Taking root: Garden and nursery under development

A little slice of paradise is under development on Kwajalein.

It may not quite be the Garden of Eden, but a nursery and garden showcasing native Marshallese plants and introduced flora species is nearing fruition at the old hydroponics garden grounds near Coral Sands Beach. Soon, those with a green thumb or seeking a little knowledge about local plant species will have a breeding ground to feed those interests.

"There are a lot of people who want to know about the Marshall Islands. This is a small example of the Marshall Islands," noted Roxanna González-Ball, a botanist working part-time at the nursery and garden. "We want to try to get more native plants. Nobody has to go visit other islands. They can stay here."

From the ubiquitous breadfruit tree to hibiscus, crotons and papaya, many flora species are already well represented at the garden and nursery. Some plants are potted and ready to transfer to facility grounds for landscaping purposes. Eventually, plants will be available to residents through the Self-Help store, according to Joe Loer, who is managing the project within RSE's Facilities Support Division.

"We are focusing on landscaping," Loer said during a tour of the gardens and nursery earlier this week.

While efforts to develop the garden began earlier this year, the project is picking up momen

TRMM aircraft storm skies in search of data

The four high bypass turbofan engines from the DC-8 whined as the aircraft lifted off the runway at Bucholz Army Air Field.

"Lets go drill some holes in the sky," said crew member Scott Paulson.

The NASA airborne science aircraft quickly caught up with a University of Washington Convair 580 and University of North Dakota Citation jet north of Kwajalein. Together the trio flew northwest in a vertical formation, hunting bad weather.

The aircraft support the Tropical Rainforest Measurements Mission, and like their counterparts on ships and on islands around the atoll, the planes look for the same bad weather — an unusual tactic for most pilots.

"Yeah, most pilots try to stay away from the storms," said DC-8 pilot Gordon Fullerton. Fullerton should

know. He's logged more than 13,800 flight hours in more than 115 aircraft types along with 380 hours in space as a shuttle pilot and commander. (See related story, page 4.)

But last week, Fullerton and pilot Terry Rager were shuttling scientists from Kwaj in the world's largest meteorological laboratory.

"The great thing about the airplane is we can go where things happen," said Chris Miller, NASA mission manager.

The aircraft is also versatile as far as missions go. For the TRMM mission, the DC-8 carries five science stations geared primarily around downward looking radar and special sensors that identify the makeup of storms. It can carry up to 18 different stations, depending on the mission.

One device, the precipitation radiometer, collects radiation and light

Parents can help their children shine at school this year

You've made sure the immunizations are up to date and bought school supplies and clothes. Your child is all ready for the new school year.

Is there anything else, you, as parents, can do to help make sure this school year is a successful one?

Whether your child is a new kindergartner, a returning student, new to Kwaj, or just at a new grade level, there are some things you can do to help him or her have a successful year.

Bob Ammann, guidance counselor for the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School, shares the following tips:

There are so many things to do on Kwaj that it is easy for children to paint themselves too thin. Help them limit themselves. Colleges look for depth of commitment rather than the number of activities.

Be aware of what your child is doing at school. Ask questions that are real: "What did you do in school today?" is not a real question. "What did you do in algebra today?" is a real question.

Consequences are cheap when young. A missed field trip because of a lost parent permission slip is inexpensive compared to a misplaced tax document. Parents should consider carefully before bailing a child out of trouble. "I'm really sorry you didn't get to go," works better than "How many times do I have to tell you?"

Remember that a reminding parent raises a forgetful child. Explore with your child ways they can remind themselves.

There is almost always homework in grades seven through 12. The high school now has seven periods, which reduces the number of study halls.

The high school provides weekly homework sheets for each subject. They fit in the front of each subject notebook. Many students find these easier to use than a single notebook for assignments.

A regular time and place for work raise the odds that students will be less distracted and more productive.

Recent research has shown that

teenagers need more sleep than previously thought — nine hours. Many teens are sleep-deprived.

At the age of 12, a child can and should be responsible for getting himself out of bed in the morning. Some parents get stuck with a job they should not have to do. An alarm clock inconveniently placed across the room is a good start. Let the child

experience the consequence of being late.

If a problem or question arises, let the child try to talk with his or her teacher first. Help him practice several good approaches.

Do call a teacher if you are confused or worried about a situation, especially if your child has tried to talk to them first.

naturally emitted from below the aircraft. The sensor breaks the feedback down and computes temperatures within storm systems, which further indicate the presence of ice or the intensity of the rain.


Another sensor even collects samples from clouds and creates a digital image of the crystalline structure. All of these "gadgets" work while the plane flies more than 400 knots at a 40,000-foot altitude or more, often being buffeted by the turbulence of upward and downward drafts.

The DC-8 scientists work in tandem with the Citation and Convair aircraft flying at three different levels into or above storms.

While the Citation and Convair fly below or into the storm, the DC-8 flies above, taking readings and collecting samples. The mission is coordinated from above by mission scientists like Michael Goodman of the Marshall Space Flight Center.

"It does get bumpy, but it's exciting," Goodman said.

On a standard mission, the team of principal investigators man their consoles, while the pilots fly the aircraft to a designated storm, picked out by radar on Kwaj. Once there, the aircraft fly patterns over the storm,

collecting data.

On a recent mission, the storm proved mild, offering little data. Pilots spotted a larger storm on their weather radar and the aircraft altered course. Again the storm proved mild; however, the aircraft made more than three passes and collected some data before returning to Kwaj.

Tomorrow they would be back and so would the rains.

Shuttle astronaut lands on Kwaj to fly DC-8

Gordon Fullerton has seen Kwajalein before, from a perspective few humans can describe — space.

"You pass over the Pacific Ocean in a matter of minutes (in space) and you know how long it takes you to fly home from here," Fullerton told a group of sixth graders from George Seitz Elementary School.

The former space shuttle pilot and commander came to the island as part of the Tropical Rainforest Measurement Mission, piloting the NASA DC-8 airborne science aircraft. The sixth graders visited the airplane last week.

"What a great opportunity for them," said teacher Barbara Terry. "Where else would they get this."

For Fullerton, the road to space began with his father, who served in the Army Air Corps, and in school, he told the students.

"There's a lot of people who want to do this so you have to be competitive. What do they look at? Your grades, extracurricular activities, and athletics," he added.

The astronaut graduated in 1957 and 1958 from California Institute of Technology with bachelor's and master's degrees in mechanical en-

gineering, respectively. He joined the Air Force and flew F-86 fighter and B-47 bomber jets before being selected as a test pilot. In 1969, he was assigned to the NASA Johnson Space Center, where he worked as support crew on the Apollo 14, 15, 16, and 17 lunar missions.

In 1977, Fullerton was selected to fly the shuttle prototype, Enterprise. He then, in 1982, piloted the shuttle Columbia on its third mission in space and later commanded the shuttle Challenger during a 1985 mission.

"The first thing is the weightlessness," he said about space travel. "Most people get some motion sickness the first 24 hours and you're always a hand short because when you're doing something you have to be hanging on to something too."

"Second is the view," he continued. "It's fascinating. Most people think about their menus before they go up, but once they're up there, it's just get out the M&Ms or crackers and eat quickly. They don't want to lose any time when they can be looking out the windows."

Fullerton retired from the Air Force in 1988, two years after joining the pilot staff at Dryden Flight Research

Center. He continues on flying as a civilian test pilot at the controls of the DC-8, NASA's B-52 launch aircraft, and the 747, which transports space shuttles across the country.

"I'm 62. I've been in this for 41 years and I've always had a flying job, and that's a record," he said. "I'll be doing this as long as I can pass the physical."

tum with the recent addition of González-Ball, a native of Costa Rica who is familiar with tropical plant species.

"Roxanna has the professional training in this area, so it was pretty fortunate that on this small island we would have someone available and have that professional background," Loer noted. "Hopefully, it will grow outward from here, and utilize her expertise as much as possible."

And growth is everywhere.

Seedlings and plant cuttings are already beginning to root and stretch toward the sky in the nursery. Row upon row of potted plants — native foliage such as scaevola and carissa — are ready for landscaping. Other areas of the grounds are being developed for vegetables, such as sweet potato, cherry tomato and squash, while large banana trees add to the tropical ambience.

"We are working different projects," González-Ball noted.

Signs and plaques will also be added to identify the various species for visitors. Information on many of

the plants and trees within the area is available at the nursery, thanks to the efforts of Matt Mayo, an RSE Environmental student intern.

"Part of what we'd like to do is make this an educational forum, as well," Loer explained. "It's going to be oriented more towards a self-guided tour. Certainly the school kids could come out."

While not yet ready to make its grand entrance into daily life on Kwaj, the garden is creeping out. González-Ball has been advising the Job Corps staff on its landscaping project and

providing plants. Some 40 plants were donated to the recent landscaping effort at the new church on Enniburr, as well.

Garden officials are also seeking help from the public: Donations of plant cuttings are needed to further increase the stock at the garden and nursery.

Those wishing to donate plant cuttings should call 51165 and leave their name and phone number. The botanist will then call back and arrange a meeting at the resident's quarters.

Public input sought on transforming art annex into greenhouse

The Hobby Shop could soon be branching out in a new direction.

According to Gloria Peterson, Hobby Shop coordinator, there is discussion of developing a greenhouse at the art annex. She said a questionnaire was recently circulated to patrons seeking feedback on the idea.

"It's just sort of in the development stages," Peterson said. The area is also being considered for a painting studio or meeting space, she added.

Steve Snider, superintendent of entertainment services, said his department is hoping a garden club would grow out of any possible developments of an annex greenhouse.

"I think it would be a nice addition to the community," Snider said. "With the island beautification going on, I think a gardening club would fit right in. We are looking a little past just

beautification plants, and looking at organic vegetables, herbs, and other goodies, as well."

Peterson said the feasibility of the project is still under consideration. She explained it would require structural changes at the annex to allow access to the greenhouse from the outside.

"It would be a fairly big project," Peterson noted. There is also some question of whether a greenhouse could work in the existing space, and whether the useable space justifies the needed changes.

However, if the plan does go forward, Snider said there could be some crossover between the different Hobby Shop sections.

"For example, a potter or ceramic artist can create a beautiful flower pot and then 'create' the plant from the seedling," Snider explained. "Woodworkers can build their own

planter and grow their own vegetables in it.

The concept of a community garden may even be transplanted to the outskirts of the island at the old hydroponics garden near Coral Sands Beach, where a garden and nursery is under development. Joe Loer, who is overseeing the project for RSE Facilities Support Division, said he has discussed the possibility of using space there to supplement the community garden idea.

"If folks are interested, this would be another location that offers a little bit more space than down [at the annex]," he noted.

Input from the community is being sought for the project. Call Steve Snider at 53331 or Gloria Peterson at 51700 to voice your opinion.

"The more feedback we get the better we can make our decisions," Snider said.
