## Shattuck tapped for magistrate post

Carol Shattuck is making a quantum leap in the legal field.

The former paralegal was sworn in as Kwajalein's new U.S. judge magistrate Feb. 22, becoming the first non-attorney to hold that position, according to Maj. William McQuade, USAKA Command Judge Advocate officer.

Shattuck called the position the "perfect job."



## Children's author making week-long visit to Kwaj in April

Long before J.K. Rowling began publishing the adventures of Harry Potter, Donna Guthrie wrote a story about a little boy whose runaway imagination leads him to believe his neighbor is a witch.

"The Witch Who Lives Down the Hall" is the first of more than 20 children's books Guthrie has authored since 1985. In April, she'll be the first Artist-in-Residence at Kwajalein.

"The concept of a residency is to bring a professional to a school for a period of time to give students first-hand exposure to [that person's] field of expertise," explained parent Jeanne Cummings, a member of the PTO committee organizing the visit. "An author was chosen for this first residency at George Seitz since writing has been a major focus across the curriculum this year."

Guthrie is expected to arrive at Kwaj April 20 and will be here for a week. She'll have a busy schedule, beginning that following Saturday as she's introduced to a students in grades kindergarten through six in a series of school assemblies, according to Cummings. Guthrie will also visit individual classrooms, host a

community event and book-signing April 23 and give a workshop for teachers at the end of the week.

"She is really thrilled about coming out here," said fourth-grade teacher Janice Riordan. "She's going to be busy the moment she gets off the plane."

The kids won't be having all the fun. There will be an evening writing workshop for adults and high school students. The sixth-grade school newspaper will also benefit from a visit, Cummings said.

Cummings said Guthrie was chosen not only for her literary skills, but for her background as an educator. She has taught kindergarten through fifth grade in both public and private schools in Pennsylvania and Colorado. Guthrie has degrees in journalism and Montessori Education, and was founder and former president of Founded Kid's Corner, an independent audio-visual company that produced patient education films

for children.

"We looked at a lot of different people," Cummings said.

Guthrie's book, "The Witch Who Lives Down the Hall" was chosen as a Literary Guild and Book of the Month Club selection and was included in the 1985 School Library Journal Best Books for Children. "Nobiah's Well," a picture book, was also a Book of the Month Club selection and received the Parents Prize from Parents Magazine for the very best for the very young.

The George Seitz Library has a selection of Guthrie's books available. In fact, librarian Erin Tully has introduced the books during weekly readings with the students, Cummings said. The books will also be on sale at the April 12 PTO Book Fair and throughout Guthrie's visit.

"The parent/teacher planning committee has been working since last spring to make this residency a reality," Cummings said. "It is hoped that Ms. Guthrie will be the first in a long line of professionals that will share their disciplines with the children of Kwajalein."

## KMR tester wins national award

For his work at the missile range, former Kwajalein resident Capt. John Eggert was named the 2000 Outstanding Tester of the Year by the National Defense Industrial Association.

Eggert was cited for his work as range control officer at the Kwajalein Missile Range, particularly with TCMP-3A, then the largest test ever conducted at Kwajalein. The test cost \$14 million in government funds and involved more than 300 civilian and military personnel, along with more than 300 tons of equipment.

"Capt. Eggert represents the outstanding quality of the testers we have at KMR," said Lt. Col. Ray

Jones, KMR commander. "I'm happy to see John recognized for his excellent performance."

Eggert also worked on numerous Theater Missile Defense testing programs, as well as the Pegasus/HETE-2 commercial satellite launch, during his tenure at KMR.

Eggert left Kwajalein on Feb. 9 to work at the Ballistic Missile Targets Joint Project Office in Huntsville, Ala.

He will receive the award at the National Summit on U.S. Defense Policy: Acquisition, Research, Test and Evaluation March 26-29 in Long Beach, Calif.

## Shattuck brings paralegal experience to job ...

privilege," she said of learning that she'd been chosen. "I think it's every person's dream who works in the legal profession to be a judge."

Shattuck was a paralegal for 15 years in Orange County, Calif., and Princeton, N.J. During that time she worked in bankruptcy law and litigation on the state level. She and her family — husband, David, and children Luke, 6, and Alexandra, 4 — moved to Kwaj about three years ago. Since then, she's worked as a full-time mom.

Shattuck said she's ready to return to the workforce. "It's a little bit of self-worth. What I'm doing makes me feel good."

What she'll be doing as a U.S. magistrate judge is presiding over misdemeanor cases and approving search authorizations, according to McQuade.

"It's a great deterrent to have a magistrate on island," McQuade said, explaining that Shattuck is authorized to levy fines, restitution or community service if a defendant is found guilty. There are no jury trials, and felony cases are handled in the state of Hawaii. And because there is no authority to confine an individual, defendants do not have a right to a court-appointed attorney, McQuade explained.

Still, any conviction is a federal conviction, he added. "It's a big burden on an individual."

Shattuck said she's mindful of the responsibility the job entails.

"There's a lot of responsibility that

comes with the position and I feel privileged to take it on," she said. "In essence, people's futures are in my hands.

"[Judges] have to be able to uphold the Constitution and the decision [must] be based on the facts of the case," Shattuck added.

The USAKA Legal Office determines what cases are brought before the magistrate. Since the last magistrate, Lisa Cataldo, left in the summer of 2000, McQuade said the command has had to rely on administrative action as the only form of government action. Now, he's got criminal justice recourse, as well.

"They are two separate things," he said. "There were several cases I would have taken to the magistrate."

Those cases, however, are far and few between. McQuade said the magistrate handles an average of five cases per year. But Shattuck's role may be expanded, as she may be asked to act as a mediator in individual disputes. This would, however, be separate from her magistrate duties.

"We had a judge several years ago who did that," McQuade said.

Shattuck said she's ready for the challenges of the job.

"It's all new territory," she admitted. "I would never have this opportunity in the states."

The U.S. magistrate judge is appointed for a two-year term. This is the only U.S. magistrate court outside the United States or its territories, and is pursuant to the Compact of Free Association, according to McQuade.

of about 20 people who accompanied Wrenn on a two-hour excursion to Ebeye as part of an extension to the island orientation required of new residents.

Wednesday's trip, however, was optional.

"This puts more of a face on things. This is a community," Wrenn said during the LCM ferry ride from Kwaj to Ebeye.

Wrenn explained that the idea for an Ebeye tour sprang from a survey of residents taking the island orientation class, a three-hour seminar detailing everything from safety to bicycle registration.

"People had expressed a desire for more in-depth information," he added. "We can walk and talk about particulars on Marshallese culture."

Walk and talk the group did, led by Noda Lojkar, USAKA ombudsman for Marshallese employees, and Stephan Notarianni, USAKA RMI relations specialist. The tour actually began with lunch at Bob's Island

Restaurant, the culinary landmark at the Ebeye pier. Discussion quickly turned to first impressions of Ebeye and comparisons to Kwajalein.

Jill Heth, an employee at

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Planning and Operations who arrived here Feb. 10, said she's fascinated with other cultures, but probably would not have made the trip to Ebeye on her own.

"It's awesome," she said.


Notarianni said he believes trips like these help dispel "misconceptions" Kwaj and Roi residents may harbor about Ebeye and the Marshallese. He noted that many people live for years on Kwaj and never make the 20-minute boat ride to the nearby island.

"It opens the door for future visits," Notarianni said. "There's restaurants. There's shops. It's a functioning community."

Lojkar said the Marshallese want to have visitors, particularly during holidays. For instance, at Christmas, churches cook additional food and make leis especially for Kwaj visitors. Unfortunately, the cholera scare late last year kept most people away.

"[Ebeye residents] like to see people come over," added Lojkar, who also sits on the Ebeye City Council.

From the restaurant, the group made a loop around the central business district, visiting shops, waving at the multitude of school children who emerged from classrooms to say, "Yokwe," and seeing how people

lived.

"It gives me some understanding of where they're coming from," said Pappas, who works with several Marshallese on Roi.

Randy Turncliff, another recent arrival in the PLOPS department, said Ebeye reminded him of the border towns in Arizona. "I'm not really surprised," he said, adding that he planned to get involved in the Ebeye community through the church.

Not everyone who participated in the tour was a new resident. Kim Brown, for example, has lived at Kwaj since last September and had been to Ebeye before.

"I love coming to Ebeye," she said. "The Marshallese are the most interesting thing out here."

Like Brown, Dr. John Janikowski had been to Ebeye before but wanted to see it from a different perspective.

"I had the afternoon off and I'd thought I'd take the official tour," he said.

Wrenn said he believed the Ebeye tour would become a fixture of island orientation, despite the fact that it would use up most of an employee's workday.

"I look at it as an investment as far as relations go," he said. "It was very warmly received. I think it's a keeper."
