


The next season, the entire infield of Ken Boyer, Dick Groat, Julian Javier and Bill White started for the National League in the 1964 All-Star game.

In what was one of the greatest thrills of my life, I was in Sportsman's Park the day the Cardinals won the pennant on the last day of the season in 1964.

I can still hear the great Harry Carey over the public address system yelling again and again that the Cardinals win the pennant. Then against odds, they defeated the hated Yankees in the World Series.

They won the pennant and World Series again in 1967 against Boston. They won the pennant in 1968, but lost the Series to Detroit.

It was a long stretch until 1982 when



they won the pennant again and The World Series against Milwaukee. The pennant was won in 1987, but the Series was lost.

They won their division in 1996, 2000, 2001 and 2002.

Yes I have been fortunate. Some of the best players to ever set foot on a ball field have worn Cardinal uniforms. Bob Gibson, Curt Flood, Bill White, Julian Javier, Lou Brock, the McDaniel brothers, (who, if you're not a Cardinal fan, you've never heard of) Mark McGuire and many others.


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Safety tricks make Halloween a treat

Spiderman, the Hulk, fairies from Lord of the Rings movies, Barbie and small pumpkins with arms and legs are the top costume choices during the annual prowl for candy this Halloween according to state-side news reports.

Kwajalein kids may opt for other costumes including mermaid or astronauts, but no matter what the costumes are, the kids will be out in full force in the family housing area Friday, Oct. 31, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

As with trick-or-treaters, Halloween hazards to children also come in disguise, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, Washington, D.C.

Halloween-related injuries may involve eye abrasions from sharp objects, skin irritation or rash from face paint or cream and burns from flammable costumes ignited from candles or jack-o'-lanterns, as reported on the CPSC Web site.

"Halloween-related accidents occur because of poor-fitting costumes, causing either vision problems or difficulties with freedom of movement," said Kevin Dykema, Kwajalein Police Department chief. His recommendation: "Have something reflective on your child or have them carry a flashlight so they can be seen by others."

Older children should always be in groups if not accompanied by an adult, Dykema said, and he reminded parents to inspect the contents of their children's goodie bags when they get home.

By following these tips trick-or-treaters, parents and other residents all can help make sure no one is haunted by injury on Halloween.

Costumes

- Costumes, masks, beards and wigs should have the label "Flame Resistant." It means they will resist burning and should extinguish quickly if they do catch on fire.

- Costumes should fit so they don't drag on the ground.

- Shoes should fit well and be sturdy, even if they don't go with the costume. Mother's high heels are not good for safe walking.

- Masks should fit securely and have eyeholes large enough to allow full vision. Avoid wearing them

when walking from house to house.

- Costumes should be bright colored or have reflective tape.

- Props should be flexible and bend easily.

- Hats and scarves should be tied securely.

On the roads

- Drivers and bicyclists: keep a careful watch for trick-or-treaters on roadsides and crossing streets.

- Kids: carry a flashlight to see and be seen.

- Trick-or treaters: remember to walk, don't run, and don't cut across yards.

- Children: stay away from animals you don't know.

Residents

- Make sure your yard is clear of things such as ladders, hoses, dog leashes and flower pots that can trip young ones.

- Keep pets who may get frightened away from children at the door.

- Use flashlights or chemical lights instead of real candles to light pumpkins, said Mike Gabany, fire marshal. If using real candles, be sure to keep the pumpkins off of doorsteps and far away from children in their costumes.

- Accompany young children.

- Let older children know where to reach you and when to be home.

- Adult Halloween parties: leave your bikes at home.

At the Kwajalein Child Development Center, preschool-age trick-or-treaters get a chance to role-play what happens on Halloween night, said Trina Tiffany, CDC director. They practice knocking at doors and are reminded to stay with their parents, she said.

Also, it helps to show them someone putting on and taking off a scary mask. They don't wear scary costumes themselves, she said, so it helps preschoolers to see someone take one off.

The biggest issue for young children, Tiffany said, is getting sepa-

rated from the adults who accompany them.

"They get excited and they want to run from house to house. There are so many kids out, especially in new housing, so it's easy in crowded areas to get separated. They get swept up in a group," she said.

Tiffany recommends having a plan to meet at a certain corner if they get separated, or making a rule to join up at a certain place after every house.

And don't forget pets on Halloween. It can be a scary time for them, and their behavior might be affected by the strange creatures appearing at their doors.

Pets

- Pets should be put in a back room so they don't run out the front door, said Margaret Morrison, Veterinary tech. Make sure the pets have their ID on just in case.

- Candy is for people, not pets. Chocolate, in particular, is dangerous for pets. "Chocolate is toxic for dogs," she said. "If a dog does get some chocolate, vomiting should be induced using two teaspoons of hydrogen peroxide."

If no results after twenty minutes, the treatment can be repeated two times more, she added.

Ilomej or funeral remains a traditional event

Editor's Note: This is the last article of a four-part series about the customs surrounding major events in Marshallese life starting with the the first birthday or *kemem* on Oct. 3. In subsequent Friday issues, *The Hourglass* examined the graduation ceremony or *kadiwojlo* and then the wedding or *mare customs*.

The Marshallese funeral process has five stages, *emmej*, *ilomej*, *kallip*, *añak* and *eorāak* with each phase holding a special meaning in the Marshallese heritage.

To the Marshallese, preserving family relationships is one of the most important elements in their culture. Death brings families together in a time of sorrow.

Jitdam begins the process of getting to know extended family members and a time of healing old wounds.

During the funeral process, Marshallese build on family relationships or *jitdam*, said Romeo Alfred, KRS training specialist. People come together during death, he added. During the funeral process, they also lay to rest all hard feelings and wrongs.

Family members learn about their extended family and proper etiquette during the funeral cer-



emony, Claire Henry said.

She added the common thread throughout the entire funeral ceremony, family and *jitdam*.

In the first stages of the funeral process, the women family members bathe the deceased body. After the women bathe the deceased, Henry said, they then rub the deceased with oil mixed with special herbs, but only unprocessed coconut oil, baked in the sun, she added.

According to Alfred, the next stage of the funeral process, the *emmej* — the process of staying awake and staying with the deceased 24-hours a day, from the time of death, through viewing and until the actual burial — falls on the family members.

In the old ways, the family believed the spirit stayed with the body until burial, Alfred said. The family members wanted to be close to the deceased's spirit.

Alfred said, the *emmej* could go on for weeks depending on where relatives are coming from. The Marshallese custom dictates that they wait for all the relatives who want to attend the funeral, to arrive. He added, family members are obligated to wait.

"They will take turns, [staying up]," Alfred said. "But there will always be family around [the deceased]."

Other family members provide those who participate in the *emmej* with food and refreshment until the end of the *emmej*.

The preparations for viewing or *ilomej*, happen only after all the family has arrived.

Before the *ilomej* the women dress the deceased in burial clothes, a nice suit or dress, and a white sheet or cloth, decorated with black embroidery, Henry said. The embroidery usually says *ilo ememej*, which means "in remembrance", and then the persons name, she added.

According to Henry, only the women of the family wash and dress the deceased.

Ilomej takes place at the deceased's home or a family member's home and last for about two days, said Alfred. Groups come to the *ilomej* to pay respect to the deceased.

The groups who come to the viewing have something in common with the deceased such as, they come from the same island as the deceased, former classmates, baseball team, relatives on the mother's side or relatives on father's side, according to Alfred. Members of the group enter together, place a dollar or bar of soap next to the casket and then one spokesperson from the group explains their relationship to the deceased, he added.

"Soap is the symbol of forgiveness," Alfred said.

Alfred explained, the soap symbolizes the washing away of any

"He is a role model for these kids," said Stephen Notarianni, Host Nation officer. Although there are over 200 Marshallese in the Army and other military services, "this is the first time that a Marshallese has come to Kwajalein and Ebeye in uniform," he said.

Prior to Oct. 1, the Marshall Islands was part of Guam's recruiting territory and previous recruiters were not Marshallese. Due to the U.S. Embassy in Majuro's intervention, Army recruiting was taken over by the Hawaii recruiting center, Notarianni said.

Kaneko spoke to interested students at Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School Tuesday afternoon and to students on Ebeye Tuesday evening.

wrong or hard feelings between the group and the deceased. The dollar helps the family with the expense of the funeral.

According to Henry, larger family groups bring bags of sugar, flour and rice to help the family during the funeral process.

The appointed spokesperson from the group then gives a short speech, about the deceased. The family members thank the group for their visit, and then gives the group refreshments.

One by one, each group enters and repeats the same process.

At the end of the *ilomej* comes the *kallip* or actual burial of the deceased.

The *alap* or landowner provides the burial plot.

During the *kallip*, the mother's side of the family gives a speech as does the father's side and the *alap*.

If the person died from unnatural causes, the young children of the deceased, including the nieces and nephews of the deceased, walk under the casket.

They walk under the casket to protect them from the deceased's spirit, Henry said. It keeps the young children protected from the

deceased's spirit and from taking the children's spirit with him or her into death, she added.

The *iroij* or traditional leader gives the final speech before burial. Marshallese consider the *iroij's* speech, a final blessing.

Then after the casket has been lowered, all the belongings from the funeral ceremony go into the grave with the deceased, like the rug, which the casket rested on during viewing, clothes, all the items used to bath and oil the deceased, Henry said.

White rocks or coral cover the grave, she added.

During the next stage of the funeral process, the *anak*, close relatives and friends actually live in or around the deceased's home for three days, Alfred said.

According to Henry, close relatives, in her family, like a husband or wife of the deceased, must continue the *anak* for three months.

The Marshallese believe the spirit stays in or around their home until the final gathering or the *eorāāk*, she added.

Marshallese also believe during the *anak*, they can be with the deceased's spirit until it departs forever, Alfred said.

The final phase of the funeral process or the *eorāāk* means to lay out, like spreading out a blanket, Henry explained.

Marshallese use this time to lay out all wrongs, differences and hard feelings, which have come up during the funeral process.

During this phase, all the family and friends again gather at the gravesite to hear speeches by the family leader, the *alap* and the *iroij*.

They also take this time to thank other family members and friends for their support and to thank the *alap* and the *iroij* for the land and blessings.

The family then gives out gifts of towels and soap, symbolic of forgiveness, to those in attendance of the *eorāāk*. The family also gives food and refreshments to the people who attend the *eorāāk*. This way the family has a chance to give something back to the community, for everything they received during the funeral process, Alfred said.

When all the ceremonies are completed family members typically do not visit the gravesite again, Alfred said. The *alap* takes on the responsibility for keeping the gravesites clean and maintained.

Hispanic heroes of U.S. wars honored

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Hispanic heroes of the past and present were honored during an Oct. 16 welcome reception for the Defense Department's National Hispanic American Heritage Month observance at the Hyatt Regency Orange County Hotel here.

In addition to the DoD summit and the HACU technical assistance workshop, DoD also hosted a program and two student career fairs and expositions — one for high school students and the other for college-level students.

The Air Force kicked off the two-day observance by honoring past and present Hispanic military heroes, including the Aztec Eagles — Mexican fighter pilots of Squadron 201— and Hispanics returning from Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. Hispanic veterans of the Korean, Vietnam and Persian Gulf wars also were recognized.

More than 300 Aztec Eagles, who were attached to the Army Air Forces, played a pivotal role in defeating the Japanese war machine in the Philippines during World War II.

"Only 10 of us are still alive, and only two pilots and one member of the ground crew are here," said a former Aztec Eagles pilot, retired Mexican air force Col. Carlos Guarduno. He was accompanied by a fellow Aztec pilot, World War II Capt. Miguel Moreno Arreolla, and ground crewman former Capt. Manuel Cervantes Ramos.

Also honored were World War II Army Air Forces pilot Lt. Col. Henry Cervantes and a Korean War hero and former enlisted man, retired Army Maj. Gen. Gustavo "Gus" Hernandez.

"As in previous conflicts and wars, Hispanics have contributed to our national security and defense with distinction and honor," said Shirley Martinez, deputy assistant secretary of the Air Force for equal opportunity, as she introduced 10 Hispanic veterans of the war in Iraq, including two Coast Guardsmen.

"Operation Enduring Freedom and the war in Iraq posed new challenges to our national security, and have been opportunities for Hispanics to fight and defend our country."

The event was hosted by Michael L. Dominquez, assistant secretary of the Air Force for manpower and reserve affairs.

Charles Abell, principal deputy undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness, told the gathering in welcoming remarks that the events are important for DoD in many ways.

"They represent our continued effort to link educational events with student career fairs and a special observance program, and to do all those things outside the Pentagon," said Abell, who presented the two Aztec Eagles and the ground crewman a coin in recognition of their contributions in support of the United States and its allies during World War II.

Abell said such events are important because even though the Hispanic population in the U.S. increased by 58 percent from 1990 to 2000, most Americans don't know much about the more than 460-year history of Hispanics in North America, or about their contributions to the nation's culture.

"Perhaps that deficiency is due to the fact that the national Hispanic population is clustered; half live in California and Texas, and 76 percent live in the west and south," the secretary noted. "Or perhaps it's because the role of Hispanics is rarely or poorly covered in most textbooks used in our nation's schools.

"No matter what the reason," he continued, "that's why joint events like this are so important -- to educate all our citizens regarding the

contributions of Hispanics to our nation's history and its defense, as well as to inform each of us about contemporary issues of concern to Hispanics."

He pointed out that since the nation's founding, Hispanics have played important roles in its defense, many making the ultimate sacrifice of their lives in the process.

For example, Abell said, Bernardo de Galvez, governor of the Spanish colony of Louisiana, captured the important ports of Mobile and Pensacola from the British in 1780-1781, thereby greatly aiding the cause of the American Revolution.

Nearly 10,000 Mexican Americans fought to preserve the Union during the Civil War, and between 250,000 and 500,000 Hispanics served in the armed forces during World War II, Abell said. "Twelve were awarded the Medal of Honor," he noted. "In three years of service, the 65th Infantry Regiment from Puerto Rico participated in nine major campaigns, earning two Presidential Unit Citations, a Meritorious Unit Commendation and two Republic of Korea Unit Citations. Individual members of the unit received four Distinguished Service Crosses and 124 Silver Stars for heroism.

"Hispanics gallantly contributed during the war in Vietnam and 14 received the Medal of Honor," Abell continued. "Hispanic Americans have continued to proudly serve in all our post-Vietnam deployments and conflicts, including Afghanistan and Iraq today."

Aztec Eagles helped U.S. war

ANAHEIM, Calif. — The more than 300 Mexicans who volunteered to help the United States kick the Japanese out of the Pacific islands during World War II are slowing passing on. Only 10 of them are still around.

Only three of them — two combat pilots and one ground crew member — were well enough to travel here from Mexico to be honored for their contributions by the Defense Department on Oct. 16 and 17. They were former “Aztec Eagles” pilots, retired Mexican air force Col. Carlos Garduno and Capt. Miguel Moreno Arreola, and ground crewman former Capt. Manuel Cervantes Ramos.

“Only 10 of us are still alive,” Garduno said sadly during an interview at the Hyatt Regency Orange County Hotel here during DoD’s Hispanic American Heritage Month observance.


The Mexican war hero said the Mexican Fighter Squadron 201, “El Escuadron 201,” was composed of more than 300 volunteers — 36 experienced pilots and the rest ground crewmen. The Aztec Eagles were attached to the U.S. Army Air

Forces 5th Air Force’s 58th Fighter Group during the liberation of the main Philippine island of Luzon in the summer of 1945. The pilots flew P-47D “Thunderbolt” single-seat fighter aircraft carrying out tactical air support missions.

This marked the first time Mexican troops were trained for overseas combat. The “Aztec Eagles” flew 59 combat missions, totaling more than 1,290 hours of flight time. They participated in the Allied effort to bomb Luzon and Formosa (now Taiwan) to push the Japanese out of those islands.

Garduno said the cooperation between Mexico and the United States in World War II “to go fight and help the Allied countries was very important.

“As small as Mexico’s contribution was compared to the big nations, it was very significant,” he said. “We’re trying to convince the people that regardless of past conflicts we had with the United States, the important thing is to be together (as we were) in the Second World War. Unity, cooperation and integrity for our beliefs in freedom are the important thing. We won the war, but we still want to be winning the peace that we’ve had since then.”





Experimentation with drugs forces wake-up call

Prescription drugs can be as dangerous and addictive as marijuana, heroin and cocaine, and are more available on Kwajalein, according to officials.

On Oct. 12, Kwajalein police identified four youths involved in experimentation with prescription drugs, after one youth checked into the hospital, according to Lt. Moses Moreno, KPD investigator.

"We did a welfare check on the others," he said, leading police to conclude that the group had experimented with the drugs for "an undetermined amount of time. For some it might have been the first time, and for others, they might have been experimenting for some time. We don't know."

Moreno said police believe the case was isolated, and did not indicate any extensive ring or connection to the sale or distribution of other controlled or illegal drugs.

The case is still under investigation, he added, but prescription drugs - controlled substances, but legal under doctor's supervision - present as much danger as their illicit counterparts, said Dr. Eric Lindborg, Kwajalein Hospital's chief medical officer.

"[Prescription drugs] can be useful if used in accordance with an appropriate diagnosis and appropriate dosage for a given problem," Lindborg said. "When used outside a doctor's oversight, they can be every bit as dangerous as illicit drugs."

Abuse of prescription drugs has even made stateside headlines recently with radio personality Rush

Limbaugh disclosing his addiction to prescription painkillers.

According to the government's National Survey on Drug Use and Health, "An estimated 6.2 million persons, or 2.6 percent of the population aged 12 or older, were current users of psychotherapeutic drugs taken nonmedically. An estimated 4.4 million used pain relievers, 1.8 million used tranquilizers, 1.2 million used stimulants and 0.4 million used sedatives."

Lindborg said he hasn't seen any trend toward more or less usage of prescription drugs locally, and added doctors must monitor the quantity, duration and dosage levels of potentially habit-forming medications.

Abusing prescription drugs can have negative legal effects as well. Generally, on-island, working adults fall under their company's drug policies, while military members fall under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Youth cases on-island gen-

erally go before the Juvenile Review Board. Cases termed as "serious incidents," which include most major felonies, can be referred to the military's criminal investigative division in Honolulu, Moreno said.

Kwajalein schools have responded to the events with a Tuesday night meeting on the topic, to be held from 7 to 8 p.m. at the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room in Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School.

"I think it's a bit of a wake-up call, and we need to take a look at it," said Bob Ammann, Kwajalein schools guidance counselor.

Ammann will moderate the discussion and Lindborg and KPD Cpl. Jody Munson, who serves as the D.A.R.E. officer, will sit on a panel. Each panel member will make a few comments before Ammann opens the discussion to the audience.

"We all think of this as a safe island, and in some cases, it's not," Ammann said.
