## pay tribute to comrades; inspire island outpouring

Marine Raiders, accompanied by family and friends, arrived on Kwajalein Saturday for a weekend of events honoring veterans.

For some Marines this was the final chapter of a story that started 61 years ago, with a raid on Makin Atoll.

One-by-one, they came down the ramp and crossed the tarmac. Residents broke out in applause as each member of the Raider party entered the terminal.

Looks on their aged faces ranged from sadness to joy. They had come to pay tribute to their missing and fallen comrades and dedicate a monument to nine Raiders captured on Makin and executed on Kwajalein.

### Introductions

The Raiders first attended an island orientation and a welcome dinner Saturday night, hosted by Col. Jerry Brown at the Yokwe Yuk Club.

Brown gave an introduction speech and praised the 11 on-island former Marines, who fielded a color guard and hosted a Marine Birthday Ball to be held the following Monday night.

He ended his speech with a "Semper Paratus" and "Hooah," a tribute to the Marines.

### Finding familiar sights on Roi-Namur

Sunday, the Raiders toured the Roi-Namur battlefield where other Marines, not the Raiders, landed

U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command historians Dr. James Walker and Dr. Lewis Bernstein gave the tour outlining the Marine attack and points-of-interest.

As the bus drove around and stopped at ruins along the battlefield, the Marines took in the sights through the eyes of experience with

the same kind of terrain, bunkers and destruction.

"It is like a park on Roi-Namur. There was none of that jungle brush, which tears your clothes," Meecham said.

On viewing the pristine lagoon beach, normally described by visitors as "a paradise," one Marine was heard saying, "This is a hell of a lot of beach to cross."

Raiders stated how impressed they were with Roi.


"It is more than I expected," McCullough said. "Roi was interesting. I got a lot of good pictures."

"I thought it [Roi] was beautiful," Raider Milton Horton said. "It is a gorgeous island."

### Having a ball on the 228th Marine birthday

Monday night was filled with pageantry and protocol at the 228th Marine Corps Ball.

Raiders and guests filed into the CRC gym, redecorated for the event with hanging linens along the ceiling, Raider posters and pictures on the walls

Following a march-in by the Marine Corps color guard, Donna Groth, a Marine from 1982 to 1989, opened the event by reading the first birthday ball message given by then-commandant Maj. Gen. John A. Lejeune.

As is custom, she then read a birthday message from the current commandant Gen. Michael Hagee.

Col. Michael Daily, director of Public Affairs for U.S. Marine Forces Pacific, and guest speaker for the event, tied the past to the present, by comparing the Raiders' special operations-style used during World War II to the fighting style employed today in the war on terror.

"It's a Raider war," he said. "Raiders, we understand the lessons you taught us."

He noted the Raiders' values of "gung ho," or working together, and "intense training," particularly in hand-to-hand combat. New directives, in fact, require Marines to learn basic martial arts and officers to attain belts in those disciplines. Daily remembers his most recent training.

"When we took our breaks, we'd sit in circles and talk about the Raiders, telling stories of our roots," he said.

Meecham, president of the Marine Raider Association, addressed the "Gung Ho" philosophy too.

"Put simply, it means looking out for the man on your right and on your left," Meecham said. "This was pierced into our soul and remains

with us today."

Following tradition, the oldest Marine present, who was George McRae at 86, took the first bite of cake and then passed it to the youngest Marine, Joanna Bucknam, a 27-year-old Kwajalein resident who served in the Corps from 1997-2001.

Many Raiders commented how they felt honored by the display of respect and warmth.

Horton had never attended a Marine Ball and described the event as, "fantastic."

Meecham said this was his second ball, and he couldn't believe only 11 Marines put together such a wonderful event.

### **Makin monument dedication Ceremony**

In 1993, Jack Miller, U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command visual information team lead, started a project to dedicate a monument to nine Marines beheaded on Kwajalein. On Tuesday, he realized his hard work with the formal unveiling of the Makin Raiders Monument at the flag pole during the Veterans Day ceremony.

Miller said he has anticipated this day for 10 years.

The ceremony kicked off with the national anthems of the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the United States, followed by remarks from Brown.

Brown thanked the veterans who live on Kwajalein Atoll, calling them, "the backbone of the island."

He then recognized Bob Hope, who died this year at 100. Hope, "a soldier, sailor, airman and Marine" entertained troops from World War II through the Gulf War, and even performed at Kwajalein's Richardson Theater in 1945.

Finally, Brown addressed the Raiders, describing their visit as, "an honor."

Next, Gerald Zackios, RMI foreign minister, addressed the Raiders, particularly the nine who died on Kwajalein.

"The Marshallese people will be eternally grateful for the sacrifice they made to ensure that democracy and freedom remains in the Republic of the Marshall Islands," he said.

In his last week of active duty, Lt. Gen. Joseph M. Cosumano Jr., commanding general for the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, returned to Kwajalein for the event he helped bring about since taking over SMDC in 2001.

He reflected on the kind of values held by service members today and those of the past, represented by the Raiders present.

"What do they have in common? They [Raiders] were, in fact, common people from all over the United States ... They were common people with uncommon valor ... They became part of something bigger than they were."

Cosumano continued by describ-

ing his recent visit with troops serving presently in Iraq.

"What were they doing this all for? They were doing it for each other," he said.

Horton described the dedication as "extremely moving."

"I was not completely prepared," Horton said. "It dug a little deeper than I thought."

Horton referenced Sgts. Robert Allard and Dallas Cook, both lost at Makin, and possibly beheaded on Kwajalein.

"The two sergeants were two of the best sergeants I ever ran into," he said.

Meecham agreed, "That made one get watery eyed. I choked up."

In Meecham's speech, following Cosumano, he said, "Could it be that the location of the remains of the nine young Raiders, who were brought to this island, as prisoners of war, only to be murdered by beheading, will be known only to their God?"

He added, "You were and still a part of us. You were and always will be Marine Raiders. Semper Fidelis. May you rest in peace."

Following the ceremony, the American Legion Post 44 hosted a shrimp boil in the Raiders' honor, presenting each with glass and pins, while each Raider also received a commanding general's coin.

## JPAC continues search for lost Marines

Though the monument to nine Marines beheaded on Kwajalein stands dedicated at the flag poles, the search for the men's remains continues, according to Bradley Sturm, an archaeologist with the Joint Personnel (POW/MIA) Accounting Command.

"At this point there are no new concrete leads," Sturm said, but added he would recommend to his command that the group begin at square one and send out a team of investigators to interview potential witnesses who might know something about the possible location of the nine Marines and a B-24 bomber crew, also presumably lost on Kwajalein.

Sturm led the expedition that uncovered the remains of 19 Raiders at Butaritari Island, Makin Atoll in December 1999.

Sturm said they uncovered an islander in the first trench, but the second trench yielded military equipment and more human remains. He was unsure he had located the Raiders until the third day, when he was able to identify Caucasian features among the bones and remove the helmets from the earth and identify them as American "steel pots."

"When I realized we had them it was the highest point of my career," said Sturm, an archaeologist with 25 years of experience.

"What an indescribable honor," Sturm added in a speech during the Veterans Day ceremony. Later that night, he "felt as if I was not the only one that might be happy to be going home."

Since then, Sturm attended the burial for 16 of the Raiders at Arlington National Cemetery, and has developed a relation-

# Kwajalein visit brings back memories of war

For many Marine Raiders, revisiting Kwajalein sparked memories of other battles. For those who had never been to Kwajalein, just the Pacific island atmosphere brought back memories. Here are just a few:

## Brian Quirk

Kwajalein is civilized now, Makin Raider, Brian Quirk said. It was very primitive then.

"The hospitality of the Kwajalein people transcends all else," Quirk said.

In 1944, we laid over for four hours, drinking beer and playing ball here, Quirk said, but they were mainly drinking beer.

Quirk was one of the 222 Marine Raiders who stormed the beaches of Makin Island in 1942 under the command of Lt. Col. Evans Carlson.

Norm and Debbie Black, residents of Kwajalein, sponsored Quirk.

Quirk said, "The Blacks treated me like I am someone special and I am not."

He admitted, "I have been dealt a good hand."

He now has a loving wife of 60 years and seven children, Quirk said.

## Dr. Ervin Kaplan

It was a long flight, Dr. Ervin Kaplan said, but it was easier to get here on a plane than an outrigger canoe.

Kaplan was a 2nd Battalion Marine Raider, who took part in the Long Patrol on Guadalcanal.

Kaplan said he came on this trip, to Kwajalein, as a Marine Raider and as a tribute to the men executed on Kwajalein.

This trip to Kwajalein brought back his memories of serving as a Raider during the Long Patrol at Aola Bay, he said.

Kaplan said 266 men were in the Marine Raider B and C Company and about 3,000 Japanese held the mouth of the river. In 1942, they attacked the East-West trail, a Japanese strong hold, he added.

Kaplan said they knocked out the "Pistol Pete," a gun which the Japanese used to shell American troops.

After the assault, 16 Marines died and the Japanese officially lost 415, according to Kaplan.

He recalled eating only one meal a day while on the Long Patrol. The only food they carried with them was some salt pork, sugar, dry rice and raisins, he said. They could not carry C-rations because it was in a can and that was too heavy, and K-rations didn't exist yet, Kaplan added.

He cooked in his helmet. He rendered the salt pork and cooked it with the rice and river water, then added sugar and raisins to it, Kaplan said.

"That was our meal," Kaplan said. "When we finished the mission we looked like pale ghosts," he added. "We were a skinny beat up bunch, but we accomplished the goal."

Kaplan returned to the 1998 Guadalcanal dedication ceremony.

"It was quite a change from sleeping in a hole in the ground to an 18x18 square foot room, in a hotel," he said.

## Mel Heckt

Marine Raider Mel Heckt said his memory of Kwajalein is vague.

"They tell me I was here but I don't remember it," Heckt said. "We were on one of the islands here. It was much more desolate [than now]. They gave us two cans of beer and that was our R and R."

This was after he had spent two months on a landing craft.

Hecht said, "I am so happy to have made this trip. We are grateful for what the Army has done."

He said the people here have been so warm and friendly, he really enjoyed his trip.

"It meant a great deal to me to make this trip to eulogize and memorialize the lives of the nine Makin Raiders who were beheaded here by Japanese Vice Admiral Koso Abe. Thank God he got his," Heckt said as his eyes watered-up. "It brings a partial closure."

"We have been working hard to bring the four Raider Battalions together," Heckt said.

He added Lt. Col. Harry B. Liverledge, Lt. Col. Evans Carlson and Maj. James Roosevelt were all good leaders.

Heckt recalled when he was with the Raider replacement training unit he was in two movies, Gung Ho and Marine Raiders.

His job in Gung Ho was to run and hit the barbed wire fence and

then everyone would run over his back.

A young actor, lying on the fence next to him, cut his finger. According to Heckt the actor received immediate medical attention while Heckt said, "I was bleeding like a stuck hog."

He added that was part of being a Raider.

Heckt also played a small part in the Marine Raiders movie where he was part of a detachment landing on the beach, in a rubber raft.

At 81, Heckt is still a practicing attorney. He deals with estate planning and wills.

Heckt has a mentally challenged child, and he helps other families plan their estates to care for their mentally challenged children.

Heckt said, "I can't retire. My wife won't let me come home for lunch."

## Kenneth [Mac] McCullough

Kenneth [Mac] McCullough, Marine Raider, said Kwajalein reminded him of a vacation resort. Everything is so neat and the people are so wonderful, he added.

He added, "The last Marine Ball I attended was in 1948."

## Chuck Meecham

Chuck Meecham, president of the United States Marine Raiders Association, and former Marine Raider, was on Kwajalein during the war.

"It was my first airplane ride in route from Guam to Okinawa," Meecham said. "We landed [on Kwajalein], blew out a tire and almost creamed that thing [the plane]. We were in that tin can [plane] until they finally got it jacked up and the tire fixed."

They were on the tarmac, in the hot sun for about an hour.

He added, "I didn't know where I was."

When he stepped off the plane last Saturday Meecham said, "I am impressed with the golf type atmosphere."

"We trained hard together. We fought hard together. There is a certain kinship between us, once a Marine always a Marine. Don't tread on us," Meecham said.

## Jack Freeling

Raider Jack Freeling said, the people here on Kwajalein reminded him of the Marine Raiders. They are so caring and loyal. It is just like being with family.

# Raider tells of three-man teams and airfield strike

While laying in the Kwajalein hospital this last Tuesday, Marine Raider Milton Horton's memory went back to the two days spent on Makin Island in 1942.

Horton joined the Marines on Dec. 31, 1941, at 20 years old, but he said "I got much older faster."

According to Horton, when Lt. Col. Evans Carlson made his pitch, about Marine Raiders to a room full of young Marines, he thought, "Who wouldn't want to join that organization."

Horton said Carlson asked the Marines if they could march 50 miles a day, "and we did," Horton added.

"You wanted to be in his organization because it was going to be a good one," Horton said.

Horton recalled the raid on Makin Island, and when the Marines left the subs, Horton said they were hit with 20-foot waves which would toss the rafts right back at the subs.

The waves swept some of the Marines out of the rafts. He was one of those men.

"I cut off my gear," Horton said. But, even with his gear gone he was still sinking.

He then cut off his boot laces and kicked off his boots.

"I came up then and hit the bottom of the boat," Horton said.

He said he kept hitting the bottom

of the boat and bouncing off, when someone reached into the water and grabbed him by the shirt collar and pulled him on board.

He was back in the same seat he had been swept from.

When they reached Makin, Horton said there was a plan to fight in three-man groups. He carried the Thompson machine gun for his group.

"It was a wonderful way to do it [fight]," Horton said.

"We had a plan laid out," Horton said. "We were just following the plan."

After they had taken control of the island, Carlson gave out duty assignments.

Horton said Carlson ordered him and Earling "Saki" Matson to burn the stockpiled aviation fuel.

"I was told it looked like we were burning the island down," Horton said. "I didn't see it; I ran."

He says he didn't care about being barefoot, all he could think of was, "All that airplane gasoline and all those airplanes didn't fly against us or anyone else again."

After two days they left on the lagoon side of the island and rowed out to the waiting subs.

"I was in an oversized row boat, after dark," Horton added. "On the lagoon side it was real nice. We didn't have any trouble at all," he added.

When they arrived back in Honolulu Horton said they had a band playing, an honor guard on the dock and Adm. Chester Nimitz to greet them, Horton said.

"That was a good welcome," he added. "A returning soldier's welcome, but we just did our job."

Horton said he has no doubts about joining the Marines.

"I am proud to be a Marine and proud to be a Marine Raider," he added.

ship with the Makin Raiders.

"The connection is tremendous," he said after the ceremony.

Meanwhile, a team from then-Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii, mounted an expedition to locate the remains of the nine missing Makin Raiders executed on Kwajalein. After three months of work in 2001, they're search proved fruitless.

"The people at CILHI are the best in the world at the job they do," said Charles Meecham, Marine Raider Association president. "They literally became part of our Raider family and were greatly disappointed, as were we, when their search here on Kwajalein proved fruitless. It was a personal loss for them after being so successful with the Makin Island recovery."

In fact, at Makin, investigators had the help of an islander who, after some time, remembered the burial site.

# On-island Marines demonstrate motto with plans

The 228th Marine Birthday Ball held last Monday night was a combined effort of seven on-island former Marines and many supportive Kwajalein residents.

Donna Groth, aviation terminal supervisor and former Marine, said the idea of the birthday ball and color guard started last March, when she found out the WWII Marine Raiders would be on island for the dedication of the Marine Raider monument.

Groth said Col. Jerry Brown suggested the ball idea.

"We were all gung ho," she added.

She said she got together with the on-island Marines and they talked over what part they would play in welcoming the Raiders and the ball.

According to Groth, they did a lot of research into the traditions and protocol for the color guard and the traditions for the ball, such as the cake-cutting ceremony.

The first order of business was to design the commemorative coin.

Groth worked with Denise Morrow and Connie Southwell on the design of the coin.

They came up with the idea to put the Marine Raider information on one side of the coin and then combine a map of the Kwajalein Atoll and the Marine birthday information on the other.

They had the coin minted at Northwest Territorial Mint at a cost of around \$10 each, according to Groth.

Groth said they worked on the ball decorations and their uniforms for the next few months.

Four of the participating Marines had to buy new uniforms, but each Marine had to buy something for their ball uniform. All seven also had to buy the khaki shirts worn at the monument dedication ceremony, Groth added.

Ann Elise Peterson did all the uniform tailoring, Groth said.

"She did a phenomenal job," Groth added. She not only did the tailoring, but also made sure all the patches were in the right spot. At one point she was working on six of the uniforms.

Groth called the time about eight weeks before the ball, "Time to get down to the nitty gritty."

The group started practicing their drills for the color guard and ball twice a week.

The Marines lost around 100 pounds of combined weight, she said.

"We wanted to look good," Groth said. "The last week we practiced everyday."

According to Groth, "I don't think you will find any person from any other branch of the service that is prouder than a Marine."

She said they did it for the motto *Semper Fidelis*, or always faithful.

Groth said she didn't feel the heat when the Marine Color Guard was on the tarmac, during the Raiders arrival.

"You just swell with the pride. They [Raiders] were there," she said.

The weekend before the birthday ball Debbie Thomas, Brenda Panton, Denise Morrow, Rusty LaRoche and Groth spent 31 hours decorating the CRC room. They received help on and off by several other people, said Groth.

They would work until late at night then get up and start all over again.

In the beginning, they had a problem finding the right place for the ball.

It was going to be at the Yokew Yuk. Then they looked at the MP room and wound up at the CRC, Groth said. It gave them the space needed for the color guard and the ceremony, she said.

Groth said, "The Marine Corps is

very steeped in their traditions."

For example, in the cake-cutting ceremony, the oldest Marine receives the first piece of cake out of respect and time in grade. The youngest Marine receives cake as a way of bringing on the new guy, said Groth.

Since they had an honorary guest, Col. Michael N. Daily, U.S. Marine Corps director of public affairs, U.S. Marine Forces Pacific, received the first piece of cake. The second went to the oldest Marine, George MacRae, and Joanna Bucknam, the youngest Marine, received a piece, as well.

"It was an honor to be in the cake cutting ceremony with the oldest Marine, a Marine Raider." Bucknam said.

According to Groth, if there had not been an honorary guest just the oldest and youngest Marine would have received cake.

Groth said she has attended four Marine birthday balls but, "this is the first one I had to organize."

Each of the seven participating Marines financed the ball, Groth said. It was around \$6,000 for everything.

Groth said everyone did an outstanding job and she was very pleased at the results.

The color guard for the ball was, including their rank from their time in the Corps, Chief Warrant Officer Lou Kubik; Sgt. Steve Fuchs; Gunner Sgt. Moses Moreno; Sgt. Bucknam; Sgt. Travis McDiffett; Sgt. Damon Brown and Staff Sgt. Groth.

# Granddaughter represents Raiders commander

Loving is the granddaughter of Marine Brig. Gen. Evans F. Carlson, and the daughter of Marine Col. Evans C. Carlson.

Brig. Gen. Carlson, then a Lt. Col., commanded the 2nd Marine Raider Battalion from Feb. 19, 1942

through March 21, 1943. He led the Makin raid, along with several other combat missions.

Carlson then went on to become operations officer for the 4th Marine Division and landed on Tarawa. He participated in the Kwajalein and Saipan assaults, too. He died in 1947.

Loving said she quit her job as a realtor three years ago, to devote her time to write a book about her grandfather and the Marine Raiders.

"My grandfather's story needed to be told," Loving said. "The Raiders who have gone before us are helping. Each one of these men has a story."

She added, "I have walked away from my career to work on this."

Loving said, "The heart of his story and the birth of the Raiders is in China."

She traveled to the Republic of China twice, tracing her grandfather's career. He was a military advisor at the Taihang Base in 1937-38.

Loving traveled to Kwajalein to participate in the Makin Raider monument dedication, Tuesday.

She said she was moved by all the hospitality here on Kwajalein and added, "I was so struck by the beauty and the horror which have taken place here [Kwajalein]," Loving said. "It is a lot to take in."

Loving said she does not, however, have a sense of closure from the Makin monument dedication ceremony.

"I think they [the missing Raiders] will be found. It may not be in these men's [visiting Raiders] lives, but it will happen," she added. "I can't remember when I have seen them [visiting Raiders] so happy."

Loving's father served under his father on Guadalcanal and earned the Silver Star in the battle of Asamana.

Loving's father went on to become a fighter pilot and fought in the Korean conflict.



# Two Raiders recount the Makin Atoll raid

It was two days in history for the Marine Raiders, who stormed the beaches of Makin Island, in 1942.

Kenneth "Mac" McCullough, and Brian Quirk were two of the 222 Marine Raiders who remembered what it was like to be on Makin Island, during the raid.

"They [Japanese] had no chance with us," Quirk said.

McCullough said all the Marines knew where they had to go and what they had to do, once they landed on Makin Island.

"We had dummy runs in Honolulu," said Quirk. "We trained for 10 days."

McCullough explained when they left the subs for Makin Island, they faced 10-15 foot waves and a coral reef before getting to the beach.

"We knew where we had to go," McCullough said.

Both McCullough and Quirk said weather and acts of God played a part in the original planned raid on Makin.

The raid hinged on catching the Japanese sleeping. All that changed, according to Quirk

"There was a shot fired upon landing," Quirk said. "If it hadn't been for our training each one of us had, we would have been in trouble. Some of the squads were hit hard," he added.

The shot woke the Japanese and instead of a surprise invasion the Japanese came to them.

Quirk said he was lying on the beach, after the landing and thought, "They can hear that [the shot] in Tokyo."

Quirk said he laid on the beach with his feet in the water he remem-

bered looking at his feet and thinking, "I wonder if I am ever going to get the hell of this island."

McCullough said the battle was over around noon and the Raiders had 10 or 11 wounded.

According to McCullough, two Japanese planes strafed the Marine's rubber rafts and the subs as the Marines attempted to get back.

"We were all washed back to the same place [on the beach]," McCullough said.

There wasn't much to do until they could make another attempt to get to the subs, McCullough said. They had four rubber boats left, he added.

According to McCullough, the intelligence officer and the other four communications officers died the first morning. He was the only communications officer left.

Mac recalls Lt. Col. Evans Carlson saying to him, "Stick close to me Mac."

"His [Lt. Col. Carlson] outsidies were always calm," McCullough said. "I don't know what his insides were doing. He was a very unexcitable man."

McCullough said around dusk that night Carlson decided the only way to get the remaining Marines off Makin was to have the subs meet them on the lagoon side of the island. He instructed McCullough to signal the subs with the change of plan.

"I was in this coconut tree," McCullough said. "I was signaling the subs."

He was trying to tell the subs of Carlson's plan using a military issue flashlight. All the radios were destroyed, he added.

"I asked them [the subs] to come to the lagoon side around 7 p.m.," McCullough said. "They kept signaling back one word, 'Who.'"

McCullough said he just kept signaling the subs and they kept signaling back, "Who."

McCullough told Carlson what the sub was saying and Carlson gave McCullough the code word. Then he was able to complete his message to the subs.

The subs were just verifying who was signaling them, McCullough said. He added once they were on the subs they did not know who got on which sub.

"We couldn't break radio silence to check on the other sub," he added.

When we got to Honolulu there was "brass knee deep" on the dock, Quirk said. They said the raid had been a success, he added.
