed. A worn toothbrush will not do a good job of cleaning your teeth. Children's toothbrushes often need replacing more frequently than adults because they can wear out sooner.

Also, if you often chew aspirin over a prolonged period you could severely

damage your teeth, according to a case study in the July issue of the *Journal of the American Dental Association*. "Aspirin can cause severe damage to both the hard and soft tissues of the mouth," said researchers from the University of Maryland Dental School, Baltimore.

The researchers presented two cases of enamel erosion attributed to daily chewing of multiple aspirin tablets on a long-term basis. Both patients needed extensive dental treatment as a result. "We could find no cause of the tooth erosion other than the aspirin use," the researchers said. "When we showed the tooth destruction to [one] patient, he confirmed that the worst areas were, indeed, where he held the aspirin tablets."

February is National Dental Health Month, a great time to make an appointment with either of the island dentists, Dr. James Schuler or Dr. Roy Schoppert, as well as the dental hygienists, Judy Shimamoto or Jan Budo at 52165.



# Range operation slips to Saturday

The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef. On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E and then to a point north

of the high tide mark on Ninni on the west reef.


Bigej, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not part of the mid-atoll corridor.

Omelek, Eniwetak and Gellinam are designated as evacuated islands. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas. See maps.


In order to ensure clearance of non-mission personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening

time, Kwajalein Police Department island clearance procedures will continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.


