Procedures provide for safe booster move

"Safety is no accident," and an FOM crew proved the cliché true in a recent operation.

By practicing well-rehearsed safety procedures, the crew recently moved a booster rocket on Meck from its storage facility to a missile silo.

"There's not a lot of room there in the silo," said Julia Olson, RSE safety engineer. "They did a great job of moving it. An 11-ton booster swinging, if anything had gone wrong, it could have hurt some people or certainly damaged the booster."

The four-man crane crew, led by Bear Kapahu and Jerry Niimi, attended a pre-lift meeting going over the specific safety procedures to be followed. Kapahu and Niimi both attended training sessions years ago at Hill AFB in Utah to learn how to move missiles.

Under Lockheed-Martin rules, all procedures are specific and written down.

"We pre-plan everything," said Tom Wright, Lockheed-Martin Missile and Space, Meck Island safety engineer. "The plan is reviewed in Sunnyvale (LMMS headquarters in California); it's reviewed here by Safety; and it's reviewed by Quality Assurance."

This and all other hazardous operations procedures are reviewed and

approved by the USAKA/KMR Command Safety Office prior to implementation.

Crews walk through the operation before performing it and any deviation from a procedure is agreed to by all members of the crew and noted on the paperwork, Wright added.

Pre-planning for an eight-hour operation might take 100 man hours or more.

For this operation, each piece of equipment, from the 40-ton crane to

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Bezzek takes over as USAKA/KMR's top cop

Some Army personnel dream of coming to Kwajalein or some other island posting, while many Army personnel never hear of Kwajalein. However, incoming USAKA/KMR Provost Marshal Maj. Paul Bezzek lobbied to get here.

"I wanted to come here," Bezzek said. "I'd heard about it from three other guys and they had nothing but pleasant things to say about it. So, I called up branch and here I am."

Bezzek, his wife, Sheriann, and two children, Brittany, 13, and Ethan, 10, arrived at Kwajalein July 3. He takes over for Maj. Derik Crotts, who PCSed this month after a two-year tour as provost marshal.

It's a job that will have Bezzek working closely with the Kwajalein Police Department as the commander's technical representative for law enforcement and security on the island.

"Even though it's a small and safe community, we have our share of crimes and emergencies and that's what I will focus on," Bezzek said. "As I gain a thorough understanding of the policies and regulations that govern life here on

Kwajalein, I'll be better suited to look for ways to improve the security and law enforcement posture for the community. However, I'm also a firm believer in, 'If it's not broke, don't fix it.'"

"Things are going to go well," Bezzek added. "The KPD is structured just like a military police company. Many of the officers are former MPs and criminal investigators from throughout the different services. We're all cops with one goal in mind—to make USAKA/KMR a safe and model community to live in."

Along with the police department, Bezzek will work with the physical security of the command and force protection efforts in support of the various missions that take place here on Kwajalein.

The provost marshal comes to Kwajalein from Seoul, South Korea, where he served as chief of Special Operations Division, United States Forces Korea, Provost Marshal Joint. Prior to that posting, he taught military science and served as the military police branch representative at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. His previous assignments also include jobs as a provost marshal and an MP company commander.

Bezzek enlisted in the Army in 1980 and earned his commission through ROTC in 1986. Bezzek also

has earned the Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, along with numerous other awards and decorations.

When he's not on duty, folks may find Bezzek and his family on the athletic fields or waters around Kwajalein. He's already signed on to play

softball with KPD this week and has taken in the local fishing scene with his son. The family also plans to do some traveling while out here.

Said Bezzek, "We don't know when we'll be in this part of the world again, so we're going to take advantage of this unique assignment."

the tools and harnesses, was inspected. Angles and distances had to be checked to calculate where the crane should be placed. The wrong boom angle or extension could spell disaster.

Aeromet was contacted to gain an accurate weather report. Lightning within a 10-mile radius or high winds would cancel the operation. The weather, however, looked good as the sun shone and only a slight cool breeze blew in from the northeast.

Taglines were attached to allow ground crew to help steady the rocket while it hung in the air.

Safety engineers including Wright, Olson, and Rudy Gil of USAKA/KMR Command Safety Office stood by monitoring the efforts.

Finally, with all the equipment checked and procedures established, the crew began its work, gently lifting

the missile from the transporter erector, holding it vertical high above Launch Hill and turning carefully toward the silo. Kapahu manipulated the crane controls as ground crewmen acted as extra eyes, guiding him with hand signals as he made minute corrections.

"These guys have a lot of experience," Olson added. "They've moved boosters before, but this was the fastest operation yet, and it was safe."

With the missile planted, workers installed grated platforms within the silo.

"It's tricky getting them down there, because you've got to get down around the missile and it's a tight fit," Wright said.

Next, the crews rolled into place the access stand that covers the silo, allowing technicians to resume their missile preparations for the next mission.

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Raytheon scholarship awarded to Suzanne Mayo
