Aircraft grounded

Dash-7 down for routine maintenance; helos parked for X-rays

The Dash-7 airplane and all five UH-1 Huey helicopters are grounded this weekend due to a series of unrelated events.

The Dash-7 is down for a routine maintenance check. The aircraft receives a check after every 150 flight hours, and if it seems that these routine checks are occurring more frequently, it's because they are.

"We're logging all our hours on the one airplane," said Steve Wallace, Aviation Department manager.

One Dash-7 is undergoing more extensive repair work in Canada, while another is grounded here for

extensive corrosion repairs, leaving all the shuttle flights to and from Roi-Namur to a single aircraft.

But while the routine maintenance check once took almost 450 man-hours over four weeks, the department will complete the current check in only two days. Wallace said 12-man crews will work in two shifts around the clock over the weekend to finish the checks.

In the meantime, flight service to Roi-Namur this weekend is suspended.

A catamaran is scheduled to transport Roi workers Tuesday morning if the airplane is not ready, according

to Bob Babcock, port captain. A schedule will be disseminated via e-mail and the roller.

Meanwhile, the helicopters remain parked on the tarmac and in the hangar after an Armywide grounding last Saturday.

The grounding is the result of new guidelines for X-raying tail booms on the helicopters. A team of technicians from the Army's 25th Infantry Division's maintenance unit in Honolulu arrived Thursday and will complete the X-rays this weekend. The film must then be analyzed. The helicopters could be flying as early

KPD taking the driver's seat in bike law enforcement

Missing a bike? The first place to look is the Kwajalein Central Police Station, where a growing collection of bicycles on the north side of the building attests to a heightened enforcement of the traffic laws.

"Now we are cracking down on statutes and policies," explained Lt. Derrick Lemmie, Kwajalein Police Department officer in charge of operations.

The problem is bikes on sidewalks, bikes parked in front of building doorways — bikes where they're not supposed to be.

"Anywhere a bicycle is parked on the sidewalk — that's our major focus right now," Lemmie said. "You can't block public access."

Last week, officers confiscated 52 bikes, only 15 of which have been reclaimed. Between Saturday and Tuesday of this week, 32 more bikes were relocated to the police station, where two rows of bicycles are waiting to be reclaimed, joined together by a long, metal chain.

Some of the most common problem

areas are Café Pacific, the baggage claim area outside Building 901, and 7th Street in front of Three Palms Snack Bar. The downtown area,

where renovation is taking place, is also causing parking problems as bike racks are shuffled around or

New Surfway refrigeration units being installed

Seven of the eight refrigeration units at Surfway are being replaced by FOM personnel in a program designed to reduce environmental damage. The program is in line with the increased focus on environmental responsibility by the military services.

"The changeover from R-502 refrigerant to the more environmentally friendly R-404 refrigerant is going very smoothly," said Ed Black, FOM Mechanical/Electrical superintendent. R-404 is a blend of non-ozone-depleting substances.

The work is scheduled for completion by late spring.

Differences in the types of refrigerants to be used can change the characteristics of the system, Black said. "That is why Nelson Refrigeration of Omaha, Neb., has been sub-contracted to provide technical expertise during the changeover period from the old system to the new."

While the display cases will not be replaced, the rest of the system, including compressors and condensers, will be new. The display cases will be shut down one after the other, for up to three days each, in order to facilitate the transition.

"The inconvenience for Surfway customers will be in product location in the cases," said Ray Denham, Retail Provisioning Services manager. "Items will be displayed in other cases as much as possible, or will be made available at Ten-Ten."

The present refrigeration system at Surfway was installed in a Corps of Engineers facility renovation project in 1990, with J.A. Jones Construction Co. doing the work. It was found that six of the units installed at that time have rusted from exposure to the elements. However, the one unit that was in a climatized environment is still in very good condition.

Black said that based on that evidence, it was decided to build a climate-controlled room at Surfway to extend the projected service life of the new equipment.

There is also a change in design from the present system. Originally,

one condenser operated all seven of the compressors, which meant that a condenser failure would affect all seven of the freezer display cases.

The redesign incorporates seven condensers, one for each compressor and freezer display case. Should one of the condensers fail, the other units would be unaffected.

Increased sizes of the compressors and condensers will make up for the lower efficiency of the new refrigerants.

The changes are in compliance with the 1990 Clean Air Act, which was enacted after concerns came to light about the use of chlorofluorocarbon (CFC) refrigerants. It was determined that CFCs were harmful to the ozone layer in the atmosphere.

The ozone layer, located some 30 miles above the earth's surface, is a thin protective layer of gas that screens the sun's powerful ultraviolet (UV-B) radiation. CFCs break apart, creating chlorine that attacks the ozone.

The American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) provides guide-

lines for proper usage of heating and cooling systems.

Army Regulation 420-49, "Facility Engineering Utility Services," used those ASHRAE guidelines to mandate the removal of ozone-depleting substances such as certain refrigerants and Halon fire suppression systems. CFC refrigerant production was ended in December 1995.

Planning for the Surfway changeover began in mid-1998. Financing from a special Army fund set aside specifically for such environmental projects allowed the construction to commence in January.

"It keeps me busy, and I want to do something for the community while I'm here," Craanen said.

"The volunteers are the battery of this garden," said Roxana González-Ball, garden botanist. She said they need people like Craanen to make many of the improvements.

Twin arbors are under construction in the center of the gardens. González-Ball plans to have vines growing over the top, with benches underneath. Between the arbors, volunteers are planning to put in a

fresh water pond with hyacinth lilies and fish.

"It will be a nice shady area for people to enjoy," González-Ball said.

The arbor isn't the only project Kwaj residents are helping with. Saturday, Jean Culberson hauled plants gardeners had been growing at the gardens to Self Help. Many of the plants were grown from cuttings donated by Kwaj residents. Now that the plants are grown, each family can have two per month to use in their own yards.

Many other volunteers pitch in when there is a need. González-Ball said that not long ago some students were riding by and just stopped to help with raking.

If you'd like to help, there is always something to do. González-Ball said that in addition to workers, the gardens can use plant or fresh water fish donations, as well. The number at the gardens is 54980.

Rental fee to be assessed for canopies, chairs, tables

Everyone has seen them around island, and most people have even used them at a private party, community function, or school event. They are the big red-and-white canopies that withstand the elements to keep you dry, provide shade, and give a party a festive look.

The canopies, along with tables and chairs, have been checkout items, available through Community Activities. A rental fee for these items will be going into effect April 15, and, on a limited basis, Community Activities will be able to offer a delivery, setup, and takedown service. Revenue from this program will go directly into the Recreation Fund.

The Community Recreation Center (CRC) staff will handle all reservations, pickups, and returns; phone 52491. A \$15 deposit is required at the time of reservation and will be applied toward the rental fee. Full payment must be made at the time of pickup or prior to delivery.

The CRC will accept cash or check payments Tuesday-Saturday, 7:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. Payments by check only will be accepted between 5-9 p.m. weekdays and all day Sundays and Mondays. Full or partial cancellations must be made 72 hours in advance to receive a deposit refund.



'FDR' makes appearance at school

Tension mounted among the presidential advisors, Sept. 4, 1939 — in a school classroom on Kwajalein?

Germany had just invaded Poland. Great Britain and France had declared war. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, played by Dick Lupton, asked his youthful-looking advisors — students of Ric Fullerton's history class at Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School — what the U.S. should do in a mock strategy meeting Tuesday.

Teams of advisors split on the options — neutrality; the sending of non-military goods to allies; a cash-and-carry policy for sending war

goods to allies; a lend-lease program; or a declaration of war with Germany.

After briefing Roosevelt on the proposed policies, the advisors debated the options with each other in an attempt to sway the president.

Based on the advisor's arguments, Roosevelt chose the cash-and-carry option, allowing allies to purchase war goods, provided they could pay for them and pick them up.

"We learned a lot about how to make foreign policy," said Sean Cummings, a cash-and-carry proponent.

"This (scenario) puts you in there, so you have to think it," agreed his partner, Amy Moss.
