Congressional aides find Kwaj 'essential'

Some people in the United States can't believe the country doesn't already have a missile defense system, but legislative aides Ethan Cooper and Dan Gans know better.

"It's a real hot-button issue right now," Gans said. "People are infuriated when they find out we don't."

Added Cooper, "For a long time people put their heads in the sand. They thought nobody but the Soviet Union had missiles, but the threat is real in other countries and it's happening now."

On the invitation of Lt. Gen. John Costello, SMDC commander, Cooper, legislative counsel to Rep. James Saxton (R-N.J.), and Gans, legislative director for Rep. Bob Riley (R-Ala.), visited Kwajalein last week on a fact-finding mission for their representatives, both members of the House Armed Services Committee. Saxton further serves on the MILCON (Military Construction) Procurement

subcommittee, and Riley serves on the Research and Development (R and D) subcommittee. The visit will allow the two aides to help their bosses as the issues of national and theater missile defense come up in Congress.

"You don't really understand it until you're touching the radars and talking to the rocket scientists," Cooper said. "It's a complex and comprehensive program, and can not be taken lightly."

Missile defense issues promise to come up more readily in the near future after the July passage of a bill requiring the installation of a national missile defense system as soon as it is technically feasible.

"We've got a moral obligation to provide a national missile defense for our citizens," Gans said. "Clearly, this place is going to play an essential role."

The next step will see Congress debating defense appropriations for

New deputy commander to dive into life on Kwaj

Lt. Col. David Stoddard, the new USAKA/KMR deputy commander and chief of staff, might seem like a man on a mission. That's because he is.

"Kwajalein is an exciting place to live and work. The work that we do here is vitally important to the defense of our nation and we live in a community well-recognized, particularly in Army circles, as a community of excellence," Stoddard said.

"As a new arrival, I was immediately impressed with the fact that you are proud of what you do and that you do it very well. The KMR's reputation as the nation's premier missile testing and evaluating range is well deserved and I will work toward continuing and enhancing that reputation," he added. "Kwajalein is an excellent place to live and our contractors make that happen. Part of what I do in my job as deputy commander is to make certain that we, the government, honestly and fairly evaluate the contractors who run the range and provide our logistics support, as well as other contract support."

Stoddard replaced Lt. Col. Richard Donahue, who PCSed last month. He takes over at a busy time for USAKA/KMR, and not just because of upcoming range missions.

"The number of range missions are going to be increasing, and, bottom line, that is why we are here, to support missions," Stoddard said. "Logistics ... support of the range is why many of us are here. We have to take care of the people that support the range."

A top priority for Stoddard is Army Performance Improvement Criteria, or APIC. Lt. Gen. John Costello, SMDC commander, has listed APIC

Minuteman III/NMD mission set for Friday; observe blackout

The skies over Kwajalein will light up with two re-entry vehicles and a series of decoys in a range operation scheduled for 8:46 p.m. Friday, Aug. 20.

According to Maj. Robert James, chief of the range test division, the mission will involve an Air Force Minuteman III missile, the National Missile Defense (NMD) team, and a number of "radar credible targets."

"The radar credible targets will help us develop and refine our National Missile Defense system," James said. "From a technical standpoint, it is a very complex mission. What you will probably see is mostly the two re-entry vehicles."

Kwaj residents may view the mission in the north skies, but are asked to observe the blackout in effect north of Bunker Hill.


"The blackout is crucial to us to collect the precise data we are known to collect for our customers," James said.

The blackout, in fact, allows the range to calibrate instruments used in recording data both before and after the mission. When residents fail to observe the blackout after the mission—by turning on flashlights, for example—the light can cause headaches for the range testers.

Likewise, residents must observe the caution area established.

The caution area is (see chart) bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on west reef, and on the south by the line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 8:54.2 N, longitude 167:45.8E, then to a point at latitude 8:52.8N, and longitude 167:45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef. Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not part of the mid-atoll corridor. This area, and additional caution areas specified outside the Kwajalein corridor islands, are designated as sheltered.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, KPD island clearance procedures began around 7:30 a.m.

today, and will run until evacuation is complete. Egress of all air and sea craft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until 4:46 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 21.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in

effect for the following days: 7:46 p.m., Saturday, Aug. 21 to 4:46 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 22; and 7:46 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 22 to 4:46 a.m. Monday, Aug. 23.

Questions regarding the safety requirements for the mission should be directed to the KMR range safety officer at 51361.

fiscal year 2000 into September, by which time a bill should be completed. That bill will likely keep Kwajalein's funding on par with past years; however, as the programs increase, and with additional test successes, the funding could also increase, Gans and Cooper said.

"Since the R & D account is limited, I will advocate also to try and fund MILCON and other projects out of other Defense accounts," Gans added. "That will not be an easy lift."

But the two aides have identified Kwajalein's quality-of-life, particularly housing, as a key issue, as well.

"The problem is the bulk of the residents are contractors, who in a sense choose to be out here, and you have to justify housing here, when you have soldiers in the states living in deplorable conditions," Gans said. "And this is an island without a representative in Congress. We have to show them (Congress) that the programs here are important enough to warrant the limited defense dollars."

And showing congressional staffers may be easier now that Cooper and Gans have come.

"I'm going to encourage my colleagues to come out here and see what you do," Gans said.

Waste not, want not: Recycling efforts on Kwaj to increase soon

Bottles, bottles everywhere, and not a one recycled — yet.

A vast reservoir of glass — broken, in brown and green and clear bottles — sits in a pile at the landfill, where it has grown for the last two years awaiting construction of a Recycling Center. The wait may soon be over.

Plans are in the works to turn larger amounts of Kwajalein waste into gold, as well as into heaps of compost and filler material for construction.

“We’re going to make it a lot more typical of communities back home,” explained Joe Loer, solid waste management department manager. “The days of just throwing it away are over because we need to further reduce the burden on our incinerators.”

In conjunction with a reorganization of the waste collection, recycling and disposal functions into a single department this past May, recycling efforts on Kwaj are picking up steam with plans for mandatory residential recycling in the future.

Sodexo Marriott Services, which runs the Oceanview and Yokwe Yuk

clubs, as well as the Pacific Dining Room, plans to be a major partner in the recycling efforts here.

“They’re starting to gear up for a whole recycling program on the island. I think with our help, we can make a pretty significant impact,” said Paul King, general manager with Sodexo Marriott.

“Someone needs to take the initiative, especially with the consumption that we’ve got,” he added. “We can make a difference. Hopefully, there will be other areas and departments that will do the same.”

King estimated the two clubs alone go through as many as 800 aluminum cans in a weekend, and probably produce as much as a third of all the cans and bottles on the island.

According to a June 1999 Integrated Solid Waste Management Program report, only about 20 percent of the 55 tons of aluminum cans which arrive here during a year are recycled.

“That’s pretty bad, actually,” King noted.

Some 300 tons of glass are generated per year, with only about 10

percent recycled. Just 3 percent of paper products, some 2,100 tons, are saved from the trash heap.

Currently, most aluminum cans are collected through the Aluminum Can Recycling for Youth (ACRY) program. Adult volunteers administer the program, which relies on youth group volunteers to collect bags of cans each week. Presently, it takes as long as two months to fill a trailer with cans to ship to Honolulu, where they are sold to a commercial vendor, with the proceeds returned to the youth organizations, according to Bill Logan, solid waste management supervisor.

With the additional loads from Sodexo Marriott, Logan said he expects more frequent shipments to Honolulu.

“That’s why we’re hoping to get Marriott on board,” he explained.

King said the additional money generated by recycling the cans will go to the youth organizations on Kwaj, such as the Boy Scouts.

“All the cans we’re collecting will go towards one of those organizations,” he said, estimating the payoff

at as much as \$1,500 in a year for cans alone.

While glass has been collected at the landfill for recycling since mid-1997 — and a glass pulverizer purchased in 1998 for on-island construction applications — the material awaits construction of a Recycling Center. There are plans to build such a facility next year just west of the landfill.

Can and bottle collection and recycling are only the tip of the trash heap, however.

“We’re starting to take cardboard,” Logan noted.

Begun in November 1998 as a pilot program, cardboard recycling utilizes two balers, one located at Surfway grocery store and another to be located at Macy’s West, which will also be used by Ten-Ten and Cafe Pacific. The baled cardboard is sent by the Material Services Group to the Navy/Department of Defense Recycling Center at Pearl Harbor in Honolulu.

In Honolulu, the material is processed and auctioned, with two-thirds of the proceeds returned directly to USAKA/KMR.

“Eventually, everything [to recycle] will go there,” Loer said.

While recycling of some materials is still in its infancy, Kwaj in some

fashion reuses about 90 percent of more than 1,000 tons in wood waste. Most is mixed with vegetable debris — such as palm fronds and yard wastes — and ground with a tub grinder. The ground materials are then turned into mulch or mixed with other materials for composting.

“It seems to work very well,” Loer said of the composting initiative.

While recycling on Kwaj has remained in relative obscurity, the USAKA/KMR solid waste profile shows that 3,500 tons of the 8,200 tons of waste generated in a year is recycled in some manner, most of it scrap metal reclamation by the Equipment Management group.

“The amount of recycling they’re doing is significant. I don’t think people are aware of it,” King noted. “Kwaj has always had the capabilities to recycle.”

Officials hope to alter that perception significantly in the coming months.

Loer said new recycle bins for the island are on order, and expects to phase in mandatory residential recycling in the future. Details will be forthcoming, he said.

“The residential recycling and office paper recycling program will begin in the fall,” Loer said.



NOAA ship *Ronald H. Brown* to hold open house

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration ship *Ronald H. Brown* will host an "open house" on Aug. 23 alongside Echo Pier. It will be open to the public from 1 to 4 p.m.

The ship is an oceanographic and atmospheric research vessel, and is operated under the Department of Commerce.

The commanding officer is Capt. Roger L. Parsons, NOAA Corps. The ship has been in service for a little over two years, and is in the seventh month of an around-the-world voy-

age, having departed from Norfolk, Va., in January.

The ship has an operating crew of 25 and berthing for 34 scientists. The stops at Kwajalein are to resupply and exchange scientists working on the Kwajalein Experiment for NASA Tropical Rainforest Measurement Mission.

The tour will be self-guided with members of the ship's crew and scientific party located at various positions around the ship. It is requested that visitors wear close-toed shoes.
