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Fallen comrades honored, remembered

“This nation is what it is today because of the efforts and sacrifices of our veterans,” said guest speaker Sgt. Maj. Roderick Prioleau during his speech at the 2013 Memorial Day ceremony on Monday at the flagpoles on Kwajalein. Memorial Day is now one of our oldest national holidays. It is a day meant to honor and remember American war dead – those American servicemen and women who have literally given all for their country.

Maj. Alonzo Garcia acted as Master of Ceremonies. He welcomed guests to the ceremony and explained that flags of the United States and Republic of the Marshall Islands were flown at half staff in honor of fallen comrades. “On this day, we remember with pride and gratitude the men and women who have given their lives for our country,” Garcia said.

Everyone rose for the playing of the national anthems of the U.S. and RMI, played by the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School Band, directed by Dick Shields. The audience remained standing for the invocation, read aloud by Fr. Victor Langhans.

Respect was paid for fallen comrades by the placing of the wreaths ceremony. Members of Boy Scout

Troop 314 brought the wreaths forward and handed them off to US-
AKA representative Prioleau, American Legion Post 44 representative John Pennington, and Gold Star Families representative Mike Sam. Pennington placed a wreath at the bottom of the Operation Flintlock memorial to remind us veterans serve worldwide and too often fall far from family and friends. Prioleau placed the wreath in front of the

colors of the U.S. and RMI to honor fellow countrymen and women who have given their lives in its defense, and in remembrance of those who have fallen in defense of our nation, and their heroic devotion to the defense of freedom. Sam placed a wreath in front at the base of the Second Raider Battalion memorial for symbolic remembrance of life everlasting and to immortalize the brave deeds of our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines and Coast Guardsmen.

Guest speaker Prioleau took the podium and addressed the audience. “[Veterans’] sacrifices in the name of peace and freedom have made our nation what it is today,” he said. “By their sacrifice, they’ve given us our strength, and our enthusiasm to continue the mission of serving the people of the United

States of America and its allies. We, the living, must ensure that their sacrifice was not in vain.”

“Our nation owes a debt to its fallen heroes that we can never fully repay,” Prioleau continued. “But, we can honor their sacrifice, and we must. We must honor it in our own lives by holding their memories close to our hearts, and pay close attention to the example they have set. We must honor it as a nation by keeping our hallowed trust with all who wear and have worn America’s uniform. God bless the souls of the respected warriors we’ve lost, and the country for which they died.”

A moment of silence was offered in remembrance of our nation’s fallen heroes, followed by a salute from the American Legion Post 44 rifle squad. Lastly, “Taps” was played by high school student Wyatt Jones.

cer – we're fighting for every birthday threatened by every cancer in every community." Money raised not only goes toward research, but also to helping those battling cancer by providing lodging, transportation and recovery support.




