Hard at work

Aviation maintenance crew keep airplanes flying despite adversity

Every week the Dash-7 planes make 76 regularly scheduled one-way trips between Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. Most of the time, it's business as usual for the Aviation Department and its maintenance crew. But when flights are canceled, especially in recent months with only one flyable aircraft available, the disruption is like a pimple on an unblemished face.

"If we miss one of those [flights], and they have to launch the boat, we become the most visible department on the island," agreed Harold Weeks, Aviation Maintenance director.

Public scrutiny has perhaps burned brightest over the last six months, as extensive repairs to two aircraft have left the burden of supporting missions and the daily commute to Roi to one aircraft and the 40-

man maintenance crew in the Aviation Department. This week the fleet is back to full strength for the first time since Nov. 27 of last year.

Skip MacQueen, Aviation Services manager, praised the efforts of his mechanics, who often worked around-the-clock to keep the one aging aircraft aloft.

"Keeping one airplane up and flying ... was quite a feat," he said. "We did a very good job in keeping that airplane up. In fact, it's still our primary work-horse right now."

"[Airplane mechanic is] kind of an unsung profession," he added. "They're responsible for providing our commuting customers a safe, operable aircraft, day in and day out, despite the many tough challenges these airplanes pose."

Free airport shuttle service offered through July 1

From now until July 1, RSE Automotive will provide a free transportation shuttle to the airport for Kwaj, Roi, or TDY personnel.

"The command wanted to support the public during the mass exodus in June. We had the extra resources to provide a dependable, reliable way

for people to get to the airport on time," said Maj. Matthew Reed, USAKA/KMR Supply and Transportation Division chief.

Two step-vans are designated to pick up residents from their quarters, including bachelors' quarters, and transport them to the main terminal. The transportation is for lug-

gage check-in and passenger departure and arrival only, according to Philip Smith, Automotive superintendent of operations.

If requested, vans will also pick up passengers at Café Pacific, Kwaj Lodge, and Jabro Transient Facility, located upstairs from Macy's.

Customer satisfaction measures quality

"Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed people can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

Quality. What does that term mean to you? Webster's Dictionary defines it as a "degree of excellence." But who determines what quality is? The answer is "customers do" — customers just like you and me.

Every day, whether we realize it or not, we make quality choices about the products we buy and the services we use. For example, we may buy a more expensive shirt from one store instead of a less expensive one from a discount store because we think it's a better value over time. The point is this: Customers define quality, not the producers of products and services. This is a premise central to the Army Performance Improvement Criteria, which we are now using to assess our organizations here at Kwajalein Atoll.

We (meaning both USAKA/KMR and our contractor partners) are in the midst right now of an effort to measure everything we do here to find out where we are now and compare it to our goals. For each process that results in a product or service to



our external or internal customers, we want to find out:

- How well does the product or service satisfy customers?
- How efficient are we at providing the product or service?
- Are we getting better or worse over time in customer satisfaction and efficiency?
- How are we doing compared to others who provide a similar product or service?

You'll notice that it all starts with customer satisfaction, which is really no more than an expression of the "degree of excellence," quality, that we are achieving, *as judged by the customer.*

I'm going to ask something of you now. When you go to work tomorrow, take five minutes out and think about the answer to two questions: 1) Who are my customers and what product(s) or service(s) do I provide them? 2) How do I know how satisfied they are right now?

Departing passengers who want shuttle service should call 58294 and ask for it specifically.

"When a caller asks for a taxi to the main terminal, they will be asked if they want the shuttle," Smith said. "If they want a taxi, then they will be charged. If they ask for a shuttle and I send a taxi, there will be no charge as long as the passenger does not request any other stops."

Passengers can call no more than one hour in advance, Smith said. "It will help us schedule our vans. That way we can pick up more passengers for the same flight."

After dropping off their baggage and returning to their quarters via the vans, passengers can call for a shuttle no more than an hour before they want to be at the airport for the departing flight, Smith said.

The vans will operate on a timeframe designed to correspond to the ATI, AMC, Continental, and Aloha schedules. All attempts will be made to meet flight schedule changes, Smith said.

"However, it is still the departing individual's responsibility to find out if check-in times change and to call to reschedule pickup," Smith said.

Passengers returning to Kwaj can pick up the shuttle at the airport to return to their quarters.

Met rocket to blast off from Kwajalein on Tuesday



The Kwajalein ground hazard area is that area contained within a circle having a radius of 400 feet from the Kwajalein rocket launcher.

All personnel and craft must stay out of the caution and hazard areas between the hours of 11 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. on Tuesday, June 13, or until the restrictions are lifted. The ground hazard area must be clear of all non-essential personnel no later than 11 a.m.

Range operation scheduled for tonight

Dash-7 fleet returns to full strength after six months ...

at work seven days a week, 365 days a year, including holidays. During five of those seven days, three shifts work 24 hours a day. Currently understaffed, the department must compete with a lucrative stateside aviation market to recruit and retain its workforce. Saying each day is a challenge would be an understatement.

"There are no typical days. It changes every day," said Steve Josephson, Aviation Maintenance coordinator. "We're just doing our jobs."

That job involves keeping aircraft over 20 years old in flyable and safe condition. To meet those goals, the Aviation Department has adapted, particularly over the last year. Most maintenance is done at night, from 9:30 p.m. to 5 a.m., when no flights are scheduled. Additionally, when only one plane was working, the regular 150-flight-hour heavy maintenance checks were packed into what amounted to a long weekend — compared to three or four weeks previously.

"I don't know if it was planned, as much as it just happened," Josephson explained. "[The maintenance program] consists of putting everybody on 12-hour shifts. There are no days off for anybody. There are people here for 24 hours a day giving the inspection everything they've got."

To put it another way: About 480 work hours, normally spread out over a month's time, were compressed into a weekend of non-stop activity. Weeks said an accelerated maintenance program will remain in place, though with the additional requirements of maintaining the full fleet, the 48-hour program will probably not be possible to achieve; an additional day or two may be needed.

"It was primarily a program to support the one aircraft," Weeks said. "The island couldn't stand three or four weeks downtime, so we had to look at an alternate plan."

Aviation officials credit the hard work of their mechanics and other maintenance personnel, especially a very experienced Marshallese contingent, with keeping the operation moving despite the hardships.

"We couldn't do it without our Mar-

shallese," Josephson observed. "They're our backbone. The Americans do a great job while they are here, but they come and go. The Marshallese will be here, they'll be here after we've come and gone."

Four Marshallese mechanics — Jebe Ninjine, Phillip Harry, John Edwin, and Eddie Jormelu — are licensed Federal Aviation Administration Airframe and Power Plant mechanics, which encompasses elec-

trical, hydraulics, sheet metal, and general aviation. A fifth Marshallese employee, Donald Phillip, who works in Quality Control, is also FAA A&P licensed.

The skill and perseverance of all employees paid off Tuesday morning when all three aircraft stood in a line on the tarmac, ready to fly for the first time.

Said Jebe Ninjine, Fixed Wing supervisor, "It's nice to see them back."

Worthy crew responds to pipe rupture

The crew of the KMRSS *Worthy* kept its cool Monday, after air conditioning piping ruptured, leaking water into a compartment to a depth of eight inches.

According to Tom Dillon, Marine Department manager, the auxiliary salt water line flex coupling ruptured, allowing salt water to spill into the machinery space. As the water rose, it seeped into two electrical boxes located just six inches above the deck, allowing the water to come in contact with live electrical wiring. That caused the water to boil and steam to rise from the electrical boxes.

No one was injured.

As it was a Monday afternoon, the crew was off-duty.

"We knew pretty quick," Dillon added, saying the ship is rigged with numerous alarm systems that alert

Marine Department officials. The crew can then be contacted by pagers.

A fire department crew was also dispatched as a matter of precaution.

Ship's crew were able to stop the water by securing the pump, draining the compartment, and fixing the coupling. The crew must now dry the electrical boxes and make sure the electrical conduits are moisture- and salt-free by testing the wiring. The A/C system was back in service by 4 p.m., Tuesday.

Dillon cited the work of Capt. Earnie Casey, First Assistant Engineer Tim Chesnut, Chief Electrician Jack Carey, Marine Superintendent Juan Muñoz, and Port Engineer Jim Vencill, for handling the situation quickly.

"It was their knowledge and expertise that made it a routine operation," he said.

Skin cancer is the most common human cancer

Painfully red, peeling skin or a glow-in-the-dark complexion are easy ways to identify new arrivals on Kwajalein.

A good tan is the required look for island residents. Not only does a great tan look healthy, it is mandatory when going home on vacation, especially for winter visits.

But there is a darker side to tanning — premature skin aging, burns, photosensitivity, cataracts, blood vessel damage, reduced immunity, and, especially, skin cancer.

The most common human cancer, skin cancer is becoming a major public health problem, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The CDC is launching a skin cancer prevention campaign, "Choose Your Cover." The Kwajalein Hospital Health Awareness Committee has designated June as Cancer in the Sun Month.

A Cancer Awareness and Prevention booth, sponsored by the phar-

macy, was at the coed softball tournament and cancer research fundraiser last weekend.

"We had fun kits, including samples donated by Coppertone, to show people how to have safe (for their skin) fun in the sun," said Colleen Howard, pharmacist and Cancer in the Sun chairperson. "We even had a drawing for a banana boat ride, for those who protect themselves from the sun."

According to the CDC, repeated sun exposure is the primary risk factor for skin cancer. Other factors include light skin color and a family history of skin cancer, although anyone can get it.

The American Cancer Society expects that over 1 million new cases will be diagnosed this year alone.

The three major types of skin cancer are basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma, and melanoma. Malignant melanoma is the most serious, responsible for the most skin cancer-related deaths.

According to the CDC, the bright side is that, because all skin cancers are associated with sun exposure, they are preventable. But if skin cancer is so preventable, why the increase in the number of cases?

"I don't think people protect themselves adequately enough," Howard said. "People come in all the time that are really sunburned. In the long run, that can turn out to be a dangerous thing."



Prevention is not difficult, according to the CDC. It can be as easy as using a proper sunblock, staying out of the midday sun, and performing monthly skin self-examinations. Self-examinations will increase early detection of mole and skin changes, according to the American Academy of Dermatology.

What sunblock to use and when to apply the sunblock are keys to prevention, Howard said. She recommends sunblock with a minimum sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 that also offers ultraviolet A and B protection. Sunblock should be applied to dry skin and reapplied frequently, even if it is a waterproof formula.

"Remember to get all those spots, like bald spots on the top of the head," Howard said.

Medications containing ingredients as common as ibuprofen can increase sensitivity to the sun and increase your risk, Howard warned, adding that she will post the warning signs of skin cancer and additional information on skin protection outside the pharmacy.


\$1,450 in donations. Raytheon donated \$250, with another \$225 coming from various donations. T-shirt sales raked in about \$425.
