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# Report to Congress outlines Iranian threat

Iran may be capable of striking the United States with an intercontinental ballistic missile by 2015, according to a Defense Department report submitted to Congress yesterday.

The unclassified analysis outlines near-term and longer-term threats posed by Iran, including Iran's nuclear ambitions and its desire to extend its influence in the Middle East.

"With sufficient foreign assistance," the report states, "Iran could probably develop and test an intercontinental ballistic missile capable of reaching the United States by 2015."

The report states that central to Iran's "deterrent strategy" is its pursuit of a nuclear program that could potentially move it closer to developing a nuclear weapon. Iran contends that its nuclear ambitions are for peaceful purposes.

"Iran's nuclear program and its willingness to keep open the possibility of developing nuclear weapons is a central part of its deterrent strategy," the report says.

The department's release of the analysis comes on the heels of the Nuclear Security Summit and testimony by the Pentagon's top policy chief, who last week said the U.S. approach to Iran remains centered on preventing it from obtaining nuclear weapons and on countering Iran's influence in the Middle East.

The Nuclear Security Summit, which convened leaders of more than 40 countries here last week, followed the unveiling of the Nuclear Posture Review, a Defense Department-led effort that represents the first overarching look at U.S. nuclear strategy since the end of the Cold War.

While the Nuclear Posture Review narrows the number of scenarios in which the United States would execute a nuclear strike, Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates said this week that "all options are on the table" for countries such as North Korea and Iran.

Michele Flournoy, undersecretary of defense for policy, told the Senate Armed Services Committee last week that President Barack Obama's administration continues to view challenges posed by Iran as a top national security concern.

"First, we are working to prevent Iran from acquiring nuclear weapons," she told senators, delineating the challenges posed by Iran. "Second, we are countering Iran's destabilizing activities and support for terrorism and extremists in the Middle East and around the world."

The written report to Congress cited Iran's influence in the Middle East — including its proxies Hezbollah and Hamas, in Lebanon and Gaza, respectively — and its reach into

Iraq and Afghanistan. Military and defense officials have characterized such behavior as "destabilizing."

Flournoy last week said a vital component of U.S. strategy to counter Iranian influence is to strengthen the security capacities of vulnerable states in the region, noting that both Gates and Navy Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, both have traveled to the region in recent months.

"It's a vital avenue for countering destabilizing Iranian activities, and we believe we are seeing some results," Flournoy said of efforts to build partner capacity. "In Iraq and Lebanon, for instance, our efforts to develop the capacity of security forces and improve governance have helped to weaken Iran's proxies."

The Obama administration's diplomatic overtures have helped to shore up the international consensus needed to put pressure on Iran, Flournoy said, referring to economic and other sanctions the United States and its allies are seeking to place on Iran.

"Meanwhile, our efforts in [the Defense Department] have helped to shore up the ability of our regional partners to defend themselves and to counter destabilizing activities from Iran," she said. "We have also reassured our partners that the U.S. is fully committed to their security."



# Two servicemembers die in Afghanistan

**Pfc. Jonathon D. Hall**, 23, of Chattanooga, Tenn., died April 8, at the Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, Landstuhl, Germany, of wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his vehicle with an improvised explosive

device at Contingency Outpost Khayr-Kot-Castle, Afghanistan. He was assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 187th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Ky.

**Sgt. Randolph A. Sigley**, 28, of Richmond, Ky., died April 18 in Bagram, Afghanistan. The circumstances of his death are under investigation. He was assigned to the 2123rd Transportation Company, Richmond, Ky.

## Due to water line break, residents advised to run potable water for several minutes before using

### Hourglass Reports

The public water supply serving Kwajalein was shut down islandwide 5:30-6:45 a.m., April 9. There was a major break in an eight-inch diameter cast iron potable water main located between Heliotrope and Poinsettia directly behind Quarters 447. The leak caused an island-wide outage due to pressure loss and the subsequent draining of the potable water tower faster than the pumps could refill the tower. The area where the break occurred was immediately isolated and the potable water pressure island wide was restored at approximately 6:45 a.m. Approximately 17 quarters were without water until 4:45 p.m. while a five-foot section of main pipe was replaced. The lines were disinfected and seven locations in the potable water distribution system and the fire hydrant closest to the break were sampled for bacteriological contamination. All samples were negative for bacteriological contamination.

When a potable water line is exposed to the atmosphere, there is a potential for the water lines to be cross contaminated with bacteria, sediments, or other environmental contaminants. All necessary precautions were taken to prevent cross contamination such as immediately isolating the water lines where the break occurred, disinfecting the water lines, and testing the water distribution system for bacteriological contamination.

Whenever potable water is restored after an outage where pressure is lost from the system, it is highly recommended to run the water through the service lines for one to three minutes or until the water runs clear

to remove any air bubbles and ensure fresh water is flowing from the main water lines rather than stagnant water left in the service lines.

# Army Olympians tour nation's capital

Four Olympians from the U.S. Army World Class Athlete Program took a whirlwind tour of the nation's capital last week to thank military leaders for helping make their dreams come true.

Team USA assistant bobsled coach Sgt. Bill Tavares, biathlete Sgt. Jeremy Teela, bobsled pilot Sgt. John Napier and brakeman 1st Lt. Chris Fogt visited the Pentagon to meet Army senior leaders, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery, the U.S. Capitol, The Old Guard Soldiers at Fort Myer, and their Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation

Command supporters at the unit's headquarters.

WCAP commander Capt. Fred Babauta accompanied the athletes, along with WCAP program manager Willie Wilson and Sgt. Maj. Tammy Coon of FMWRC.

The Soldier-athletes even managed to squeeze in a partial round of golf on Fort Belvoir's Woodlawn Course, another Army MWR facility, before dashing back to the Pentagon to meet more Army senior leaders. They are back in town today for the U.S. Olympic Team's traditional visit to the White House.

Napier was so honored that he posted a photo of his commemorative coins on his Facebook page with a caption that read: "The vice

president, five 4-stars, the SMA, one 2-star and one 1-star coin!"

"You need 1 more," a friend commented. "Get it in 4 years."

Napier finished 10th in the Olympic two-man bobsled event at Whistler, British Columbia, and flipped his four-man sled during the second heat with Fogt aboard. Injuries forced them to miss the final two heats but did not dampen the competitive spirit of Napier. The Pentagon visits made him even more passionate about representing troops in future Olympics.

"It was really, really cool," Napier said. "It was amazing for us to get their coins for a little keepsake to say we met our Army senior leaders. For me, the most exciting was get-

ting to meet Sergeant Major of the Army (Kenneth) Preston. Being an enlisted guy and an NCO like I am, it was very cool to meet the Army's senior enlisted Soldier.

"It was also great to meet General (George) Casey and all the generals. They were very supportive of our program and really wanted to make sure we had all the tools possible to succeed. That just proves that our Army and the United States military is behind their Soldiers and behind their athletes. It really was a blessing to meet all those leaders and thank them for letting us represent the U.S. Army this year in the Olympics."

The Soldier-Olympians also met Lt. Gen. Rick Lynch, commanding general of the U.S. Army Installation Management Command and assistant chief of staff for installation management, at his Pentagon office.

"I don't think you realize the impact that you have on our Army," Lynch told the athletes. "Folks see you out there competing in the Olympics and doing all that you do, they aspire to be like you. ... There are youngsters out there right now watching you four and aspiring to be like you. That's a big deal."

At age 23, Napier was the wide-eyed Soldier of the group. This was his first visit to the Pentagon; that tour was somewhat "old hat" for

Tavares, 47, a five-time Olympian, and Teela, 33, a three-timer.

"This was more higher-command than we've ever done," Tavares said. "It was good seeing the Chief of Staff of the Army and the Sergeant Major of the Army. To meet them is always an experience that brings you down to earth."

"We live in our own little world in sports, sometimes, and don't get to meet these senior leaders. But when you do, it lets you know what it is all about."

The whole trip was also an eye-opener for Fogt, 26, a former track and field star at Utah Valley University.

"It was great to meet the Sergeant Major of the Army and the Chief of Staff - everyone has been really nice," Fogt said. "It's great to see where the Army is run, how things happen, and where it all comes together - just seeing all of the working parts."

Fogt was particularly impressed with the tour at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier during a changing of the guard and meeting Soldiers from the U.S. Army Drill Team, who performed a dazzling display of high-flying, spinning rifles, complete with bayonets.

"The Old Guard did an amazing job of showing us around," Fogt said. "We actually got to go down inside and see where it all happens,

which was awesome to see how much time and effort they spend to pay their respects."

Tavares was delighted to meet and sign autographs for the Soldiers and Army civilians who work behind the scenes at FMWRC to ensure that his athletes have what they need.

"It's always good to see the nuts and bolts of how everything is run and meet all the people and thank them," he said. "They really don't realize how much they actually are part of what we do."

At FMWRC, the athletes met with Commanding General Maj. Gen. Reuben Jones, Deputy to the Commanding General J.C. Abney and Command Sgt. Maj. Abe Vega.

Napier summarized the impact of the whirlwind week.

"The whole visit really just gives you a sense of pride in the Armed Forces - seeing Arlington Cemetery, meeting all the generals and the Sergeant Major of the Army, seeing WCAP's support from Colonel (Brick) Miller and Sergeant Major Coon on down to our commander. And then going to see the Army Drill Team and the Capitol and how Congress works and the Senate works - it just gives you such a sense of pride for your nation that I'm really proud to be an American representing all of them in the Olympics."

"It's an absolute honor."


