


When our girls were old enough to help decorate the tree without knocking it over, they started taking turns being the one to finish our work by placing this simple topper on our tree. The meaning and significance of

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Bush thanks troops in holiday message

In his annual holiday message Friday, President George W. Bush thanked servicemembers and their families for their sacrifices.

“Our nation is thankful for the many sacrifices you and your families make every day. During the holidays and throughout the coming year, we ask the Almighty to bestow His protection and care on you and your loved ones. We pray for your safety and for liberty, justice, and peace on Earth,” Bush’s

message, released today, reads.

He also said the nation owes servicemembers and their families a debt of gratitude for their service.

“In this season of giving, we remember our duty to others, and we see that sense of duty fulfilled in the men and women who wear our nation’s uniform. Our country owes you a debt of gratitude for your courage and resolve to serve the cause of peace,” Bush said. “Americans are proud of your dedicated service, and I am proud to be the commander in chief of the greatest force for free-

dom in the history of the world.”

The president spent part Dec. 20 visiting troops at Walter Reed Army Medical Center here. He visited injured soldiers in their wards, passing along his well wishes and presenting some with Purple Heart Medals. He said this month has the lowest number of patients admitted since 2002.

“Every time I come to a facility like this, I count my blessings, and one of the great blessings is to be the president of a country that produces such brave men and women,” Bush said during his visit.

Mail handlers rush to get holiday packages to troops

While most soldiers are tucked in their beds for the night, a mail handler with 461st Human Resource Battalion, out of Decatur, Ga., is waiting for the mail to arrive

We started getting a spike in mail at the end of October,” explained Army Spc. Tony Rogers, from Tunnel Hill, Ga. “We went from getting four or five (shipping containers) of mail a week to over 10 a week. I try to be there when the trucks arrive to make sure everything goes smoothly. We don’t want any mix-ups that would cause a soldier not to get mail.”

The trucks normally arrive from Baghdad between 1:30 and 2 a.m. Four hours later, Rogers arrives to work at 6 a.m. to sort the mail.

“I don’t mind,” he said. “These packages are a big morale boost for the soldiers. I know how important it is for soldiers to be able to stay in touch with their families back home. It is worth it to see a soldier get a package and get excited. The holidays are tough, and anything I can do to cheer these guys up is important.”

Army Pfc. Cassie Durkin, from Whitewater, Wis., a human resource specialist for 3rd Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, is a brigade staff mail handler. “It has really been busy here lately,” she said. “We used to get mail once or twice a week, but it has been coming in every day lately. People are trying to get their loved ones packages and cards for the holidays, but it’s a lot.”

Durkin arrives at 6 a.m. with the other mail handlers to sort through each shipping container and separate letters and packages by unit. “We work for three hours straight normally,” she said. “There is a lot of detail that goes into it, because we have to read every address and make sure that each package gets put in with the right section.”

Durkin explained that her first three hours of the day are just the beginning. “Official mail call starts at 9:30 a.m. and lasts until 2 p.m., but we haven’t been getting out until 6 or 7 p.m. most days,” she said. “We stay as late as we need to. We make sure that everyone has a

chance to get their mail. A lot of people have missions that keep them from coming during official hours so we stay and help them out.”

It is a demanding job, but Durkin said she enjoys it. “It can be very tiring, but I’m happy to help people out,” she said. “I personally try to help out people by hand delivering what I can, especially people that I know have a lot on their plate and can’t get down here. Someone else’s happiness really makes the job worth it. I really enjoy seeing people get something special from home.

It’s tough when you see soldiers getting antsy because a package they are expecting hasn’t arrived yet. I try and get everyone their packages so they don’t have to go through that.”

As Christmas gets closer, Durkin said, mail is a critical part of mission effectiveness. “It is the most important thing for the soldiers’ morale right now,” she said. “Presents, Christmas cards, homemade cookies and pictures are all pieces of home that soldiers out here need. If I can help with that, it’s a good thing.”

Wednesday morning a boatload of young people gathered at the Dock Security Checkpoint, ready to board the catamaran Pvt. Anderson and head to Carlos. They formed a human chain, loading box after wrapped box conveying gifts for the day.

The 15-minute cruise was filled with chatter and a quick rehearsal of "Rudolph the Red-Beaked Parrot Fish."

A handful of children waited at the dock when the catamaran arrived. The students from Kwajalein unloaded their boxes and headed to the center of the

Marshallese celebrate season with songs, dances

The 2007 Christmas in the Marshall Islands presentation was held at the Corlett Recreation Center Monday night.

The evening's events included performances by two groups, one from Ebeye and one primarily from Kwajalein.

The dances and songs are performed as a tribute and remembrance of Christian missionaries bringing the gospel of Jesus Christ to the islands. Sailors and missionaries from Northeastern United States, where Christmases are icy, windy snowbound affairs, introduced Christmas to the people of the Marshall

Islands in 1857. In the years since 1857 the Marshallese made the season their own, developing traditions which shine with the loving spirit of these people.

This traditional event featured dancing and singing performances. Different groups from Ebeye perform each year. "An invitation is sent to Leiroj Seagul Kabua James, and she determines who gets invited to perform," explained Cris Lindborg, director Kwajalein's Marshallese Cultural Center. These programs would not be possible without the support of Ebeye's traditional leaders, the Kabua family.

The first group was from Ebeye and had performers of all ages, but primarily young people. Dressed in red shirts and black skirts or slacks, the performers entertained the crowded gymnasium for more than

an hour.

Next came the jebta from Kwajalein. "We've had the local Kwajalein-USAKA [U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll] jebta under Noda's [Lojkar] guidance perform every year since we started," Lindborg said.

This group, made up of people who live and or work on Kwajalein, was dressed in matching bright green outfits.

The performances ended with the entertainers tossing candy and goodies into the crowd. The jebtas are competitions between groups in the community; no prizes are awarded other than personal satisfaction.

Preparation for Christmas in the Republic of the Marshall Islands typically begins in September.

Monday's performances were appetizers for the buffet of entertainment provided Christmas day on Ebeye. Churches across the island feature presentations throughout the day. Visitors can walk from church to church and see hundreds of parishioners displaying their talents, each trying to outdo the group preceding them.

"We would like to invite the Kwajalein community to go to Ebeye and watch the dancing and performances that happen all Christmas Day in their churches," she said. "It is a great time of joy and fellowship, everyone is welcome to attend. The Kwajalein/USAKA Jebta will be going on the 11:40 a.m. boat that would be a great time to join the group that performs at various churches."

Lindborg added, "Make sure you wear appropriate clothing, skirts bellow the knees and covered shoulders for women and long pants for men. Also might want to bring a fan and 1 dollar bills to contribute to the churches."

The Marshallese Cultural Society started the Christmas in the Marshall Islands program in 2000 with Lindborg and her husband, Eric, in key roles. "We started this program because we felt a need to share more social, fun exchanges with the Ebeye community," she said. "Traditionally, Christmas is a very special time in the Marshall Islands and many people in Kwajalein do not get a chance to go to Ebeye on the 25th, so we thought we'd bring a "sample" of it here."

Kwajalein Range Services Environmental office checking cause of sperm whale death

Part of a sperm whale washed ashore Oceanside Kwajalein on Monday according to Kwajalein Range Services Environmental, Safety and Health representative Mike Malone. The ES&H office coordinated with the Marine Mammal Response Network Coordinator, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Pacific Regional Office for advice on the disposition of the snarge. Malone said ES&H collected a tissue sample to test for DNA and toxicology data in order to positively identify the species and provide insight into the cause of death. Malone said most marine mammals are

protected under the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards in addition the Marine Mammal Protection Act of the

1972 and the Republic of the Marshall Islands Endangered Species Act of 1975. "In the future, if people find something of

this nature they should notify the Environmental Office at 51134 or call the emergency pager at 192," Malone said.

THE HOST NATION office reminds residents that many traditional customs are followed on Ebeye, not the least of which is a dress code. Adults must wear conservative clothing. Women should wear loose-fitting shirts that cover their shoulders and dresses or skirts that cover their knees. Men can wear shorts, but only if they aren't planning on attending a formal or church gathering. Men should wear long pants if they plan to enter a church. The dress codes aren't Marshallese laws, but long-followed cultural traditions and not complying with them would be considered offensive by citizens and traditional leaders of our host nation.

Eight servicemembers die in Global War on Terror

Two Soldiers died Dec. 12 at Forward Operating Base Curry, Afghanistan from wounds suffered when their vehicle encountered an improvised explosive device. The Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment (Airborne), 173rd Airborne Brigade, Camp Ederle, Italy. Killed were: **Staff Sgt. Michael J. Gabel**, 30, of Crowley, La. and **Cpl. Joshua C. Blaney**, 25, of Matthews, N.C.

Sgt. Samuel E. Kelsey, 24, of Troup, Texas, died Dec 13 in Tunnis, Iraq of wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart, Ga.

Spc. Brynn J. Naylor, 21, of Roswell, N.M., died Dec.13 in Baghdad, Iraq, of wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his unit using small arms fire. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 12th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo.

Pvt. Daren A. Smith, 19, of Helena, Mont., died Dec. 13, in Baghdad of wounds sustained from a non-combat related incident. He was assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 89th Cavalry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Polk, La.

Sgt. 1st Class Jonathan A. Lowery, 38, of Houlton, Maine, died Dec. 14, in Mosul, Iraq of wounds sustained when enemy forces attacked his unit using small arms fire. He was assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, III Corps, Fort Hood, Texas.

Sgt. Austin D. Pratt, 22, of Cadet, Mo., died Dec. 15 in Balad, Iraq of injuries sustained in Baghdad in an incident that is currently under investigation. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 30th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), located at Fort Polk.

Pfc. Juctin R. P. McDaniel, 19, of Andover, N. H., died Monday in Baghdad of injuries sustained from a non-combat related incident in Taji, Iraq. He was assigned to the 524th Combat Service Support Battalion, 45th Sustainment Brigade, 8th Theater Sustainment Command, Fort Shafter, Hawaii.






