## Clinton signs defense budget

USAKA/KMR holds the line against FY00 cuts

A two-year trend was broken this week when President Bill Clinton signed a \$268 billion spending bill for the Department of Defense.

Hard work by USAKA/KMR officials paid off Monday when its full budget was approved with the signing of the appropriations bill.

In the previous two years, a total of \$25 million had been cut from the USAKA/KMR budget, according to Mike Reid, assis-

# Seitz comes to Kwajalein to assess community services

Running a retail business on Kwajalein or Roi-Namur is not as square as it might sound. In fact, the shape is more like a triangle.

That's the graphic representation used by Todd Seitz, USAKA/KMR Community Services retail operations specialist, to explain the dynamic of balancing customer service, customer needs and business profits to island residents. Seitz recently arrived on Kwajalein to assess the services supplied by KLS on behalf of the Army.

But, according to Seitz, he is on Kwaj as not only an assessor of community services, but also as a facilitator.

"It's a partnership," he said of the relationship between the government and Raytheon, which is responsible for the logistics on the island, such as retail and recreational services.

The facilities under review include Macy's, Surfway, Macy's West, Ten/Ten, the Laundry, Tape Escape, Gimbel's, the Bank of Guam and the Surfside Barber Shop/Beauty Salon.

Beginning Thursday morning, Seitz took his mission to the streets, setting up shop in front of Macy's. He handed out survey cards to residents. The cards asked customers to rate the stores in several areas, such as appearance, price and selection. He said communication is the key to improving the quality of life on Kwaj.

"Every time someone makes an issue or makes a complaint or something's wrong, almost invariably it's communication," Seitz explained. "The more [store managers] know, the more I know, the more we can do to make this a better place to live."

tant chief of staff for Resource Management.

"It was looking like the start of a bad trend," he said.

The USAKA/KMR fiscal year 2000 (FY00) annual budget, excluding military construction and customer funding, is just over \$150 million. It is essentially the same budget as last year if the cutbacks are added, Reid said.

He explained the success by SMDC and USAKA/KMR to support its budget was a credit to the FY00 Congressional Strategy. He said the multi-pronged strategy involved inviting key Congressional members and staff to the island, providing briefings to Congressional committees and lobbying by top military leaders.

"The end result was the negative trend was reversed and the Congress finally supported the president's budget," Reid said. At the

same time, Clinton vetoed several other spending bills.

The 2000 fiscal year began Oct. 1. Until this week, when the budget was approved, USAKA/KMR had been operating under a Continuing Resolution Authority (CRA), meaning it was operating within a limited funding allocation pending final approval of the appropriations bill.

While the core of USAKA/KMR's budget was approved this week, money comes from other sources through customers who use the facility's resources, such as the recent TRMM project or National Missile Defense (NMD).

"They reimburse us for services we provide," Reid said. "Our budget is actually a lot larger [because of the customers]."

The defense budget also includes a 4.8 percent pay raise for military personnel.

The survey, he further noted, not only gathers feedback, but also informs residents there is an alternate source to answer their questions and comments about community activities.

The "USAKA Community Services Quality of Life Survey" also requested information regarding customers' computer and Internet accessibility. Seitz noted many residents shop online. He said he wants to know what common threads exist between online shoppers so that information can be forwarded to KLS. A website may also be created for residents to access with their comments.

Formerly chief of community activities at a military installation in Germany, Seitz arrived on Kwaj Sept. 25 with his family. Bringing a pair of "fresh eyes" to the retail picture on Kwaj, Seitz said he has been impressed so far with the inventory and services.

But, he added, "There's always the ability to improve and refine." For example, possible refinements to Macy's may include adding shelf

space and tightening floor space to increase the amount of inventory on display.

Seitz noted most customers want "more of a lot of different things." But besides the fact many large manufacturers do not deal with retailers with a small inventory, Seitz said residents should remember a store must not only please its customers, but also realize a profit. That's where the triangle comes into play — needs, service and profit.

"Without one of those three things, we wouldn't be able to be here," he said. "All these stores should be profitable ... It doesn't have to be profitable where we make tons of money, but we can't lose money."

According to Kathy Valencia, manager of Retail Merchandising Services, annual surveys, want slips and buying trips help determine what inventory stores will carry.

Commodity specialist and managers continuously review catalogs to update stock. Special orders are also available.

Survey forms can be found at various locations downtown.

# Fair offers answers to medical questions

More than 100 Kwajalein residents braved the rain Monday to attend the island's annual Health Fair.

The turnout may have been a little small but the fair proved to be a big help for those who attended.

Todd Chaponot visited RSE's Safety and Industrial Hygiene booth. Larry Krone was there to measure him so Chaponot can make adjustments to his workstation at Altair. He said the radar console is 30 years old and isn't designed ergonomically. His biggest complaint is sore wrists, something Krone hopes to eliminate.

Someone from Safety and Industrial Hygiene will follow up with a workplace visit for everyone who stopped by for an evaluation Monday.

Krone has some advice for people

who sit at a computer all day.


1. Make sure the monitor and keyboard are directly in front of you.

2. The monitor should be at eye level.

3. The mouse should be within six to eight inches of your hand.

According to Krone, if the mouse is more than 16 inches away, the possibility of shoulder and neck pain increases.

prove the ergonomics of workstations on island.

People with a doctor's recommendation or an existing problem will have first priority, but others who are interested in a workstation evaluation can call Larry Krone at 51511.

The Health Fair included many more interactive displays. The Diabetic Clinic gave free blood sugar screenings. Every other month more than 70 Marshallese workers attend the clinic to monitor and control their illness. The clinic hopes to reduce the negative medical consequences of diabetes in the Marshallese workers.

The next clinic will be Friday, Dec. 3.

Nurses gave dozens of people flu shots at the fair. The hospital is providing the shots free to any resident or island worker who wants one. Doctors recommend that everyone over 50 get the vaccine. People who smoke or have chronic lung disease, such as asthma, need them, too. The Center for Disease Control also recommends that anyone who wants a flu shot get one.

Kwajalein Hospital's lab supervisor estimates she gave out at least 100 free cholesterol and colon cancer screening test packets Monday. Beth Turnbaugh said those tests, plus pregnancy and HIV screenings, can be done through the lab at Kwajalein Hospital without a physician's orders. For any other test, a person would have to see a physician first.

The health fair also included representatives from the pharmacy, dental clinic, physical therapy office and mental health office.



## Big splash: 187 personal records set at swim meet

The Mako Sharks defeated the Baracuda team, 405-371, recently at Millican Family Pool during the second fall meet of the Kwajalein Swim Team.

The swimmers showed off the results of good training, proving it with a total of 187 personal best times. Four pool records were also set that day.

Each team contributed two records for the books.

Jessie Brown, with a time of 37.63 seconds, dropped almost a whole second off Lynn Pippit's 1995 breaststroke time. The Fogg children, Katie and Benjamin, had outstanding performances with three new records.

"I feel really good about myself," Benjamin Fogg said.

It was an exciting meet. People cheered loudly and tiny 6-year-olds wore giant goggles too big for their faces, as they lined up for their races. The spectators showed the most ex-

citement over the freestyle events, the most competitive stroke, since it offers the closest races.

The meet began, traditionally, with the enthusiastic cheers of both teams, followed by the invocation, and the playing of the national anthems.

Besides the outstanding personal and pool records, the races were taut with tension, especially some of the 15 and over freestyle races which were neck and neck, with Adam Banducci, Jon Clayton, Jon Dufur and Loren Lindborg.

Lindborg won the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 25.45. Dufur finished behind him in a mere 25.93 seconds and Clayton in 26.07.

Banducci won the 100-yard freestyle with a time of 58.52, beating out Lindborg and Clayton by .36 and 1.46 seconds, respectively.

The medley relays remained close in both the younger and older categories with the Makos winning five out of six of the races.

The freestyle relays were also tight, with Makos taking the lead in three out of five of the races.

The two teams will face each other again on Nov. 1 and Nov. 22, both at Millican Family Pool.

# Runners circle Kwaj on Columbus Day

Those who stayed in bed lost. The winners of the 22nd Annual Columbus Day Runabout were the hearty souls who participated.

At 6 a.m. sharp, race official Caitrin Hogan fired the starting gun. Sixty-six runners, cheered on by families, friends and Kwaj's Running Club (KRC) members, leapt across the starting line. The race was on.

Fifty-three of the runners chose to

run the Quarter Marathon (6.5 miles or one loop of Kwaj) while 13 took on the challenge of the Half Marathon (13 miles or two loops).

The KRC classifies runners into women's and men's divisions and then into four categories in each division: Youth (12 and under), Teen, Open (20 to 39), and Masters (40 and older). Entries from each category, both male and female, participated in the race.

Sharon Greenbaum, Women's Open division winner, with a time of 1:45:08, was the overall winner of the Half Marathon. Greenbaum is obviously on track with her training for the Honolulu Marathon in December. She was the second-place finisher in the Rustman Triathlon earlier this year on Kwaj.

Just 25 seconds later, Derek Brower, Men's Open division winner, crossed the finish line with a time of 1:45:33.

Ed Hillman came in third, winning the Men's Masters division with a time of 1:47:22.

The winner of the Female Masters division for the Half Marathon, with a time of 3:03:18, was Michele Babcock.

The results of the Quarter Marathon were surprising. Five of the first six finishers were Masters division entries.

Wesley Hedman, a newcomer on Kwaj, was the overall winner and Male Masters division winner with an outstanding time of 47:12.

The Male Teen division winner was David Zakeri, who crossed the finish line three minutes later.

Kevin Cohen, with a time of 57:23, was the Men's Open division winner. The Men's Youth winner was Christopher Berling, with a great time of 1:12:15.

Anna Vining, with a time of 52:54, was the first female to finish and the Women's Open division winner.

The winner of the Female Master division was Jane Sholar, with a time of 1:16:31. Her accomplishment was all the more extraordinary since she pushed her children, John and David, in a double stroller for the entire race.

Julianne Kirchner, 7, was the Female Youth Division winner. With a time of 1:25:46, Julianne beat 21 other participants in all categories.

The Female Teen division winner for the Quarter Marathon was Heather Cornell, with a time of 1:35:54.

An awards ceremony was held at Emon Beach Columbus Day afternoon to congratulate not only the winners, but also all the participants.

# Riley named Wyoming journalism adviser of the year

Mike Riley's job is to produce great news. Last week, he received some good news. Riley was named Journalism Adviser of the Year for 1998-99 by the Wyoming High School Student Press Association.

Riley, who teaches English and journalism at Kwajalein High School, came to Kwaj from Cody, Wyo., last August.

He was selected from among high school advisers in Wyoming schools in the student press association — about 80 schools — for his work at Cody High School, which has a student body of about 900. Riley, who taught at the school 15 years, had been adviser to the newspaper, yearbook and school television program since 1992.

"Being out here, 4,500 miles or so from Cody, doesn't diminish the pride I felt in getting the news," Riley said. "I would have loved to have been at the banquet. On the other hand, it's neat to be out here. It puts things in

perspective."

Riley volunteered to take on the Cody school newspaper because it was floundering. He found the task challenging.

"The first year was hard," Riley said. "I started learning about newspapers."

When he asked for five computers for the class, he got three — Macintosh LCs. Riley undertook both the yearbook and newspaper with a class of 15.

"[The Macs] are old heroes. They ought to be bronzed," Riley said.

That year he also started a TV program at the school. "When I left, [the program] was a monster. Technologically, we had negative scanners, all digital equipment and film editors. We were the first school in the country to submit a totally digital yearbook to Jostens Publishing."

The students earned much of the equipment by selling ads.

"I taught all three [newspaper, television and yearbook] as journalistic media," Riley explained. He said he believes students need responsibility as well as freedom.

Last year, a staff of about 20 produced a biweekly 16- to 24-page paper.

The Cody High School paper won first place in Wyoming in its size category — the largest — four out of five years. The whole staff — photographers, illustrators, ad designers and writers — won all-state and national awards. Three of his students won high school journalist of the year three years in a row.

Riley keeps in touch with many of his former students by e-mail; many are still active in journalism. One of his first students, currently a sports writer for his college paper, recently won a full summer's internship to his choice of one of a group of New York-based publications.

Riley received the news of his honor by e-mail from the president of the high school press association. A plaque with his name on it will hang in Cody High School for the year.

Riley said he was pleased to be nominated by his students.

"The hard work the students put in" is the biggest reward, Riley added.


