But I saw something that apparently a lot of people are blissfully unaware of and left me slack-jawed when I read it.


Now, we all hear about how many potential terrorist targets in the United States are vulnerable to attack and not enough has been done to protect

Making general statements about teens is wrong

We are writing in response to the letter submitted by the Myers' family in the Wednesday edition of the *Hourglass*.

We are offended by their comments about Kwajalein teenagers' behavior and character. Their claim that the 'general consensus' is that this act was committed by teenagers is unsubstantiated and premature. The truth is that the Myers did not know who burglarized their home at the time the letter was written.

Even if the crime was committed by teenagers, we feel that it was inappropriate to make the generalization that the parents, teenagers and the Kwajalein Police Department are irresponsible and just don't care. No matter who took the Myers' belongings, the person or people responsible do not represent their entire peer group.

The consequences for underage drinking and burglary on Kwajalein are significant and the police department is thorough in their attempts to prevent and investigate these crimes.

The Myers do not live in the teenagers' homes and therefore are unaware of what disciplinary measures parents take to raise their children properly. To make the blanket statement that people know and don't care based on one incident and anecdotal evidence is unreasonable.

It is unfortunate this incident occurred and we hope the problem is resolved.

It may not look like it, but the Memorial Wall project is progressing and things are finally coming together. This memorial has been in the planning stage for several months and is being created to honor the dedication and sacrifice of our Soldiers and their families who have served on Kwajalein from the end of World War II through the present.

The 394 by 10 foot wall will be painted a standard building 'sand' color and a flower chain of hibiscus will be painted across the length. A plaque is planned to be black granite with the atoll map, coins for each of the services (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard) and an inscription: In Honor of the Military Men and Women and their Families Who Have Lived and Worked on Kwajalein Atoll 1944 to present. Dedication is planned for Memorial Day.



A group of 15 young men and three leaders of Boy Scout Troop 314 enjoyed a two-night, three-day campout on Gea Island the weekend of Jan. 28-30. B-Boat volunteer drivers dropped off the troop on Saturday afternoon, and picked up everyone on Monday morning. A borrowed paddled-powered twin-hull dingy, was used to move the equipment from the anchored B-Boats on and off Gea.

Gea is the third island north from Kwajalein on the west reef and has no modern infrastructure. There are ruins of Japanese equipment

from World War II used to power a submarine net between Gea and Ninni. On ocean side, at the south end of the island, there is a sand beach with campsites and a sandbar extending out from the island. As the tide came up, this proved to be a great place to hang out, with the surf arriving from both the ocean and lagoon side.

Golf association means fun, camaraderie

The motto of the more than 30-year-old Kwajalein Golf Association is 'have fun and enjoy golf.'

According to Curt Bean, KGA president, there are currently 140 members on Kwaj and an addition 54 members on Roi-Namur.

Though you do not have to be a member of the KGA to golf on Kwaj, it does have its benefits. According to Bean, a KGA membership entitles someone to:

- Discounted entry into the many tournaments.
- Discounted entry into the Coral and Kwaj Opens.
- KGA will keep track of members U.S. Golf Association handicaps. This includes putting them into the system and transmitting to the USGA. All a member has to do is turn in their scorecard, and the handicap chairman takes it from there.
- Membership in the Hawaii State Golf Association (this provides various discounts at Hawaii golf courses and various other sponsors.)
- The ability to qualify for various USGA- and HSGA-sponsored golf events.

When asked why someone should become a member, Bean said, "It enables people to meet new people, enjoy the camaraderie, fun tournaments and match play."

The KGA sponsors many events throughout the year for members and residents. Here are a few:

- The Atoll Cup – This event puts Kwajalein golfers against Roi-Namur golfers with an alternate shot and stroke play match. The match alternates between Roi and Kwaj, usually in January.
- Sadie Hawkins Fun Tournament – In this event a girl chooses four other people for her team. It is usually in February.
- Moonlight Madness Fun Tournament. Participants play golf on a team in the dark, with glow balls. "This is one of the most cherished events in the KGA



and is always fully booked. This year we are having two tournaments on March 25 and in August," Bean said.

- Handicap Championship - Members play match play and the winner gets the next year's membership for free.
- Coral Open - The first major championship of the year that is usually the last two weekends in May, with an awards banquet at the end.
- KGA Club Champion - This event is usually held in September. It's a scratch match play event that determines KGA Club champion and they get their next year's membership for free.
- Kwajalein Open - The largest major championship usually played the first two weeks in October. "This event is huge; we fly a pro in from Hawaii to help run the championship and give lessons, have two weeks of stroke play, have various cookouts during the week and have fun tournaments during the week," Bean said.
- Backwards Fun Tournament – Golfers play the course backwards on a team.
- Par 3 Fun Tournament – An event in which every hole is a par 3.
- Cancer Fund Raiser Tournament (Jimmy Hermesen Memorial) – In this tournament all proceeds go to the American Cancer Society and usually the winning teams donate their winnings.

Bean also stated, "The KGA is about fun, playing golf, meeting people, learning the game and trying to make Kwajalein a better place to live."

If a resident would like to golf on Kwaj and not be a member of the KGA Bean said, "A person only needs to pay for greens fees either daily, monthly or twice a year."

"It is a great place to come and get away from routine life, relieve a little stress and enjoy being outside while playing a game with friends and family," said Bob Butz, golf course supervisor.

Anger shouldn't indict whole 'family community'

I would like to make a brief response to the diatribe of Jason and Yuliya Myers that was published on Wednesday.

They are very angry people obviously and who wouldn't be after losing their money, expensive vodka and cigarettes. Too bad they left their doors unlocked, but I guess it's a little late to worry about that now.

It's discouraging that their anger over this misfortune now translates into an indictment of the whole community or at least the segment that's trying its best to raise families here. The Myers have reached their conclusions about how this crime may have been committed based on conversations with others. Everyone they talked to they say agrees this was done by teenagers. Aren't we

all lucky the criminal justice system doesn't use 'general consensus,' I wonder if they are parents themselves. I hope not.

A popular myth here is that since Kwajalein is a self-contained microcosm with so many pleasant diversions that somehow adolescent life ought to be idyllic. Far from it, I submit. Not surprisingly, young people, like adults, usually find that Kwajalein is not like anyplace they have been before. Young people in their developing years sometimes find the adjustment more challenging than adults and they also adjust at different rates.

Bad behavior in adolescents usually derives from late or under-development of character, poor adjustment to surroundings, inappropriate associations, peer pressure or some vile

combination of these factors.

Many parents struggle with these elements of childrearing on a daily basis. Some fail or feel like they are failing a lot of the time, but to their credit, they generally keep trying their best to raise kids in a very different atmosphere.

It is unfortunate that the Myers suffered from this intrusion and I would say that most people hope the culprits are discovered and punished. But I guess I would also say that if I felt the way they do, I would be inclined to move to someplace else I liked better.

Someplace away from unfit parents, hooligan children and ingrate offspring.

High school students respond to burglary letter

Inner tube water polo makes a splash on Kwaj

Generally speaking when someone thinks of team sports, things such as softball, basketball and soccer come to mind. Though all these sports are played on Kwaj, another less familiar game is as well, inner tube water polo.

"This game has been a sport on Kwaj for a very, very long time," said Mandie Morris, pools and beaches coordinator.

"When I first arrived on Kwaj in 1976, the game had been around for a number of years," said Bill Williamson, Kwaj resident and inner tube water polo player.

So what exactly is inner tube water polo? According to Morris, it is a variation of water polo. "All field players in the water must sit in an inner tube. The goalie may sit in the inner tube or play vertical in the tube, around his/her waist with legs down in the water. Then each team attempts to get the ball in the opposing team's goal (looks like a soccer goal, but floats on top of the water). The teams play two 20-minute halves with a 5-minute half time," Morris said.

She went on to explain, in the water, teams play with six players which include one goalie. You can play with only five in the


water. Either way, there must be at least one opposite gender member in the water at all times. As far as roster goes, the minimum is five, one of which must be opposite gender, the maximum is 15.

"Each team receives points for scoring: goal - 2 points, penalty shot - 1 point. The team with the most points at the end of the game wins," she said.

One may want to consider a few things before deciding to play this sport. "Knowing how to swim is a necessity. There is a lifeguard present at all games, but the play can get intense and if someone who could not swim fell out of his/her tube, it could be a dangerous situation," Morris said.

"You have to be able to stay in an inner tube with someone trying to throw you out. It's played rain or shine. The game is fast. Not like softball, there is no rest. We may play an entire half, faster than one inning of softball. You touch the ball a lot," Williamson said.

"It is really fun and provides a huge avenue for competitive spirits. However, it is a pretty tough and physical game. It is not a contact sport, but paddling around in the water takes more skill and energy than one might imagine," Morris added.



Registration for this sport is underway and ends Thursday. Cost is \$150 per team. "There is no individual registration for this sport. Therefore, a learn to play clinic has not been scheduled. But if someone is interested, they are more than welcome to call me and we can see what we can do," Morris said.

The season will run from March 2 to April 6.

"It is definitely an experience that all those who live on Kwaj should take part in, whether it's playing or coming out and watching a game," Morris said.

was approved by a secret U.S. government panel that's supposed to consider the security risks of a foreign country buying or investing in American industry.

Gee, could there be a possible problem with this?

Our government says that the UAE is an important ally in the War on Terror.

I guess the fact that a lot of the operational and financial planning of the Sept. 11, 2001 hijackers took place in the United Arab Emirates and the government there still recognizes the Taliban as Afghanistan's real leaders and has close ties with Iran isn't a big red flag.

Now, it might just be a coincidence, but isn't it funny that our government appointed a senior Dubai Ports World executive, David C. Sanborn, to be administrator of the U.S. Maritime Transportation Department? Sanborn had been Dubai Ports World director of operations for Europe and Latin America. I guess \$6.8 billion buys a lot these days.

Some congressmen, who have brains in their heads and whose districts include the ports in question, are pressing the administration to reconsider its approval of the sale.

Many counterterrorism and security experts have expressed concern over

how easy it would be for a port operation that was engaged in smuggling or terrorism to manipulate manifests and other records that could slip by Homeland Security's already limited scrutiny of shipping containers and by U.S. Customs agents.

As one of them said, "A country that may be a friend today, might not be tomorrow. You don't know in advance what a country's politics are going to be in the future."

Proponents of the sale say that DP World would have a strong economic interest in operating the ports securely and efficiently. Maybe that would be true for company executives interested in making money. But what about terrorists with a wish to be martyrs and go to paradise who might get themselves hired by or already work for Dubai Ports World and would be able to get a container with a nuclear device or dirty bomb into New York City harbor?

It wouldn't even have to be as sophisticated as that to do great harm. Sabotaging machinery and equipment could cost our economy billions of dollars and possibly dock worker's lives.

Or how about a tanker with millions of gallons of fuel or tons of explosives in its hold. One lighted match in the right

place could trigger an explosion and fireball that could take out half a city. It wouldn't be a very big problem for someone working for the port operation company to gain access to secure areas and ships to wreak havoc.

And one more thing to consider folks. Many of the Sept. 11, 2001 hijackers traveled to the U.S. from the United Arab Emirates and the hijacker who flew the plane into the World Trade Center south tower was born in the UAE. Just food for thought.

Some of the things our government has done recently makes me wonder just who the heck is running the asylum.

Is Homeland Security for real, or is it just a big, hugely expensive joke?

In today's world with rising Arab hatred toward the Western world and America in particular, why in the name of all that is holy would our government even begin to take an enormous risk like this?

Maybe somebody in Washington, D.C. should wake up and smell the radiation!

Honoring fallen heroes

Pfc. Matthew L. Bertolino, 20, of Hampstead, N.H., died Feb. 9, when the vehicle he was traveling in was involved in a rollover while operating as part of a combat patrol near Jalalabad, Afghanistan. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii.







Of the 157 students attending Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School, 57 percent have a 3.0 or higher grade point average and of that group, 13 percent have a 4.0 GPA. We would also like to state that over the past 4 years, high school students have maintained an average Standard Aptitude Test score that is almost 100 points higher than in the United States.

This is irrefutable evidence proving that Kwajalein students are committed

to excellence and that we are not the delinquents the letter portrayed us to be.

This letter was written to correct the misleading notions and beliefs pertaining to adolescents and their parents and to show that we are responsible, intelligent people. We do not appreciate the stereotyping that occurred in last week's letter.
