

### Marshallese Labor Roles

Men typically perform activities associated with the sea and sky (fishing, canoe building, gathering drinking coconuts, capturing birds) while women dominate activities on the land (digging arrowroot or gathering pandanus fronds). Women also control the domestic sphere and are associated with activities in the village, while men work in the bush lands away from the village. Women control a great deal of power in the matrilineal social structure so while men are the public performers, women's behind-the-scenes decisions often predominate.

Rumor: Due to a high rate of sports injuries related to softball, USAKA is planning to make changes to the game when played on our installation. Last year, USAKA experienced overall reduction in work force efficiency and force readiness. In its review, much of the loss or reduction was attributed to MWR activities, primarily through sports. Softball was singled out as the most injury-induced sport. As a result, USAKA has instituted new policies that aim to reduce injuries while maintaining work force efficiency and readiness. New policies will include the use of glow-in-the-dark softballs when games are played after dusk. Additionally, the size of softballs would increase from the official size to an 14-inch circumference softball with limited flight. Further, those playing infield will be required to wear protective head gear. For bats, players will have the option of using little league bats or adult bats no heavier than 20 ounces. # Divers, *Sequoia* crew search Kwajalein lagoon

## *Sunken plane may contain MIA servicemember from WWII*

Living in tropical paradise, we can sometimes forget that a battle raged here almost 70 years ago. Operation Flintlock was a short, yet brutal battle that changed Kwajalein Atoll in more ways than one. The battle left behind reminders that it took place and lives were lost – some in plain sight on land, others lurking beneath the Pacific Ocean waters. Dan Farnham, avid diver and history enthusiast, is interested in the latter. Most who have lived here for any number of years have read Farnham's articles in the *Hourglass* about World War II planes that met their end in the Kwajalein lagoon. It is this interest in diving underwater WWII aircraft that sparked Farnham's interest in finding one in particular – the *Kingfisher*.

The *Kingfisher* was a two-seater scout plane from the USS *New Mexico*. On Jan. 31, 1944, it was shot down while flying over Ebeye. The pilot, Lt. Forney O. Fuqua, was fatally wounded. The rear gunner/radioman, Aviation Radioman 3rd Class Harrison Miller, ditched the plane into the lagoon. Miller was rescued by a nearby American minesweeper. Fuqua, however, went down with the plane, where he is believed to still be today.

Farnham began the project to locate the *Kingfisher* in August 2011. "The intent of the entire project is to bring a [missing in action] serviceman home, and bring closure to the veterans involved and the family of the missing pilot," he said. "I'm a veteran, so veterans affairs is something that is near and dear to my heart."

Like any historical project, it began first with research. Farnham contacted a friend, U.S. Marine Corps Maj. Joshua Vance, and tasked him with finding out if Miller was still alive; at 94 years old, he was indeed. He talked with Vance about what he remembered the day the *Kingfisher* went down. Vance also found and talked with two crewmen who rescued Miller. Eyewitness accounts provided from the veterans combined with deck logs and combat reports helped to define the search area.

Now all that was needed was sonar equipment to aid in locating the plane. Farnham contacted Chief Warrant Officer 2 Joseph Toth of the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter *Sequoia* about potential support for the project. Toth brought the request up through his chain of command and it was approved. U.S. Army Kwajalein

Atoll Command, U.S. Pacific Command and Space and Missile Defense Command were all made aware of the project and were also on board and supportive.

The *Sequoia* was brought into the project because they visit Kwajalein at least 1-2 times per year. Also, they have a smaller boat which was perfectly equipped for this particular search. A side-scan sonar unit was flown to Guam where it was picked up by the *Sequoia* and brought to Kwajalein.

The team assisted with the search March 21-22. The sonar was trailed behind the boat on a cable, about 100 feet back and about 20 feet underwater. "We put the 'fish' (sonar) in the water, we hit record on the software and we just ran grids. We came across a number of 'targets of interest' that we need to go back and re-analyze the imaging. That's what I'm working on right now," Farnham explained.

Future help from the *Sequoia* may be needed. "If we don't find it off the imaging this time, we're going to have to expand the search area and go looking again," Farnham said. "If we do find it from the imaging we got this past week, there's two more [planes] out there that I want to find with MIA's that went down during the battle."

Finding the *Kingfisher* is like looking for a needle in a haystack. Really all you can do is scan with sonar equipment and then dive 'targets of interest' based off imaging results. The *Sequoia* may be Farnham's only shot at locating the plane and others like it. Farnham and Toth will both be analyzing the imaging over the course of the next few weeks, which will hopefully lead to a hit and some closure for a serviceman's family.

# Turbo Turtles claim another victory in the pool





It was all Chargogg and Turbo Turtles during the regular season. Stan Jazwinski and Jim Roby anchored Chargogg to a one-loss season, including a win against the number one seed Turbo Turtles. Chargogg had beaten Lacedaemonians both times they played during the regular season. But, the high school team came out looking for revenge during their playoff game. Swift goalie moves by

Daniel Murillo, strong defense by Stephanie Hibberts and Jake Jahnke, accompanied by aggressive mid-field play allowed Keith Brady to continually score, leading to a victory for the high school team.

The first round of playoffs sent not only Chargogg, but USAKA home as well, leaving Lacedaemonians and Turbo Turtles to square off in the finals. Turbo Turtles had an intimidating forefront with two of the top three scorers in the league, with Bill Williamson and Bruce Premo playing forward. Greg Moore provided strong defense as well as an outside scoring threat playing mid-field. The anchor of the team was Stan Edwards, standing 6-feet-9-inches tall, playing as a most impenetrable goalie. The Turbo Turtles put an exclamation point on their one-loss season with a 63-36 victory. It was a well-deserved win for the Turbo Turtles, but will have next year’s teams vying to keep them from consecutive championships.

# Swim team members medal big in Guam

Seven members of the Kwajalein Swim Team competed in the Guam International Invitational last weekend. Each swimmer competed in four individual events and at least one relay.

The first KST member to compete was Chance Bowser, 13, in the 100 backstroke. He achieved a second place finish for his age group. Next to swim was Annie Hepler, 15, in the 50 butterfly; she easily won gold. Giordan Harris, 18, also swam the 50 fly and placed third.

The 100 freestyle was next and all seven swimmers from Kwajalein participated in this event with Valisa Lokboj, 12, taking the bronze in her age group and Colleen Furgeson, 13, taking the silver medal. Harris narrowly missed the gold medal in his age group and won silver while Hepler placed third. Phillip Kinono, Bowser and Alice Joji each established meter times for this event and just missed medaling, placing fourth in their respective age groups.

In the 50 breaststroke there were several nice surprise swims by four of the swimmers, resulting in medals. Kinono won gold, Ferguson won silver, and both Joji and Lokboj won bronze. In the 200 individual medley, an event where all four strokes are swum in order, Harris won the bronze.

In the afternoon session, Lokboj and

Bowser continued their great performances and earned bronze medals for the 50 backstroke. Kinono and Ferguson each earned gold in the 100 breaststroke in their age groups.

The 50 freestyle was the last individual event of the day. All seven KST members swam and achieved great results. There were 82 swimmers that swam this event and the competition was tough. Hepler and Harris both medaled in their age groups; Hepler took silver and Harris took bronze.

The 200 freestyle relays were the last event of the day. KST swam in

two relays, a women's which included Joji, Lokboj, Hepler and Furgeson and a mixed that included Harris, Bowser, Kinono and Hepler. Relays were not scored and did not count for points, but were a lot of fun to participate in and team cheering could be heard far away.

The Guam Invitational is held every Spring. This is the first time the KST has participated in the event. It was a very positive experience for the swimmers and the results achieved helped validate the practices the KST swim program has provided for many years.

## Meow! New policies for island pets

My name is BaBa Habibi Zeto and I am a Persian cat! I was born in Kuwait where Sheralyn adopted me and since then dragged me all over this globe. I've written this article to make you aware of some recent changes in the USAKA Pet Policy which include some new guidelines.

As of February, Kwajalein now requires all new pets coming to Kwaj to meet Hawaii's Rabies Titer (FAVN) requirements which means drawing blood from your pet and submitting it to an approved laboratory, as well as filing it with Hawaii. While current on-island pets are grandfathered from this requirement, pet owners are strongly encouraged to consider meeting this requirement as well. Benefits include not having to quarantine your pet when going through or moving to Hawaii. Without meeting this requirement, your pet could only be seen at an approved quarantine Vet facility, which could be costly. For around \$200, the Vet Clinic on Kwaj can do the test and submit it to Hawaii. Another new change is you are required to have your pet examined at least once per year. The Kwajalein Vet Clinic will also no longer offer euthanasia "for convenience." If you are leaving island for good, you must either take your pet with you or find someone to adopt the pet. Euthanasias are taken seriously and the decision to euthanize a pet is made in conjunction with the owner, the Vet Clinic and the Army Veterinarian. Also, when you leave island for any amount of time, you're required to have an adult care for your pet and notify the Vet Clinic of your departure/return dates, as well your caretakers information and your contact information.

Remember, having a pet like me is a privilege, not a right. Be sure to comply with all requirements listed in USAKA/RTS Regulation 210-8. Contact the Vet Clinic at 52017 if you have any questions.




## THEN AND NOW - "BUILDING 1010"


