## Domestics program curtailed; overnight stay extended

The good news for many residents is that unofficial visitors can now stay on island for up to 60 days. The bad news for some is that the domestic worker program is being cut back.

Those are the two major changes to USAKA/KMR Entry/Exit Regulation 190-10, which has been rewritten and was signed by Col. Curtis L. Wrenn Jr., USAKA/KMR commander, last week. The regulation establishes the procedures and policies regarding entry to and exit from USAKA. All changes are effective immediately.

## Wallace speaks on employee issues

Following up on comments made during last year's APIC survey, RSE site manager John Wallace hosted a forum Wednesday night at the MP room to address issues raised by employees and field questions from the audience.

Wallace said he wanted to address the "inaccurate information" that was apparent from the hundreds of comment cards he received from last year's survey.

"I took the time to read all the comment sheets," he said. "It was pretty depressing."

Covering everything from budgets to housing to the upcoming rebid for the logistics and technical contracts, Wallace emphasized that while the company is not trying to exploit its employees, it must remain competitive to stay in business and make money for its shareholders. He explained that many of the company's decisions are based on its contract with the government.

Drawing on various "themes" raised by the survey, Wallace

## Revised policy governing entry, exit from USAKA effective immediately

USAKA residents and long-term TDY personnel (90 days or more) can now sponsor an individual for 60 days within a 12-month period. The old regulation stipulated a maximum of 30 days.

Maj. Paul Bezzek, USAKA/KMR provost marshal, said the extension should eliminate up to 80 percent of the exceptions to policy that his office handles. Most of the cases in-

volve people who want to return to USAKA within the 12-month period, but only had about a week available of the original 30 days, which wasn't very cost effective for such an expensive and time-consuming trip, Bezzek explained.

"Raising the number of days would also allow more time for those personnel out here unaccompanied, who are married, to allow their spouses [or] family members to visit," he noted. "It would also allow college-age students who are over the 23-year age limit and grandchildren to visit for

## First Stop clinic offers immediate care

A scrape, a sore back or a cough — not serious enough to sit in the hospital waiting room to see a physician. But these injuries and illnesses can turn into

secondary infections or can be a sign of a more serious problem causing lost time from work.

The answer for Raytheon employees is the new RSE Work Place Health Center, known as First Stop, or *Ejmour*

*Mokta*, translated to "Health First," located in the Imaging Center, building 699.

The wellness clinic is a pilot program developed by a cooperative effort between the hos-



# Saltwater, dry season stress Roi water supply

A combination of high tides and waves in January caused sea water to overflow Roi's shoreline and contaminate two of the island's eight lens wells. And as the dry season continues with little relief in sight, residents are finding innovative ways to conserve water.

"Part of the lens was contaminated by sea water," said Kim Carr, Roi Water Plant operator. "There are four pumps along the runway that tap ground water, and two of them are pumping water that is too high in chlorides for drinking water."

The lens is important to Roi residents, who depend upon it as an alternate water supply when the rainfall is insufficient to meet users' demands.

The area affected by the overflow was the north end of the runway near the ninth hole on the golf course. Large amounts of sea water pooled above the fresh water lens that lies underneath the runway and the course. Salt water drained down into the lens and contaminated it.

Salinity is calculated by testing the quantity of chloride in the water. When 250 parts per million is reached, the salinity is above the allowable content for potable water. Two of the pumps along the runway are tapping water at 120 parts, which is well within the permitted range. This water is currently being used to fill the raw water tanks during the dry season. However, the amount of fresh water in an underground lens well is limited because the well is made up of rain water sitting on top of salt water. As water is pumped from the well, the salinity will rise. Once the

water is pumped out, it is not replenished until the rainy season.

"Due to the lack of rainfall, we are watching water usage closely," Carr said. "The rainfall for Roi-Namur for the month of February was 1.25 inches. Although the situation has not put the island into a state of emergency, Roi residents should conserve water as much as possible."

Kerry Young, Roi FOM plumbing supervisor, agreed. "The wells are experiencing a high usage because of various projects, such as the pouring of concrete for the new power plant.

"A lot of water is required to cure the cement, and the lens wells can't recover quickly enough due to the high usage," he added.

Karin Robas, Roi Community Activities superintendent, is well aware of the water shortage because she has had to improvise to find new solutions to water the golf course.

Usually the course is watered with sprinklers, but now, due to insufficient water in the lens well under the course, she has had to use water

from a smaller well near the old torpedo pool. She fills up a portable tank and drives it to the course, where she uses a hose to spray the water on the greens.

"Our biggest challenge is time," Robas said. "We can only water for a couple of hours in the early morning or at sunset to avoid quick evaporation in the midday heat."

A tank will hold enough water to cover about one and a half greens. There is only time to use two tanks in the morning and two in the evening, which means only six greens can be watered each day. Robas coordinates her usage with Carr, as do other departments on Roi.

"The community as a whole can make a difference," added Stan Jazwinski, Utilities superintendent. "When water is found running unattended, turn it off. If a project can wait until May or June instead of during the middle of the dry season, that would help. Anyone who knows of any leaks should report them immediately to the trouble desk."

most of the summer.”

The new policy also raises the number of individuals a sponsor can bring out at one time from three adults to four, and three children to six.

“The 60-day [time period] is definitely a morale booster,” Bezzek said.

Marshallese domestic workers will be spending less time on island, at least at individual households.

Domestics working as babysitters may work only five days a week, while those employed in any other capacity are limited to three days at one household. The old policy allowed the possibility of two domestics to work at the same household seven days a week. Work hours have been cut back, as well — from 5:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., three hours earlier than before.

“It’s been misused for a long time,” said Maryanne Lane, USAKA/KMR Host Nation specialist, of the 16-year-old program. “It’s going to affect people who are using this program for an access program to Kwajalein.”

Currently, there are 157 domestics, with the majority serving as babysitters and housekeepers.

Lane said that domestics who are legitimately employed should not be impacted in the pocketbook, as they can still work all week long, just not at the same household. She added that the estimated economic impact of domestics on the local economy is about \$1 million.

That is not expected to change, Lane said.

“They’re making a huge amount of money to contribute to their extended families,” she said, explaining that the money does not go far because of the large households.

Another change in Chapter 5, Section 10 of the regulation forbids domestic workers from bringing children of any age to Kwaj.

All domestic contracts must be renewed at the USAKA Host Nation Office because of the new regulation. Those USAKA residents with last names A to K should go between April 3-7. Those with last names L-Z should visit the office between April 9-14.

Other significant changes in Chapter 5 (Unofficial Guests Programs) of the policy include:

- The commute list that allows 100 Kwajalein Atoll residents to come onto Kwajalein every day and 50/75/15 (Tuesday-Friday/Saturday/Sunday-Monday) onto Roi-Namur is being limited to native-born Marshallese. Bezzek said the change is largely a matter of preventing visitors to Ebeye or Third Island from gaining access to Kwaj or Roi — like representatives with Greenpeace.

“We are allowing other individuals such as school teachers, missionaries, etc., access to USAKA if they go through the RMI government and Host Nation office,” Bezzek added. Lists with the names of those individuals are filed at each island’s DSC.

- Marshallese students who attend Kwajalein schools or the Job Corps program may now be sponsored by families during their off-days.

- The number of teams an individual may sponsor has been lowered to one sports team per league, per season, under the Sports Team Sponsorship Program. But the requirement for a C-badge holder on a team to return to the DSC to be signed on by the sponsor has been waived.

- The number of guests under the Religious Access Program has been raised from 10 to 15 during any two days of the week.

In Chapter 6 of the regulation, Space-Available Travel, unofficial visitors are now allowed to remain at the airport terminal if they do not get on the first available flight, rather than return to the DSC. It also allows guests who wish to purchase a Travel Authorization and fly the same day to obtain a “fly-out” badge when they enter the DSC, rather than return after buying the TA.

Copies of the revised policy are being circulated to company site managers, human resource departments and Grace Sherwood Library.

talked for about 45 minutes before opening the floor to questions. Much of the earlier time was spent explaining budgets and contracts.

"We make our money through an award fee process," he said. "The government grades our performance through an evaluation process and determines how much award fee we earn."

He noted employees shouldn't compare their benefits with that of other contractors, since each of the companies out here have separate contracts.

"If you want their benefits, you should work for them," he said.

In reference to budgets, Wallace said Raytheon and USAKA are at the mercy of Congress and whatever reimbursables are realized through the year from range customers like NMD.

"These budgets are a moving target," he said.

Moving on to morale, Wallace emphasized that the attrition rate is at historical levels of years past, though he expected it to go up in the next year or so as the logistics and technical contracts expire.

A smaller workforce is not necessarily a bad thing, Wallace said, as some jobs would have been cut anyway as the modernization of the range continues.

"Some of that is good," he said of the attrition.

In the ongoing debate of who gets the bigger piece of the pie — accompanied or unaccompanied — Wallace said there are no plans to disrupt the makeup of the island workforce, but said unaccompanied issues were a priority to him and the command.

"[But] you cannot operate this base as we know it just on an unaccompanied basis," he noted.

Despite a smaller population,

Wallace did not predict any improvements in the housing situation, though he said every effort is being made to empty the Pacific BQ.

"I don't see any new houses on the horizon," he said. "The housing picture is not very pretty."

In regard to the rebid itself, Wallace said, "This is a very, very important piece of business for Raytheon."

He said the new contract is scheduled to be awarded in May 2002, with the proverbial keys to be turned over in either October 2002 or January 2003.

The second half of the meeting was spent with questions from the audience, which numbered about 100.

"I would like to see a stronger voice for the community," said Phyllis Manley, Grace Sherwood Library librarian. "We need more meetings like this."

Wallace agreed to further forums, and to meet with individual departments in the future.

pital and safety department, said Elaine McMahon, Kwajalein Hospital administrator. First Stop is designed to reduce reportable injuries, reduce secondary infections and return employees quickly to work.

"The model would be an industrial first aid station," said Dr. Eric Lindborg, Kwajalein Hospital chief medical officer. "You should be able to get the same kind of first aid care that you would get at a work place in the states ... staffed by a physician's assistant."

Last Tuesday morning found PA Bess Buchanan in the small, tidy two-room examining area, performing a follow-up exam on Ten-Ten worker Johnny Jorn.

A few weeks ago Jorn had come into the clinic after falling on the job and causing an abrasion and bruising to his back, said Buchanan, while she took Jorn's blood pressure.

Since Jorn is a diabetic, there was more of a chance of a secondary infection from the scrape, Buchanan said, examining the scar

that the scrape had caused.

Within a half hour of arriving at the clinic, Jorn left for work, clutching a slip from First Stop containing information his supervisor will need to know about any medical restrictions on his activities at work.

The emphasis is on wellness using single-dose, over-the-counter medications, Buchanan said.

From a safety perspective, First Stop can not only reduce reportable injuries, but also identify problem areas in the workplace that can be fixed before a serious injury occurs, said Carl L'Esperance, RSE senior safety officer and Worker's Compensation specialist.

First Stop is open to Raytheon employees 6:30 to 10:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. Employees will need a note from their supervisors after 7:30 a.m. to document the First Stop visit, Lindborg said.

If the pilot program succeeds, the "intent is to do outreach programs in the workplace on diet, hypertension and hygiene," McMahon said.

Maj. Abbie Whitehead is on an unusual assignment in her profession, but there's nothing unusual in what she's seeing in the local pet population.

Whitehead is TDY here from the U.S. Army Veterinary Service, Central Pacific District Veterinary Command, Oahu. For the last week or so she's seen scores of cats and dogs, as pet owners take advantage of a ser-

vice available only on a quarterly basis.

The most common problem encountered? Fido the dog and Frisky the cat are a little round around the middle, she said.
