

Commander updates community on transition

It's the beginning of a new year, and I'd like to give you an update on the transition team's progress.

During the Kwaj Town Hall Meeting in November, I stated that I would be briefing the results of the transition team's work to our higher authority. I asked you to wait and not make any career-changing decisions until you get the result of those briefings. Dr. Rodney Robertson has approved the recommended course of action at his level. Michael Schexnayder will receive a briefing in the month of March.

My transition team looked at four possible courses of action and came to the conclusion that the best course of action is to implement full range distributed operations and continue with accompanied personnel on Kwajalein.


Kwajalein Range Services has been directed to develop a proposed operational and logistical support plan that will ensure the continued and unhindered operation of U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll as it transforms its current business practices and operations through fiscal year 2013.

USAKA has received direction from the Space and Missile Defense Command commanding general that it must realign its business practices and mission execution to accommodate RDO enabled by installation of a fiber optic network between Kwajalein and Guam.

As a result of that guidance, and with the input of multiple study groups, USAKA received budget guidance in November that indicated a reduction in funding is inevitable for future fiscal years.

The new plan includes funding the Reagan Test Site to a level that provides for the execution of the RDO and provides for continued operation, maintenance, improvement and modernization of the current RTS instrumentation suite per the current contract requirements.

It also ensures that, for purposes of recruitment and retention, living on Kwajalein includes an accompanied option for selected positions. Many options are on the table for review, and as I've mentioned before, we're



using the Lean Six Sigma model to affect efficiencies in current operations. Some of the areas we're looking at or planning to look at are warehousing (ongoing), intra-atoll transportation (ongoing), retail facility consolidation, housing footprint reduction, Roi operations, community activities operations, and a personnel policy review.

As you can see, a lot of work remains, but I promised you an update as things progress in the spring '07 time frame. The current plan is to get changes in order during this fiscal year. Stand by for period updates in the near future.

Following procedures can mean life or death

What would happen if there was a fire and no one evacuated?

The Kwajalein Fire Department responds to between nine and 10 emergencies each week.

“Our typical responses are fire alarm activations, report of fire, emergency medical incidents, and hazmat responses,” explained Ken Riley, assistant chief of fire prevention.

When an alarm activates, people should evacuate, but that doesn’t always happen.

“If you are at work and the fire alarm activates, take your cac [common access card] and personal items that are at your immediate disposal such as purses or backpacks,” Riley said. “If you are in your BQ [bachelor quarters], the same guidelines apply. If you get to the hall and see there is no smoke, take time to lock your door and exit the building. The corridor walls and doors are fire rated. If you get to the hall and it is filled with heavy smoke and you cannot make it to the fire exit, close the door and place a wet towel at the crack of the door. Call the fire department, and let us know you are trapped.”

When an alarm goes off in a facility on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, an alarm is also received at the fire station. When this happens, the alarm room operator dispatches response crews.

“Immediately after dispatching the fire department, the alarm room operator will notify KPD [Kwajalein Police Department] who will in turn dispatch a unit. EMT [Emergency Medical Treatment] personnel respond in the ambulance on all alarms. The DoD and Army standard for structural responses is three engine companies and an incident commander. On Kwajalein we respond with two engine companies, an ambulance, and an incident commander,” Riley said.

According to the National Fire Protection Agency, the first objective of a fire alarm signal is to notify occupants of a fire. “Buildings are designed, size of corridors, distance to and size of exits, etc. with consideration for a prompt evacuation,” Riley said. “If the occupants wait until they actually see fire or smoke, it may already be too late for all occupants to exit.”

Every building is required by Army

regulations to have an Emergency Evacuation Plan. Riley explained that this plan will show evacuation routes and a point to assemble so a head count can be made. The facility manager is responsible for having these posted. “If you do not know where your plan is contact the manager of your facility. If you do not have one, at minimum you should be across the street, be careful crossing streets as emergency units will be responding,” he added.

Onlookers could keep emergency responders from effectively doing their jobs. Riley advised, “You should keep the fire department between you and the building with the alarm activation.”


When an alarm activates, residents should assume it means fire. However, Riley said that smoking, cooking, water leaking into the system and condensations caused by occupants opening windows are also reasons why an alarm will sound.

KFD typically beats the DoD and Army standards for response time, which is five minutes. “We average between two and three minutes [in response time],” Riley said.

Facts and figures

The following is provided by the NFPA:

- In the United States from 1999 to 2002 an estimated annual average of 2,340 reported fires in dormitory properties caused three civilian deaths, 80 civilian injuries and \$32 million in estimated direct property damage.
- Fires in the dormitory occupancy group fell 22 percent from 3,200 in 1980 to 2,620 in 2002. In comparison, structure fires of all types declined 51 percent from 1980 to 2002. While the long-term trend shows that the problem has been getting better, the number of fires reported in 2002 was at its highest point since 1989.

Republic of Marshall Islands will make first Olympic appearance in Beijing

Swimmer Jared Heine hopes to do well at country's first games

A September graduate of Florida State University with a degree in Information Technology, 22-year-old Jared Heine should be out pounding the pavement trying to get a job. Instead he can be found in a pool, not lounging, but training for the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games, where he will represent the Republic of the Marshall Islands.

The RMI was voted in as the 203rd member of the International Olympic Committee last February and will make its first appearance at the XXIX Olympic Games. This recognition allows the RMI National Olympic Committee to send a handful of Marshallese athletes with previous international experience to take part in the games. The athletes don't have to qualify to participate.

Here's the kicker; even though Heine has an automatic

bid to participate, he is determined to qualify for the 100-meter backstroke on his own.

"I'm definitely going," Heine explained, "but within the Olympics, for swimming, there is a meet within a meet. The people who qualify swim first, for the people who get to just go there is another meet for them. I want to be able to swim with the guys who made the standard."

"I think Jared has a great shot at qualifying under the B standard, although it will not be easy. Nothing worth achieving is ever that easy," said FSU Assistant Coach Jim Barber. Barber is Heine's current swim coach.

Team captain of the Seminoles Division I swim team in his senior year, Heine was on Kwajalein last week

to meet his 2007 World Championship teammates at Emon Beach. Before making it to Kwajalein he had a stop in Majuro to press the flesh with the President of the Marshall Islands Kessai Note.

Born in Guam, raised in Honolulu and living in Tallahassee, Fla., Heine followed his older brother, Jason, to the swimming pool and started competing at the age of six. Even at that age Heine demonstrated a fierce competitive nature when he started winning third, second and eventually first place swim ribbons, recounted his mother Claudine, who is Marshallese.

"Jared is a smaller-than-average male swimmer with a big heart that is performing at levels no one thought he could ever achieve," said Neil Harper, head coach for the FSU Swim Team, and a 1984 and 1988 Olympian.

If the slim, 5'9" Heine can shave 1.08 seconds off his 100-meter backstroke personal best time of 58.08 at the World Championships in March, then two additional Marshallese athletes will be able to piggyback on Heine's successful attempt and be allowed to participate in the Beijing games. Incidentally, the Olympic record for this event is 53.45 seconds.

In the international swim world, where touching the wall a fraction of a second behind the winner can land you in fifth or sixth place, Heine's attempt is no small feat.

"I am sure that not too many athletes and rival coaches ever thought that this skinny little kid would ever amount to much," Harper said. "I think the fact that he continues to keep improving motivates him to see just how much more improvement his hard work

can achieve."

"Athletically Jared has less room for error to compete at a high level, so he has to train at that level very consistently to achieve his goals," Barber added. "Jared stays motivated by the fact that he is representing his country."

Acceptance in the IOC brings a few perks for small countries attempting to develop competitive sports programs. For Heine, that perk is a \$4,000 Beijing 2008 Olympic Scholarship, paid out quarterly—not much for a college graduate who could be making a lot more.

Heine was the only Marshallese athlete to receive one of 906 scholarships awarded by the IOC to promising athletes. International rankings, and in Heine's case points scored in international competition, were the criteria used in securing this financial support intended to assist athletes with accommodation, training and medical costs according to the IOC official Web site.

The next year and a half will be devoted to training six days a week, twice a day with Barber on the Seminole campus, where Heine is working as an unpaid volunteer coach so that he can use the facility.

"I trust him completely," Heine said of Barber. "Each week he knows how much yardage I'm doing. He knows what he wants me to be doing. He has a plan for me all the way to the Olympics."

"Our overall goal is to create an environment from which success is inevitable. I have always wanted






athletes that I work with to be very tough, both mentally and physically," explained Barber. "Jared has strong character and a sense of purpose...he will achieve several lifetime best performances along the way, and we can all sleep at night knowing that he has achieved the highest level he is capable."

With 569 days until the Olympic

Games, Heine knows there will be moments of burn out. His trip to Majuro to meet Note helped reignite the spark.

"I think it's easy to say, 'Oh, you're representing the Marshall Islands,' but when you come over here and say it, it means a lot more," Heine said. "That kind of turned on some lights."

"It's the Olympics. It doesn't get any better than that," continued Heine. "My two goals are to end on a high note and a personal best."

When Heine climbs into the pool for his 100-meter backstroke heat at the Beijing games, it will be the final race of his swim career and at the same exciting moment the first Olympic race for an entire country.
