
Fiesta time on Kwajalein

Secretary of Army predicts changes

WASHINGTON (Army News Service) — The Army needs to deploy quicker and change to meet new threats, Secretary of the Army Louis Caldera told a standing-room-only crowd as he officially opened the Association of the United States Army's annual meeting Oct. 11.

Caldera said change is needed so the Army can respond quickly to the changing world, meet the needs of the nation, to fight and win wars and face new challenges — terrorism threats, drug trafficking and weapons of mass destruction.

"Change is never easy. Change is difficult. It is threatening," Caldera told the AUSA members and said the Army stands at a crossroads to be prepared for humanitarian missions as well as for battle.

"We are committed to change," Caldera said. "We are committed to making the Army the force of choice for the nation."

Stating that change for the Army means a restructuring of the force, Caldera said, "We must be a full-spectrum force in which every unit is capable of contributing along every point of the spectrum from humanitarian assistance to high-intensity conflict."

The secretary stopped short of outlining any restructuring changes but said the Army's Chief of Staff, Gen. Eric K. Shinseki is a leader of tremendous ability who will lead the Army in its change.

Shinseki was expected to unveil the Army's vision during the annual meeting.

No reason to stomach food poisoning

Following a few simple steps will save on the indoor plumbing

You wake up queasy. You're grateful for indoor plumbing. You're pretty sure it's a case of the stomach flu, or is it?

Chances are, if the symptoms last 24 hours or less, it's probably not the flu but food poisoning.

Pat Zurick is a member of the food safety department on Kwaj. In his experience, many times the 24-hour flu is really the result of improper food handling. He said the food here on Kwaj is being inspected upon its arrival to reduce any chances of it becoming a problem.

Zurick checks the food on every plane and barge arriving on Kwaj. On barge vans, computers record the temperature of frozen and chill products every hour of the voyage.

"If it's not at a proper temperature when it arrives we don't accept it," Zurick said.


He also monitors food safety standards at Ten-Ten, Surfway, Café Pacific and Café Roi. Zurick recently

participated in a food safety-training seminar conducted for facility managers by a Sodexo Marriott food safety trainer in California.

"There are lots of people working really hard to ensure that the food served on Kwaj is safe, and this is very important due to our remote location. Also, we don't want to jeopardize our mission due to a food-borne disease outbreak," Zurick said.

The majority of food-borne illnesses are a result of not handling what are called potentially hazardous foods, such as meat, poultry, seafood, cooked rice, cooked potatoes, dairy products, cut melons and alfalfa and other sprouts at a proper temperature and by not washing hands. Whether at home or at a potluck dinner, people can reduce their chances of becoming sick from food by following some simple rules.

1. Wash your hands before han-

dling food.

2. Cook foods to the proper temperature.

3. Keep cold foods cold at 41 degrees or less. Keep hot foods hot at 140 degrees or higher.

4. Don't let potentially hazardous foods sit at room temperature. Defrost foods in the refrigerator and quickly refrigerate leftovers. These foods should never be left out at room temperature for more than four hours; two hours is preferred.

5. Wash counter tops, cutting boards, utensils and your kitchen sink drain with a sanitizing solution. This solution can be made by mixing one tablespoon of bleach with a quart of water.

6. Don't cut chicken, meat, produce or other foods with the same knife, or on the same cutting board without first sanitizing them.

A recent survey found that home kitchens were more likely than commercial food establishments to have critical health violations, such as thawing meat on a kitchen counter top.

You can put your kitchen to the test by taking a quiz called, "Can Your Kitchen Pass the Food Safety Test?" at the Health Fair scheduled for Oct. 25.

Recipe for success: Quintet of chefs come to Kwaj, Roi with a cornucopia of experience

A classically trained chef who specializes in contemporary French cuisine. An Oliver Twist saga in the kitchens of California. A husband and wife who found a recipe for romance. And a childhood dream come to life.

The personalities behind the white aprons of those entrusted with one of the most difficult jobs here — pleasing the hundreds of discriminating and sometimes disagreeable palettes on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur — are as interesting and spicy as the dishes they concoct in the kitchen.

French contemporary from Texas

A premature mid-life crisis — along with a busted Texas oil industry and an itch to move — led Bob Baker into some of the most exclusive culinary schools and kitchens in the United States.

“I wanted a career that would take me places, and I love to travel,” said Baker, the executive chef at the Yokwe Yuk Club. “Plus, it’s a real creative outlet, being a chef. The culinary arts is the only art form that requires all five of the senses, because it includes the sense of taste, and no other art form does.”

A sixth generation Texan, Baker was 34 years old when he decided to ditch his academic career as a history teacher, a profession he chose after the proverbial bottom fell out of the oil industry in the 1980s. He entered the California Culinary Academy in San Francisco, where he graduated with honors. Over the next 14 years, Baker put together an impressive resume: line chef at the contemporary French Domaine Chandon in the Napa Valley; stints with Marriott Hotels and Four Season Hotels, as well as further studies in France; and a job with Lancaster Hotel in the exclusive Houston theater district.

Eventually, like many in his profession, the 48-year-old chef opened up his own restaurant in the Texas Hill Country near Austin.

“We had a very interesting clientele,” Baker recalled.

But Baker said he eventually got “burnt out” and took an offer to become a private chef in Marion County, Fla., where he pursued his interest in water sports.

“I decided one day I was going to be this master mariner and sail around the world,” he mused.

That dream took a slight detour when the opportunity came along to be the executive chef at the Sodexo Marriott headquarters. But a phone call from Paul King, Sodexo Marriott site manager on Kwajalein, about a job in the middle of the Pacific Ocean renewed Baker’s wanderlust.

“Suddenly that rekindled my interest in fishing, diving and boating — and here I am,” Baker said. “[My family] just decided it was time to get out of the city and move to a remote island location — and they don’t get much more remote than this.”

On Kwaj for just over a month now, Baker said residents should expect to see a new menu at the Yokwe Yuk sometime around the beginning of the year after he determines what specials are and are not selling.

“I’m trying to get a feel for what people want,” Baker said. “You want to satisfy everybody.”

From dishwasher to executive chef

It is Wade Jones’ job to satisfy the largest number of diners on island as executive chef of Café Pacific.

It’s a task he has spent much of his life doing. At 17, Jones went out on his own in San Francisco and took a job as a dishwasher in a Mexican restaurant, where he learned to cook authentic ethnic food. The decision to become a chef was predicated on the need to survive.

Chefs forced to improvise ...

"The main reason I got into food, I like to eat," Jones said. "To me, that is one of the joys of life: To be able to sit down and have a nice meal, and being served and treated as a customer."

Over the next 27 years, Jones worked his way through the food chain. In 1990, he enrolled in community college and got his culinary degree two years later. That piece of paper immediately opened doors earlier closed to the 44-year-old chef: He was hired directly after graduation by Hewlett Packard in Oregon, one of the largest accounts for Marriott in the world, and worked his way up to manager.

"I've been through every aspect of the business," Jones said.

But some of his most valuable experiences, according to this self-made gourmet, occurred outside the kitchen and classroom.

For example, during one summer break while attending school, Jones worked as a cook at a YMCA camp. He was in charge of feeding 200 children. Armed with only a table mixer and a hand mixer, he did all the bread from scratch.

In another instance, in a situation that seems Dickensian inspired, Jones disguised himself as a dishwasher at his first job out of school so he could observe the staff and get a true picture of how the kitchen operated.

"It's the idea that people are one way in front of management, and they're another way with staff. Their guard is down and they're more relaxed, and so you can find out if they have any problems," he explained. "I was able to help a lot of them get over their hurdles. They came out much better workers because of it."

That innovative, optimistic attitude has served him well during his nearly two years on Kwaj, where the cook is often at the mercy of his supplier.

"You'll never be in the ideal kitchen. You make your un-ideal situation an ideal workplace," Jones said.

"Don't give up. Always look for the best in a situation ... That's helped me adapt here."

Since transferring from the Yokwe Yuk Club to Café Pacific in March, Jones has tried to not only reinvent the menu but also the system under which it is designed. He can be found as often at his computer keyboard as in the kitchen.

"You have to have computer skills," Jones observed. "It's not just being a good chef, anymore."

Making beautiful dishes together

Bernadette Brockmon would rather think of herself as a cook and not a chef, as she looks to combine hearth and home at the Three Palms Snack Bar. Jon Brockmon, seeking a little adventure, finds himself the new chef manager at the DSC Snack Bar, which he hopes to make homier for its mostly Marshallese clientele.

Together, the husband and wife chef team brings a little different attitude to Kwaj.

"We're the type of people who try to make something out of nothing," Bernadette Brockmon said.

That's a good thing, considering the resources available to both the ordinary and extraordinary cook on Kwaj.

"I'm really into the fresh, herb produce - what's available, type of chef. Coming here to Kwaj is pretty interesting. You get what you get and try to make something delicious out of what you have available," Bernadette Brockmon observed. "Here at the snack bar, we're the only game in town, so we're trying to offer the kind

of things you would want to eat at home – chicken noodle soup or things you would want from home.”

A graduate of the California Culinary Academy in 1991, Bernadette Brockmon has owned her own catering company, worked at an exclusive California mountain resort and served as a private chef to a well-to-do West Coast family.

Bringing similarly impressive credentials to the dinner table, Jon is a former steelworker who turned chef in 1986 after graduating Western Culinary in Portland. He’s worked at the Red Lion Hotels in Washington, at the fancy Salish Lodge, where the TV series Twin Peaks was filmed and also owned his own catering company, falling into the company of such celebrities as football great Ronnie Lott and multi-billionaire Bill Gates.

Eventually, Jon Brockmon went to work in the Research and Development division for Marriott. It was at this time he met Bernadette, who also worked for the company. This week marks their first wedding anniversary.

“We came to Kwaj mainly because of Jon’s renown with the company,” boasted Bernadette Brockmon of her husband. “They really wanted someone to come out and give culinary appeal to what we have here on Kwaj.”

Jon’s version of the story: “I told my boss I needed some adventure. So the next day, on my e-mail, is this job ... It’s a great adventure.”

While here, the couple intends to make the most of their time. One of the main projects will be a cookbook, partly inspired by their island experience, that will teach the novice the tricks of the cooking trade. Jon Brockmon, always ready with a quip, said the book will allow the unprofessional to look professional.

“It’s going to be a cookbook for the average, so that he can [fool] his friends that he knows everything about being a chef,” he explained. “I don’t think a lot of chefs will like what we’re doing ...”

So what is the secret to being a good chef?

“You have to have a high metabolism,” Bernadette noted.

“And you have to look good in white,” Jon added.

The childhood dream

Anthony D’Amico is not necessarily interested in making a fashion statement as executive chef at Café Roi. After all, what 7-year-old is worried about style?

“I’m the only guy I know that ended up doing what he wanted to as a kid,” D’Amico said. “I always wanted to be a chef as a kid. At 7 years old I had already figured it out, and thought about it again at 17...I’ve always done it, and there’s nothing else I can do.”

So right out of high school D’Amico entered the Culinary Arts Center in Cerritos, Calif. Over the years he’s worked in everything from hotels to banquet houses. He came to Kwaj from Claremont-McKenna College in southern California, where as executive chef he handled all food needs, from student dining to off-campus catering.

“I do a little bit of everything,” D’Amico said.

His only weakness: Baking.

“Baking is more of a science,” D’Amico. “I can do it, but you can’t play as much, such as with sauces.”

D’Amico arrived on Kwajalein nearly 1½ years ago, originally working as executive chef at the Yokwe Yuk Club.

“It was a good job opportunity,” he said of his first international assignment. “Something to move up, something different.”

And something out of the ordinary for a guy who rarely entertained the idea of traveling.

“It’s the strangest thing that ever happened to me. You never travel much, so you never thought you would end up halfway across the world,” he mused.

D’Amico was transferred to Roi-Namur a year ago and says he loves the community feeling of the smaller island. He even entered the first Roi chili contest last month. He didn’t win.

“There’s always next year,” he promised.





Trio cross ocean to deliver sailboat

Former *Guinness Book* world record holder among crew

He was rolled upside down in a sailboat halfway across the Indian Ocean during the middle of the night. He nearly became a casualty off the coast of South Africa when his sailboat almost got hit three times by another ship. Intestinal parasites attacked him in the South Atlantic.

Such is the life of a world record holder.

"There were a few challenges along the way," conceded B.J. Caldwell.

Caldwell is the youngest American to ever solo circumnavigate the globe. The 23-year-old was on Kwaja-

lein last week with two other sailors delivering a sailboat purchased by Kwaj resident Rod Godfrey.

Only 19 years old at the time, the 16-month journey, which ended Sept. 28, 1996, in Hawaii, was a world record for about 46 days until an 18-year-old Australian accomplished the feat.

Along with Caldwell were veteran sailor Robby Buck, who has made 53 trans-oceanic trips, and Bryant Money. They delivered Godfrey's 28-foot sailboat — the *Ri-Wut*, Marshallese for "toy boat" — last week after a 17-day, six-hour journey across the Pacific Ocean.

Make sure to check future record books: Caldwell said he will attempt a non-stop solo circumnavigation soon.
