

### RMI Economic Overview

The RMI is classified by the United Nations as a Small Island Developing State. The economy remains relatively small, with an estimated current-dollar Gross Domestic Product of about US\$100 million as of 2003. The economy relies heavily on RMI Government and US military expenditure and employment, but has seen some growth in commercial and small-scale fisheries, mariculture/aquaculture, agriculture, traditional crafts manufacturing (handicrafts) and tourism.

# Volunteers give TLC to local pet cemetery

Summer marks the return of the many Kwaj Kids who attend college in the United States and abroad. We (the college kids) bask in our “parasite” ways: long and unproductive naps, never-ending raids on the refrigerator, and infectious, chronic laziness are just some of our best qualities. As the days slowly progress, two Kwajalein parents had seen enough! Gloria and Thaddeus Cassiday summoned the group of college students and proposed an idea that would impact one of the less visible facets of Kwajalein: the Kwajalein Pet Cemetery.

The pet cemetery is a small, raised area of land located to the right of the “Shark Pit” and behind Telemetry Hill. As Kwaj pets pass away, families are given the option to bury their animal at the cemetery. There are a large number of graves in the burial ground (the actual amount is unspecified), some dating back to the 1980s. Since nobody is responsible for maintenance in that area of the island, in just a few hours, a clearly noticeable difference can be attained. The project was conducted to make sure that the furry friends, which so many people within the Kwajalein community have put to rest, are well-represented. A few of the Kwaj Kids who helped with the project actually have family pets buried in the cemetery.

With the help and supervision of Missile Defense Agency Site Manager Dave Gray, Gloria and Thad-

deus, our group, consisting of 10 Kwaj Kids, rode down to the end of the island to start the clean up. With music blasting, we got to work using rakes, shears and power tools, all provided by Gray via MDA. Without the help and generosity of Gray and the Cassidays, none of this would have been possible.

The pet cemetery has three different sections; only one of which was visible before the cleanup began. Old grave stones were found underneath shrubs, leaves and fallen tree branches. We were amazed at how many of the graves were covered before we arrived. As we cut and raked, the once debris-filled cemetery began to look like the beautiful memorial it was intended to be.

In two short hours, the project came to a close. As we left the beautiful patch of land that over-

looks the ocean, we felt a sense of satisfaction. Kwajalein is our home, and being able to make just a small difference when we come back is important; giving back to the community that had such a big impact in our lives is rewarding.

# KRS and MTEP provide training for Marine Department personnel

Two employees of the Kwajalein Marine Department recently completed a weeklong training and certification program in Seattle. Electrician Patrick Solomon and mechanic Ross Arikaitau attended the Hamilton Jet Maintenance and Overhaul along with the Configuration and Service training courses to earn their certifications. Currently, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll assets *PVT Sorenson* and *PVT Anderson* catamarans have the Hamilton Jet systems in place.

“We identified that funding was available for training through the Marshallese Training Education Program and Kwajalein Range Services, and we had a need for specialized training for the unique components on board the catamarans. They are valuable mission assets that must be in a constant ready state. Patrick Solomon and Ross Arikaitau have high-level skill sets and a proven work ethic that we wanted to expand. They were great candidates for the program,” said David Layton, port engineer.

Both Arikaitau, who has 21 years in the marine department, and Solomon, appreciated the training. “We have learned something different, a unique knowledge to bring to the department,” said Arikaitau.

Sending an electrician and a mechanic proved to be very useful as well, with each man learning the other’s specialty. “I learned more about the jets now, along with many other things specific to these components. I can find and repair problems; I can tear down and reassemble the jets,” said Solomon.

“Our goal in the Marine Department is to promote our RMI employees through technical training and certification, and give acknowledgement of their efforts. This allows a more consistent work force with a high knowledge base, thereby promoting the RMI work force into positions with higher levels of responsibility and authority,” added Layton.

# RMI paddling team to compete in 2014 Micronesian Olympics

The Micronesian Olympics is an event designed and held to bolster friendly competition between different parts of Micronesia: Chuuk, Pohnpei, Guam, Palau, Saipan, Kosrae and Yap. The Republic of the Marshall Islands is invited to participate in the games every four years, allowing many athletes from the Majuro, Ebeye and Kwajalein communities to compete. Kwajalein and Ebeye have built a reputation for sending a remarkably successful swim team to participate in the games. This year, however, the dynamic of the once “predominately-swimmer” RMI team changed. Although the 8th Micronesian Olympics, taking place in Pohnpei in August 2014, is over a year away, there is an unbelievable amount of buzz surrounding the RMI’s athlete decisions. While the decisions usually are about which swimmers to take, this year the decision includes sending additional athletes to participate in a different event altogether: paddling. All of the uncertainties have ceased with recent negotiations between the Marshall Islands Swim Federation and the Marshall Islands National Olympic Committee.

In early April, Mary Harris, president of the MISF, made a presentation to the MINOC board regarding the 2014 Micronesian Olympics. As she was presenting the list of athletes for consideration to take to the games, MINOC posed a question. The committee asked whether the Marshall Islands were going to submit a paddling team to compete. Harris weighed her options and replied with an enthusiastic, “Yes!” The participation from the Kwajalein and Ebeye communities will now include a team of six boys and six girls who will compete in the paddling competitions. Harris was overwhelmingly excited for the opportunity to send paddlers. When talking about the opportunity, Harris said, “Paddling is in our

culture. I believe that the presence of an RMI paddling team is long overdue.”

There were two major conditions surrounding the RMI’s ability to take a group of paddlers: First, each eligible paddler must function dually as a paddler and an open-water (long distance) swimmer. Secondly, the boys and girls teams who intend to participate must present a potential for medal contention. MINOC and MISF soon reached an agreement, and for the first time in eight years, the RMI will be sending a paddling team to participate in the 2014 Micronesian Olympics.

This wonderful opportunity would never have come to fruition without the supporting cast members from the Kwajalein, Ebeye and Majuro communities. An immense amount of behind-the-scenes work is put into prepping for this newly developing RMI paddling team. When word got out that the RMI was acquiring 14 new, untrained athletes, many different clubs and community members jumped at the chance to get involved.

Susan Zehr and Gus Aljure of the Kwajalein Paddling Club stepped up to teach the boys and girls the basics of paddling. Working with the KPC, Aljure and Zehr were able to give the new paddlers some real, open-water canoe experience. The KPC graciously provided the young athletes with canoes and paddles while they continued their search

for their own gear. There are two canoes that the MISF is currently trying to bring over from Majuro. Ideally, the art of canoe making will make its way to Ebeye, with support from Waan Aelon in Majel (Canoes of the Marshall Islands), famous in Majuro for their traditional canoe building and carpentry programs. An extension of this program recently made its way to Ebeye; a continuation of the program would mean locally built canoes for the RMI paddling teams.

Kwajalein residents Amy Lacost and Travis Engstrom volunteered to help with the open-water swimming side of the deal. They practice weekly with the RMI paddlers at the Family Pool.

Last but not least, Harris makes sure the MISF continues to thrive. “Having a swim, open-water, and paddling team – all for medal contention at the Micronesian Games – is quite the commitment to take on,” Harris commented. “However, MISF is up to the challenge and we are thankful for the continued support of USAKA, KPC, Kwajalein Police Department Dock Security and the Kwajalein community. Without their support, the paddlers and swimmers would not get this opportunity.” As the days slowly progress, the RMI paddling team becomes stronger and faster as they make their way to the highly anticipated Micronesian Olympics.

**Tobacco Use in Facilities on USAKA/RTS, has been updated.**

**The most important changes include:**

3. No smoking within 50 feet of building entrances (existing rule).
