What's bugging you?

Pest control begins at home with some preventive measures

The rusty brown mass floating on top of the water bucket resembles melted chocolate. But look a little closer and the glob is alive — dozens of carpenter ants form a living trawler, fishing for what Mike Nicholson calls wigglers.

In a few more days, you'll be calling them all sorts of names, as the wiggler eventually morphs into a mosquito and starts fishing for human blood.

"This is how I find out what's going on," explained Nicholson, Pest Control acting manager, dipping a small plastic vial into the bucket, scooping up a couple of wigglers, which resemble hyperactive pogo sticks the size of a pen tip.

"Ants are sort of a pest control guy's best friend. They'll let you know where food is at," added Nicholson as

Overseas residents can elect to vote in November

When asked if he planned to vote in this year's election, Jim Weisrock, with J.A. Jones Construction, said, "I think voting is one of the most important privileges we have. This is my third time to vote absentee as an international worker."

The list of reasons why U.S. citizens overseas might not choose to vote in the Nov. 7 general election may seem long and varied, but the absentee voting process is not difficult to use.

The Federal Voting Assistance Program kicked off its voter registration drive this month with the goal of ensuring that every eligible U.S. citizen has a chance to participate in the election.

The month-long effort will be followed by Armed Forces Voters Week, Sep. 3-9, which marks one of the last few weeks that voters can safely submit the Federal Post Card Application and meet most state deadlines.

Deadlines vary by state and can be determined by the local voting assistance officer, but it is a good idea to have the application in the mail 45 days prior to the

Power to the People

- The voting age population in the U.S. is more than 196 million people, of which over 146 million are registered voters.

- There are more than 6 million potential voters qualified to use absentee ballots.

- In addition to the president and vice president, 33 of the 100 seats in the U.S. Senate are up for election, as well as all 435 of the House of Representatives seats. Eleven of the 50 state governorships could change hands.

- Only 54.2 percent of eligible Americans exercised their right to vote in the 1996 presidential election.

- Only 38 percent of eligible Americans voted in the 1998 federal election, the third lowest turnout behind a 50.1 percent turnout in the 1924 election of Calvin Coolidge and the 1824 federal election, which drew only 48.9 percent of the voting population.

- During the U.S. Civil War, soldiers in the field were encouraged to vote by absentee ballot.

Attention shoppers: New products are here for back-to-school, holiday shopping

Kwaj shoppers have no doubt noticed a number of new items in Macy's and Ten-Ten this week. With back-to-school supplies and clothes taking center stage, more than a few new products have been added to the shelves in time for the beginning of school, as well as for early Christmas shopping.

The children's and teen's clothing section in Macy's has been expanded into the center of the store to accommodate the new apparel, from infant to early teen wear. And, for the first time, a line of raincoats for children has been added — and has almost sold out.

At the quarterly Consumer Advisory Council meeting Aug. 17, Ray Denham, manager of retail provisioning services, enumerated some of Macy's new arrivals, including Kwaj logo wallets, fanny packs and key chains; desktop CD player hi-fi systems; two styles of music keyboards; an expanded selection of name-brand wallets; a large selection of sandals; and designer fragrances for men and women.

Denham also reported that in response to customer requests, generic over-the-counter drugs, such as aspirin and acetaminophen (for Tylenol), and new brands of hair products are on order at Ten-Ten for this fall. At Surfway, sugar-free ice cream will be back in the freezer in October or November.

The retail stores receive about 1,000 "want slips" a month, said Lloyd Jordan, RSE manager of residential support. "We try to order a product if we get several requests."

Jordan added that holiday supplies have already been ordered in anticipation of Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas and the first New Year's Eve of the new millennium.

At Macy's, the fragrance section has been expanded and tester cards are a new feature, according to Annemarie Jones, Macy's manager. Now customers can try a scent before they make a commitment.

And because of the current cur-

rency exchange, Austrian crystal is at the lowest price it has been in years, Jones added. Other new arrivals are 14-karat gold Kwaj anchors in two designs.

Also at last week's meeting, Paul King, Sodexho Marriott general manager, updated the council on ongoing food service changes. Gilligan's will add gourmet nights, a Sunday brunch and will post an entertainment schedule in September. At the Oceanview Club, a grand opening is planned in September along with interdepartmental volleyball and horseshoe tournaments.

In October, the Sunrise Bakery will have space in Surfway to sell packages of cakes, muffins, cookies, brownies and other goodies and space in Ten-Ten to sell individual servings.

The Consumer Advisory Council, which meets quarterly, is intended to assist the commander and the merchandising and food service managers in establishing and evaluating policies and programs. Their goal is to be involved in improving the quality of life on Kwajalein by communicating with and representing the community regarding its consumer issues.

"The CAC is a venue to get feedback about changes and decisions from the people represented," said chairman Todd Seitz, Community Services retail operations specialist.

The council is made up of representatives of USAKA/KMR, contractors and organizations on island. The community is encouraged to contact a representative with questions, concerns or comments.

Army ready to assist Pacific in disasters

WHEELERARMY AIRFIELD, Hawaii — If a hurricane strikes a remote Pacific island, it's too late to come up with a disaster relief plan when the winds start howling.

With this in mind, the U.S. Army Pacific sends teams to locations throughout Asia and the Pacific to help requesting countries improve their disaster readiness plans.

The teams, headed by Army Civil affairs experts, are called Disaster Preparedness Mitigation Assessment teams.

When USARPAC recently sent a team to the exotic Cook Islands in the South Seas, they turned to the Military Traffic Management Command's 599th Trans Group in Hawaii to provide crucial transportation expertise.

This was the first time that MTMC was asked to participate in a USARPAC Disaster Preparedness Assessment.

Working for two weeks without a day off, the MTMC team members produced a detailed 22-page report, which analyzed the whole transportation infrastructure from an engineering viewpoint.

Once the team completed its survey, all team members briefed their findings to the Cook Island authorities.

One mission benefit was the opportunity for team members to establish close working and personal relationships with host nation officials and private citizens.

"The Cook Islanders are very friendly and they are very proud of their culture and heritage. During the evenings, many places offer a show along with the meals so that visitors can see the local dancing and hear the outstanding drumming," said Grey Marsh, a civil engineer with MTMC's Transportation Engineering Agency.

he probed around one residential yard full of potted plants, loosely covered water catchments and lots of very hungry Asian tiger mosquitoes.

Welcome to Mike Nicholson's world, where seashells are mosquito breeding grounds, squid is the bait of choice to capture the common housefly and the Formosan termite is a dreaded enemy with few weaknesses.

"The bugs fascinate me so much. Mother Nature is one incredibly smart lady," Nicholson said. The *Hourglass* accompanied Nicholson around Kwajalein on a recent morning to review the everlasting battle of man versus the elements.

Bite worse than its roar

Nicholson noted that one man alone can't beat the bugs, especially when it comes to mosquitoes. "Dump a bucket. When you walk the dog, dump a bucket. When you go to work, dump a bucket. Make it a habit," he said.

The combination of light winds (until recently) and frequent rains has produced ideal breeding conditions for the Asian tiger mosquito, also known as *Aedes albopictus*.

"We'll have a big explosion of them, and then it will

seem to calm down for a while," Nicholson explained.

It takes only about three to five days for an egg to become an adult mosquito, which will use just about any container with standing water in it to breed, from water catchments to seashells to flower pot saucers.

"That's the biggest concern I have," Nicholson said. His advice for an itch-free gathering on the patio: Use mesh screens, available at Self-Help, to tightly cover any water catchments, empty water out of any containers, including garbage cans and keep a leg or arm out — feasting mosquitoes don't travel too far from their original habitat. If one mosquito bites you, you can bet the blood bank there are a few wigglers morphing nearby.

"Normally, if I come out here and see that [the source is] something people have had for a long time, I won't mess with it. So as not to be intrusive I'll let them know and let them take care of it," Nicholson said. "The whole idea is to become less dependent on chemicals and insecticides."

Besides the obvious nuisance mosquitoes pose, Nicholson said a bite can cause an allergic reaction in some people. Another concern is disease transmission.

"These mosquitoes are known vectors of yellow fever, dengue fever, encephalitis," he explained. "However, [for] most of the diseases that are transmitted by mosquitoes, humans are the dead end host of that disease."

In other words, it is rare for a disease to be passed from one human to another by a mosquito bite. The usual source of mosquito-borne illnesses is a bird.

"We don't have that many birds out here to worry about that, but there is a constant threat from migrating birds," Nicholson added.

What's all the buzz about?

While there are few birds in the air, there's certainly no lack of flies buzzing around the beaches. Again, Nicholson said residents are key in helping keep this particular pest under control.

"Flies, we try to deal with them, catching as many as we can. Because their food source to live on is so plentiful out here, the only thing people can do is common sense stuff."

There are two species of flies here — the common housefly and the green bottle fly. Both will feed on just about everything, from refuse to rotting vegetables.

"Milk containers are one of the biggest problems," Nicholson said. He advises residents to rinse out cartons and containers, as well as cans and bottles, before disposing them, and to make sure garbage bags are sealed tight. He also suggests rinsing out garbage cans

between uses.

"Flies live with human activity. If our activity could be reduced, we wouldn't have too much of a fly problem," he observed.

In another attempt to reduce reliance on chemicals, Nicholson said Pest Control has been experimenting with different strategies, including fly traps baited with squid. Flies go into the dome homes hung in trees, but they don't check out.

"Sometimes, these things get full real fast," Nicholson said. "It's like a lobster trap. They go in and they can't get back out."

Terminating termites

The problem with the Formosan termite (*Coptotermes formosanus*) is that it usually doesn't come out at all once it gets inside your home

Innocuous to humans but a terrorist against homes, the Formosan termite brings its own water source with it in the form of mud balls, eventually becoming a "mud carton," as it begins to feed in the walls of a home.

That trait defeats traditional treatments, which attempt to poison the termite as it periodically returns to the ground for water.

"I've lost many a night's sleep with these termites," said Nicholson, a veteran of termite warfare.

But a relatively new treatment, one that Nicholson first employed about three years ago in New Orleans, where the Formosan termite is destroying centuries-old plantation homes, is stopping the Formosan by turning off its desire to feed. It also disrupts the termites' normal tendency to groom one another of fungus, which grows out of control and eventually kills them.

"It's LSD for termites," Nicholson said of the treatment. "It starts messing with the synapses points in their brain."

Like many of the pests here, the termite is not endemic to Kwajalein, according to Nicholson. It likely was shipped here from Hawaii, he said.

"Termites are not native to here. There's nothing to eat containing wood growing here," he noted.

Absentee voting from Kwajalein is easier than you think ...

election date.

"People need to register right now so they will not have any last minute problems," said Kent Duncan, USAKA/KMR legal officer and voting assistance officer.

"The voters should register at least 60 days in advance," he added.

To meet overseas and absentee voters needs, the Federal Voting Assistance Program was established to educate and inform U.S. citizens worldwide of their voting rights, foster voting participation and protect the integrity and enhance the electoral process of federal, state and local elections.

The FVAP also provides a broad range of nonpartisan information and assistance to help voters with the electoral process.

Kwajalein resident John Tompkins understands the importance of absentee voting. "I always read through the issues and then base my decision on that information."

The Uniformed and Overseas Citi-

zens Absentee Voting Act mandates that all states and territories allow U.S. citizens to register and vote absentee in elections for federal office.

Some states also allow citizens covered by the UOCAVA to register and vote in state and local elections.

"There are many similarities in the requirements by the different states, and notable differences, as well," Duncan said. "Being aware of the specific requirements of the state where you are registered will make the entire process easier."

Generally speaking, it is best to register to vote in the state of your last residence.

During August, every soldier and federal overseas civilian employee will receive an FPCA. All other overseas civilians can obtain this form from the local voting assistance officer. This postage-free postcard is distributed by the FVAP for use by absentee voters covered by UOCAVA.

Kwajalein's local voting assistance officer has instructions for filling out the form as required by each

state. There are presently no provisions for submitting this form over the Internet. This card serves to register the voter, as well as request an absentee ballot to be sent to the applicant.

A Federal Write-in Absentee Ballot may be used only if you have applied for a regular absentee ballot from the state where you are a registered voter and the ballot has not arrived in time for the election. This form is also available from the local voting assistance officer.

"People should not underestimate the value of their vote. If people will take the time now to register, they can have an influence on the candidates and issues," Duncan said. "Despite all the help that the FVAP and other sources give, they don't do it all for you. Each voter still has to listen to the television, radio and newspaper resources in order to help them with their decisions."

And remember, as Kwajalein resident Dotty Miller stated, "You can't really complain if you don't vote."

We're looking forward to coming up to an island and there is a perfect wave and friendly people," McGrew said.

Although all three members of the crew have traveled to most continents, the dream of sailing to islands almost untouched by Western civilization started with McGrew about 16 years ago.

"I've been wanting to do this since I was 14," said Kwaj-kid McGrew. "[Former Kwaj resident] Mike Bates inspired me ... He taught me how to wind surf, and he had the dream of sailing around the world, which he did."

Cardillo thought about having a "sailboat to go around on during the five weeks off" while he was working on a seismic exploration ship with Breen after college graduation.

"I was planning to PCS three years ago, but after we bought the boat together I decided to stay and get ready for this trip," Cardillo said.

Breen, who learned to sail for this voyage, laughingly said, "Paul talked me into [it]."

One of the most frequently asked questions, according to McGrew, is if the trio will still be friends after such a long trip together.

"If anything, working on the boat is much harder than going out and playing," McGrew said. "There has been some bumpy moments, but for the most part we each have found our place."

The camaraderie among the joint owners of the sailboat started years before the *Cherokee* was purchased on Dec. 23, 1997, McGrew said. Cardillo and McGrew knew each other as kids on Kwaj.

"My family left Kwaj in 1984. Thomas' family left four months later, and we ended up living 15 minutes apart in California," McGrew said. "Then [Thomas] went off to school in Texas. Our paths almost crossed in Asia when we were on treks. I got a job here. A month later Thomas arrived back on island."

Breen and Cardillo both attended Rice University, working together on a seismic exploration ship after graduating. From 1994 to 1995, they backpacked around the world, sometimes traveling together, Cardillo said.

After the boat was purchased, the trio sailed it around Kwajalein Atoll and to nearby atolls for 15 months. At the beginning of 1999, they began to overhaul the ship.

"The boat is 30 years old. It's never had an overhaul," McGrew said. "We could have pulled it out, slapped some bottom paint on it and left."

But the trip demanded that they learn a lot before leaving for a year.

"Things could have broken down. We didn't know anything about the boat. Taking everything apart and putting it back together meant a huge learning curve for

us. We also learned a lot from our friends on Kwaj ... they helped us a lot with the boat," McGrew said.

The *Cherokee* left Kwaj a lot later than originally planned.

"The original plan was to leave even as early as April or when the boat got done," McGrew said. "We found out that every project you plan takes three times as long."

As the boat neared completion, July 11 was set as the departure date, but fate rudely stepped in. On June 23, McGrew broke his arm and jaw when the wheel of his bike fell off while he was riding back to work. At first, neither of his crewmates believed the seriousness of his

injuries.

"I heard about his accident, but I thought he just got some stitches," Breen said. "I wondered if he would be back to help me on the boat after work."

Cardillo said he heard about McGrew breaking his jaw, but "thought that I was being kidded."

Now, McGrew, with his jaw healed and his arm still in a Gortex cast, is cleared to leave the island.

"My doctor in Hono said I could have the cast taken off in five weeks. The cast is great because I can get it wet and rinse it off," McGrew said.

Last Friday found all three at the Small Boat Marina doing last-minute tasks. Cardillo and Breen were installing a freezer in the galley, and

McGrew, up on deck, was stowing items.

The *Cherokee* is packed with food, guitars, games, surfboards, a new kite board and 12 soccer balls, according to McGrew.

"I want to teach the kids [on the islands] soccer. It's the world's most popular sport," McGrew said.

The crew was ready but not overly excited. All three agreed that they were still too busy to get excited.

"I guess I'll be excited when we arrive at an island and are surfing a great wave," Cardillo said before going back to work on the freezer.

Nodding toward his crewmates working in the galley of the boat, McGrew said, "I would have never realized my dream on such a scale without these two. They're not afraid to dive into anything."





Trip of a lifetime

Cherokee crew finally on its way

A year's time exploring the islands in the Pacific by sailboat may not appeal to some, but for intrepid three-some Paul McGrew, John Breen and Thomas "TC" Cardillo, it's a dream that finally came true Tuesday.

Quietly and unobtrusively, the *Cherokee*, a Hedley Nicol ketch trimaran sailboat, slipped its mooring, headed into the lagoon and then out to sea.

The first stop will probably be Wotho Atoll, northwest of Kwajalein Atoll. After that, the loose plans include sailing the Marshall Islands for the next four months and then onto the Gilbert Islands. The travelers plan to stay in the Pacific over the next year, but which islands they will stop at and the length of stay at each will be determined at the time. Experience is the goal, according to all three.

"The boat is just a mode of travel."
