


Commander announces first Person of Quarter

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New superintendent brings enthusiasm for job

Robinson is 27-year education veteran

The new Kwajalein School Superintendent has been named and is scheduled to arrive Feb. 24.

Allan Robinson, who goes by Al, is coming from Sultan, Wash., a community of approximately 5,000 with one high school, one middle school and two elementary schools.

"My wife, Sonya, and I were considering our next career move and decided to look outside of Washington State," Robinson explained how Kwajalein became an employment option. "I was looking on the AASA [American Association of School Administrators] Web site, and found this job in September, which caused me to start researching the position."

Robinson said that his children are grown and it seemed like a good time to look to the horizons. "The more I looked at it, the more excited I became about the possibilities. The size of the school system, and the community involvement on the island, and in particular with the school system, was very instrumental in my decision to apply."

Robinson has been either a principal or superintendent in schools since 1986. He's been the superintendent of schools at the Sultan School District since 2000. Sultan is in Northwestern Washington, located approximately 30 miles Northeast of Seattle as the crow flies.

Robinson is a 1980

graduate of the Washington State University with a bachelor of arts in industrial education. "I began college planning to be an engineer, but in working with a high school youth group fell in love with working with young people," he said. "I can't imagine doing anything else. I have been working with young people, and parents, and teachers, and school boards, and community members for almost 27 years, and am as excited about it today as I was my first day in the classroom."

That enthusiasm seems to have reached his target audience. "Although we hear in education that we build the future, and don't always get to see the fruits of our labors, I believe there is no greater feeling than when a former student comes back and thanks you for some little thing you did, and perhaps didn't even know about it. Students are like sponges, and they absorb so much more than we ever realize. If a teacher touched you and made a difference, find them and thank them today."

While teaching brings joy to Robinson, he admitted that it isn't always easy, "Helping young people see the reason behind what they're learning and helping them become responsible for their own learning. As teachers and staff and parents, we do not have all the answers, but we can help point our students in the right direction to find what they're looking for.


"I believe the school is, or can be, the heart of a community, and I also

believe that in order to be effective as a school, the school has to be immersed in the community and vice versa," Robinson said. "I have been very involved in community activities and festivals for years, am organized, can lead or follow (when required), and am very visible as a representative of the school system and community. In a small community, I believe visibility is crucial."

Robinson will be accompanied by his wife. "My wife, Sonya, who works in a neighboring school district as a lead secretary, will join me this summer after finishing her school year. All of our six sons are either in college or on their own, and so it will be just Sonya and me."

And this is their first time overseas. "This will be my first venture not only out of the U.S, but also out of Washington State for work. For those wondering, I will turn 50 this summer," he said.

He plans on taking it all in when he gets to the islands. "I am a former woodshop instructor, and so love woodworking. I have a guitar I haven't paid much attention to in recent years, and I hope to reacquaint myself with it. I am interested in boating, and perhaps in diving, though I know nothing about diving, either snorkeling or scuba, at this point. I also am very interested in getting back into physical condition and love bicycling. I

once rode across Washington State, 444 miles and five 4,000 ft. passes, over eight days in August of 1993."

Robinson admitted to not knowing much about the Republic of the Marshall Island prior to finding the job on the AASA Web site. "Since I have accepted the position I have been amazed at how many people not only know of the Marshall Islands, but know Kwajalein, and have been there. I play a friendly game of poker every couple of weeks with a number of gents, all of whom are 20 years my senior, and one, who is a WWII vet, actually fought in the Pacific and spent some time on Kwajalein."

Robinson added, "I can't wait to get on island and get started. I look forward to meeting you all and working with each of you."

Robinson also has a master of arts in education administration from Whitworth College and is a graduate of the Superintendents' Credential Program at Washington State University.

Pardon their dust

Emon Beach getting extreme makeover

Much of beach will be off-limits during infrastructure remodeling

Much of the Emon Beach area will be off-limits through the beginning of April. This recreational area is receiving a facelift that will be more than skin deep.

By the time all is said and done, infrastructure problems will be solved, and the area will be made into a more useable recreation site.

"This project involves the Construction Shop, Water Distribution Shop, Electrical Shop and Heavy Equipment Shop. There will approximately 10 to 12 people working at one time on this project," Gerry Geronimo, project coordinator from Public Works, said.

An overview of the work:

- Heavy Equipment Shop will regrade the road, prep the subgrade and place a six-inch gravel base. They are also be responsible for batching and delivering concrete to the job site.
- Water Distribution Shop will do excavation, back-

fill and compaction for underground utilities. It is also responsible to install four-inch power and water lines and extending the storm drain to the southeast corner of Pavilion 1.

- Construction Shop will construct two concrete curbs, 12 feet apart and lay octagonal brick pavers along the existing dirt road. It will also build two decks with patio pavers approximately 800 square feet. The decks will be under the palm trees across from the "A" frame pavilion and across the road from the Kayak Shack.
- Construction crew will construct a swale on three sides of Facility 1880 to eliminate drainage problems in the area.

"Emon Beach is a very important recreational and gathering place on Kwaj as it supports all island demographics on a daily basis, and it is used for the biggest special events including the 4th of July celebration, the Music Festival, Beach Blast Days and AFE shows," Simone Smead, Community Activities manager explained. "The beach area has steadily deteriorated over time, and we feel this important area should be kept up."

The community may be inconvenienced while the work is being done. "We intend to keep the beach open as much as possible, only closing specific areas as construction requires," Smead said. "Community

Activities has reviewed all existing pavilion reservations in our system, and we are working with those individuals to make accommodations. We will not be accepting new reservations during this time because we cannot guarantee long-range availability. The pavilions will be open on a first-come, first-serve basis and we will work with people for reservations a week or two out to see if it's possible to ascertain if the pavilion they want will be open, but it will be a fluid situation.

"We encourage people to consider Camp Hamilton and Coral Sands for their needs so they can have confirmed reservations."


The idea for improving the Emon Beach was pitched to U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll in 2003 when Col. Jerry Brown was commander.

Since then the need for this revitalization has become more apparent. "The use of the Main Pavilion at Emon Beach has increased since the Yuk Club went down, and people continually look for a big place to have the largest parties on

island," Smead continued. "Specific problems that will be corrected include putting in proper drainage around the Main Pavilion to alleviate the patio floor flooding. The paver pathway will resolve the pothole issue as well as create a pathway boundary so there is not continual expansion of the path. The decks at the North end of the path expand that area to accommodate larger gatherings. There is also a chance that lighting and power will be brought to the small North end pavilions as well."

The project was presented to the Quality of Life Integrated Project Team for discussion, and interest lead to the submission of a work request to obtain a Rough Order of Magnitude. "The project was accepted and funding was authorized Nov. 13, 2004. Since then the project has been in the detailed planning stage and materials were ordered and have recently been received," Smead added.

Once the project is

complete, the community should see a marked improvement in the beach area. "The decks can be used in the day to place beach chairs or to just be off of the sand, and in the evening times they can be used as a gathering place or add additional space for parties that use the smaller North end pavilions," Smead said.

However, in the meantime the community's patience is requested.

"Unfortunately, this inconvenience is a necessary part of the project, but we are all excited to have better beach area when it's all done," Smead said.

The project began Tuesday, and will continue for 10 to 12 weeks." The community is asked to stay away from equipment and out of the areas indicated by caution tape, barricades and other safety de-

marcations," Smead said.

Keeping the community out of harm's way while the construction is in progress is one of the concerns of the project manager. But he must also ensure that his crews are safe. "There are several safety concerns on this project such as equipment operation; electrical hazards such as using extension cords and power tools; hand injuries; ergonomics and chemical reaction and sprain or back injuries," Geronimo said. "We are working with our safety representative to eliminate these hazards."

He added thanks to the people involved in the project, "This job will not materialize with out the combined effort of Engineering Department, Environmental, Safety, and Health Department, Water Distribution Department, and Kwajalein Operation personnel."

Range operation scheduled for Wednesday

A range operation is scheduled for Wednesday. Caution times are 7:01 p.m. through 3:28 a.m., Thursday.

In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within the Kwajalein Atoll. The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr island on the west reef; on the south the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni island on the west reef.

Bigej, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor.

The mid-atoll corridor islands of Gagan, Legan and Meck shall be in sheltered status. Only mission essential personnel shall be approved by the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Command Safety Office to remain on sheltered islands. Illeginni and Omelek are designated as evacuation islands. All mid-atoll corridor islands not named

as sheltered islands are deemed as evacuation islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas. See maps.


In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein Police Department clearance procedures will begin at 7:30 a.m., Sunday and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:





Mahi mahi season has arrived. If you have recently been out fishing the waters surrounding Kwajalein Atoll, or if you have had a chance to stop by the Small Boat Marina after the boats have returned from fishing, you know what I am talking about—mahi mahi season is here!

For those of you who have not yet had the opportunity to get out on the water to enjoy the thrill of landing one of these impressive fish or know little about mahi mahi, here is some information you might find interesting.

Mahi mahi (meaning "strong strong in Hawaiian) is also commonly referred to as Dolphin fish (not to be confused with "Flipper" the porpoise) and Dorado (Spanish for "Gold"). Mahi mahi is one of the most beautiful game fish in the world, its upper body colored a bright green or blue and its sides gold, with flashes of green. When a mahi mahi first comes out of the water, its colors are absolutely

"electric" – an absolutely magnificent sight!

Male mahi mahi are referred to as "bulls" – bulls have a distinct upright head. Females are referred to as "cows" and have a much more rounded head. Small mahi mahi are also often referred to as "chickens".

Male or female, mahi mahi are just about the wildest catch you'll ever bring into the boat. They have the strength and power to literally pop the cooler top open, flip out of the cooler and right back into the water. I have seen this happen with my own eyes! They are also one of the fastest fish in the ocean, reaching speeds over 40 mph.

Mahi mahi do not have a very long life span, generally living only three to four years and are one of the fastest growing fish in the sea – growing up to an inch a week. Biologists say a 30-pound dolphin is only one year old – that's a phenomenal growth rate. Mahi mahi can also range anywhere from 2 pounds to over 80 pounds in weight. Although larger mahi have been caught, the current mahi mahi International Game and Fish Association world record is held by an 88-pound mahi caught in the Bahamas. The record here at Kwajalein is currently held by Capt. Tom Jack and crew for their 49-pound mahi landed on Dec. 18—a spectacular fish!

Mahi mahi can be found on the reef or around anything that is floating. During mahi mahi season, wherever you find flying fish, you can generally find mahi mahi, as flying fish are one of their favorite meals. If you hook a mahi mahi, try your best to avoid all of your

instincts of getting the fish to the boat in a hurry. Instead, slowly reel in the fish; try to get one or two more lines in the water next to the hooked fish – many times the rest of the school will follow the hooked mahi up to the boat. Using this technique provides a great opportunity to hook two or three more fish. Once you get your mahi to the boat, one of the safest ways to capture this fish is to keep its head in the water until you are absolutely ready to pull the fish in the boat. Go directly from the water into the cooler and close and latch the lid – leave the hook with the fish in the cooler for at least fifteen to twenty minutes until well after the fish has had a chance to settle down. Should a mahi get loose on the boat, one technique you might want to consider using to ensure your catch remains in the boat is to throw a towel over its head – this will generally settle the fish down so you can put it in the cooler!

One final bit of information about mahi mahi, they are absolutely delicious to eat – one of my personal favorites – you can find lots of good recipes online or you can simply ask any one of the local anglers here on island for their favorite recipe!

Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 14 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terror:

Pfc. Darrell W. Shipp, 25, of San Antonio, Texas, died Jan. 25 in Baghdad, Iraq, of wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 5th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Pfc. Nathan P. Fairlie, 21, of Canador, N.Y., died of injuries suffered in Baqubah on Jan. 26 when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Bradley Fighting Vehicle during combat operations. Fairlie was assigned to the 6th Squadron, 9th Cavalry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Two Soldiers died Jan. 25 in Baghdad, Iraq, of wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near their vehicle during combat operations. The Soldiers were assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 61st Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo. Killed were: **Sgt. Alexander H. Fuller**, 21, of Centerville, Mass. and **Pfc. Michael C. Balsley**, 23, of Hayward, Calif.

Lance Cpl. Anthony C. Melia, 20, of Thousand Oaks, Calif., died Jan. 27 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq.
