

The family clan, or "jowi," is the foundation of Marshallese family life. There are approximately 30-60 jowis throughout the Marshalls and the root of each clan can be traced back to one woman who is referred to as the mother of that clan.

As in the family unit, responsibilities include providing shelter and food for visiting jowi members, caring for jowi members who may be hospitalized on Ebeye or Majuro, caring for the children of other jowi members when necessary, and assisting during funerals for members of the jowi.

**EBEYE 4-H CITIZENSHIP CLUB** – Susannah Jones, CYSS Training Specialist, has been an avid 4-H leader for many years within the Kwajalein community, heading up the 4-H Ebeye Citizenship Club. The goal of the club is to promote positive relationships between children, teens and adults of both Kwajalein and our Host Nation. Jones organizes monthly activities for the club, which features service-learning projects on both Ebeye and Kwajalein.

In November, school-aged Kwajalein children along with adult volunteers headed to Ebeye for a gardening project. Armed with soil, shovels, gloves and other miscellaneous gardening supplies, the Kwajalein group arrived on Ebeye and met with numerous Ri-Katak teen volunteers and Ebeye school officials. The group loaded up a taxi with their supplies, and headed to a nearby pumpkin patch that was over-run with weeds.

The crew got to work quickly, weeding the garden, and planting new plants to liven up the garden. The project brought out a spirit of togetherness amongst the participants and showed children and adults alike that hard work and team work can really make a difference.

The Citizenship club will meet on Kwajalein in January, and is planning on a fun-filled reading afternoon at the library.

**SAS 4-H COOKING CLUB** – This year's Cooking Club has been taken over by CYSS registration clerk Micah Johnson. Her enthusiasm for this endeavor has been contagious for the children who attend her program.

Johnson introduced the children to their monthly theme, 'Cooking around the World.' Micah has an entire year of monthly activities fo-

cus on healthy and nutritious recipes highlighting cultural aspects of people all over the world. Her past project introduced children to the Native American culture.

Using food and healthy choices to also educate children about cultural awareness has proven to be a fun and successful endeavor. Kids were treated to Native American dance rituals, listened and discussed Native American music and created their own Navajo Tacos.

However, despite everything going on in November, teens were still able to create nearly 100 holiday cards to be sent in recognition of the service that military Families give to our country.



## Important information about the reclaimed water system (Northwestern tip, industrial end of Kwajalein Island)

One of the seven routine sampling points within the reclaim or non-potable water distribution system on Kwajalein Island frequently does not meet the chlorine residual standard. Although this situation does not require you to take any precautions, public notification is required annually under these circumstances.

The USAKA Environmental Standards require that water entering and within the reclaim water distribution system meets certain residual chlorine levels to reduce the potential for bacteriological growth. In 2005, one of the sampling points at the northwestern portion of Kwajalein was changed from the photo lab to the liquid nitrogen plant to better reflect the extremities of the distribution system. This new sampling point shows residual chlorine levels which are less than the minimum compliance standard. The low chlorine residual is associated with user locations northwest of Olympus Drive on the industrial end of the island. It is important to note that the water entering the distribution systems is acceptable and all other sampling points meet or exceed compliance standards.

As a precaution, daily samples will continue to be collected and analyzed for coliform bacteria each time the chlorine residual falls below the compliance level. Samples taken thus far have been negative for the presence of coliform bacteria.

A reduction in the diameter of the reclaimed water lines will prevent water from sitting in the pipes long enough to expend its chlorine. ## Marbled Cheesecake

Another Roi favorite, the hardest part will be waiting until the cheesecake chills before you cut into it. The richness of the cheesecake combined with the deep chocolate flavor is heavenly alone or with a small dollop of whip cream.

- 2 ½ packages cream cheese, softened
- 1 ½ c. sugar
- ½ c. flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 6 eggs
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 bag chocolate chips, semi-sweet or dark

Make your crust first by mixing 1 box of graham crackers, crushed, 1 stick butter melted and 2 tablespoons flour until crumbs clump when you squeeze them. Using your fingers or a fork, press into the bottom of a 9x13 cake pan that has been liberally sprayed with non-stick spray. Allow to chill for 20 minutes before adding filling.

Heat oven to 300 degrees. In a small sauce pan, melt chocolate over low heat, or place in glass bowl in the microwave for 1 minute at a time stirring in between cycles of heating. Stir chips until mostly melted, set aside to cool briefly, the rest of the chocolate will melt as it cools.

In a large mixing bowl, whip the cream cheese until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, mixing briefly after each one. Add rest of ingredients except chocolate and mix just until combined, scraping the sides of the bowl to make sure all cream cheese is incorporated. Pour all but 2 cups of the cream cheese mixture into your prepared pan. Spread evenly over the crust. Add the melted chocolate to the remaining cheesecake batter in the bowl and stir together. Pour the chocolate mixture over the cheesecake batter in the pan, using a butter knife slowly draw "lines" up and down and from side to side in the cake pan being careful not to disturb the crust on the bottom. The cheesecake and chocolate mixture will combine just enough to give a marbled appearance. Bake in 300 degree oven for 60-75 minutes. Cake is done when a toothpick poked in the cake halfway from the center comes out clean. Turn off oven and allow to cool to room temperature before placing in the refrigerator to chill completely.
