Notice of Availability, USAKA Draft Document of Environmental Protection for Dredging and Filling

Hourglass Reports

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards require that the operating parameters of USAKA activities, with the potential to affect the public health and environment, must be defined in a Document of Environmental Protection. The Standards further provide that regulatory agencies and the public be allowed to review and comment on a Draft DEP.

The Draft DEP for Dredging and Filling, August 2010, provides

requirements and limitations for dredge and fill work at USAKA and the Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site. Dredge and fill activities include harbor deepening and shoreline protection.

The public is invited to review and comment on this Draft DEP. The Draft DEP and the USAKA Environmental Standards are available for review at the Grace Sherwood Library, the Roi-Namur Library, and the Alele Museum and Library.

Honoring Veterans

Veterans are honored, remembered for their sacrifices and dedication to U.S.

Veterans Day is proudly celebrated on Kwajalein every year and is a chance for all residents to pay respect and give thanks to those veterans that have dedicated their lives for the pursuit of freedom and peace to be enjoyed by all. This year, island residents, distinguished guests and veterans past and present joined together Thursday to recognize Veterans Day. With the last few months being on the rather soggy side, a beautiful, bright blue sky and gentle breeze was welcomed by all as they gathered at the flagpoles for the ceremony.

MAJ Stephen Parrish acted as host for the ceremony and began by welcoming guest keynote speaker Ambassador Martha L. Campbell, Senator/Iroij Michael Kabua, acting Mayor of Ebeye George Luther, USAKA/RTS senior leaders and their spouses, KRS president Dave Norwood and his wife Jenny, veterans of the United States of America and the Republic of the Marshall Islands to the day's celebrations.

He began, "The year was 1918. On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, silence fell over the battlefields of Europe. After four years of carnage and devastation, the fighting had stopped; World War I, 'the war to end all wars,' was over. One year later, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 Armistice Day; a day to celebrate the end of the war and honor those who fought. In 1954, Armistice Day was re-designated Veter-

ans Day to honor all veterans living and dead, whether they served during war or peace."

The playing of national anthems of the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the United States of America were sounded by the Kwajalein High School band, under the direction of Dick Shields.

Following was the Invocation, read by the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Chaplain, MAJ Roger Rodriguez, who travelled from Colorado Springs to partake in the day's ceremony. "What a privilege it is this day to lift up our veterans and to render them honor for their service to this great country we live in," he said.

USAKA/RTS Commander COL Joseph Gaines welcomed all residents of the U.S. and Marshallese communities, distinguished guests and guest speakers to the 2010 Veterans Day ceremony. "It is a truly beautiful day on the island here. Good morning and yokwe." Gaines thanked the Kwajalein High School band and director Dick Shields for playing at the ceremony. "You all sound wonderful and I'm honored and privileged you would play at today's ceremony." He welcomed American Legion Post 44 and their Rifle Squad, along with the Boy and Girl Scouts who acted as flag holders and ushers. "Finally, welcome to all veterans, both U.S. and Marshallese and their families and guests in attendance. Today I have the privilege of introducing our keynote speaker, the U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the honorable Martha L. Campbell." Campbell has served more than 29 years as a member of the Department of State Foreign Service. She was sworn in as U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands on Aug. 21, 2009. Campbell opened the first office of the U.S. Representative in Majuro in the Marshall Islands in 1987, just after the United States signed the first Compact of Free Association. "How fitting that she should end up as the U.S. Ambassador here many years later," Gaines commented. She has held numerous other overseas assignments since she joined the Foreign Service in 1980.

Campbell took the podium and greeted the attendees, wishing them a good morning. She thanked Gaines for inviting her to speak at the ceremony. She also thanked the Kwajalein High School band and the American Legion Post 44 Rifle Squad. She expressed gratitude toward the Boy and Girl Scouts and all the other folks that helped with the ceremony. She gave a special thanks to all the veterans in attendance, both Marshallese and American.

"We have a historical and sacred trust with the men and women who wear the uniform of the United States of America. From the minutemen who stood watch at Lexington and Concord, to the men of the 7th Infantry Division who landed on Kwajalein in World War II, to the service members who today serve in Iraq and Afghanistan, American veterans deserve our deepest appreciation and respect. Today, we recognize with pride and gratitude, the contributions and sacrifices made by our military veterans. We also pay tribute to all who have worn the uniform and continue to serve their countries and civilians. Many veterans act as coaches, teachers and mentors, selflessly volunteering their time and their talents."

Campbell asked all veterans in attendance to please stand for recognition. "Thank you. These men and women possess an unwavering belief in American ideals. Our veterans continue to stand up for those timeless principals of liberty, self-determination and equal opportunity. We share these principals with our friends and allies in the Marshall Islands and it adds to our military's luster to serve shoulder to shoulder with Marshallese brothers and sisters. This observance is particularly moving for us here on Kwajalein Atoll at the site of fierce fighting where many soldiers were killed and wounded. The Marshall Islands are now a great friend and ally and they share their atoll with the U.S., recognizing the contribution to science and defense. We honor especially, the Marshallese citizens who have served and are serving in the U.S. military. On Veterans Day, we honor the heroes we have lost and we rededicate ourselves to the next generation of veterans by supporting our Soldiers and Sailors from the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard as they return home from duty. I'd like to thank the Republic of the Marshall Islands for its role in defending our mutual freedoms. And on behalf of our Commander in Chief, Barack Obama, the U.S. Embassy at Majuro, and all Americans everywhere, I want to say to veterans and active duty, U.S. and Marshallese, thank you for your service, thank you for your sacrifice, and thank you for your continuing dedication."

The Laying of the Wreaths was next. "Traditionally, the ceremony for the Laying of Wreaths is to honor fallen comrades; those who answered their nation's call and literally gave all," Parrish stated. Gaines, Campbell, Jim Burke, representing the American Legion Post 44, and Amy LaCost, representing the American Legion Post 44 Women's Auxiliary, participated in the Laying of Wreaths. Hannah Finley, Claire Grant, Wyatt Jones and Stephen Parrish Jr., from the Kwajalein Boy and Girl Scouts, walked the wreaths down the aisle.

As each wreath was placed, Parrish said, "Ambassador Campbell places a wreath at the base of the Operation Flintlock memorial in order to remind us all that

veterans serve worldwide and too often, fall far from family and friends,” Parrish said. “COL Joseph Gaines places a wreath in front of our national colors to honor fellow countrymen and women who have given their lives in its defense. Mr. Jim Burke of the American Legion Post 44 places a wreath in front of the colors of the Republic of the Marshall Islands in remembrance of those who have fallen in defense of our nation and their heroic devotion to the defense of freedom. Representative of the American Legion Women’s Auxiliary, Ms. Amy LaCost, places a wreath in front of the 2nd Raider Battalion memorial, for symbolic remembrance of life everlasting and to immortalize the brave deeds of our Soldiers, our Sailors, our Airmen, our Marines and our Coast Guardsmen. Now that this distinguished group has placed the wreaths on these memorials of honor and respect, let us once again humbly thank our veterans for answering the call to duty, especially those who fought and died here in the Marshall Islands. For what they did in times of crisis and war, and for what they did to preserve the peace, let us remain ever grateful for all they have done and for what we owe them; let us never forget.”

The Rifle Squad of American Legion Post 44 then fired a Three-Volley Salute on the hill while *Taps* was played by high school student Alex Shotts. Those participating in the






