## New housing for new millennium planned

As USAKA prepares to move into the new millennium, plans are underway for an extensive series of projects designed to substantially improve the standards of housing for all USAKA/KMR residents.

"There is a requirement for 94 sets of additional multi-plex quarters," said Bert Scott, director of installation management. "These will be of the three-bedroom, three-and-a-half-bathroom variety. That will allow for the assignment of either families or bachelors as the need arises."

With the KMR modernization and remoting program

## GE dishwashers being recalled

### From CPSC

The Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) recently initiated a recall of GE and Hotpoint dishwashers.

GE and CPSC have reports of 50 fires, seven of which spread beyond the dishwashers. No injuries were reported.

The GE and Hotpoint dishwashers that are being recalled are models GSD500D, GSD500G, GSD540, HDA467 or HDA487 with a serial number that has a second letter of A, M, R, S, T, V or Z. The model and serial numbers are located on a rectangular label that is on either the right or left front edge of the inner tub.

Consumers should stop using the recalled dishwashers immediately. Keep the dishwasher door unlatched to prevent the flow of electric current from the latch to the slide switch.

The company is offering rebates toward the purchase of a new dishwasher. For information, call 1-800-599-2929.

## Two Kwajalein students named Merit Scholarship semi-finalists

The National Merit Scholarship Corp. has named two Kwajalein High School students as semi-finalists in the 45th annual National Merit Scholarship program.

Ryan Mawhar and Daniel Robey are among the select few high school students nationwide being considered for a scholarship.

The two seniors attributed their scholastic success to voracious reading habits — and some natural ability.

"It just happens," Mawhar, 17, said of his strong academic record. "I read a lot."

Said Robey, "I like to read. School is basically fun."

Mawhar is active in the school newspaper, and said he would like to embark on a career in journalism. He also writes short stories.

Robey, 17, said he will head down a different path, likely something in the sciences. He is a member of the National Honor Society, enjoys soccer and occasionally contributes to the newspaper, as well.

Scholarships awarded through the National Merit Scholarship program are underwritten by 600 independent sponsor organizations and institutions, as well as with NMSC's own funds. These sponsors join NMSC in its efforts to bring public recognition to academically talented students and to stimulate wider educational opportunities and support for them.

Nearly 1.2 million students from 20,000 high schools entered the competition as juniors by taking the 1998 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

Fewer than 1 percent of the nation's

seniors were designated semi-finalists on a state representational basis. The number of semi-finalists named in each state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

Kwajalein students compete from Massachusetts, the state with the highest cutoff score.

Semi-finalists may choose to continue in the competition by submitting a detailed application, which includes a self-descriptive essay, evidence of scholarship and leadership, and a school recommendation. About half of the finalists will be chosen as Merit Scholarship winners.

Three types of awards will be offered in 2000.

Every finalist will be considered for one of the 2,400 National Merit \$2,000 scholarships awarded on a state representational basis. Corporations provide for 1,200 awards for finalists who must meet the sponsor's preferential criteria. Finally, about 200 colleges and universities are expected to underwrite at least 4,000 awards for finalists who attend the sponsoring institution.

The National Merit Scholarship Corp. will release names of recipients in the summer of 2000.

led by instructor Paul McGrew, started work on the Haunted House the weekend before Halloween.

Rooms and long narrow hallways were built in the CRC using four rolls of 40-foot-wide and 100-foot-long black plastic and a network of ropes.

Pumpkins, quite a few of the 6,500 ordered by Surfway's manager, Gary Prettyman, were being carved into scary faces. Posters depicting goblins, vampires and witches took form under talented hands.

Ominous signs warning that workers only were allowed into the CRC scared away the curious.

By Friday, the Kwajalein Hospital and the *Hourglass*, along with a number of other individuals, started working on their rooms. The house facade, erected by designer Denise Morrow and Debbie Thomas was in place.

At 5 p.m. on Saturday, ordinary Kwaj residents were turned into ghouls, monsters and vampires with the help of lots of fake blood, warts and fluorescent hair spray.

When the doors opened Saturday night, during one the stormiest nights of the year, the goblins and the things that go bump in the night were ready to scare anyone who dared enter.

Many braved the tempest outside to visit the cadaverous house with its groaning, screaming cacophony.

Blood (catsup and food dye), intestines and gore threatened to upset the most calm stomach.

For two dark and stormy nights,

## Future housing to feature 96 new units by 2004 ...

underway, an estimated reduction of 74 families is anticipated.

Starting in mid-2000, the NMD and THAAD programs will be gearing up on Kwajalein, with a requirement for 86 units for the projected period at mid-FY01 through FY07. The peak period of this buildup is anticipated in mid-year 2001.

The 16 proposed buildings will each contain six units, adding a total of 96 quarters. They will be placed in the existing trailer area along the lagoon, from the tennis courts near Echo Pier to Emon Beach. They will be oriented for the view.

Additionally, a green belt of some 75 feet between the road and the buildings is proposed, leaving substantial room for family enjoyment.

This project is slated over several years, with initial construction of the first phase of five multi-plexes (30 quarters) nearest to Echo Pier scheduled for the FY 2001-02 time period. The second phase of five multi-plexes is slated for 2002-03, and the final six multi-plexes scheduled for the 2003-04 years.

The length of the time frame is due to location, Scott explained. Projects in such a remote area of the world take longer due to such considerations as obtaining the necessary funding, mobilization times and transportation.

Those trailers that are not part of this relocation procedure will be disposed of through the on-island property disposal procedure that already is in existence.

The push to "revitalize" housing here comes from some of the highest links in the chain of command.

Lt. Gen. John Costello, U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command (SMDC) commander, has directed that all trailers be eliminated and replaced with hard housing, as reported in the Oct. 5 edition of the *Hourglass*.

On a recent visit to Kwajalein, Congressional aides Dan Gans and Ethan Cooper identified Kwajalein's quality of life, and particularly housing, as a key issue, according to the Aug. 17 edition of the *Hourglass*.

In other projects, the Reef BQ is about to undergo a complete renovation by San Juan Construction Co. This is scheduled to take about 16 months and cost \$7.2 million.

That will be followed by the Pacific BQ, which is in the fiscal year 2001 Military Construction Army Program, according to the Oct. 13 issue of the *Hourglass*. That project could cost upwards of \$20 million.

Residents of those BQs undergoing renovations have been relocated into 39 temporary trailers, which are located by the Richardson Theater, and oceanside from Kwajalein Hospital.

"We have planned this out pretty well as far as construction and revitalization are concerned," Scott said. "The problem will be if any programs slip or overlap, then that makes the reshuffling very hard to accomplish in a very orderly fashion."

### Housing refurbishment

Starting in FY00 and continuing through the projected time frame of FY10, the Old Housing Revitalization Program will provide upgrades and continuing maintenance for old and new housing as funding becomes available.

Plans are tentatively being made for refurbishing the "old housing," which was built in the 1950s, up to

the 1980s standards of "new housing."

This would mean total renovation of those quarters, including rewiring, sewer lines, central air conditioning (if not already installed), installation of a second bathroom, floor covering and window treatments, privacy fences and other electrical and mechanical modernization to bring the buildings up to current Army standards.

Built in the late 80s, new housing is slated to receive more funds for maintenance, as well as for any improvements that may become necessary.

With all of the building and renovation projects in the next few years, it will be a time of substantial change for island residents.
