Disinfection byproducts in drinking water on Meck Island

Hourglass reports

The Meck Island water tests performed during fourth quarter FY13 showed Total Trihalomethane (TTHM) levels in the drinking water greater than the maximum contaminant level (MCL). Trihalomethanes represent a group of chemicals generally referred to as “disinfection byproducts”. They are formed when chlorine is used to disinfect water to make it safe for drinking. They result from a reaction between the chlorine and naturally occurring organic compounds in the raw water. Mandatory public notification is required when a contaminant exceeds the MCL. Potential health effects from long-term consumption of water with elevated levels of TTHM include liver and kidney problems or increased risk of cancer. However, potential short-term exposure by healthy adults has not been shown to lead to adverse health effects. Potential exposures to Meck personnel can be considered short-term due to the limited time the MCL has been exceeded.

Final approval has been granted for a granular activated carbon (GAC) filter system, which is scheduled to be installed on Meck in the late spring or early summer of 2014. This GAC filter system will treat the entire Meck drinking water system to remove those naturally occurring organic compounds before the water is disinfected with chlorine, effectively reducing the resulting TTHMs to minimal levels.

In the mean time, an activated carbon point-of-use filter will be installed on the tap outside the water treatment plant to filter out TTHMs and provide safe drinking and cooking water for Meck personnel from this tap only. Showering and face-washing at other locations will have no negative effects. These activities may continue at any shower or potable water tap.



2nd round of Threat Awareness and Reporting Program (TARP) sessions around the corner

Hourglass Reports

The Army is a prime target for foreign intelligence and international terrorist elements. The Army faces the threat of espionage, sabotage, subversion and international terrorism from elements outside, and even inside, the United States of America. U.S. Army-Kwajalein Atoll is no exception.

To counterveil possible threats against operations and intelligence on USAG-KA, the 500th Military Intelligence office will soon conduct mandatory TARP trainings for all military, civilian and contractor personnel that could not attend earlier sessions. The training is mandated by the Department of Defense and is intended for U.S. citizens, regardless of their level of security clearance.

The primary focus of TARP training centers on ensuring Department of Defense personnel understand their responsibility to report potential threats by:

1) Being knowledgeable of reportable threat-related incidents and behavioral indicators;

- 2) Being knowledgeable about how to contact the supporting Counter Intelligence office;
- 3) Following the procedures for reporting an incident;
- 4) Cooperating with or assisting Counter Intelligence agents in the conduct of their official duties;
- 5) Not discussing the details of an incident, unless authorized by the covering Counter Intelligence agent.

The training dates, times and locations listed at right will provide flexibility to accommodate the various working hours for all those required to participate in the TARP.

Divers brave downpour during 2013 Underwater Turkey Hunt

Nearly 75 Kwajalein residents young and old came together under torrents of rain Monday to take part in the Kwajalein Scuba Club's annual Underwater Turkey Hunt.

One of the most significant events on the KSC's calendar, the event brought out a total of 44 divers who pushed off the shore of Emon Beach at 10:50 a.m. in search of a variety of prizes hidden under rocks and coral and inside cavities in the reef stretching along the coast.

While the divers kicked slowly out into the depths, nearly a dozen KSC volunteers and about 20 spectators either took shelter from the pouring rain under pavilion roofs or sat on park benches with umbrellas clasped in their hands. Others strapped on their snorkels, masks and fins to swim out to the outer edge of the reef to get a firsthand view of divers in action.

Some of what the divers were hunting for were rubber chickens and water bottles painted to look like little pigs, said KSC Vice President Matt Ziemba.

"When people bring up a chicken they get a turkey," Ziemba said while he helped lay out after-hunt snacks under a beach pavilion.

"And when people get a pig they get a ham. And we have a bunch of bottle 'coozies' that are out there."

Aside from the frozen Thanksgiving dinner entrees and soft drink accessories on divers' radars, they also searched for three dozen golf balls—or "turkey eggs"—painted in different colors, each signifying a class of prize to be won. To get Scuba Club gift certificate for a T-shirt or towel, for instance, one had to find a yellow egg. And those who uncovered the silver eggs were allowed to select from an assortment

of prizes, such as jewelry and pottery purchased from local vendors.

The grand prize, described by Ziemba as "one giant turkey," went to the diver who found the most pink-colored turkey eggs. Stephen Tippetts was the lucky guy who brought that bird home.

Other participants settled for prizes of the smaller sort.

"I found a golf ball way over there," Maj. Shawn Hebert said, pointing south past the jetty after returning to shore. It was one of the silver eggs. He exchanged it

for a silver wire-wrapped bracelet made from small seashells for his daughter, Elise, who had combed the lagoon floor with him for about 40 minutes.

“We had a great time,” Hebert’s wife, BJ, said outside one of the beach pavilions where many of the participants crammed under to get out of the rain and have a hot dog and turkey-shaped cupcake. She was one of two divers who found a water bottle painted to look like a pig, earning the right to take home a ham.

The divers attributed the good time to the KSC volunteers who organized and carried out the event. While some handled some of the more administrative duties on shore, others took to handling responsibilities in the water. KSC Safety and Training Officer Doug Hepler, for instance, kicked off the event with a brief introduction to the crowd. And Geoff Lake, Matt and Chris Ziemba and Jay Lord followed with discussions on safety precautions. Dive masters, meanwhile, were on hand to perform safety checks on every participant’s

regulator, tank and other equipment before he or she entered the warm water.

Four other KSC members got the opportunity earlier in the morning to hide the prizes that would later be ferreted out by the divers.

“We went down to about 40 feet,” Ziemba said, explaining the approach the team took to squirrel away the chickens, pigs and eggs. “And then we had two teams that spread out. One went north, and one kind of went in the southern direction.” The team that went south swam for about seven minutes tucking away the prizes as they swam, he said. And the team that went north swam for nearly 13 minutes.

Some prizes like the pink turkey eggs were often placed in plain sight on top of sand on the lagoon

floor. But to locate the more well-hidden turkeys and piglets, divers had to put in some real effort.

“Knowing that this hunt had the potential of dangerous fowl hiding in the coral we approached cautiously,” Tim Roberge said jokingly. He was one of the divers to come out of the water with a rubber chicken in his hand—and the right to take home one of the event’s coveted frozen turkeys.

“As I was hovering above I caught out of the corner of my eye an odd looking coral formation. That is when I realized that there it was and had little time to react,” he quipped. “... I reached down and pull the rubber chicken from the coral where it was hiding. I could swear that it attempted to bite me.”
