

# Gaines, Mills recognized by U.S. Ambassador to the RMI

The commander of the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site and his director of host nation activities were recognized with awards during a June 12 ceremony at Majuro hosted by the Republic of the Marshall Islands U.S. Ambassador.

Colonel Joseph N. Gaines, Commander of USAKA/RTS, and Lt. Col. Christopher D. Mills, director of host nation activities, were visiting Majuro, the Republic of Marshall Islands capital, to brief the RMI president and his cabinet on recent U.S./RMI partnership efforts. While on their visit, Ambassador Martha L. Campbell surprised the two Soldiers with a Meritorious Honor award for Gaines and the Foreign Affairs for Public Service award to Mills. This was Gaines and Mills last visit to Majuro before they both leave USAKA/RTS.

"We are honored to be recognized by Ambassador Campbell for our work here in the Republic of the Marshall Islands," said Gaines. "It's

been a thrill to serve as a member of her country team during the last two years and I am proud of all we have accomplished together. Ambassador Campbell and the embassy staff are like family to us at USAKA/RTS and we will miss them very much," he said. Mills added, "It is quite an honor to receive this award. Ambassador Campbell and the embassy staff in Majuro were a pleasure to work with and really made us feel like part of the country team. I will display this proudly at my next assignment."

During the meeting with RMI government officials, President Christopher Loeak praised Mills and Gaines for their efforts to keep the RMI government informed of changes at the U.S. Army installation and thanked them for their service.

Mills is a career foreign area officer who has served at USAKA for the last three and a half years. He is being reassigned to the 162nd Infantry Brigade at Fort Polk, La. Gaines is scheduled to retire from the Army at a ceremony on Kwajalein scheduled for June 27.

# On-going construction projects improve environment, facilities

## Hourglass Reports

Various construction and deconstruction projects are underway in the atoll, and each individual project will improve the islands in different ways.

One recently completed project is the plumbing and carpenter shop on Roi-Namur. The new facility replaces the Korean war shop that was demolished in November 2011. San Juan Construction completed the project in May.

Another Roi project is the fuel/cargo pier repair. Much of the demolition has been completed, and then the rehabilitation will begin.

Kwajalein's ongoing construction projects include the removal of five fuel tanks, four of which are located just behind the concrete wall closest to Lagoon Road. "The tanks are old, constructed in 1954," said Daniel Esqueda, acting director for USAKA public works. Some hurdles will need to be addressed prior to complete removal of the tanks, to include cleanup and remediation of previous fuel spills.

According to Esqueda, it should take about 18 months for completion of the project. The project is supervised by the Army Corps of Engineers, and work is done by San Juan Construction.

Housing is getting some rehab as well, with roofing refurbishment being done on 400-series housing. Kwajalein Range Service's facility maintenance department is handling the roofing repairs.

Judy Shimamoto spent 14 days in March exploring the continent of Australia, beginning in Cairns, North Queensland, then on to the Red Centre at Uluru and Alice Springs and ending her trip in Sydney. "I can't pick one favorite thing - each area had something to offer that was special," she said. "Sydney is a big city with impressive public transportation and museums and the iconic Sydney Opera House. Uluru is a big rock in the middle of the desert - beautiful and full of significance for the aboriginal people. Alice Springs is home to the Royal Flying Doctors Society and the School of the Air - full of history of the development of the Outback - while Cairns is tropical and gateway to the Great Barrier Reef." Her best advice is signing up for the "Hop On, Hop Off Bus," because it was good "for getting a feel for a new city and helping to decide what I want to do there." Eating different foods is always one of the most enjoyable experiences of travel to a new place. "In Australia I was introduced to barramundi fish and Tim Tams (an addictive chocolate cookie). I couldn't pass the opportunity to eat crocodile and kangaroo and camel sausage - interesting, but not destined to be part of my diet, although the grilled pumpkin and garlic mash served with these meats would be worth learning to prepare."







## Roi-Namur Fuel Pier construction and ciguatera

- Construction operations necessary to replace the Roi-Namur Fuel/Supply Pier are scheduled to begin on Tuesday and continue for several months.
- All residents should avoid fishing and fish consumption in the areas affected by work (especially the lagoon around Roi-Namur).
- The dinoflagellate, *Gambierdiscus toxicus*, is known to exist in sediment material in subtropical and tropical waters, and the disturbance of bottom sediments could intensify the potential for ciguatera contamination.
- The public will be notified when construction commences and fishing restrictions are lifted.

# Military Casualties

**Sgt. Joseph M. Lilly**, 25, of Flint, Mich., died June 14, and **Spc. Trevor A. Pinnick**, 20, of Lawrenceville, Ill., died June 12 in Panjwa'l, Kandahar province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked their unit with an improvised explosive device. They were assigned to the 18th Engineer Company, 1st Battalion, 37th Field Artillery Regiment, 3rd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Wash.

**Sgt. Nicholas C. Fredsti**, 30, of San Diego, Calif., died June 15, in Spedar, Afghanistan, when insurgents attacked his unit with small arms fire. He was assigned to 1st Battalion, 504th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C.
