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Lt. Col. Dean Wiley brings experience, education as Reagan Test Site director

Reagan Test Site's new director snuck on island this summer while most residents were on vacation. Since Lt. Col. John Eggert, former RTS director, left for his next assignment in May, the usual change of responsibility ceremony did not take place. If you haven't already, now is your chance to meet and learn a little about our new RTS director, Lt. Col. Dean Wiley.

Wiley arrived at U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll July 20. He is accompanied by his wife Tina and 15-year-old son Austin, who began his sophomore year at Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School last week. His daughter Alexa, a senior at Central Michigan University, came out to visit during the summer and is hoping to visit during Christmas. He also has a 24-year-old step-son, Andrew, who lives in Kansas. Like most who move to Kwajalein, Wiley and his family eagerly browsed the internet and talked to friends about where and what Kwajalein was. He was told he was handed the best assignment in the U.S. Army. Now that he's out here, Wiley said he "knows that to be absolutely true."

Wiley is expected to be on Kwajalein for one year and will then transition to Huntsville, Ala., for

his remaining year. He spoke highly of his new team at RTS. "I feel that the team of personnel I've inherited here at Reagan Test Site are ... extremely professional [and] very hard working; I could not be happier with the team that I have here. I have not had a chance to meet a lot of the folks in Huntsville yet, but through internet, telecoms, they're doing just as good of a job back there. They'll do anything to get the mission done."

The transition to Huntsville is Wiley's main challenge as RTS director. "Our number one goal during my tenure out here is going to be the transition of the range distributed operations," he said. Wiley also expects to balance the mission and personnel between Kwajalein and Huntsville.

Looking toward the future of RTS, Wiley expects the number and pace of missions to remain the same, regardless of the transition to Huntsville. "What you will see is the range taking the control of the missions from Huntsville rather than Kwajalein," he said. "That's the range distributed operations portion."

USASKA/RTS is a unique mission, but growing up as an Acquisition Corps officer, Wiley has plenty of experience and education under his belt to help him successfully lead here. He worked as the operational test officer at Fort Sill, Okla.,

and has conducted tests at Yuma Proving Ground, Electronic Proving Ground, White Sands Missile Range and Aberdeen Proving Ground. "I think I bring that experience and education as an Acquisition Corps officer ... to the job. I understand ... running a test range having been to all those test ranges. I think those experiences help me out here."

Wiley is certainly prepared to run RTS for the next two years and is now working on getting prepared to enjoy life on Kwajalein. He and Austin already completed their open water qualification at Emon Beach last weekend. "We're looking forward to our next dive," he said. Wiley has taken advantage of Holmberg Fairways, he and his wife don't miss Bingo on Thursday nights and really enjoy the outdoor movies at the Rich Theater on Saturday nights. "We're trying to take it all in," he said of Kwajalein. "We're just trying to do a little bit of everything and see what Kwajalein has to offer."

As RTS director, Wiley's door is always open. "I look forward to getting around to meet everyone," he said. "I want to thank everyone for the warm welcome that we have received. ... We feel like part of the family already."


The Right-Hand Man

So far, he has enjoyed playing Baggo at Emon Beach and deep sea fishing. He plans to try his hand at Bingo and check out the community theaters.

This week, a reference for pronouncing words in Marshallese is featured. As with many languages, Marshallese has some exceptions, but the guide should prove useful in most situations, and could be useful for future editions of Manit Minute.

“Jermal-in-Jimjira” is the motto that guides the Directorate of Host Nation Activities here. The phrase means “working in friendship” and is a fitting beginning for Manit Minute.

Honolulu hosts annual U.S., Marshallese meeting

The Joint Committee Meeting between government representatives of the United States and the Republic of the Marshall Islands took place Aug. 26 at Pearl Harbor Naval Base in Honolulu.

Representatives from the Marshall Islands included Minister of Foreign Affairs John Silk; Chief Secretary Casten Nemra; assistant secretary for American affairs Keyoka Kabua; and RMI consul general Noda Lojkar, from Hawaii.

Representing the United States were Martha Campbell, U.S. Ambassador to the Marshall Islands; Col. Joseph Gaines, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander and U.S. defense representative; Maj. Christopher Mills, director of USAKA Host Nation Activities; and various U.S. government representatives from the Pentagon, U.S. Pacific Command, U.S. Missile Defense Command, USAKA and the U.S. Coast Guard.

Highlights from the discussions included: USAKA fiscal year 2012 budget cuts; Marshallese employment figures at USAKA in fiscal year 2012; RMI humanitarian assistance projects led by the U.S.; RMI and U.S. Coast Guard professional exchanges and training; Joint Task Force–Homeland Defense exercises in the Marshall Islands; Marshallese citizens in the U.S. Armed Forces; Pacific Partnership humanitarian visits to RMI; U.S. Military Academy Capacity Development Project; and Construction Civic Action Detail team projects in the RMI.

New issues raised by the RMI included a request for exact number of Marshallese citizens serving in the U.S. Armed Forces, and the possibilities for using the U.S. Army at West Point Development Project for long

term sustainment projects in the RMI – particularly on Ebeye. The U.S. side raised the issue of conducting a joint RMI/U.S. audit of the RMI debt to ensure a clear understanding by both sides of all charges owed.

The JCM is required by the Compact of Free Association and is held annually between the U.S. and Marshall Islands to discuss issues of common interest in an effort to better understand and improve the relationship between the two nations.

Following the conclusion of the meeting, all participants traveled to the USS Arizona Memorial at Pearl Harbor for a U.S. Navy tour of the memorial with a buffet and social hour following on the pier. Both the RMI and U.S. representatives commented on the success of the meeting and are looking forward to enhancing the long-term partnership between both nations and fostering a more meaningful and fruitful alliance.

Security awareness relevant year round

His mug shot has been circulating on the AFN Roller slideshow for about a month. He's not a wanted fugitive, but quite the opposite. Capt. Lonnie Gentry is the person to call if a resident or worker on Kwajalein or Roi-Namur sees or hears of suspicious activity.

U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll's anti-terrorism officer spent the month of August working on ways to increase security awareness here, but wants to remind residents that being alert to suspicious activities and reporting them is a year-round event.

"If you see something that doesn't look right, let us know," Gentry said. "The guys and gals in security, intelligence and operations have the knowledge to figure out if whatever you saw could pose a threat."

He also pointed out that previous re-

ports from concerned employees have enabled him to take measures that increase USAKA's awareness of possible issues. Sometimes something that seems like it wouldn't be important actually is, he added.

A recent incident in Killeen, Texas, home to Fort Hood, serves as an example of quick reporting of suspicious activity. Killeen Police and the FBI arrested a Soldier who was absent without leave after a gun store clerk reported the Soldier was displaying suspicious activity. After his arrest, the Soldier admitted to planning an attack near Fort Hood, and had the materials to do it – a stockpile of ammunition, weapons and bomb-making materials.

The iWatch is the Army's anti-terrorism and personal protection program and was developed out of the familiar Neighborhood Watch programs. However, the core message of iWatch is the



same. If you see something, say something, or call the appropriate authority.

Even though Gentry's photo will be coming down off the Roller, he reminds the community that iWatch and anti-terrorism efforts continue here.

To report suspicious activity, call 59559 for the installation anti-terrorism officer, or 54417/54471 for USAKA operations. Call 54445 for the Kwajalein Police Department front desk, or 56445 for the Roi-Namur detachment.

What's suspicious? People without a need to know asking questions about sensitive information, such as building blueprints, security plans or important travel schedules.



Old Camp Hamilton was located oceanside near Holmberg Fairways and was the island Scout encampment. Scouting has been an active program on Kwajalein since probably the first two boys arrived on-island, because the oldest *Hourglass* archives refers not only to meetings but to a "Boy Scout Building" as early as January 1961. Currently, Kwajalein Scouting includes Cub Scout Pack 135; Boy Scout Troop 314 and a Girl Scout Troop 4. There is a Scouting Troop on Ebeye as well, and thanks to some donations from the Kwajalein programs, the first summer camp was held on Bigej in over 10 years. Last year, there were more than 80 Scouts participating in the Kwaj program, and all participate in activities from clean-up days to the highly anticipated Pinewood Derby. This Labor Day, registration for the Scouting program will be from 1 to 5 p.m. at Emon Beach.

HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH

Hispanic Heritage Month begins on Sept. 15, chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively. In September 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim National Hispanic Heritage Week. The observance was expanded in 1988 to a month long celebration from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15. America celebrates the

culture and traditions of U.S. residents who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America and the Caribbean.

The term Hispanic, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau, refers to Spanish-speaking people in the United States of any race. On the 2000 Census form, people of Spanish/Hispanic/Latino origin could identify themselves as Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, or "other Spanish/Hispanic/Latino." More than 35 million people identified themselves as Hispanic or Latino on the 2000 Census.



Edward Baca enlisted in the Army in November 1956 with the New Mexico Army National Guard. In July 1962, he was assigned as a platoon leader of the 3631st Maintenance Company. Soon after, he volunteered for active duty and deployment to Vietnam. Baca was released from active duty in 1966 and returned to the New Mexico Army National Guard, assuming command of the 3631st. In 1977 Baca became the state military personnel officer and was assigned the state assistant, G-1. A short time later, he was appointed the adjutant general, New Mexico National Guard. Commanding both the Army and Air National Guard of New Mexico, Baca led the state guard to a position of national prominence.

Baca spearheaded a nationwide National Guard force modernization effort and directed the first fielding of the Chaparral and Hawk missile battalions in the Reserve. The National Guard Bureau designated New Mexico's award-winning drug demand reduction program as a pilot for all states and in October 1994, Baca was promoted to lieutenant general and assigned as chief, National Guard Bureau, a position he held until his retirement in 1998.



Richard E. Cavazos earned his commission from Texas Technological University in 1951. During the Korean War, Cavazos won the Distinguished Service Cross for his heroic actions during an attack on Hill 142. Later, he attended the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, the British Staff College and the Armed Forces Staff College. In 1967, Cavazos commanded 1st Battalion, 18th Infantry, in Vietnam. His valiant leadership of that unit in the attack at Loc Ninh earned him a second Distinguished Service Cross. After Vietnam, Cavazos served as commander, 2nd Brigade, 1st Infantry Division, and of the 9th Infantry Division. In 1980, he became the innovative commander of III Corps. In 1982, Cavazos assumed command of the U.S.

Army Forces Command and earned his fourth star, making him the first Hispanic four-star general in the Army. His early support for the National Training Center and his involvement in the development of the Battle Command Training Program enormously influenced and advanced the Army's warfighting capabilities.



Sonia Sotomayor graduated from high school in the Bronx in 1972 and entered Princeton University. She worked with the university's discipline committee, where she started working on her legal skills. Sotomayor graduated summa cum laude from Princeton in 1976. That same year, she entered Yale Law School, receiving her J.D. in 1979, and passed the bar in 1980. She immediately began work as an assistant district attorney in the Manhattan borough of New York City. In 1984, she entered private practice. She also served on the board of the Puerto Rican Legal Defense and Education Fund, the New York City Campaign Finance Board, and State of New York Mortgage Agency. Sotomayor's won the appointment as U.S. District Court Judge for

the Southern District of New York City in 1992, which was confirmed unanimously by the U.S. Senate. She was elevated to the U.S. Second Circuit Court of Appeals, then nominated and confirmed as Supreme Court Justice in 2009.

KSC nitrox equipment arrives on-island

Kwajalein Scuba Club is poised to step into a new era. A membrane system for the production of enriched air nitrox was delivered to KSC Aug. 25. Nitrox improves diving safety while allowing divers to spend more time exploring reefs and wrecks on their dives. Nitrox is a mixture of nitrogen and oxygen gas, just like air, however nitrox contains a higher percentage of oxygen than air. KSC will produce a mixture of 28 percent oxygen and 72 percent nitrogen. Nitrox is not used for extremely deep dives and the recreational diving limit at USAKA remains 130 feet. Nitrox will be available to enriched air certified KSC and Roi-Namur Dolphins members within a few weeks. KSC members are working to install the membrane system and prepare the scuba tanks for nitrox.

KSC has been working on obtaining the enriched air nitrox membrane system for more than 18 months. Funds for the system came from the KSC and the Quality of Life fund. The membrane system eliminates the need for pure oxygen to make nitrox. The system is safer and more consistent than older methods for nitrox production.
