## Vols find work around atoll

It could be as simple as buying an extra toy at Macy's or as complicated as designing a course and gathering the equipment to teach graphics to children. Opportunities to volunteer time or money to help Kwajalein's Marshallese neighbors on Ebeye are as varied as the reasons for volunteering.

"I need to give back to the community and people that are providing such a wonderful lifestyle for me," said Connie Southwell, USAKA graphics specialist, who is in the process of obtaining outdated computers and designing a graphics course for high school students on Ebeye. "I thought it would be fun ... The ad in the *Hourglass* last fall looking for art teachers at Queen of Peace spurred my interest ... it would let the kids know there is a career field out there."

Southwell didn't know who placed the ad or how to connect to the right people on Ebeye, so she went to Scarlet Scholte, a long-time resident who has worked with the Marshallese children who attend Kwajalein's schools.



"I mostly deal with the guest students, having them over for lunch and getting school ... personal supplies," said Scholte, who is in the process of getting Southwell in touch with school officials on Ebeye. "My main concern is the students that walk in two cultures — it's difficult for them."

Programs that provided the Marshallese students tutoring, meals or a place to shower on Kwajalein suffered when the volunteers PCSed, Scholte said. New people are needed to volunteer this year.

And folks want to get involved.

"I want to do something more significant," said LuAnne Fantasia, explaining that she wanted to volunteer on Ebeye but did not know

## SMDC IT managers visit Kwaj

Transmitting data off-island or talking on the phone may get faster and clearer after a visit this week from members of the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command's Information Management team.

"We realize Kwajalein is a national asset, vital to this command, the U.S. Army and the national defense," said Bob Connell, chief information officer for SMDC and deputy chief of staff for Information Management in Huntsville, Ala. "This is an isolated area where reliable communications are critical for both mission success and resident quality of life."

Connell, Erbin Troutman, Connell's deputy and Information Assurance manager, and Aubrey Pinkerton, SMDC Network manager, met this week with local information management staffs to discuss fiber optics, bandwidth and improved off-island communications capabilities.

First up, officials are discussing a fiber optic line that could link Kwajalein to Hawaii and CONUS. Such a line would increase bandwidth off-island, bandwidth needed in the future for remoting radars and sensors and in

the present for transmitting to customers the data the range currently collects.

Officials must weigh that option with increasing the bandwidth utilized among the existing satellite networks.

"You do the trade-offs," Connell said. "Do you have the mission requirements to support that bandwidth?"

Per megabyte, underwater fiber is much cheaper over the long haul. Fiber also offers instantaneous connections, without the time delay associated with satellite communications. Satellites also are subject to interruptions due to weather and sunspot activity.

The Army ran a fiber-optic ring around the atoll, connecting Roi-Namur, Meck and Kwajalein, about five years ago, so a fiber connection to the mainland would not require many new lines on Kwaj.

"It gives the command lots of options," Connell added. "All customers want faster communication with a cheaper price tag."

But while cheaper to operate, fiber comes with a multi-million dollar initial price tag. Options include costs being split among Federated States of Micronesia, Republic of the



# Council chairman says go to the source first

Issues should be addressed at the lowest level first, said CW2 Wiley Blanton, USAKA Bachelor's Advisory Council chairperson.

"The responsible person has to be responsible," Blanton said at the Roi BAC meeting Wednesday afternoon. "I like to address specifics, for example, did you call FOM for a water problem, who did you talk to and what did they tell you? There is no need to bring an issue to the council without talking to the responsible party."

This policy sent Roi representatives back to their phones to call FOM on lack of hot water in the BQs, inaccessible dumpsters and a request to put a cipher lock on Building C or Roi's Recreation Center to keep items from being stolen.

Representatives raised the issue of Housing personnel entering a non-smoking BQ room without the occupant's permission after receiving a smoking complaint.

Housing's policy on smoking in non-smoking rooms allows management to enter the room and is based on USAKA regulation 210-2, said Trina Royne, Housing Services super-

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visor. Royne said that some residents believe no one should enter until the occupant is notified. The problem is that the person can erase all evidence of smoking before Housing could enter.

The regulation states the because "UPH buildings are occupied by many people, access by Housing management or fire personnel may be required to protect lives and property."

People at the meeting raised another smoking issue — whether smoking would be allowed in the Outrigger Club after Oct. 1 since smoke from the club filters into the gym and library located in the same building.

Col. Curtis L. Wrenn Jr., USAKA commander, will make a decision in the near

future, based in part on a survey, Blanton said.

"If the club is non-smoking, that takes care of the problem. If not, we will have to look into resolving the smoke in the gym [and library]," he added.

Questions arose concerning responsibility for maintenance and accountability of bikes recently bought for Roi resident's use on Kwajalein.

"Out of five bikes, two are missing, two are operational and one is missing a seat," said Lloyd Jordan, RSE Residential Services manager. Jordan said the bike keys are kept at Floyd Corder's office on Roi and a person with business on Kwaj can use the bikes stored at Kwaj's Inter-Atoll Terminal. Maintaining them and providing accountability is difficult from Roi. The issue was taken under advisement.

"The purpose of the council is for the bachelors to bring their concerns from their standpoint whether good or bad," Blanton said.

If an issue is taken to the responsible party and "there is no response ... if you're not happy with the response ... or if there is no central point of contact, that would be something to bring to the council," he concluded.

# HBO special to highlight WWII paratrooper company

WASHINGTON — Audiences around the country are hearing firsthand about the hell that sparked an everlasting bond between World War II soldiers from a Tom Hanks and Steven Spielberg production.

"Band of Brothers" is a 10-part HBO miniseries based on the experiences of E Company (known as Easy Company), 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division. The series begins Sept. 9.

But a special presentation is already being shown on HBO featuring an oral history from Easy Company veterans and behind-the-scenes footage called "The Making of Band of Brothers."

Highlights of the series are also being shown to veterans and soldiers on stages from Seattle to Philadelphia. Nineteen regional screenings are bringing the Easy Company soldiers to the forefront for recognition, said an Army official.

The next screening will be Saturday at Fort Campbell, Ky.

At a July 26 screening at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, Capt. Victor Shane Olshansky, a logistics officer with today's 506th Infantry (Air Assault), Camp Greaves, Korea, presented memorabilia to six veterans from Easy Company.

Olshansky's father served in the unit in 1959 as a first lieutenant.

The 10-part miniseries has no fictitious characters, said Stephen Ambrose, the author of the book, "Band of Brothers." There are also no Hollywood romances, Ambrose said. He added that it was the intent of executive producers Tom Hanks and Steven Spielberg to tell the story accurately.

Easy Company was one of four companies within the 2nd Battalion, 506th Infantry Regiment. It consisted of men who volunteered to be trained as paratroopers for the honor and the extra \$50 for enlisted and \$100 for officers a month, according to historians. Out of 500 officers and 5,300 enlisted soldiers who volunteered for the training, only 148 and 1,800 graduated respectively.

The movie will outline the unit's battles in England, Normandy, Holland, Belgium and at Hitler's hideaway, the "Eagles Nest."

World War II began just after midnight

June 6, 1944 for Easy Company. On D-Day paratroopers of Easy Company dropped into the dark Normandy countryside as part of Operation Overload. The company suffered 65 casualties during its five weeks in Normandy.

In the fall of 1944 Easy Company parachuted into Holland to capture the city of Arnhem. However, they were unsuccessful and they spent the rest of the fall in battles along the road to Arnhem, nicknamed "Hell's Highway."

On Dec. 19, 1944, Easy Company was sent to Belgium to help defend the besieged city of Bastogne during the Battle of the Bulge. The men had limited access to food, proper boots and long underwear to defend against the bitter cold, and were frequently shivering and hungry, veterans said.

In early April 1945 the company moved into Germany and spent two days assisting with the liberation of a concentration camp. In May the men arrived in the Bavarian city of Berchtesgaden, the site of Adolf Hitler's mountain fortress, call the Aldershorst, or "Eagles Nest." When the war ended, May 8, the men of Easy Company toasted the victory with Hitler's champagne.

what was needed or who to contact. I'm finished with sitting around on the beach every weekend ... I have no teaching experience. I can read and I can listen — I did that with my own sons."

Finding out what is available and who to call could be a job for Sherlock Holmes. Even though Fantasia and Southwell have been here more than a year, neither knew who to call.

Only here just a few months himself, Host Nation chief, Maj. David Coffey, said he didn't know about all the volunteer efforts, but would like to see someone step forward to be a point of contact for all the efforts that are taking place.

"Host Nation office encourages [volunteering]," Coffey said. If someone has an idea or wants to volunteer and does not know who to call, Host Nation can help with the contact, "interfacing between the two communities."

One problem mentioned by Scholte was that many of the people who consistently did volunteer work year after year PCSed, like Christian Women's Fellowship president June Foltz, who left Wednesday.

"I was put here to contribute," Foltz said. "The thing that surprised me the most is how comfortable and enjoyable it is being in the Marshallese culture.

"Go through organizations that already exist, like church, school or hospital," Foltz advised. "Individuals in those organizations can make the connection."

The CFW, with the help of Marshallese and Roi residents, brought a barge load of plants to Third Island two years ago, organized an Ebeye Christmas drop five years ago, a Carlson Christmas drop two years ago and has brought in speakers like missionary Cherith Rydbeck.

"[We did] activities that we enjoy together — Bible study, crafts, singing," Foltz said. "It was really significant for me to realize that just talking to someone in English helps their English."

No matter what is done it is "important to do it with dignity and respect for them," Foltz said. "People can donate at the chapel too — time or money — it is funneled into something that is needed."

Kwajalein High School science teacher Derek Brower said that he and the other members of the Protestant Chapel Mission board meet once a month to decide where and how the chapel money will be used on Ebeye or in another area in Micronesia.

"If someone is interested, I go over to Ebeye with them," Brower said. "I show them what is needed and encourage them to do it on their

own."

Brower is currently accepting old computers from people on Kwajalein, delivering them to high schools on Ebeye.

The chapel is in touch with the churches and schools on Ebeye, said the Rev. John Dorr Jr., Protestant chaplain. "They need teachers up to five days a week. They run their schools from Monday through Friday. So someone could spend a couple hours on Ebeye helping out with the kids."

In addition to providing supplies to students and teachers, the Protestant chapel is preparing for an Ebeye Christmas Drop.

More than 7,000 shoebox-sized, age- and gender-specific boxes will be given to the children in December. Dorr said he contacted Samaritans Purse, a non-profit organization, this summer. Through a program called "Christmas Child," the organization sends the boxes donated by people all over the world to areas in need.

"If we are able to do a successful distribution ... Samaritans Purse is interested in branching out to other locations in Micronesia," Dorr said, explaining that the chapel will need volunteers to help distribute and set up the event. "You just don't drop the gifts ... our chapel kids will sing, then their church groups will want to sing."

Amber Morse, who originally moved to Kwajalein Atoll as a volunteer to teach at Queen of Peace, is currently working on Kwajalein. She sponsors sports teams and will be a guidance counselor for senior high school students on Mondays on Ebeye.

"I don't understand how people can live here and not see the need over there," Morse said. "Why would you live in a foreign country and not get involved in the culture and the people?"

Morse volunteers "because I have been given the greatest education in the world ... because I was born into a family where education was important."

Both Morse and Debbie Daly, a teacher at College of the Marshall Islands, said that sports teams from the high school and college need sponsors on Kwajalein to come and play.

"Contact Community Activities to see if a team has signed up and doesn't have a sponsor yet," Morse said.

Elementary and high school students can volunteer their time too. Both Scholte and Morse said high school student James Corder volunteers at Calvary school every Monday and helped with their yearbook. The students in the Marshall Islands Club at Kwajalein high school raise money and donate their time to projects for the Marshallese, including bringing Christmas gifts to the children on Carlos every December.

Ebeye hospital also has a need for volunteers, said Dr. Jill Horner, Kwajalein Hospital staff physician. A three-year resident of Majuro before moving to Kwaj, Horner travels with the Coast Guard to the outer islands and visits Ebeye to help with medical problems. She warned that unless someone is committed to volunteer work, it is detrimental to the Marshallese.

"It is very difficult for the Marshallese when someone is not consistent," Horner said.

Nurses on Kwajalein could go over and change bandages and help at the hospital, she added.

In the past, volunteers have repaired the hospital roof and provided quilts for the patients, Horner said.

Horner volunteers because "I have skills that are needed over there. I speak medical Marshallese and that is a benefit."

When volunteering or working with the Marshallese it is good to know about their social customs.

"Never wave your hand, raise your eyebrows or nod — it is rude to put fingers in the air to motion someone towards you," Horner said. "Don't shout out loud or call out their name. They don't tend to use names. It's very personal."

Horner reminded men to wear long pants and women to wear long dresses with sleeves when visiting Ebeye or Third Island.

## Army astronauts work aboard ISS

WASHINGTON — After more than 168 days aboard the International Space Station, a retired Army colonel will return to earth next week.

Retired Col. Jim Voss will ride home aboard the Space Shuttle Discovery, crewed by active Army Lt. Col. Patrick Forrester, a mission specialist. The shuttle is scheduled to land at the Kennedy Space Center Aug. 22.

Forrester is part of a four-man shuttle crew whose mission is to deliver 7,000 pounds of supplies, food and science experiments to the space station. The shuttle also transported up the Expedition Three crew who will spend the next several months on the space station.

Voss, a flight engineer with the Expedition Two crew, arrived at the space station March 18 to study the human body in space, space radiation, observations of the Earth, crystal growth in weightlessness and plant growth in space.

Voss' replacement and the Space Shuttle Discovery arrived at the space station Aug. 12.

While the shuttle was docked at the space station this week, Forrester and another mission specialist, Dan Barry, performed two space walks.

NASA selected Forrester as an astronaut candidate in May 1996. He completed two years of training and evaluation, and is qualified for flight assignment as a mission specialist.

In addition to Forrester, there are five other active-duty Army astronauts: Lt. Col. Jeff Williams, Lt. Col. Nancy Currie, Lt. Col. Tim Creamer, Lt. Col. Doug Wheelock and an astronaut candidate, Maj. Timothy Kopra.

The outgoing crew was commanded by a Russian cosmonaut with two American crew members. Expedition Three will be commanded by a U.S. astronaut joined by two Russian crewmembers. The crews alternate each rotation as agreed upon by the American and Russian station partners, said an official from the NASA Public Affairs Office.

The International Space Station is the largest space station ever, and with the conclusion of Expedition Two's scientific research, it has reached a significant level of stability and self-reliance, according to NASA officials. They said the station is able to sustain and maintain itself for long periods, and is prepared to continue to grow for years to come.

Marshall Islands and the Department of Defense, Connell said. He added USAKA and SMDC are working with other organizations and customers to firm up customer requirements and ultimately arrange funding.

In any case, officials hope to establish bandwidth management to maximize the current available lines. Under the current architecture, certain lines are dedicated to specific functions, such as mission data. But those lines are underutilized when the range isn't performing a mission. Meanwhile, lines dedicated to administrative work get maximized every day. The idea is to utilize all lines more efficiently. And during missions, the priority shifts, so that administrative lines are cut back to make room for the additional data streams required by the mission.

Additionally, a plan to replace the telephone lines across the island is progressing.

The project began in 1999 with the placement of conduits and main lines to key areas, said Don Hornbrook, chief of USAKA Information Management. Phase II, beginning in October 2001, will add spurs to the main business areas, and Phase III will extend the lines to most buildings and residences on-island by the end of calendar year 2003.

Another key issue revolves around computer security. Troutman said the key lies in standardization of hardware and compatible software.

Hackers have failed, so far, in infiltrating internal systems, Connell said, because of existing intrusion detection software, countermeasures, firewalls and increased security awareness.

"The command needs more people in the area of information assurance, but considering our current assets we do very well," Troutman said.

The e-mail system, on the other hand, has suffered "a nuisance," with some of the recent Microsoft-based viruses that have virtually shut down networks around the world.

"They don't destroy, but they do slow us down," Connell said, adding the "I Love You" was the worst, because it was the first major Microsoft-based e-mail virus.

No virus has gone beyond the server level, however, he stressed, and much of the security lies with the users.

"Each individual is responsible for the systems they operate," said Pinkerton. "It comes down to simple things like bringing discs from home to a government computer. Those discs can carry a virus. It only takes one major screw-up to bring down a network."

The command's information management team has enjoyed some success with initiatives over the years.

Connell and his staff worked with Hornbrook and local contractors to install the automated telephone switches in 1996, which allowed for direct-dialing, and in 1999, to build the Satellite Earth Terminal, which gave the island more telephone lines off-island using commercial satellite bandwidth.

"This is a team approach," Connell said. "We come here to jointly develop more efficient solutions to our communications issues."

"There is a great government-contractor atmosphere," agreed Pinkerton. "It's a good bunch of folks who work well together. That's not to say there aren't a lot of challenges in our jobs."

Connell said, "We have some major tasks and initiatives ahead. But, we're confident that with teamwork and perseverance, the command's information management goals and objectives will be accomplished. And that will ultimately improve everyone's quality of life."




