It will be women who change our world

Since the first caveman crawled out of his cave and saw his first cave-woman, hit her in the head with his club, and dragged her back 'home,' women were expected to be subservient to men.


That was the 'arrangement' between men and women for centuries.

It was a major tenet of almost all religions, especially the world's three major religions—Christianity, Judaism and Islam. Men were superior to women in all ways. Women were expected to 'obey' their husbands in all things.

It remained so until women in the western world, primarily the United States, tired of being treated as property and having no rights. They could not vote, own land or run a business. They were totally dependent on a husband, father or brother for financial support.

American women started fighting for the right to vote in 1848 when a women's rights convention was held in Seneca Fall, N.Y. The battle was just beginning.

After the Civil War ended in 1865, women fought for the vote by stating that the 15th Amendment freed the slaves and that they in effect were slaves to men, and thereby should be



considered 'freed' by the amendment and thus be given the same rights as all American citizens. Of course, that didn't work.

In 1872, Susan B. Anthony was arrested for illegally casting a vote in an election. The arrest was challenged all the way to the Supreme Court which rejected the argument that the 'equal protection' clause of the 15th Amendment extended to women.

Women turned from the courts to Congress and in 1878, a constitutional amendment providing 'the right of citizens to vote shall not be abridged in the United States or any state on account of sex' was put up for a vote. This amendment would be put before every session of Congress and would be voted down for the next 41 years.

But in 1900, shamed by women's persistence in the face of being ar-

rested, jailed, ostracized by society and in many cases disowned by husbands, Utah, Colorado, Idaho and Wyoming became the first states to allow women to vote.

In 1912, Theodore Roosevelt ran for president with a promise to support women's right to vote.

In May of 1919, the amendment allowing women to vote finally gathered the two-thirds support needed in Congress and passed. The amendment was sent to the states for ratification, and after all the state legislatures had voted on it in July of 1920, it came down to the Tennessee legislature. If Tennessee passed it, the amendment would become law. There's a story that says a young legislator who was about to cast his vote found a note his mother had put in his pocket that morning. It said, 'Be a good boy, vote yes.' The amendment passed the Tennessee legislature by one vote. American women finally won their battle. It had only taken 72 years.

But it was still going to be a long road in the fight for women's equality. It would take many more decades for women to earn the right to work without stigmatization. It would take


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Acts of compassion

Canvasback doctors, dentists visit Ebeye

Twenty-three healthcare providers from across the United States volunteered their vacation time and their extensive talents the past two weeks.

They are members of the Canvasback Missions.

They arrived on Kwajalein March 17 and treated dozens of patients at the Leroj Kitland Memorial Health Center on Ebeye through Friday.

"We could not have done this without the help of USAKA," Jacque

Spence, who founded the charitable organization with her husband in 1981, said of the support they received from the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll.

"Alan Taylor [from the USAKA

Host Nation office] arranged for us to stay in vacation trailers, have bikes and eat at the PDR [Café Pacific],” Spence said. “Everything was laid out for us.”

The team of surgeons, nurses, dentists, hygienists, physical therapists and other volunteers provided dozens of surgeries and a myriad of care during their stay. One physician said, “Even with everything we’ve done to prepare, we’ve still been working 12-hour days.”

Healthcare providers from the Canvasback Missions have been coming to the Marshall Islands since 1986. Spence said this group included two teams. One team treated patients with orthopedic

problems, and the other team provided dental care.

The orthopedic team, headed up by Robert Wells, M.D., performed knee joint replacements and arthroscopy utilizing donated equipment, which they left in Ebeye. Wells also trained Ebeye orthopedic surgeon Richard Trinidad to use the equipment so he can continue doing implants and arthroscopy after the team departed.

The dental team, led by Milford Anholm, DDS, helped relieve a backlog of patients who needed dental services. Working with Ebeye’s Dr. Timota Taniera, they treated up to 50 patients a day and trained the Ebeye dental

staff on how to do four-handed dentistry.

Kwajalein Range Services Marian Naretto, a certified registered nurse anesthetist and solo anesthesia provider for the Kwajalein clinic, was one of the people who supported the trip. She spent time in the operating room and on the wards, and will go back over next week to continue where Canvasback Missions’ training program left off.

Canvasback Missions, a faith-based, nondenominational organization, serves remote Pacific islands with healthcare and health education.

“My life wasn’t satisfying me,” Spence said as she explained how Canvasback came to be. She

added that she and her husband, Jamie Spence, had achieved professional and financial success but that it wasn’t enough. They built a boat and began a seven-year trek over the Pacific from San Francisco to Australia. Somewhere along the way, she said, the small islands they visited changed their view on life. “They went from being our personal playgrounds to making us aware of the need that existed.

“We saw so many needs. There were many miracles that happened that showed us what we should do.” Spence related how she had a medical emergency during the trip that took weeks to resolve due to the lack of medical

care available. Even though they had money, money couldn't buy what wasn't available.

She added that she learned about a little boy who died from pneumonia on one of the islands they visited because there was no medication. "On one of the islands the most 'high-tech' thing they had was a kerosene lamp, but they didn't have any kerosene," she said quietly.

"Even the poorest person in the United States lives like a king compared most of the people you meet on these islands," Spence said. She added, "They have very few options."

Meeting the people of the islands changed the Spence's lives. They returned the states with a new goal. They commissioned a 71-foot, aluminum-hulled boat, the Canvasback, one of the world's largest sailing catamarans. With help from businesses who donated supplies and equipment, plus more than 200 skilled volunteers, the vessel was launched on June 16, 1986.


"After we built the Canvasback we started in 1986 to help the outer island dispensary systems in the Marshall Islands build up. We really felt like it was a U.S. responsibility. And the Marshall Islands are well situated for a shallow-draft boat ministry," Spence said.

Eventually the mission of Canvasback outgrew the catamaran. Spence now takes approximately six, two-week trips a year to third-world nations where her organization provides medical care.

Spence said many people on Kwajalein made this trip possible. She said Sharon Hurst from SpaceX and KRS's Jimmy Matsunaga were instrumental in getting a donated 20-foot container to ship supplies and equipment.


She added that everything for this venture, from trucking donated supplies cross-country, to testing and repairing equipment, to packing the container was accomplished by volunteers.

New defense budget will modernize military

The proposed defense budget will modernize and recapitalize the armed forces, Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates told the House Appropriations Defense Subcommittee Thursday.

Gates said the proposed budget and the emergency supplemental request will exceed \$700 billion. The military needs this money to sustain the force, modernize weapons systems, train forces and build defense capabilities.

Marine Gen. Peter Pace told the representatives that the heavy demand on U.S. forces is unlikely to dissipate in the near future. The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff specifically asked the representatives to look hard at the military's increased need for mid-level officers and NCOs.

Pace said embedded training teams in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere help those nations provide for their own security. "The training that we do with other armed forces rests on the shoulders of our mid-grade Soldiers and mid-grade officers," Pace said. "We are peeling off some of those officers and enlisted from operational units. An increase in mid-grades would help us enormously with what lies ahead."

Gates said the budget and concurrent increase of Soldiers and Marines will sustain the military by reducing stress on the force and improving quality of life for U.S. troops and their families. The budget also funds ongoing operations in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere in the campaign against violent jihadist networks around the globe, he said.

Gates told the representatives to put the budget request in historical context. The request translates to about four percent of the U.S. gross domestic product. He said it is a significantly smaller percentage of GDP than when the United States was involved in the Vietnam War or the Korean War. Gates said this amount of money may give people "sticker shock," but it must be viewed in the light of different threats. "In addition to fighting the war on

terror, we face the dangers posed by Iran's and North Korea's nuclear ambitions and the threat they pose to not only their neighbors, but globally, due to their records of proliferation," he said.

He said the United States must be ready to counter the uncertain paths of China and Russia – both pursuing sophisticated military modernization programs. And, he said, there is a range of other challenges, flash-

points and threats in the world. "In this strategic environment, the resources we devote to defense at this critical time should be at a level to meet those challenges," Gates said. "The costs of defending the nation are high. The only thing costlier would be to fail to commit the resources necessary to defend our interests around the world, and to fail to prepare for the inevitable threats of the future."

decades for women to earn the right to run for political office, to own a business and to own land and property in their own names.

There is still a fight for equality in many areas of American life for women such as equal pay for equal work, but they have attained what their earlier sisters couldn't have dared dream of.

It was much the same way in parts of Europe. Women in England weren't treated much better than domestic servants by men. It wasn't until World War I, when women were needed in the factories and heavy industry, that English women began fighting for equal rights as citizens.

In the past 200 years, women in the western world have come a long way, as the saying goes. They not only changed the way they were treated, but the way many people were treated. They changed the entire fabric of society and the way many religions looked upon women.

But as we all know, such is not the case in much of the world.

In some countries, girl babies are killed at birth because they are considered worthless.

Just recently, a 19-year-old girl in Saudi Arabia was sentenced to 90 lashes after she was kidnapped and

gang-raped by seven men *because she was alone with a man not related to her.*

Women in many countries and religions can be repudiated by their husbands on a whim. Under centuries-old family code, a man can divorce his wife just by saying it three times. In strict Muslim and other societies, there is great shame in being a spurned wife. Without the support of a husband, many women have to beg in the streets which is against the law in some Middle Eastern and African countries. Women have been executed for begging.

But slowly, women in Islamic and African countries may be starting to change things.

In Morocco for example, women have started an organization called Spring of Equality which gives legal advice to women. This organization helped get a new family code passed that requires a husband to go to court and show cause why he should be allowed to divorce his wife. And, more importantly, if a divorce is granted, the woman keeps any children and will be allowed to keep the family house so they won't be out on the street.

In Morocco, as well as other countries, girls of any age can be given by their fathers in marriage. Under the

new code, when a girl reaches 18, she is no longer considered bound by her father's wishes.

These changes came about because brave women dared to challenge Moroccan custom and law, even at the risk of death.

Many of the changes in Morocco were met with large protests by many men who claimed it was against the Koran.

But the King of Morocco, Mohammed VI, was impressed with the women's courage and gave his support to changing the family code.

As small as these changes may be, they are enormous for that part of the world. Big changes start with little changes.

Women have the power to change the world. They changed the western world and now perhaps, little by little, they will change the rest of the world.

If equality and fair treatment of women can be attained in other countries, then equality and fair treatment of everyone might follow.

If radicalism and hatred in Islamic and other societies is ever going to change, it will be women who change it.

If the world becomes a better place, it will be because of the courage of women who stood up, risked everything and fought for what is right.

Children of Men *Y Tu Mamá También* and *Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban* director Alfonso Cuarón returns to the helm to tell this futuristic tale in which society is without hope since humankind lost its ability to procreate. The year is 2027, and women can no longer give birth. The youngest inhabitant of the planet has just died at the age of 18, and all hope for humanity has been lost. As civilization descends into chaos, a dying world finds one last chance for survival in the form of a woman who has become inexplicably pregnant.

Rocky Balboa Sylvester Stallone returns to the director's chair for *Rocky Balboa*, the fifth sequel to the film that made him a superstar 30 years before. The movie begins with Rocky (Stallone) still mourning the death of his loyal and beloved wife, Adrian, who died three years previously after losing a battle against cancer. Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 44 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terror: **Sgt. Thomas L. Latham**, 23, of Delmar, Md., died March 11 in Baghdad, Iraq, of wounds sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Humvee. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 14th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

Sgt. 1st Class Douglas C. Stone, 49, of Taylorsville, Utah, died March 11 in Iraq of wounds suffered from a non-combat related incident. His death is under investigation. Stone was assigned to the 96th Regional Readiness Command, Salt Lake City.

Sgt. Robert M. Carr, 22, of Warren, Ohio, died March 13 in Baghdad of wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle. Carr was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 12th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo.

Lance Cpl. Angel Rosa, 21, of South Portland, Maine, died March 13 from wounds received while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. Rosa was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Pfc. Alberto Garcia Jr., 23, of Bakersfield, Calif., died March 13 in Baghdad of wounds suffered when his unit came in contact with enemy forces using small arms fire and an improvised explosive device.
