

Back in the '70s, my brother, Bob, at the age of 10, played in Little League for a team called Farmer's Supply. The team sponsored by a local feed store posted an ignominious 0-12 record, or something like that.

One evening, after another heart-wrenching loss, my father reminded my brother that the loss, "builds character."

"But Dad," Bob answered. "I've got all the character I want. I just want to win a baseball game."

Chicago Cubs fans know that feeling and more after the painful meltdown that began in Wednesday night's game during the eighth inning and continued on through the tragic finale Thursday.

But it's just a game? Maybe.

I don't know. I'm emotionally drained. My guts have been yanked out, dragged about the coral rock and returned to my body cavity in the wrong order.

To the Cubs fan, this week's pathetic playoff will go down in their history alongside the 1984, '89 and '98 collapses in a long line of tragic games.

But for the record, there is no curse, and the Cubs are not "lovable losers." And Steve Bartman, the ignorant fan who tried to catch a foul ball meant for left fielder



Moises Alou in Game 6, did not single-handedly cost the Cubs the pennant, though he certainly got his name added to Cubs lore in the same spot Bill Buckner occupies for Red Sox fans.

The Marlins played amazing ball, and our team just blew it, fair and square.

Cursed. I don't think so. Unless you consider a cheapskate owner who failed to field a decent team for decades, then sold the team in the '80s to an equally cost-efficient corporation that makes money whether the team wins or loses — hardly a corporate incentive to spend the big bucks for a winner.

If not for decades of losing seasons in between, three failed playoff performances would hardly raise an eyebrow. How many times have the Braves or Astros failed to pull the trigger in the last 10 years? In fact, 26 baseball teams, including the Braves and Astros, would have loved to have made the championship series this year.

If the Cubs have any curse it's their reputation. A Cubs player in the playoffs has not only the standard pressures of post-season ball to think of, but he must also carry the weight of this reputation.

I'd love to get philosophical, talk about the virtues of always believing in the future possibility of victory in the face of 95 years of past failure, but it just doesn't compute.

That's not to say I don't believe. If the Cubs re-sign Kerry Wood and Sammy Sosa, or some other big bat, during the off-season and add another arm to the bullpen, there's no reason to think they won't contend next year.

And that's not the same ol' "Wait 'til next year" mantra, it's simple baseball

logic. And the Cubs haven't always had that kind of potential for "the next year."

Fact is, I'm a Cubs fan. My grandfather is a Cubs fan. My father is a Cubs fan. My brother is a Cubs fan. I was born into it. I accepted it for myself while attending games at Wrigley Field. Does this sound like a religion to you as it does me while I write it? Frightening really.

But I don't ask for much, just what every other fan wants from his or her team, a championship. I don't think we necessarily deserve it over other teams, just because we've lost for so long, nor do I think fate has pegged us as eternal losers. Baseball's a tough sport, and whether it's poor management or just dumb luck, the Cubs have just never put it together in my father's lifetime.

Still just a game — sure it is. Disappointment, frustration and depression — yeah.

The sun will rise tomorrow, and maybe, if the rains that have socked us in the past week will clear, we'll see it.

I'll wash my "lucky shirt" and get it ready for next season. I'll pay more attention to football now. My fantasy team needs help, though my pro team, the Chiefs, and my college team, the Sooners, are still undefeated.

I still have a job. The family is healthy, and come December, my son, Jack will arrive in the world.

Will he ever see a Cubs championship?

I don't know about that, but I hope we'll watch the games on television and occasionally make a pilgrimage to Wrigley Field. I'll show him the McDonald's across from the stadium that sits on the site where his great-great grandfather once had a cobbler shop. We'll sit in the stands where my father, brother and I, along with his mother and sister have all sat, and we'll cheer on our team.

I'll tell him of the time we saw Cardinal slugger Mark McGuire strike out three times in 1998, or when the home team took a double-header from the Phillies in 2001, or the time in 2003, when we saw Kerry Wood strike out 11 Brewers, while the Cubbies hit seven home runs in a single game.

I expect we'll see the Cubs win some, and we'll probably see them lose some. Some will get rained out.

That's life, on and off the diamond.

But hopefully, we'll see it together with a shared fanatical bond, as generations before us.

It is just a game. And maybe that's the beauty of it.

# Television reception plan enters test bed phase

Housing residents may have the opportunity to test their television reception, while those in Bachelor Quarters should receive better reception in the near future. On Roi-Namur, channels should become available within the year.

In order to get a more clear picture of television reception problems, officials met last week to discuss how to improve it.

Crews installed new transmitters Sept. 17-19, adding three new programming channels along with a flight information channel, weather radar channel and 24-hour roller.

In January, after U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command has transferred to a new headquarters at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Ala., AFN will begin to broadcast three more AFN channels including a family channel, Spectrum entertainment and a movie channel.

Saturday's meeting, however, addressed the short-time issues of improving reception and prompted the creation of the television test bed. Essentially, the test bed consists of a handful of TV antennas, all of which will be available at Macy's West. Residents will call a number yet to be determined, and

a technician will come by the house at no charge to test each of the four antennas. After determining which affords the best picture, residents may then go buy the appropriate antenna.

"Not all solutions are going to be the same. It depends on the geography, what's growing around your house," said Mike Nelson, Communications manager.

Another potential improvement, currently on the drawing board, is boosting the transmission signal, a measure that should help some cases and has been cleared by radio frequency safety officials, but it won't solve all reception problems. Apparently, cinderblock walls, aluminum-covered trailers and even vegetation such as palm trees, absorb the ultrahigh frequencies, or UHF, at which the additional channels are transmitted.

"It's not a distance issue, but an obstruction issue," said Joe Marshall, Community Services manager.

Thus, solutions may be as simple as moving an antenna to a window, or placing an outdoor antenna atop a house.

Kwajalein Operations will design installation methods for outdoor antennas. Still on the table is the process, who will install and how outdoor antennas will go up.

Officials agreed they don't want to see residents climbing around and atop their homes installing antennas haphazardly and potentially injuring themselves. And currently, regulations prohibit attaching things such as antennas to homes, though officials are seeking some sort of waiver.

"We're going to end up with some antennas in the air, and that means a standardized installation process," Nelson said.

BQ antennas are currently not set to receive UHF channels but that will change as Marshall committed to work with KRS management Saturday to buy and install outdoor antennas for each building and attach those to new amplifiers on each floor that will then push the signals through the cable in the buildings. This could take effect as early as December.

On Roi Namur, officials will send the television signals through the atoll's fiber optic net, making it available to Roi residents as early as December. Lloyd Jordan, deputy manager for Community Services, met with Roi officials Wednesday to work out issues regarding the resident-owned cable, specifically, who will maintain the cable and current resident-owned equipment.

# Atoll-wide measles immunizations near completion

Since the outbreak of measles in the Marshall Island in late July, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll has not had one case, according to Dr. Eric Lindborg, Kwajalein Hospital chief medical officer. Ebeye's Public Health Center has recorded 30 confirmed cases, according to Dr. Tin Soe, Ebeye's hospital and PHC Medical director

"The last case was admitted [Wednesday] from Ebeye," Soe said. "A two-year-old boy who did not have any immunizations at all."

The family did not bring the child into the hospital for routine immunizations that are given to babies, he said.

The Ebeye Public Health staff gave a total of 6,496 Kwajalein Atoll residents, ranging in age from 6-months to 40; the measles, mumps and rubella vaccination between Aug. 1 and Sept. 16, he said. They started administering the booster or second vaccination dose on Sept. 17. As of Oct. 10, 1,594 individuals under 20 years of age were inoculated, Soe said, adding that they ran out of vaccine, but a new batch arrived yesterday.

The CDC recommends that only individuals under 20 years old receive the second dose, although normally one dose will give immunity, he said. But a couple of children that were vaccinated did get the measles, which may be because the vaccine was stored at too high a temperature due to transportation problems. The second dose will solve the problem.

"We hope to finish this weekend," he said. "Two doses of vaccination were done already [on the] outer islands of Kwaj Atoll and Lib Island, all schools and half of Ebeye households," he said. "[Only the areas] from the new hospital southward to Gugegue remains."

The measles outbreak will be declared over as soon as three weeks pass since the last known case, he said. Since the last case occurred Wednesday morning, the Marshall Islands won't be clear until Nov. 4, if no other cases are discovered.

But the requirement for individuals 40-years-old and younger to show a record of measles immunization before boarding an international flight will remain in effect until four weeks after the last case is documented, Lindborg said.

# A mare or marriage involves the entire family

**Editor's Note:** This is part three of a four-part series on the major events in the life of Marshallese. We started with the first birthday, or kemem, on Oct. 3, followed by the graduation ceremony, or kadiwojlok, on Oct. 10. Next week, the series will end with the customs surrounding the last event, death.

Because of the Marshallese commitment to family and the family structure, when it comes to marriage or *mare* the whole family gets involved in the entire process from engagement to the actual ceremony.

"Family ways are really strong," said Noda Lojkar, USAKA ombudsman and acting mayor of Kwajalein Atoll.

Before Christianity, there was no official ceremony. The Marshallese couple only needed to ask and receive approval from both sets of parents and then they moved into the man's family home, according to Lojkar. If both families didn't approve, then there was no union.

"Now it is different," Lojkar said. "Make sure the parents know, especially the head of the family."

It is still common for the couple to ask the parents' permission to marry, but it is more out of respect for the family and the family structure.

In the past, the man also had to show the ability to provide for his bride, with a dowry that was offered to the woman's family.

Marshallese also practiced arranged marriages, according to Claire Henry. Many of the arranged marriages guaranteed a pure royal blood line, she added.

Henry's grandparents, both came from a royal lineage, she a Litokwa



and he a Loeak, and were arranged to be married. Her grandmother grew up on Ebon, and her grandfather came from Ailinglaplap. When they were married they had never met before, Henry added.

Since there was no written history of Marshallese traditions, customs and traditions were passed down by word of mouth and also varied from family to family. The major thread that remains the same in all Marshallese events, however, is family and the involvement of family, extended family and friends in all events in a Marshallese life.

Traditions as to the wedding have changed over the years with the addition of the Christian religion, but the Marshallese family structure is still intact. One addition to the custom is the couple now must talk with the pastor or priest, along with family.

It is a whole family affair, Henry said. After the couple talks with the father, the father then talks to the extended family and together they all work out the arrangements such as decorations, food and location.

As with all Marshallese celebrations the ceremony does not start until the *iroij*, and or *leiroj* arrives.

The blessing of the *iroij* and *leiroj* is just as important as the parents of the couple.

After the wedding ceremony, which is usually Christian-based, all the guests join to celebrate with the newly wed couple. The *iroij*, and or *leiroj* sit at the wedding table, along with the fathers, mothers and family elders, of the newly married couple.

As with *kemem* and *kadiwojlok* a meal is a huge part of the ceremony, with many of the traditional foods — breadfruit, bananas and coconuts — coming from outer islands. The traditional foods such as chicken, fish, pork, crab and rice fill tables in the celebration meal, but with the traditional wedding meal, giant turtle is added to the menu.

People sing and dance, and family elders give speeches, Thompson Tarwoj said.

At the Tarwoj wedding, he wore a white suit, tie and black shoes. They were married in the church with a choir to sing at their wedding, and had a huge dinner after the ceremony.

His grandmother spoke after the ceremony to all the family members and guests, reciting the family lineage and family elders.

"All the family works together," Tarwoj added. They support the married couple.

As with other Marshallese celebrations, guests brought the traditional dollar bill.

There was also a special dance for him and his new wife, he said.

When it comes to honeymoons, they are not that big a deal, Lojkar said. The newlywed couple usually returns to work the next day.

Tarwoj and his new wife helped the family with the cleanup after the celebration was over.

"We stayed until everything is done," Tarwoj said.

When the royal family has a *mare*, the event becomes magnified, with the whole village involved in the ceremony, said Lojkar. The village helps with the planning and decorations and preparing of the meal.

Marshallese customs have changed with the introduction of Christianity and western culture, but the Marshallese custom of honoring family and the family unit has not.

# Columbus Day fishing tourney nets Lib donations

A 333-pound marlin rocketed the No Mo' Fingah team to first place in the bill fish category at the Columbus Day Fishing Tournament this past Monday; but the overall winner was captain of Team 40, Dave Wallner, with a combined aggregate weight of 222.63 pounds of fish.

The Kwajalein Atoll Sportfishing Club sponsored the tournament to help raise funds for the Lib Island Christmas drop.

"On previous tournaments, B-boats had to obey a restricted range, but the private boats could go anywhere they wanted to," said Steve Moore KASFC tournament director. "For this tournament, the extended range meant that B-boaters could fish waters that were normally closed to them, and they could compete on an even basis with the private boat owners.

"There were some very skilled B-boat fishermen in this tournament, so the level playing field really sharpened the competition," he added. "We had six private boats and four B-boats in the tournament."

According to Moore, the tournament raised over \$2,000, which was twice the club's goal.

"I thought the tournament was extremely successful," Moore said. "We accomplished all of our goals, raise money for the Lib Island school project and Christmas fund, increase community interest in sportfishing and provide a venue for some good clean fun."

In addition to the money raised by the tournament, the club also received private donations of over \$1,000 toward the Christmas fund, Moore said.

The tournament was to help raise money to build a roof for the school house on Lib Island. Some of the funds raised will be used to buy school supplies for the kids and fishing supplies for the adults.

Nine of the ten boats in the tour-

nement caught fish.

Capt. Steve Moore, with crew John Correnti, Jonesy Kaohelaulii, Joe Hansen and Bruce Hansen, brought in the big Pacific blue marlin early and then returned to continue fishing in the tournament.

Wallner took the biggest ahi award with a fish tipping the scales at 43 pounds and the biggest dog-tooth tuna at 20 pounds.

Also, with a 43-pound ahi, team Malt, with co-captains Lamar Hina and Tino Salvador, were also co-winners along with Wallner, in the ahi category.

Team Tejas, with Terry Yearly, captain, took first place in the ono category with a 20-pound fish.

Tom Krasuski, of team Winner, took the smallest fish honors with a .45-pound fish. His team did, however, catch a total weight of 26 pounds of fish.

There were no fish caught in the mahi mahi category.

The awards banquet is Monday, Oct. 20 at 6 p.m. at Emon Beach. The awards for the winners will be hand-carved trophies.

When the tournament ended at 6 p.m. several of the tournament entrants put their fish up for sale at the small boat marina with several Kwaj residents vying for the best deal they

could make.

"I was very pleased with the crowd that showed up for the weigh-in," Moore said. "It's been very heart-warming to see the amount of goodwill that exists on Kwajalein towards our Marshallese neighbors. I hope this will become an annual event like the Roi Chili Cook-off which benefits Third Island. I can't wait until next year," he added.

# Two records fall during rainy Columbus Day race

Despite one of the rainiest starts ever, Mark Daugherty and Sharon Greenbaum broke two master division records at Kwajalein Running Club's 26th annual Columbus Day Runabout, according to Bob Sholar, KRC president.

"After 25 years, now 26 ... records don't fall very often," he said. "And it was the first time I remember it raining at two minutes to 6 a.m."

The divisions are broken down into genders times the two distances times four age groups — youth (Y), 1-12; teen (T), 13-19; open (O), 20-39; and master (M), 40 plus.

The skies opened just before the 6 a.m. start, but 65 runners and walkers took to the pavement, with eight in the masters division completing 13.04 miles or two loops of the island and 57, representing all divisions, completing 6.52 miles.

Female masters division Greenbaum, at 1:41:48 for 13.04 miles and a pace of 7:48 minutes per mile, broke Laura Clark's record 43:12:00 time set in 1991; while male masters division Daugherty,

finishing the 6.52 race with a time of 40:40 and a pace of 6:14 miles per minute, broke a 1980 record of 43:12 set by Larry Moore.

Coupled with some new talent, the number of runners increased to 65 from last year's record low turnout of 45, Sholar said.

Seven masters entered the 13.04 mile race, with Greenbaum as the only female entry taking her division and the top time for the two loops of all the master runners.

Robert Guidi, who is training for the Ironman competition held in Hawaii in November, took the male masters division with a total time of 1:49:44.

In the 6.52 mile race, there were eight winners one for each division. Daugherty took the male masters division and Maryjon Large Moore took the female masters division race with a time of 1:03:46. Josh Adams, on island just five weeks, took the male open division with a time of 46:31 and pen division runner Laurie Mann won her division with 53:15.

Chris Berlind, with a time of 66:10 took the male teen division. Wannetta Corder and Ola Kaluhiokalani crossed the line together in

the female teen division with Corder awarded a time of 1:30:02, one second faster than her partner.

In the youth division, the Corbett family took the wins. Ten-year-old Renee Corbett won the female division with 1:47:26 and her 8-year-old brother, Cory, at 1:49:35 took the male division.

## Stars and Stripes heads to Baghdad

WASHINGTON — Service members in Iraq will soon get more current news as The Stars and Stripes, the daily newspaper of the U.S. military abroad, begins publishing in Baghdad, Stripes officials said here.

The newspaper is establishing a second print site for its Middle East edition in Baghdad. The Baghdad plant will print 15,000 copies originally, said Stripes General Manager Max Lederer. The current print plant in Kuwait will continue to operate and produce about 10,000 copies.

The paper is free for service members in the area.

Service members in Iraq have complained of the spotty delivery of the paper. In some cases, the paper is delivered a week or two after the publication date. The problem, Stripes officials said, was in getting the edition transported from Kuwait City to the bulk mail facility at Baghdad International Airport.

The new Baghdad edition will allow service members in the capital to get same-day service. Service members in outlying areas will still receive the paper via the mail facility, but the wait should be one to two days, said Stripes Publisher

Tom Kelsch.

The Washington offices of the newspaper will beam the pages of each day's edition to Baghdad using American Forces Radio and Television Service satellites, Lederer said. The printing plant will take the pages and print them in eight-page sections through the night. Local Iraqis will stuff the various sections together. Lederer said he envisions each paper being 32 to 48 pages.

About 130,000 U.S. service members are in Iraq, as well as about 100,000 U.S. civilians. Even with a "pass-along" rate of 4-to-1, that means only 60,000 will see a newspaper. Kelsch said Stripes would like to increase the press run, but will need funding to do so. Officials are looking for the money to make that happen, he said.

Service members have been able to watch the American Forces Radio and Television Service since the beginning of the conflict. Many units carried satellite television equipment into Iraq with them in March. Now, over-the-air radio is also available. The first area to receive an AFRTS station was Talil in June. Service members in Baghdad received an FM channel in July, and those based in Mosul got one in August.

## Dinar exchange proceeds smoothly

WASHINGTON — The director of the Iraqi currency exchange for the Coalition Provisional Authority called the first day of the currency exchange in Iraq "a great success" that begins the country's move toward "sustainable economic growth."

Speaking from Baghdad, retired Army Brig. Gen. Hugh Tant reported no major incidents at more than 230 banks throughout Iraq that began replacing old dinars with the new Iraqi dinar introduced today.

Dan Senor, senior adviser to U.S. civilian administrator L. Paul

Bremer III and the Coalition Provisional Authority, told Pentagon reporters the new dinar's introduction represents "another sign that the reconstruction (of Iraq) is on track. It's another step toward major progress."

He called it "symbolic of a unified economy" because it represents the country's first national currency in more than 15 years.

The new dinar replaces two currencies in Iraq: the print dinar, used mainly in the central and southern parts of the country, and the Swiss dinar, used predominantly by the Kurds in the north.



# Class size questioned; driver's ed. plan takes turn

Kwajalein's driver's education, third grade class size and NSSE Survey summaries topped the discussion in Wednesday's School Advisory Council meeting.

Karen Amman, Kwajalein school superintendent announced at the meeting that the drivers education program is postponed, temporarily.

The contractor, who was in negotiation with the school board, did not feel that he could provide realistic driving conditions on Kwajalein, Amman said.

She did say, however, that the school system is advertising on *Monster.com* for a driving instructor, and she was confident that there would be driver's training class sometime after the first of the year, in the second semester.

In the area of the third grade

class size, both Ammann and SAC Chairman Jud McCrary addressed the issues.

According to McCrary, there are 21 students in one third grade class and 19 students in the other.

"It is more detrimental to pull them out of a class and put them in a new class," McCrary said. "We feel they are receiving quality education. It is not a problem at this time."

One of the third grade teachers will leave at the end of this week.

"There is a substitute teacher in the classroom currently who is a certificated elementary teacher," Ammann said. "The position will be in the *Hourglass* on Friday. We are also advertising in the states."

Ammann also addressed the Special Education policy rewrite.

"We are not quite ready," Ammann said.

She estimated it would be another two months before the policy would be ready for public review. It then would be open for review and comment by the community.

Other issues discussed included the NSSE Survey summaries—the surveys sent to parents last year.

According to Ammann, approximately 130 surveys were sent out with only about 40 returned. The

areas of concern were areas which score less than a three on the survey.

"We will write goals based on these," Ammann said.

There will be another survey sent out around next May, McCrary said. Hopefully more people will participate, he added.

Ammann stated a general vision screening, of all students, will take place in November, before the optometrist is scheduled to be on-island.

Steve Howell, Kwajalein Jr./Sr. high principal said report cards will be mailed out Nov. 1 and on Nov. 7 parent/teacher conferences are scheduled.

There are also some new policies for adults who coach the students.

"If they are working with kids they have to be investigated," said Howell.

Each adult-coach must pass a background check and attend the coach's workshop.

Also, student sports walk-ons are no longer allowed. Each student must sign up for the sport and they are required to attend the tryouts.

The next meeting of the SAC is Nov. 19, 7 p.m. in the elementary school music room.
