The Kwajalein Pipes and Drums will open the ceremony with holiday tunes. Col. Gary K. McMillen, USAKA/KMR commander, will give the keynote holiday greetings to all in attendance. The Junior/Senior High School Band, directed by Dick Shields, along with the high school and elementary choirs, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, will perform during the ceremony.

Finally, McMillen and Mr. and Mrs. Claus will light the Christmas tree, officially opening the holiday season on Kwajalein.

Dec. 6 brings an opportunity to meet with Mr. and Mrs. Claus and take home a photo of the fun event. ## Dash-7 makes safe landing on Kwaj

The siren blast Tuesday morning at about 9 a.m. turned out to be just a precaution for the Dash-7 landing at Kwaj.

When the plane lowered its landing gear, one of the indicator lights flashed red intermittently, according to Steele Clayton, aviation safety officer.

Normally, all three lights are green when the landing gear is down and locked. The pilots circled the airport and visually confirmed that the gear was locked.

They automatically "scramble the

[emergency] trucks" as a precaution whenever anything like this occurs, Clayton said.

Once on the ground, the crew found condensation and corrosion on the electrical connector. After cleaning it, they tested it on the ground and in the air to confirm that the connector switch was functional.

# Macy's — your one-stop shopping store

What's an island Christmas shopper to do when the quintessential gift — the necktie — is not even available on Kwajalein?

Not to worry: There are plenty of options to choose from at Macy's, as well as Macy's West. Whether looking for a gift for the dad who has everything or the child who wants everything, the assortment of gifts available on island should satisfy even those shoppers with visions of malls dancing in their heads.

"Every year, the newest assortment of toys — everything that's new on the market — is bought," noted Annemarie Jones, manager of Macy's.

Every holiday season, one toy that's marketed better than any other rises to new sales heights. This year's apparent heavyweight is the Pokemon line. The phenomenon from Japan was originally a video game and made the transition into cartoon format. It's now the most popular toy, especially among young boys.

"Of course, there's the ever popular Barbie. How could I forget Barbie?" Jones added.

For adults, there are plenty of big toys to choose from.

Macy's expects to be well-stocked with a variety of technological toys, from televisions that run the gamut in screen size to VCRs to home theater systems to the increasingly popular DVD systems. One DVD player has room for up to 200 DVDs or CDs, while one CD system can accommodate as many as 300 discs.

Jones, adding Macy's is enlarging its stock of those items this week.

"[Macy's has] a great variety, but the problem is that when people see something they want they buy it. If they don't, it's gone," observed shopper Sarah Stepchew, found at one of the store's hotspots for overseas gifts — the T-shirt rack.

Items unique to Kwajalein remain a popular Christmas gift to friends and family back in the states. From T-shirts to sweatshirts to hats, Macy's literally stocks thousands of such items only to see its inventory dwindle almost overnight.

"People always like to shop for Kwajalein local items," Jones agreed. More of these items are due in December.

Of course to get those local items back home to CONUS, residents are encouraged to mail Christmas gifts as early as possible. Post office personnel recommend packages be sent out by Dec. 1 to ensure delivery before the stateside holiday. Cards and letters have a little more leeway, with a Dec. 5 deadline.

"You have to shop early and mail early. Earlier than you would in the states. It's almost too late now," shopper Maree Gregoire said. "First year [here] you buy everything that has Kwaj on it. After that, it's catalog shopping. This year, [Macy's] had millennium Waterford [champagne flutes]. I bought those for specific people."

Also promising to be a popular gift item whether buying for someone who lives off island or on island is Hawaiian heirloom jewelry, a 14K gold jewelry with black enamel and old English lettering. According to Jones, the item has its origins in the 19<sup>th</sup> century when Queen Victoria presented Hawaiian Queen Liliuokalani with a lovely gold and black enamel piece during a visit to England.

"Through this queen, Hawaiian heirloom jewelry has become popular," Jones said. The jewelry is available in rings, pendants, bracelets and earrings. Everything but the earrings can be personalized, with English words translated into Hawaiian.

And on Saturday, one of the store's most popular attractions opens for business — Trim-a-Tree.

Located in the middle of the store, a large assortment of ribbons, lights, Christmas balls, garlands and figurines will be available for home decoration.

"There are lots of new things in Trim-a-Tree this year," Jones promised. "People will have to come and see."

pumpkin and pecan pie, along with ham and prime rib and, new this year, an array of gourmet salads and fresh fruit — all were beautifully ar-

ranged for hungry residents.

"We wanted it to be really festive," Jones said.

many of which were pulled together so more family and friends could share their meals.

It takes the entire staff of 75 cooks and food service people to prepare and serve this meal.

And he and his staff worked for more than a week on the preparation.

Now that Thanksgiving's a memory, there's Christmas dinner to plan.


But, even bigger, is the millennium at Kwaj.

# Sports pack Turkey Bowl

The mighty rope wiggled back and forth like an agitated snake, as young faces twisted with effort to seize the advantage in a spirited game of tug-of-war.

That was just one event in an afternoon packed with activities at Coral Sands Beach. From people sitting in the shade dozing to playing flag football on the field, junior/senior high school students and faculty kept themselves busy at this year's 30<sup>th</sup> annual Turkey Bowl.

"Z-1 Caution." They also break-danced, this time to an urban hip-hop song.

Then came the faculty's salute, read with clarity by Robbie Hamill and Camilla Morrison. Afterwards, another dance followed — a beautiful Hawaiian dance done by three Marshallese girls in red Hawaiian-style dresses.

Next came the event everybody had been waiting for — the traditional dance of the "Men in Skirts." It's a dance done by six male students in cheerleader outfits and pom-poms. The audience was mightily cheered to watch the antics of these new "cheerleaders" and their routines, choreographed by cheerleader Heather Cornell.

The ceremonies concluded with the judging of the class cheer, which was determined by the loudest class. Yelling, "We have spirit, Yes we do, We have spirit, We have spirit what about you?" the junior class won by an overwhelming majority in decibel measures.

Turkey Bowl was the culmination of "Spirit Week," a week when each class shows school spirit by doing outrageous things each day, such as "Gender Bender Day," when the guys dress up as girls and girls dress up as guys.

Turkey Bowl began in the 1969-70 school year. Originally a football game between the freshman and senior classes, it has evolved over the years into a pep rally at CRC and a field day at Coral Sands Beach.
