## KRS plans to retain about 90 percent of workers

## It's official: KRS awarded contract

From SMDC Public Affairs and KRS Public Relations

The U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command has awarded a \$626 million, four-year contract with the potential for 15 years valued at \$2.5 billion, to Kwajalein Range Services LLC, for logistics support and integrated range engineering support services at USAKA/RTS.

This award is a cost-plus, cost-term award fee contract with potential duration extending to 15 years. KRS will provide technical services for the missile testing and space surveillance missions as well as complete logistics and infrastructure solutions to support the USAKA/RTS community. These logistics services include procurement and supply, power, water, facility and housing maintenance, schools, recreation, retail, post office, telecommunications and sea and air transportation. Phase-in for the program has started.

KRS is comprised of Bechtel National, Inc., a subsidiary of Bechtel

## Prep for college starts years early

Every fall students all over the U.S. and on Kwajalein face the daunting job of finding and applying to colleges. The process got a kick-start here earlier this month at College Night, an annual school event designed to simplify the complicated process for both students and parents.

"It's great when the kids do the application and searches ... they are taking care of their business," said Bob Ammann, Kwajalein high school

# Many Internet sites unfairly blocked by content association

In the Friday, Sept. 20, issue of the *Hourglass*, Mrs. Thompson-Williams made a good point in her editorial. She wrote of the island Internet service being a "free service paid for by the government, and my tax-paying family in the states doesn't need to pay for anyone's 'adult entertainment.'"

There are a few problems with that argument, as I understand it.

First, expense is extended in the maintenance of filters used on the systems, not the other way around.

Second, as a veteran, I am aware of the necessity for discipline, and avoiding disruptive influence among the enlisted, but we're primarily older adult civilians on this site. We've been around the block a few times. Families should download filters for free off of DoD sites.

Third, censorship is governmental "filtering" of information from citizens. This is the case on this site, for better or worse. It's a tradition for the service to espouse its values on those who signed the dotted line — been there, done that. But there are many military "traditions" that have been re-evaluated in the recent past, like women in the services, joint task forces, etc. Perhaps we can re-think the censor-

ship issue along with these other "traditions." Maybe it can go the way of flogging and other primitive zealotries.

Lastly, all "adult information" isn't pornographic or violent. For example, I'm visiting Cambodia in the near future. The information I get on the country is "tourist tripe" that's of little value. I would like to read information from the ex-pats and visitors who have risked the travel, dealt with the daily rigors and walked the walk, but, unfortunately, many of these fellows sometimes engage in non-puritanical activities. Therefore, I can't get 'the real low-down' for my visit to Angkor Watt because of island censorship. It's "blocked by association."

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

## Internet major resource for college-bound students ...

counselor.

Students can begin preparing for college, the next big step in their lives, very early in their high school careers. Taking admittance tests, submitting grades, writing essays and applying for financial aid are all part of the process.

The job has always been a little bit more daunting for Kwajalein students because of the distance from the states, Ammann said. But over the last five years applying for college has gotten easier thanks to the Internet.

"There is a big change, now that all the information is so globalized," he said. "Every college has a Web site ... there are virtual tours of the campuses, and you can read the college newspaper. I think that is the best source to get a feel for the campus."

Admissions, financial aid, applications and even a school catalog can be downloaded from school Web sites and college database Web sites, he said. A student can apply for acceptance at many different colleges using an on-line application and even apply for financial aid.

Ammann walked parents and students through the college planning handbook and resources available on-line during the College Night meeting. "Excel outside of class. Make your summer productive" was one of the tasks listed in the handbook for 10th-graders. Ammann emphasized the need to "get started right away on the paperwork," especially if the student is a senior and has decided to go to college.

"You should apply for college in their junior year," advised Floyd Corder Sr., who has three children in college with three more to go, including his fourth son, Eric, who is planning to go to California Maritime. Corder said the key is to remind kids that their grade point average and the Scholastic Aptitude Test are important.

"Colleges get a feel for who is going to be successful. No one wants to go to a school that has a 10 percent graduation rate and no school wants kids who they know won't graduate," he explained.

In his sons' junior years, Corder said he talked to each of them about their college selection and keeping the price within the family's budget.

Hawaii is considered in-state for Kwajalein residents and Pell Grants are available, Corder said.

Both Ammann and Corder emphasized the need to get the FAFSA, or Free Application for Federal Student Aid, paperwork done. FAFSA is used to apply for all federal and state student grants, work-study and loans. The form and instructions are found on [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov).

"The biggest problem is getting taxes done first," Corder said, explaining that the financial aid request packet re-

quires a completed tax return from the last year. "Get the FAFSA done first and right, otherwise the packet will be delayed." The earliest date that the financial aid packet can be mailed or e-mailed in is Jan. 1.

A big plus for island residents is that most colleges consider Kwajalein a remote area and the chances of getting in a college are better, said Dotty Miller.

"Communicating with the colleges is the biggest challenge to being here," Miller said, admitting that she does not like searching the Internet. "There is nothing like talking to someone directly."

Although Kwajalein schools can't bring recruiters or admissions people here, there are some local resources, Ammann said.

"An MIT guy came in and talked to the kids and so did some Texas A&M

Aggies, who are really gung ho," Ammann said.

As part of his goal to attend West Point, Jonathan Miller has already talked to some local West Point graduates, who have given him pointers, his mother said.

"The difficult thing, of course, is to do campus visits," Ammann said. "People visit in the summer before their senior year, but you don't get quite as good a look in the summer."

Another problem is that when students get accepted to college, they have to go far away, said Pat Wanslow. Because of the distance, her nephew, senior Patrick Casey, will attend a school in the family's home state.

"We have asked all of our kids to go to college in Arkansas, because at least if someone gets sick, or more likely, needs cash in a hurry, we have family there," Wanslow said.

Instead of doing the application work, parents are letting their children take care of it.

Sara Lollar has been wading through college searches, tests and on-line applications for quite some time. In fact, she has gotten so familiar with the different search engines and college Web sites that she has become a reliable source of information for her classmates.

Last Wednesday night, a small group of seniors clustered around the Lollar's home computer, as she helped them sign up for the SAT. She also helps her friends pick out their college using the Internet.

Lollar said she started preparing for college and getting college brochures as far back as 10th grade, sending e-mails to colleges from Pakistan where she lived.

"The colleges then send you brochures," she said. Her PSAT scores went to colleges last year with a checkmark in the box requesting college information. On Nov. 2 she takes the SAT, and those scores will be forwarded on to her selected schools.

Lollar said she's found everything she needs by using the Internet.

"There is even a Web site that you can enter your grades and school history in and they'll send you a list of colleges you are eligible for," she said.

Copies of the College Night handouts are available at the high school administrative office.

defense contractor. KRS was formed exclusively to manage this contract. ## Manit Day celebrates richness of Marshallese culture

The march of missionaries and military powers through the Marshall Islands beginning in the 18th century thrust the islands onto the stage of world history. But the Marshalls' cultural history goes back centuries, and its rich variety of tradition, skills and food will be on display Monday at the Marshallese Cultural Center.

Manit Day, a national RMI holiday, celebrates the culture, its distinctiveness in this age of globalization. Monday's event will feature a number of demonstrations and exhibits, ranging from displays of traditional medicine to weaving and coconut-rope making.

"It's pretty much going to be an all-day affair," said Cris Lindborg, director of exhibits at the Marshallese Cultural Center. Officially beginning at noon, Manit Day activities at the center will get going much sooner, with preparation for the cooking of a pig in a traditional underground oven around 9 a.m., she said. The festival will end around 6 p.m.

In between there will be other cooking demonstrations, weaving, fishing and sailing exhibits, medicinal displays and a slide show inside the cultural center. Special events will occur about every hour, including fire-

making demonstrations, story-telling and a fashion show of sorts that will follow the evolution of Marshallese dress from traditional times to the present. Dancing and music are scheduled for later in the day, about 5 p.m., according to Lindborg.

More than 100 Marshallese performers and demonstrators are expected at the festival, which is now in its fourth year, Lindborg said. Manit Day on Kwaj didn't happen last year because of Sept. 11 and other extenuating circumstances, she said.

In conjunction with Manit Day, the cultural center will unveil a couple of new exhibits. One display involves a series of posters and stories about the scientific and mythological lore of the birds of the Marshall Islands.

The second exhibit involves a photographic collection of images from an 1883-85 Swedish expedition to Jaluit Atoll. The photographs came from the Bishop Museum in Honolulu and the Royal Stockholm Museum in Sweden, Lindborg said.

"They are incredible pictures," she said. A handicraft contest in association with a loan of artifacts from the Bishop this summer is ongoing, according to Lindborg. Entries, including mat skirts and a spear, will be on display, with the winners chosen at the festival.

background or some kind of educational background. There were three that had worked for the RMI police."

The record number of new constables added to the KPD is half of the total manpower scheduled to be added to help with new mission requirements, according to Bruce Bell, Alutiiq Security and Technology site manager. The other 10 will be U.S. police officers.

Clad in blue slacks and pressed light blue shirts, new constables Sylvia Korok and Salvstin B. Nathan stood ramrod straight as they searched each bag carried through DSC last Wednesday. Both were slated to be part of Sunday's Meck security team.

They agreed it was difficult to go through the belongings of people they knew.

"It is hard, but it is my job," Nathan said.

As to wearing slacks rather than a dress, Korok said, "It is OK. I change at work."

The KPD did talk to Ebeye's traditional leaders about the uniforms and "they are supportive," Bell said, adding that the constables may change to shorts

and polo tops in the near future.

KPD now employs 27 constables, all proficient in the Marshallese language, with average English skills, dependable and able to use a computer, said Police Chief Kevin Dykema. The constables do not carry weapons, but have the ability to make a citizen's arrest.

Previously, the department hired and trained one constable at a time. But the size of the group dictated a change in training, from on-the-job training only to a combination of group work followed by OJT.

"So much of the training in the past had been on-the-job training," Bell said. "That works, but ... it is literally one-on-one to do that. Training in bulk allowed us more time and flexibility to go more in-depth on some things. It also cuts down on the amount of time you spend in training."

The weeklong training course not only covered each constable's specific duties, but gave the new recruits a look at the overall security and law enforcement mission on the island, which was not done for constables who received only OJT, Cotton said.

Bell said that the training paralleled U.S. military training, which gives re-

cruits the overall intent and how their part affects the entire mission, not just a specific task.

There is no glass ceiling for the new constables. The KPD has created a program that allows constables to become police officers, he said.

Requirements to become police officers include working in law enforcement for three out of the last five years, passing a background check, receiving at least an interim secret clearance and graduating from a military or civilian police academy, Bell said. The last requirement is the hardest for a Marshallese.

"So we worked on a program where we essentially give them the equivalent of graduating from an academy," Bell said. "When they become an officer, the pay rate becomes the same as U.S. officers, commensurate with their rank."

"We have Marshallese investigators, sergeants, corporals and officers," Bell said. "Quite honestly, they are a big part of our success here." One constable is already in the program and even some of the new constables are planning ahead.

"I'm thinking of becoming an officer," Korok said, with a smile.


