

Hourglass changing to once-a-week


You have all heard me talk about transformation of U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll and Reagan Test Site and how we are implementing Lean Six Sigma to assist us in making important changes to the way we do business and improvements of our infrastructure.

I'm ready to announce the results of the first two studies the team has accomplished. First, *The Kwajalein Hourglass* will change to a once-a-week newspaper beginning May 12. Additionally, the TV guide will be published separately, also once a week. The TV guide will come out on Fridays, and the *Hourglass* will come out on Saturdays. Announcements will be made in *The Hourglass*, the *KRS Newsline* and on the *AFN Roller*.

The numbers of copies and distribution points for each publication will also change. We are not only reducing the number of copies to better reflect the reduced island

population, we are also reducing the number of distribution points, at the same time increasing the numbers we deposit at each point. Beginning May 12

Are we returning to bad old days of Cold War?

Secretary of Defense Robert Gates met with Vladimir Putin, the president of Russia, on April 24 to discuss the possibility of placing U.S. missile defense capabilities in Eastern Europe. Poland and the Czech Republic are the countries in which the United States would like these capabilities.


One of those assets could be the Ground-Based Radar Prototype that now sits at the south end of Kwajalein.

As some may know, there was a delegation of Czech government officials on island recently to discuss the

transfer of the radar to the Czechs.

The meeting between Gates and Putin must not have gone very well. After the two men met, Putin announced that Russia will probably withdraw from the Conventional Forces in Europe treaty which limits the number of conventional weapons and forces that can be deployed by a European nation. That will be Russia's response if the U.S. goes ahead with deployment of a missile shield in Eastern Europe.

This move could upset the balance of power and stability in Europe and is



aimed directly at the United States. Could it be that Putin feels so

Town hall meeting for Marshallese employees addresses future of Kwajalein, transition, transportation issues

Col. Stevenson Reed, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander, met with hundreds of members of the Republic of the Marshall Islands workforce Wednesday at a RMI town hall.

The format for the town hall had Reed speaking and Noda Lojkar, liaison for the RMI government to USAKA, translating. Following the colonel's remarks, the meeting was open for questions from the audience.

"I believe in my heart what everyone does here is important, and that's why I want to hear what you have to say," the colonel said.

He added that he will have important issues translated into Marshallese and printed in *The Hourglass* and that quarterly he will write a paper that will be distributed to the Marshallese, "I want to make sure you are informed," he said.

He addressed concerns he had received from community members:

What is the future of USKAKA and the Reagan Test Site?

"Let me assure everybody here that the U.S. government is not planning on departing Kwajalein in the near future," he said. He added that USAKA will be in the RMI until at least 2016, "We plan on being here beyond that.

"Two weeks ago I briefed the Atoll Senators on fiber optics and how it will affect the range. The timeline for that is to have it fully operational by the 2009 time

frame," he said.

He added that the fiber optics project is a 10 to 15 year lease, "That tells you we plan on investing in it for that long," he said. "We're seeing, in 2008 and 2009, customers increasing 30 percent and in 2010 even more of an increase."

What are we doing with transformation?

"We've had 31 studies of what USAKA should look like," the colonel began. "Gen. Campbell [Lt. Gen. Kevin T. Campbell, Space and Missile Defense Command commander], must approve the report we've sent him. The results will be briefed in the June or July time frame."

He continued, "So we're going to change how we look; maybe that will be size, maybe jobs. We have no plan to leave here and take sensors." He explained that the Ground Based Radar-Prototype is not a USAKA asset; it belongs to the Missile Defense Agency.

"One of the things we are doing is transforming our business practices through Lean Six Sigma." He added that through the warehouse project the community will see \$154,000 going into the infrastructure, specifically to fix houses. "We're fixing Kwajalein to look better and be more efficient."

What can be done to improve the LCM transportation issues?

"Last month I rode the LCM to see what it's like going back and forth to work," he said.

"We understand that the LCMs are crowded. Part of this problem is because of the lack of water taxis."

He said that the Army cannot legally sell fuel to the water taxis. [Public law prohibits the military from selling fuel to the public. A possibility for the future is the Foreign Military Sales proposal to the RMI, a government-to-government transaction and not available to private taxis.] He said he is having his staff look into answers for the LCM problem. "I want to see if we can figure out when is the best time during the week to perhaps add an additional LCM to the schedule." Once a decision has been made, a trial run will be scheduled for the remainder of the spring and summer. He said he will provide more information on this after his staff looks at it.

What can be done about space-available air travel to Roi-Namur?

"Space-A is for everyone," he said. "No Space-A traveler has priority over anyone else."

Next the colonel took questions from the audience. The questions were asked in Marshallese, Lojkar translated, and the colonel responded.

Q. Who has priority riding the LCM home after work? Is it the workers or others such as the children who have come over to play sports or people who have come over to visit?

A. The workforce has priority; however, I'm not going to have little kids coming from school and sports get kicked off the LCM. One horror story I heard is a little girl coming from school got kicked off



the LCM twice.

Q. I come to work around 7 a.m. on the LCM, but I don't start my work day until 10 a.m. and I have to work until 8 p.m. Can we have a later morning boat? Can we move the LCM back to 7:15 p.m. for later workers?

A. We will look at the schedule. That's why we are looking at the trial period for an additional LCM. The one LCM, for the trial period, is going to cost me \$86,000 a year.

Q. Can you reduce the prices at the DSC Snack Bar?

A. The prices are controlled by the contractor, Kwajalein Range Services. I will talk to them about this.

Q. Why can we only take two items through the DSC to go to Ebeye? Can that be changed?

A. We'll have to look at it. [The regulation that governs items through the DSC is under revision. USAKA's major concerns, based on historical data, are contributing to black marketing on Ebeye and competition with Ebeye businesses. There may be some room for loosening restrictions, according to Klein.]

Q. Why can't passengers go straight to the

Racing the RustMan

Wet weather can't stop 28th RustMan Triathlon

What does it take to stop a RustMan? Heavy winds and water dumping from the sky certainly didn't do it. Monday's 28th swimming, cycling and running of the RustMan showcased the hardheadedness and athletic ability of 18 indi-

vidual contestants and 16 teams. The competition began as scheduled at 4 p.m. with a brisk 1-kilometer swim from Echo Pier to Emon Beach. The spectators were as wet as the swimmers who emerged from the water.

Next came the 42-kilometer bicycle ride. "It was a slow bike course this year due to rain," said


Bob Sholar, race director. "This was visible in the bike times of veteran contestants."

The final leg was 10-kilometer run.

The men's overall winner was Jon Jahnke in 2:20:48. "John is a high school teacher, new to Kwajalein this year," Sholar said. The women's overall winner

was Virginia Mack in 2:41:57. "Virginia is an X-ray technician, also new to Kwajalein this year," Sholar said.


"Interestingly, both Jahnke and Mack are in the Masters Division [40+], but were also the overall winners," Sholar said. He added, "This is the second time in 28 annual events that this

has happened for the men and women both. The middle-aged runners have become more dominant in recent years." The last time Masters Division competitors took the titles was in 2004.

The team Drowning, Swerving and Plodding Along, belied their name, finishing first 2:14:58. Justin DeCoster was the swimmer; Brian Brewster followed on the bike and Abe Stores was the runner.

Some of this year's highlights included:

- The first time a U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander competed, Stevenson Reed took on the running leg of the team competition with squad mates John Landgraaf and Steve Snyder, also known as John, Steve and the COL.

- For the first time in several years, a contestant chose to do a Purist RustMan using a one speed "Kwaj Bike". Mike Savage, competing in his first RustMan, finished in

3:05:26.

- After doing the run segment on teams for the prior five RustMan events and improving that time each year, RustMan promoter Doug Hepler has now done the "whole enchilada" in 3:11:40. Hepler gradually peeled off 50 pounds of body weight over that 5-year period leading up to Monday's personal triumph.

- Maggie Greenwood who is visiting from Guam finished in 2:57:50, lowering the Female Seniors (50 and over) record of 3:10:41 set back in 1994. The solo contestant field included a second visitor, Stephanie Los, who sailed into Kwajalein Harbor on a long-distance cruising sailboat earlier in April.

- Julianne Kirchner and Michael Taylor from Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School were well ahead out of the water together in an impressive 13:48 swim segment. They swam hard and then tied intentionally, joining arms to cross the swim

finish line.

- Longer-term Kwaj residents Amanda Curtis, Pam Tinker Johnson and Sarah Stepchew finally decided to do RustMan for the first time.

- Ladies winner, Mack gave an impromptu sportsmanship award to co-contestant Mary Miller, by placing her winner's flower lei around Miller's neck during the awards presentation. Miller witnessed Mack's bike crash near Building 1010 and stopped to assist. "This, despite Miller being competitive in nature and wanting to possibly beat her prior RustMan time of 2:48:02, done in 2002," Sholar said. Mack crashed after running into a water bottle in the road that had fallen from the bike of another contestant. Virginia had a road rash and bruised elbow and forearm when she crossed the finish line.

- One contestant was dehydrated enough to require some IV fluids, but was fine the next day.

Roi-Namur. And please, I ask that you be conservative when you pick up your copies. Only take what you need.

These changes in the *Hourglass* will net us an annual savings of approximately \$10,000, which will be used to make changes on Kwajalein.

Second, the Lean Six Sigma team conducted a study of the warehousing and receiving operation and came up with a plan that will save the command \$154,000. Combined with the *Hourglass* savings, that's \$164,000 that I intend to put back into the infrastructure, specifically to

fix houses, to improve the quality of life for all of us.

Due to my travel schedule, the next Kwaj Town Hall meeting will take place in very late May or early June. I will have more information on Lean Six Sigma initiatives at that meeting.

LCM and load? Why do they have to wait in the waiting area where it is crowded and hot? Why do the workers to Meck go straight out?

A. I don't have an answer. I'll look into it and get an answer.

Q. Why can't the water spigot at DSC be moved to the other side. That will make it easier to get water and people can come get water?

A. The spigot is for the workers on Kwajalein. The answer is no. It would make the boats more crowded if people were coming over just for water. We're not going to move it every two years to make people happy. [Lt. Col. Jeff Klein, deputy mission commander, clarified that there is a safety concern with having the water spigot on the lagoon-side of DSC. He said in the past it was located there and young children would ride the LCM over to get water. In short, it was a safety issue for the kids, and overcrowding of the LCM issue that negatively impacted USAKA employees.]

Q. The hours for food service workers were reduced. They have not been brought back to what they were before. Are they going to be? Why did this happen?

A. I don't control hours. The managers [working for the contractor] in the different departments do that. I don't know why the hours were cut; it was probably a business practice. They should have told you why.

We will ask them to get back to you.

Q. Can we have a better variety of food at DSC Snack Bar, instead of just chicken?

A. The variety is about all we're going to have for now. There are other stands where you can buy other food.

Q. I have asked this question before, and it has not been answered before. It is about grandfathered workers. A lot of the workforce is not grandfathered. Can other workers get the same privileges?

A. I can't afford to do that with everyone. We would have to lay-off a large amount of the work force due to the cost associated with the benefits given to grandfathered workers. We will explain more in a future column.

Q. This meeting is not what I thought it would be. Some of the questions are not being answered.

A. I don't know all of the answers. The answers will come from me, but I have to work with my staff to get more information.

Q. What is the purpose of the two, late LCMs?

A. It's to give rides for people who work late shifts, as I understand it.

Q. Can there be a priority for who rides these LCMs because they are often full? Can shift workers have a priority?

A. We will have to look at the list we currently have.

Q. Maybe we should eliminate or suspend sports so the workers

don't have a problem getting a seat on the LCM.

A. We will look at the priorities.

Q. Some of the LCM captains allow more passengers on than others. Can there be a set number of passengers?

A. We will look into loading, priorities, number of LCMs and all of these issues. That should answer all of the questions about the LCMs.

Q. When the LCMs are full and people are left behind there should be a standardized process for adding a boat. Right now there isn't one. Can this be changed?

A. So we can't just adjust the schedule? We will look at that, too. We will have to provide a service to you; but it will take some time to come up with the answers.

Q. Can the DSC Snack Bar open on Mondays? There are a lot of people who come over to Kwajalein on Mondays.

A. We'll check with KRS on that.

Q. The Kwajalein Police Department personnel treat the people at DSC like animals. When the passengers are waiting to go on a boat and the captain says it is full, the officer closes the gate in our faces.

A. No one should be treated like an animal. But there's also the point that some people are using alcohol, some behave badly. We need to look at it from all sides.

Q. Why are the wages

the way they are?

A. I don't tell KRS how to hire people. They have a human resources department that makes those decisions.

Q. What is USAKA's plan for after the fiber optics is operational? Will the RMI workforce be reduced?

A. We don't have an answer yet. Logistically it may change; we don't see it as being smaller.

Q. What about using the catamarans instead of the LCMs?

A. I don't know what the exact maintenance costs are on the cats. The customer pays for that when they use them. I know they are high. I haven't looked into that yet. We will look into a comprehensive solution to the issue of transportation to and from Ebeye.

Q. I was given a security clearance in 1991; it was taken away in 2006. So now I can't do my job, as I require a security clearance to do it. When can I get it back? This will also affect the future of young people wanting to work here.

A. That is still being looked at. Because there were some security breaches round the world, the department of defense is reviewing this. It is not a USAKA issue. We have to wait until they say it is ok. Reed promised the group that he would get answers to the questions asked and will publicize those answers in either late May or early June.

strongly about the issue, he is willing to restart the Cold War? Apparently, the answer is yes.

The American government says the missile shield is not intended for use against Russia. No such 'shield' could stop all the missiles Russia has available for launch. It is intended solely as a defense against one or two missiles launched by rogue nations such as Iran.

But the Russian government, meaning Putin, is not buying into that argument.

Looking at it from Putin's point of view, not only has the Soviet Union broken apart, but so has the Warsaw pact. Many of the nations that belonged to the Warsaw Pact have now joined NATO. The Russians view the expansion of NATO as a direct threat. The Russians always expect treachery and betrayal. And why not? Their history is full of it.

According to an article by Czech writer Tony Wesolowsky in *These Times*, the commander of the Russian Space Forces (counterpart to the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command) told the Russian news media that if the GBR-P was placed in the Czech Republic, it could monitor all of central Russia's missile launch facilities and the Russian Navy's northern fleet.

General Nikolai Solovtsov, commander of Russia's nuclear missile forces said that if such a radar and launchers were placed in Poland and the Czech

Republic, they would most certainly become targets.

The political leaders of the Czech Republic and Poland seem to be in favor of the plan despite the displeasure of the Russians. However, many Czech and Polish citizens are fearful of becoming targets of the Russians and/or terrorists and do not want the facilities in their countries.

There are military analysts who question the need of placing assets in Eastern Europe when radars already exist in Norway, Greenland and Britain. The cost of building the launchers and transferring the GBR-P radar is estimated at \$3.5 billion, according to reports.

Even though the missile defense issue has taken U.S. and Russian relations to a new low, it appears the Pentagon intends to move forward with the project.

A thaw in U.S. and Russian relations could hardly come at a worse time in the world's history. Like it or not, admit it or not, the United States cannot deal effectively with Iranian and Syrian influence in the Middle East and Iraq without Russia's cooperation.

Russia is the biggest arms supplier to Iran and recently sold sophisticated anti-aircraft missile systems to the Iranian military. Russian contractors are building a nuclear plant near Tehran.

Russia is the only country in the world right now that could bring *real* pressure to bear on Iran and Syria.

However, I think we Americans miss

a crucial point. The real problem in dealing with the Russians, and especially Putin, who after all, was a KGB agent in the glory days of the Soviet Union, is that they feel they have been humiliated since the breakup of the Soviet Union. They think they are not respected by Americans and Europeans.

For years now, the United States has gloated over winning the Cold War. We refer to ourselves as the world's only superpower. We've been rubbing salt into Russia's sensitive wounds.

Sometimes it costs little but gains much to give a prideful nation the respect it feels it deserves. Nothing hurts worse than disrespect, especially for Russia and Putin.

It seems we forget Russia has thousands of nuclear warheads. It is certainly not irrelevant on the world stage, especially as I said, in dealings with the Middle East.

Putin *can* be cooperative. He allowed U.S. troops to establish bases in former Soviet territory for the invasion of Afghanistan with no opposition.

More than anything, Putin wants to restore Russia to its stature in world affairs. The U.S. has a lot riding on how he goes about doing that.

Pride is a wonderful thing, but so is the ability to be humble and compromise.

Otherwise, both the U.S. and Russia might find that the price of pride and arrogance can be very costly.

Smokin' Aces When a shifty magician turns state's evidence against a Las Vegas underworld heavy, the high price placed on his head sparks a fevered race to rub the snitch out and collect a tidy paycheck in *Narc* director Joe Carnahan's dark action comedy. Buddy "Aces" Israel (Jeremy Piven) is a small time scammer who has somehow managed to get the goods on big time mobster Primo Sparazza. Upon discovering that Buddy is about to deliver the evidence needed to get him thrown in jail for life, Primo takes out a sizable contract on Buddy that entices every two-bit thug, grizzled bounty hunter, deadly vixen, skilled assassin, and ladder-climbing Mafioso within a hundred mile radius into taking a shot at the prize.

The Good Shepherd One man bears witness to the secret history of America during the Cold War in this drama directed by celebrated actor Robert De Niro. In 1939, Edward Wilson (Matt Damon) is a young man with a bright future ahead of him — he's a top student at Yale and the protégé of one of the school's leading English professors, Dr. Fredericks (Michael Gambon). But Wilson's life changes dramatically when he's invited to join Yale's powerful secret society, Skull and Bones. Through his Skull and Bones connections, Wilson meets Sam Murach (Alec Baldwin), an mysterious FBI agent who asks Wilson to investigate charges that Fredericks is a Nazi sympathizer working with the German government. Later, at a Skull and Bones party, Wilson is introduced to Clover Russell (Angelina Jolie), the sister of one of his classmates and the daughter of a powerful politician; their one-night stand leaves Clover pregnant, and Wilson must leave the woman he loves, Laura (Tammy Blanchard), to wed Clover and give their child a name. Shortly after their wedding, thanks to his work with Murach, Wilson is invited to join the Office of Strategic Services, a military intelligence organization organized by Bill Sullivan (Robert De Niro), and Wilson accepts. Through World War II, Wilson serves with the OSS, and learns he can trust no one in the game of international espionage, which helps make him little more than a stranger to his wife, his son, and his few friends.

Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 18 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terror: **Cpl. Willie P. Celestine Jr.**, 21, of Lafayette, La., died April 26 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to 2nd Assault Amphibian Battalion, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Lance Cpl. Adam E. Loggins, 27, of Athens, Ala., died April 26 from wounds sustained while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 6th Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune.
