## Manassas gets her feet wet after extensive overhaul

After an extensive overhaul lasting more than a year, Landing Craft Utility 1667 *Manassas* returned to the waters of Kwajalein Lagoon recently.

The overhaul marked a significant accomplishment for the six shops in the Marine Department.

*Manassas*, which had been in the Marine Department dry dock since May 1998, was moved into position on the Syncro-Lift work table June 10. Metal chocks were strategically placed to secure the vessel in the cradle as the elevator slowly lowered the LCU into the water. Lines held *Manassas* in position when she finally lifted off of the cradle and once again was floating in her natural environment.

"The largest task in the overhaul was the replacement of the two engines and two generators," said Juan Muñoz, superintendent of the Marine Department maintenance shops. "It was necessary to cut a hole in the deck to facilitate their removal by crane."

Additional overhaul work included a new air-conditioning system and freezers and a fire suppression system to replace the older halon system. An electronic engine control throttle system and remote steering unit were installed. A digital magnetic flux compass replaced the older analog unit and a radar and GPS navigation system rounded out the upgrades.

This is the first time *Manassas* was in dry dock for a complete overhaul at Kwajalein. With the work being performed locally, instead of at a shipyard, a cost-savings of almost 50 percent has been realized. However, with limited manpower at Kwaj and the long lead time to receive parts, the overhaul takes longer, said Tom Dillon, Marine Department manager.

trials, to be followed by sea trials that will test her seaworthiness. The work of the six shops involved in the overhaul and modernization of the watercraft will be verified in these tests. Electricians, carpenters, engineers, welders, painters, and stevedores contributed to the successful completion of this challenging job.

“Although we were short-handed during the past year,” Muñoz said, “we managed to complete the overhaul, as well as keep the other boats in good repair.”

The 30 people in the maintenance shops will next perform overhauls on four of Kwajalein’s five LCMs, and next fiscal year, the shops will overhaul the fleet’s two catamarans, a fuel barge, and the water barge.

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## Handicrafts of Micronesia

# Micronesian carving tradition alive in storyboards, figures, canoes

Carving or painting on wood and public buildings is a traditional Micronesian art that has been adapted into handicrafts.

Palau continues to produce a large quantity of carvings. Wooden utensils, bowls, and other containers are still carved for functional purposes.

Today, many types of wood carvings are sold as handicrafts. Items from Palau include storyboards, monkey-men, tikis, and statuary. Love sticks and war clubs come from Chuuk. From Ponape come wooden fish and other sea life. The sharks from Ponape are extremely popular.

Woods used for carving vary as to availability. Two common woods are breadfruit, a very soft wood, and mangrove, a hard wood.



## Storyboards

One of the best-known handicrafts from Micronesia is the Palauan storyboard. It is a traditional art form that was used to color and carve the rafters of the *bais* (men's community houses). The original colors were black, brown, and white.


The carvings so impressed the Germans when they ruled Palau that they cut whole rafters from the *bais* and shipped them back to Germany for their homes and museums.

When the Japanese arrived, the artist Hijikata thought it rather senseless to hack apart the *bais*. He started training young Palauans to carve and paint storyboards on small pieces of wood.

Each carver has his own style of carving. The enamel paints used by contemporary carvers produce boards much brighter and more colorful than the older boards. Natural wood finish is common now due to

commercial influences.

A whole story from folklore or just a motif may be depicted on a board.



## Lovesticks

Lovesticks come from Chuuk. They are wooden and carved with geometric designs and range from a quarter-inch to half-inch wide and from one to four feet long.

Traditionally, the lovestick was used by a man seeking a sweetheart. The man would thrust the stick through the thatch wall of a girl's hut. The girl could identify her caller by feeling the stick's pattern. If she desired his company, she would pull the stick into the house. Otherwise, she would push it out.




## Canoes

Canoes represent a way of life for the Micronesians. The small amount of land surrounded by water necessitated water navigation. Each area has its distinct type of boats. Though motor boats have replaced many of the canoes, canoes do still exist. Scaled-down replicas are being made and sold as handicrafts.

The function of a canoe dictates its design. A canoe built for traveling and fishing outside the lagoon is designed to go much faster than one being used for transporting cargo. Cargo canoes are rather long and have side platforms at the middle.

The canoes most commonly re-

ceived as handicraft from Ponape are made in the Kapingamarangi village, a settlement of people from the atoll of Kapingamarangi. The model canoes are lashed with handmade coconut rope. The sails are woven from pandanus. They are generally between one and three feet in length.



## Stick Charts

Stick charts are found only in the Marshall Islands. They might be considered the counterpart of modern navigation charts. Early Marshallese navigators recognized that during most of the year strong ocean currents propelled by trade winds passed through their atolls. Wavecrests that accompanied these currents could be seen as well as felt by the experienced seaman. With this information he could orient his canoe.

It is believed stick charts were made a number of years after the knowledge they reflect was acquired. The charts were not made to scale and were used merely as aids, decipherable only by their individual owners. The art of navigation was a closely guarded secret handed down within a family.

The chart is made of sticks of wood tied together with twine. There are three types: the *mattang*, which illustrates general concepts of wave and island relationships, used as an educational tool; the *meddo*, which shows the relative location of several specific islands; and the *rebbelib*, which shows all or most of the Marshall Islands. Shells are sometimes used in the *meddo* and *rebbelib* types to indicate island locations.



In B Division, Square Pegs topped Duke, 38-30.


Michelle's Team claimed the Women's Division title by winning over Spartans I Women, 18-15.

## State Department issues travel warnings

### From The Department of State

The Department of State reminds American citizens worldwide of the need to remain vigilant with regard to their personal security.

The department is issuing this public announcement, not in response to any one particular threat or event, but to emphasize its ongoing concern for the security of Americans overseas.

The State Department continues to receive reports that make us concerned for the safety and security of both official U.S. government personnel and private American citizens. We take these threats seriously.

As a result, security has been increased at U.S. government facilities worldwide. A number of our posts have temporarily suspended or limited services to the public at various times, and others may have to do so in the future.

U.S. citizens traveling or residing abroad are urged to review their security practices, to remain alert to the changing situation, and to exercise caution.

Terrorists, including Usama bin Ladin (who has been indicted for the bombings of our embassies in Africa and for threatening to kill American

citizens outside of the United States), continue their threats against the United States and have not distinguished between military and civilian targets.

The potential also exists for retaliatory acts against U.S. citizens as a result of the apprehension of suspects in the bombings of the U.S. Embassies in Nairobi, Kenya, and Dar es Salaam, Tanzania; U.S. strikes against terrorist targets in Afghanistan and Sudan last August; U.N. and NATO actions in Iraq and Serbia; and the Ocalan trial in Turkey.

The department reminds Americans to take appropriate steps to increase their security awareness. Americans should maintain a low profile, vary routes and times for all required travel, and treat mail from unfamiliar sources with suspicion.

American citizens traveling or residing overseas may contact the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate by telephone or fax for up-to-date information on security conditions. In addition, U.S. citizens planning to travel abroad should consult the Department of State's public announcements, travel warnings, consular information sheets, and regional travel brochures.

## Japanese-American veterans honored

WASHINGTON—Secretary of Army Louis Caldera helped in the unveiling of a memorial dedicated to the heroics of Japanese-Americans during World War II.

The 'Go For Broke' monument is located in and was given to the city of Los Angeles June 5, with veterans of Japanese-American units in attendance.

The polished black granite monument measures 40 feet in diameter and at its tallest peak is 9 feet high. A total of 15,987 names of Nisei veterans are engraved on its curved perimeter wall. Nisei is the term for second-generation Japanese-Americans.

Caldera chronicled the valor and sacrifice of Nisei units during World War II from Italy and France in Eu-

rope to Burma and Okinawa in the Pacific. He told the veterans and public assembled during the ceremony that one of the greatest tributes to the Japanese-American veterans came from Bill Mauldin, shortly after the war. Mauldin, a *Stars and Stripes* cartoonist who was on the frontlines, wrote, "No combat unit in the army could exceed (the Japanese-Americans) in loyalty, hard work, courage, and sacrifice."

"Hardly a man of them hasn't been decorated at least twice, and their casualty lists were appalling . . . A lot of us in Italy used to scratch our heads and wonder how we would feel if we were wearing the uniform of a country that mistreated our families. Most of us came to the conclusion that we would be pretty damn sulky about it, and we marveled at those guys who didn't sulk."
