

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Marine police, other responders perform boat rescue in SAR pass on March 29

Hourglass Reports

A private boat was swamped in SAR pass March 29 and eventually capsized. There were no injuries to anyone on the boat *Gypsy*, owned and operated by Lisa Shier.

Shier, DeDe Hall, Heather Mayer and Heidi Rowell were aboard at the time of the incident. Kwajalein Marine Police and the Small Boat Marina responded to Shier's distress calls.

The area around the lagoonside end of SAR pass was unusually rough in the early afternoon March 29. Several boats transited the pass into the lagoon between the hours of noon and 1:30 p.m. and all reported very large, steep waves. There were injuries on some of the other boats. The conditions were caused by a strong current flowing into the lagoon through the pass and a strong wind blowing in the opposite direction.

The large tidal difference caused by the full moon made the currents into the lagoon stronger than usual. Unfortunately for boaters, it is difficult to see hazardous conditions at the lagoon end of the pass from the oceanside end. When there are big waves in SAR Pass, South Pass is generally a safer option. It is also possible to wait a few hours for the currents and waves to diminish.

Shier's boat was coming off the top of one of the really big waves at the pass when the water came over the stern of the boat, nearly filling it with water. Later waves kept dumping more water in the boat. It was obvious to everyone on board that they were in serious trouble.

Shier and the crew took quick action to ensure their safety. Shier made distress calls to the Small Boat Marina on Channel 68 with information on the boat's name, location and the nature of the difficulty. The marina contacted KPD Marine Police, and search and rescue boat *SR001* was dispatched to the scene.

In the meanwhile, Shier turned the boat to the north towards Carlson. This action got the boat out of the immediate area of SAR pass and into a region where the waves were smaller, thus reducing the amount of water

coming into the boat.

The plan was to attempt to get the boat in a position where the crew would be able to swim ashore if required. All of the crew donned life jackets which were very helpful once the crew ended up in the water.

The boat's bilge pumps were turned on, but were unable to keep up with the water coming in. The crew attempted to bail out the boat with a cooler and a tackle box, the only large containers aboard at the time. The bailing efforts of the crew allowed the boat to stay upright for several minutes. The boat finally rolled over in shallow water near the Carlson Pier.

The first rescue vessel on the scene was *Starlite* from Carlson with Grundy Ned and several others aboard. *Starlite* recovered all of the *Gypsy* crew from the water. *SR001*, operated by Lt. Mike Herrington, was on scene just a few minutes later, followed by Marina Boat K-63 with Paul Soloman and Willy Bolkem aboard. With the assistance of K-63, *SR001*

got a line on *Gypsy* and towed it back to Kwajalein.

K-63 picked up the *Gypsy* crew from *Starlite*. K-63 and later K-60, with Bobby Gulibert and Bano Battock assisted the *Gypsy* crew in retrieving their dive gear and the boat gear from the lagoon. *Gypsy* was turned upright and hauled out of the water Monday afternoon at Kwajalein. The boat is being repaired. (Rescuers were acknowledged by Col. Frederick Clarke at a ceremony April 13 in the Religious Education Building. See Page 10).

Every boater at Kwajalein should think about safety and have respect for the ocean, according to Small Boat Marina Supervisor Tweety Holbrook. Holbrook said it is very helpful to think ahead about 'what-if' scenarios and consider what to do in different kinds of emergencies. Quickly implementing risk reduction strategies including calling the marina and donning lifejackets were very helpful to the crew of *Gypsy*.

However, Cardillo said that after the committee chose the Country Club for the prom, "They realized the logistics were far more difficult than using the multi-purpose room. So Julie and Blake had to figure out how to get the kids here. They arranged for the bus to do a trip every hour. The bus is doing four loops around Lagoon Road and down Ocean Road. The kids had to sign up and buy tickets in advance for the rides so we would

“They formed a decoration committee of eight, including boys and girls and Leia Klinger was chairperson,” said Cardillo. “Melissa Peacock and Carrie West were in charge of the food. Julie Alves’ mom, Laura, is helping us do the food and she totally transformed the interior of the Country Club and she is coordinating all of the food provided by junior class parents. We are lucky to have her.”

The students also offered their thanks to Laura. “She’s been a big help,” said junior Melissa Peacock. “It took her a long time. She was here as long as we were yesterday.”

“Mrs. Alves pretty much spearheaded our committee,” said junior Carrie West. “All the displays are hers. She decorated all of the tables and made most of the desserts. She made everything to match our theme. We told her what we wanted and she made it happen.”

Cardillo added, “The Country Club staff is helping too because we are having coffee and punch, but they will sell sodas and ‘mixed’ drinks and smoothies (non-alcoholic of course). The kids are excited about that.”

She noted that there were a few moments of panic for the students. “The music committee thought they had lost the speakers to Bill Williamson’s Jimmy Buffet party that was going on today also, and they were stressing out about that. One boy brought down his 1980’s super-heavy speakers with a bike trailer, but fortunately, we were able to get other speakers.”

Cardillo credits all of the juniors with putting in a lot of time and effort to make the prom a fun time for their fellow high school students. The class began planning for the evening in November.

In addition to the planning, the students spent hours decorating and readying the Country Club for the prom.

“Yesterday we were down here from 2 p.m. until 10 p.m.,” Cardillo said. “Some of them came today from 1-3 p.m. and they all made sure they got on the 6:30 p.m. bus to be here early and do all the finishing touches like tablecloths, candles and centerpieces for the tables.”

The highlight of the decorations was a tree arch with lights that took a total of approximately eight hours to make.

Juniors Will McPhatter, Blake Larson Aaron Mathieson, Dan Valles and Jake Villarreal built the tree from a kit ordered by the class after they saw it in a prom magazine. Melissa Peacock, Stephanie Premo and Cayley Carrado strung the lights on the tree.

"They must have had 10,000 staples putting in those lights and the gossamer to make it look as good as it did," said West. "Three days getting ready for prom tired us out."

"If you look at all the leaves, it's all gossamer," said Cardillo. "So they had to bunch it, staple, bunch it, staple and so forth."

"I think it went really well," said West. "I was nervous on Saturday because the place was so dirty, but in a few hours we pulled it together and cleaned it up and hosed down everything. It turned out really great."

West added, "That was because of [junior] Leia Klinger and her planning. If we didn't have her it wouldn't have turned out so great. She had it outlined with pictures exactly how she wanted it to look. So we just followed her game plan."

The theme for the prom this year was Masquerade Ball.

Leia Klinger said the junior class was inspired to do a masquerade ball theme because, "The eighth graders had been reading *Midsummer Night's Dream* and that's a mythical-type of story and that's where the whole masquerade thing started. Actually, the masquerade theme was something we've been wanting to try for a few years."

Putting on the prom was not without monetary cost to the class. According to Cardillo, the juniors paid to rent the Country Club, to have the bus running and to hire a 'bartender.'

The money comes from fundraisers the class gives during their school years.

"We joined the seniors in the Christmas tree sales this year," said West. "We also had money from previous years. We've been collecting money since seventh grade so when we got to be juniors, we could pay for the prom. It was

Unfortunately, the folks from Carlson were unable to join us today. The boat was actually overturned and it could have meant loss of life. The crew was truly lucky to have people respond competently and quickly. We want to take this opportunity to recognize them in a public forum."

With that, Col. Frederick Clarke and Chief Secretary Casten Nemra handed out the certificates of appreciation that read, "In recognition of your selfless actions and response to the capsizing of a recreational boat from USAKA. "The Central Pacific's Most Dangerous Band") will play cool jazz, jumpin' swing, and hot Latin tunes throughout the evening. The 13-member Stage Band has been a notable element of the school music program for many years. In the late 1980's, former Kwaj resident Nate Jackson was planning a small party for the dance class that he taught and heard the Stage Band rehearsing a couple of swing tunes for their next concert. He asked the band to share their music at his party. At the time, the band knew only four dance songs, but they were such a success that the dancers had them continue repeating those same four songs.

Since then, the band has greatly enlarged its repertoire. The group routinely learns thirty to forty songs each year, beginning rehearsals in August to prepare for the dance. Band alumni have gone on to play in university jazz groups, and former band member and recording artist Andrea Lindborg returned often to rehearse with the band and perform for the Kwajalein



community. Current members often "double" on various instruments to cover the instrumentation needs of the many ensembles in which they perform. The student soloists study improvisation to give authentic interpretations to the jazz classics by such greats as Miles Davis, Charlie Parker, Glenn Miller and Count Basie.

As more people have learned of the dance, ballroom dance classes have enjoyed an enlarged enrollment. The band performs musical styles for swing, fox trot, cha cha, rumba, salsa, and even a couple of waltzes. During the dinner dance, Cheryl Shields often finds herself reviewing dance steps for guests who have taken classes earlier in the year. Even the idea of a "dress up" event takes on a very local

appearance, with dancers in tuxes and fancy dresses along side others in "island formal".

Proceeds from the dance cover the meal and decorations, and very importantly help purchase new music for the following year. Tickets are \$ 45 per person, and are on sale from Cheryl and Dick at 51684. Reservations for seating of parties of four to eight are available when tickets are purchased. 
Eight servicemembers die in Iraq, Afghanistan

Sgt. Kurt E. Kruize, 35, of Hancock, Minn., died April 4 in Baghdad, Iraq of injuries sustained in a non-combat related incident. He was assigned to the 367th Engineer Battalion, St. Cloud, Minn.

Two Soldiers died April 7 in Mosul, Iraq, when enemy forces attacked their vehicle with an improvised explosive device. The Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 64th Armor Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, Fort Stewart, Ga. Killed were: **1st Lt. Robert W. Collins**, 24, of Tyrone, Ga., and **Pfc. William A. Blount**, 21, of Petal, Miss.

Two Airmen died April 9 near Kandahar, Afghanistan, in a crash of a CV-22 Osprey. They were assigned to the 8th Special Operations Squadron, Hurlburt Field, Fla. Killed were: **Maj. Randell D. Voas**, 43, of Lakeville, Minn. and **Senior Master Sgt. James B. Lackey**, 45, of Green Cove Springs, Fla.

Sgt. Sean M. Durkin, 24, of Aurora, Colo. died April 9 at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, of wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his vehicle with an improvised explo-



sive device near Forward Operating Base Wilson, Afghanistan, on March 27. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 12th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, Fort Carson, Colo.

Cpl. Michael D. Jankiewicz, 23, of Ramsey, N.J., died April 9 in Zabul, Afghanistan, of wounds sustained when the CV-22 Osprey he was flying in crashed. He was assigned to the 3rd Battalion,

75th Ranger Regiment, Fort Benning, Ga.

Spc. Joseph T. Caron, 21, of Tacoma, Wash., died April 11 in Char Bagh, Afghanistan, of wounds sustained when insurgents attacked his unit using an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Lead levels above drinking water action level on Meck

The Meck Island water tests performed during first quarter FY08 showed lead levels in the water above the limit, or "action level". This is not an emergency and the high levels of lead detected were either due to the water in the building plumbing remaining stagnant because of decreased usage on Meck and/or water plumbing containing lead components. As a precautionary measure, run the water for 1-2 minutes prior to utilizing it for consumption. As a result, the environmental department increased monitoring of Lead and Copper from annually to every 6 months, investigated the need for a corrosion control treatment, and performed additional source water and water quality parameter monitoring. The analytical results from the water samples taken during the third quarter of FY08 showed lead levels below the action levels, however, lead levels were detected above the action level in first and third quarters FY09. Lead and copper samples will continue to be collected at Meck on a semi-annual basis until two consecutive six month monitoring periods demonstrate lead levels below the lead AL.


Range operations scheduled for April 21

Range operations are scheduled for April 21. Caution times are 12:01 a.m. through 7:45 p.m., April 21 or through mission completion.


During these times, a closed caution area will be in effect in the open ocean west of Kwajalein Island. The caution area extends from the surface to unlimited altitude.

The west reef south of Legan Island will be closed to all marine traffic during the caution times. The mid-atoll corridor will not be closed.

Bike Safety Awareness

In preparation for the upcoming RustMan event, all USAKA residents and visitors are reminded that bicycles are the primary mode of transportation on USAKA. They must be operated in a safe and proper manner. Bicyclists must obey all traffic signs and markings just as operators of motor vehicles are required to do. At some locations, specific bicycle signs will provide traffic control guidance. Where such specific bicycle signs are not present, normal traffic signs shall apply.

All bicyclists on USAKA are encouraged to wear bike helmets and maintain their bikes in working order. All bicycles doing "lap" training around the airfield or participating in the RustMan event will wear a bicycle helmet.

All bicyclists riding their bicycles during periods of darkness will operate their bicycles in compliance with USAKA 190-5 which states, "It is recommended that a headlight or flashlight be used at all times during periods of darkness. Use of the light is required when traveling in all areas of Kwajalein south of 9th Street and along the entire perimeter unpaved road during the hours of darkness. The hours of darkness are 30 minute after sunset to 30 minutes before sunrise." In addition light color or reflective devices such as vests or belts are highly encouraged.

Each bicyclist will operate the bicycle at a speed that is reasonable and prudent under existing conditions. No bike training will be allowed in any area other than around the airfield. Always be alert for pedestrians.
