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# The names of Kwajalein

## *Kwajalein library named after Rhode Island's state librarian*

The Grace Sherwood Library on Kwajalein came into existence and was named for Rhode Island's State Librarian. Miss Sherwood sent stacks of books to service men in many parts of the world, from Alaska to Germany. Originally started as a war project, the program continued well after WWII, through a cooperation of the public and with the book pool Sherwood administered. While the servicemen of Kwajalein named their library after Miss Sherwood, they didn't have the corner on her services. Her activities as director of the state library's book pool for the Armed Forces touched Army outposts and Naval bases in all directions.

Grace Mabel Sherwood was born in 1884 and lived in Providence, R.I. She was a member of Alpha Beta at Brown University, where she graduated in 1906. She became director of the Legislative Reference Bureau of Rhode Island State Library in 1907. She wrote lyrics for several amateur musical productions,

favoring women's suffrage and authored several books revolving around primarily local government and laws. Grace Sherwood retired from the Rhode Island State Library in 1970 and passed away in 1979.

## *Richardson Theater named for trainer of invasion forces in WWII*

Richardson Theater was named after Lt. Gen. Robert C. Richardson, who was charged with training the Army invasion forces in the Central Pacific. Richardson commanded the Pacific region during the height of World War II in 1943 until his retirement in 1946. He was named military governor of Hawaii and Commanding General of U.S. Army Forces in the Pacific Ocean Areas.

The theater was dedicated in the summer of 1944 and remains the oldest American facility on Kwajalein. It is also listed on the National Historical Register.

Commissioned from the U.S. Military Academy in 1904, Richardson also attended the University of Grenoble, France, as well as the Army War College. During World War I he was a liaison officer in the American Expeditionary Force. Afterward, he was a military attaché with the U.S. Embassy in Rome.

Prior to World War II, Richardson commanded the 1st Cavalry Division from 1940-1941. He then directed the War Department Bureau of Public Relations before becoming Commanding General of the 7th Army Corps. A dispute about having to serve under an Australian officer is believed to have cost him his command.

During his Hawaiian command, Gen. Richardson oversaw the construction of Richardson Hall in an impressive 49 days. Also known as the "Pineapple Pentagon," it has remained the planning and operational support centers for soldiers of the U.S. Army, Pacific since 1944.

Among Gen. Richardson's many awards are the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Silver Star, the Purple Heart and the Officer Legion of Honor from France. Richardson died in 1954.

Carefully balancing knees on elbows while keeping one's head on the ground earned an extra card towards the winning hand. Onlookers watched as Gene Littlefield displayed his yogic prowess with his very solid, full headstand.

Final cards dealt, the crowd went quiet as shuffling and concentration ruled, then the decision came down.

"It's all for the kids, that's what matters," said Lannie Carroll, long-time ECCF volunteer and supporter.

Paul Haislip was the final winner with a full house, and was presented with an honorary ECCF T-shirt and \$25 AAFES gift certificate.

Roi-Namur’s Earth Day celebration might have been small like the island, but it was big on participation and heart. A large percentage of the population, over 25 participants, turned out to promote the conservation of nature by picking up trash along beaches and diving for trash in the small boat marina. Clean up efforts were followed by lunch at the Surf Shack for all.

Roi-Namur Dolphins Scuba Club sponsored the Earth Day event this year by organizing activities and covering the cost of rental vehicles for transportation of trash, dive equipment as well as the cost of the lunch.

Rene Prenoveau, dive safety officer, led six divers in the clean up of the small boat marina. Johnny Mejbon, Pier master, guarded the marina in a B-boat to ensure the divers’ safety from boat traffic. Divers brought up many interesting artifacts including, “enough bottles and cans to redeem for deposits to pay for a boat”, said one diver.

Of other interest in the dive were unexploded ordinance items that had to be brought to the attention of the explosive ordinance disposal team for further investigation.

Dan “D” Gooch, dock security checkpoint officer in charge, commented that the divers were well organized and very safe.

“We cleaned up the beach from Tradex all the way to the jungle,” said beach clean up volunteer Lannie Carroll. In addition to the WWII canteen, they found a refrigerator, a computer monitor, and lots of buoys and flip-flops. “But no shoes good enough to wear,” he commented.

noon, volunteers gathered at the Surf Shack from various clean up sites to celebrate Earth Day with a barbecue lunch supplied by the Roi-Namur Dolphins and organized by Secretary Sandra Garrison. Earth Day volunteers ate a delicious lunch of burgers and potato salad before heading off to collect the trash and take a well deserved nap.

The Earth Day tradition began on April 22, 1970, and is recognized by the United Nations as International Mother Earth Day. The day is intended to inspire awareness and appreciation for the Earth’s natural environment.

Particularly appropriate to our mission here at USAKA is a 1978 quote from Margaret Mead,

“Earth Day is the first holy day which transcends all national borders, yet preserves all geographical integrities, spans mountains and oceans and time belts, and yet brings people all over the world into one resonating accord, is devoted to the preservation of the harmony in nature and yet draws upon the triumphs of technology, the measurement of time, and instantaneous communication through space.”

Mead continued, “Earth Day draws on astronomical phenomena in a new way – which is also the most ancient way – by using the vernal equinox, the time when the sun crosses the equator making the length of night and day equal in all parts of earth. To this point in the annual calendar, Earth Day attaches no local or divisive set of symbols, no statement of the truth or superiority of one way of life over another.”

**Sgt. Vorasack T. Kaysana**, 30, of Westminster, Colo., died April 10 in Kirkuk, Iraq, of injuries sustained April 9 in a non-combat related incident. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 12th Cavalry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, Fort Hood, Texas.

**Sgt. Brent M. Maher**, 31, of Council Bluffs, Iowa, died April 11 in Paktia province, Afghanistan, of injuries sustained when enemy forces attacked his unit with an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 168th Infantry Regiment, Iowa National Guard, Shenandoah, Iowa.

**Pvt. Brandon T. Pickering**, 21, of Fort Thomas, Ky., died April 10 in Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, Landstuhl, Germany, of wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his unit with small arms fire and a rocket propelled grenade in Wardak province, Afghanistan, April 8. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 4th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Polk, La.

**Spc. Donald L. Nichols**, 21, of Shell Rock, Iowa, died April 13, in Laghman province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked his unit using an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 133rd Infantry Regiment, Iowa Army National Guard, Waterloo, Iowa.

**Spc. Joseph A. Kennedy**, 25, of St. Paul, Minn. died April 15, in Helmand province, Afghanistan, of injuries sustained when enemy forces attacked his unit with small arms fire. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 2nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, Fort Knox, Ky.

She is currently serving as a Divemaster for the KSC, she assists Ron Gamble with students and is studying to become an instructor.

Dodd came to Kwaj about one year ago, and is an enthusiastic member of the KSC. She is serving as the treasurer for the club, and is involved in most of the events. Dodd received her certification in Panama City Beach, Fla., and had 72 dives when she

arrived to Kwajalein. She mirrors many people's opinion about diving in the Marshall Islands when she commented, "You find something amazing on every dive!"






