## Record contract awarded for \$35.2M Roi-Namur power plant

USAKA/KMR's largest-ever single Military Construction, Army (MCA), project was recently awarded by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Honolulu, for a new power plant to be built on Roi-Namur, according to Gene Dohrman, USAKA/KMR MCA project manager.

A joint venture between J.A. Jones of Charlotte, N.C., and International Bridge Corporation of Guam won the \$35.2 million contract to build the facility. The Kwajalein power plant cost more to build, but was built in two phases with two different contracts, Dohrman said.

"We've incorporated lessons learned from the Kwajalein power plant into the design of the Roi-Namur power plant," Dohrman said.

The new plant will look much like the Kwajalein power plant, with tall precast concrete wall panels.

The nine diesel-driven generators will have a capacity of 13,500 kilowatts, said Kevin Ehart, Raytheon Utilities manager.

An average household television uses 36.7 kilowatt hours a month. Roi-Namur uses an average of 2.9 million kilowatt hours a month. The KREMS sensors on Roi-Namur account for much of the power consumption on the island.

"That's unique to Roi," Dohrman said. "Most power plants don't have

to deal with power spikes like those produced when KREMS powers up."

J.A. Jones/IBC will submit a schedule of construction activities soon to the COE Kwajalein Resident Office, which will administer and oversee construction. The contract construction period will end in December 2001. The contract includes demolition of the old plant, which will occur following a validation period during which the required reliability of the new power plant must be demonstrated by the contractor.

At the height of construction, as many as 100 or more workers will live and work on the island. The contractor will be responsible for housing the workers in man camps.

J.A. Jones has a history of work at USAKA/KMR. The contractor performed renovation on Cafe Pacific, Kwajalein Hospital, and Surfway in the early 1990s. The company also built the Ground Based Radar Prototype facility on Kwajalein, a saltwater intake on Roi-Namur, and fuel containment upgrades on five islands,

in 1996-97.

The new plant replaces the existing Roi-Namur power plant. Built in 1961 with seven generators, the plant received two additional generators in 1967. The nine generators have powered the island ever since. Over the

past several years, however, deterioration has reduced power output by as much as 30 percent and resulted in major overhauls on a recurring basis.

"There's a lot of specialty work," Ehart said. "We have to come up with ways to keep it running."

Many parts are no longer available for the old equipment, and have to be fabricated or modified. Spare parts will be readily available for the new equipment.

Said Ehart, "Our efforts will shift from corrective maintenance to primarily preventive maintenance."



## Aeromet reviews May rain, wind, highs, lows

What a great month May turned out to be! But we need the darned rain.

The lack of rain was again the big weather story across Kwajalein Atoll. Cooler than normal sea-surface temperatures to the south and east of us continued to inhibit rainfall. The paltry precipitation total for the month was 3.58 inches—about one-third of our 9.98-inch normal for May.

Although Aeromet meteorologists recorded 19 days with .01 inch or more, our normal daily rainfall of .32 inch was exceeded only three times.

Other weather numbers for the month were at or slightly above normal. Our average daily high temperature (measured in the shade) was 86.4 degrees, or .3 degree below normal. Kwajalein's temperature reached 87 degrees 17 times last month and a scorching 88 degrees twice.

Our lowest daily high temperature was a balmy 85.3 degrees on May 24.

Readers may have noticed our morning low fall to a bone-chilling 75.3 degrees during a morning rainshower May 31.

In the wind department, Kwaj's brisk trade winds returned to full form after a relatively calm first 10 days in May. By month's end, our daily average wind speed was up to 12.7 knots, or 6.8 percent above normal.

Climatic normals for June differ only slightly from May. In a normal season, Kwajalein receives 9.68 inches of rain in June. The average highs should be 86.7 degrees and lows 77.2 degrees. The daily average wind speed should drop to 11 knots.

## Rev. Pijja Matauto of Ebeye passes away

The Rev. Pijja Matauto, pastor of the Ebeye United Church of Christ since 1973, passed away June 5 at the Ebeye Hospital. He was 65.

The funeral was held at the church Wednesday. Burial followed on the church grounds, in accordance with the wishes of the family, the congregation, and the board of directors of *Jarin Rarik Dron*, the church organization of the Marshall Islands.

Matauto is the first person honored in this way at the church.

A Kwajalein landowner, Matauto was a respected community leader as well as religious leader. He was a member of the board of directors of *Jarin Rarik Dron*, serving as treasurer.

He is survived by his wife, Glenna; sons Lawson, of Ebeye, and Spohn, of Honolulu; daughter, Nancy, of Ebeye; and seven grandchildren.
