Kwaj police target abandoned bicycles

That sticker on that eyesore of a bicycle abandoned near Surfway is not the USAKA seal of approval. In fact, it's a notice. Next week, that eyesore won't be there.

Kwajalein police will begin a clean-up effort tomorrow aimed at abandoned bicycles. In short, officers will mark with stickers bicycles left at public places after hours. If the bike remains a week later, officers will pick it up.

"We're not trying to cause any problems; we're just cleaning up the island," said Police Chief Kevin Dykema.

The move began after officers noticed a high number of what appear to be abandoned bicycles throughout the island. These are bicycles that are in less-than-Kwaj-condition and remain in the same public place, such as the Surfway parking lot or the mini-mall, for weeks. Police expect to find 50 to 100 bicycles, Dykema said.

Volunteers needed for landscaping project in BQ area

Volunteers are needed to help add a green touch to the BQ picnic area project underway behind the Yokwe Yuk Club.

Next week, Sabrina Kalister, Kwajalein Public Gardens coordinator, and an RSE Building and Grounds crew will prepare the area by delivering compost and digging holes for plants. On Monday, June 11, flora from the public gardens will be planted using volunteer labor.

"We're asking for volunteers from the BQs," Kalister said. "The more volunteers the better."

The landscaping project will complement a new picnic area under construction in a court-





yard surrounded by the Yokwe Yuk Club, Tropics, Surf and Sands BQs.

The centerpiece of the \$31,000 project using APIC money is a six-post pavilion that sits on a concrete slab. The pavilion has already been installed, as well as a new sidewalk that runs just east of the picnic area.

Glenn Gandara, Facilities Engineering manager, said a total of six picnic tables will be moved to the area, along with three barbecue grills and new trash containers. A new picnic table and trash container are to be added near an existing barbecue grill next to the Coral BQ.

Gandara said the work should be completed by FOM this month.

Landscaping for the project is expected to take only one day, according to Kalister.

More than two dozen plants will be planted, she said. Flora include hibiscus and ficus trees, among other foliage.

"We've got plenty of stuff," Kalister said. "Everything out there is going to

be low maintenance."

Volunteers need to meet at 8 a.m. at the project site.

"It will be easy. The project should only take a couple of hours, depending on the number of volunteers we get," Kalister said.

The command appropriated more than \$108,000 — \$75,000 of which came from an APIC award last year—for various community projects on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. Much of the work, from the installation of a water slide at Millican Family Pool to construction of a new passenger check-in area and waiting room at the air terminal, has already been completed. The money was also used to purchase a new ice cream machine at Sunrise Bakery, among other items.

Legal services temporarily cut

Due to the upcoming PCS move of Maj. Bill McQuade, USAKA/KMR judge advocate, the USAKA/KMR Legal Office will have only one attorney for an indefinite period beginning June 12. For this reason, the Legal Office will not be able to maintain its current level of personal legal services.

Legal services that do not require an attorney, such as powers of attorney, passports and notary services, will continue to be available for all Kwajalein residents. In addition, the Legal Office has prepared preventive law articles that give general information over a wide range of topics. These articles will be available in the Legal Office waiting area.

Personal consultations with an attorney, however, will not be available except for USAKA/KMR employees, military retirees and their family members. Referrals to private attorneys located in Majuro, Hawaii and the other 49 states will be available through the Legal automation assistant and the paralegal.

Serial numbers are printed on a silver sticker on the back of the machine.

Spartans I claim A division title

The Spartans I Boys edged the Earth Pigs, 72-66, Friday night to capture the Men's A division basketball championship.

The Spartans (12-2) set a fast-paced, physical tone right from the start by employing a full-court, man-to-man defense. This represented a slight departure from the trapping, zone defense normally played by Spartans I.

This defensive strategy was concocted literally minutes before game time "when we saw (the Earth Pigs) had only five guys (to start the game)," according to Spartans' sophomore Patrick Casey, who chipped in 13 points for the victors.

The pressure defense enabled Spartans I to race out to an early 8-0 lead. The Spartans led 13-3 when the Earth Pigs' Dave Gray found his scoring touch.

Gray drained a variety of mid-range shots (10 to 16 feet from the basket) to help pull his team within four points, 25-21, with approximately five minutes left in the first half.

Spartans I answered back with seven straight points to open up their largest lead of the game, 32-21, with two and a half minutes remaining in the first period.

A by-product of the Spartans physical defense was their propensity to foul — 12 times in the first half; thus sending the Earth Pigs (9-5) to the free throw line.

Gray capped a 22-point first half by

drilling five of six free throws over the last two minutes, leaving the Earth Pigs down by only four points, 35-31, at halftime.

Two-man show

The second half was highlighted by an entertaining basketball duel between five-time Spartans I MVP, Floyd Corder, and the Earth Pigs' Gray.

When Gray wasn't scoring 12 second-half points, he was creating easy scoring opportunities for his frontcourt teammates, Doug Vanderveen and Tim Elchlepp, who scored six points each in the second half.

At the other end of the court, every time the opposition would threaten to draw even or take the lead, it seemed Corder would counter with a clutch jump shot, occasionally from beyond the three-point arc, to keep the Earth Pigs at bay.

"We were always playing 'catch-up'," lamented Elchlepp after the game, in which his team never had the lead.

Nonetheless, the outcome was still in doubt with less than three minutes remaining.

The Earth Pigs' chances at victory were dealt a serious blow seconds later when Gray picked up his fifth personal foul, ending a dominating 34-point performance.

Darryl Jones (11 points, nine in the second half) hit a three-pointer to bring the Earth Pigs to within three points, but Corder answered back with a three-point basket from the top of the key with 90 seconds remaining to effectively nail down the

championship for Spartans I.

The victory capped Corder's five-year career with Spartans I.

"I am going to miss it," Corder said of the team.



Morton Hax and Swinney Lojka, with 11 points each, led Nameless in scoring.

KPD sees rise in black market

KPD officials are looking closely at the black market.

Lt. Moses Moreno said he's seeing an increase in cases where badged residents, authorized to shop at local retailers, are buying items, particularly alcohol and cigarettes, for those unauthorized to shop on island.

"It's a daily event," agreed Chief Kevin Dykema.

Residents may purchase alcohol and cigarettes and share them with others unauthorized to shop, provided the items are shared together, Moreno said. An authorized buyer, however, may not purchase, beer, for example, and give it or sell it to an unauthorized buyer.

Violators may face administrative action or charges in the U.S. Magistrate Court.

Police push for bike registration ...

This will not affect bicycles at the Dock Security Checkpoint.

But the move raises the issue of bicycle ownership and registration, as well, added Maj. Paul Bezzek, USAKA provost marshal.

If a bicycle is accidentally picked up, owners will need either a registration number, serial number or some identifying feature to claim it.

Not that there's much worry of accidental pick-up. The targeted bicycles will be in sad shape, Bezzek and Dykema said, and each will be stickered. That sticker will remain on the bicycle a week before any action is taken.

But bicycle registration does help. If a bicycle is stolen, police can generally recover it, if they have a registration number.

"If you come down to the station and say your blue Huffly was taken, well, that doesn't help much," Bezzek said.

Bicycle registration is easy, taking only three to five minutes at the police department. There, officers jot down the serial number and owner, and assign the bike a num-

ber and sticker with that number.

The provost marshal added that many residents have made their bicycles unique and distinctive, also making it easier to identify.

Most bicycles picked up before tomorrow are those parked in public walkways and other hazard areas.

Bicycles that are picked up both before and after Saturday remain at the Kwajalein Police Department for 45 days, allowing the owner time to come to the department and claim it before it is sold at a public auction. Bikes generally sell on average for \$5 but bids range from \$1 to \$10 on some bikes, Bezzek said.

The next public auction is 9 a.m. June 11 at the Kwajalein Police Department.

Bicycles not sold go to Bicycle Heaven, the bicycle scrapyard near the landfill.

To properly dispose of a bicycle, simply put it near a dumpster and Solid Waste crews will transport it to Bicycle Heaven, said Charlie Heath, Solid Waste Management supervisor.
