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

Work candles violate regs, put people at risk

Decorative candles can not only be hazardous, but also can be a violation of KRS regulations.

“It is trendy to burn candles,” said Mike Gabany, assistant chief of Fire Prevention. “I do not like candles. Many fires involve candles.”

He said many of the decorative candles sold on island with flowers, twigs and other items embedded in them present unseen dangers. The candle burns down and then the items embedded in the candle ignite.

In one recent case, a resident purchased a candle with dried plants and sticks and, when the candle burned down, the com-

bustible material in the candle ignited and filled the home with black smoke.

“This was a near miss,” he said.

According to Gabany, decorative candles are intended more to decorate than to actually burn.

Macy’s offers a National Fire



Prevention Association brochure on candle safety next to the display of decorative candles, Gabany said.

Gabany said he has seen an increase in candles in the work place and noticed many of them burning, which is direct violation of a KRS regulation.

“The candles are reappearing,” Gabany said.

Employees should discontinue the use of candles in the work place. If candles are burning, the owner will be asked to extinguish it and a deficiency will be recorded, Gabany said.

“If a lit candle is unattended, the fire department will confiscate,” he added.

Gabany also cautioned against gel candles saying they not only

carry the danger of an open flame, but they also give off gasses.

Gel candles are semi-liquid and when they burn they give off gasses which expand faster than the container can disperse them, Gabany said. It is like having a small container with a boiling liquid inside. The opening to the container isn’t large enough to disperse the gasses and the container could explode.

“Fire prevention is extremely critical,” Gabany said. “Use common sense with the candles and where they are placed.”

J.I. equipment brings music to residents' ears

When patrons sang karaoke Saturday night at the Yuk Club, voices rang out through the bar and stage lights grooved to the beat.

Thanks Johnston Island.

It's been nearly a year after the island began receiving shipments from Johnston Island, and residents can see, hear and feel the impacts.

Since May, hundreds of Matson containers filled with items totalling more than \$10 million in acquisition value have arrived, according to Robert Tucker, USAKA property administrator, in a December *Hourglass* report.

The Yuk Club serves as one current example.

Paul Fritz installed last week an estimated \$15,000 in speakers and stage lights including a pair of 4-foot-long JBL subwoofers and accompanying speakers.

"It's somewhat overkill, but it's great," Fritz said.

In fact, Fritz re-oriented the DJ booth and speaker wiring throughout the club, putting the majority of the sound on the stage, giving the dance floor greater sound and making the dining area, now utilized to the one side of the club, and rear

portions of the club more conversation-friendly.

The booth now gives guest DJs easier access and control over the equipment.

Fritz also upgraded the lighting, adding a number of lights that operate on sound sensors, flashing a variety of colors to the beat of the music.

The additions not only improved the club, but other entertainment venues, too.

Fritz said the new equipment freed up gear he once shared with Armed Forces Entertainment shows, meaning he won't have to move the lights and sound equipment from one place to another, saving time, money and wear-and-tear on the gear.

Also, off-island shows often travel with their own equipment too, an expense built into their tour fees.

On occasion, some of that equipment hasn't arrived with the bands, leaving island organizers scrambling to put the show on.

With the abundance of equipment on-island now, Kwajalein not only meets those emergency needs, but could invite bands at reduced rates by saving the group transport costs for gear, Fritz said.

Those who wish to host their own parties may soon check out some of the equipment at the Corlett Recreation Center, too. While some equipment is currently available, Fritz is working to package new gear with the older gear to create a

more complete DJ set-up.

And would-be bands can set up at the Adult Recreation Center, where the new gear offers everything, including amps and speakers.

Bowlers and work-out fiends, too, may thank J.I. when they concentrate more on playing the game and less on keeping score or step on new equipment, said Torrey Landers, Recreation superintendent.

The bowling center received six automatic scoring machines for their eight lanes, and are working to obtain two more. They also picked up shoes, pins and balls. At \$4,000 each, automatic scoring machines were not on the Community Activities budget, so the J.I. acquisition gave them an upgrade that otherwise wasn't possible, Landers said.

The same holds true for the Ivey Gym, in particular, and other work-out locations at Roi and Meck. The influx of three containers filled with equipment — cross-trainers, ellipticals, stair climbers and treadmills — allows Gym officials to reevaluate what goes where, and put out the best equipment, upgrading across the board, Landers said.

The group received new kayaks, too, but not a pitching machine, as rumored, he said.

Landers said Community Activities as they're trying to figure out where to put equipment, they're trying to decide where to store others in the meantime.

"It's a good problem to have," Landers said.

Command approves outdoor TV antenna unit

North Point residents could see a clearer television picture this summer after officials signed off on a USAKA-approved outdoor television antenna last week.

The Winegard Square Shooter 1000 will go up on houses in the near future as residents buy and install the antenna.

But before they do, they must follow a few steps, according to Craig McCarraher, AFN Chief Engineer, and Maj. Joe Southerland, USAKA director of Information Management.

Residents can order the antenna online, but must make sure it is the Winegard SS 1000. They also should know, associated coaxial cable, fasteners, splitters, connectors and other required hardware may not come with the order, Southerland said.

Macy's West will carry the antenna as soon as they can get the product on-island, said Paul Divinski, Retail manager. That could come as early as early- to mid-June. Macy's West also will carry the associated hardware required for installation.

Residents have two options for installation. Public Works engineers are currently designing templates on where the antenna should go on each type of housing unit on-island. The template will also include where the cable will run into the house for two drops — one in the living room and one in the master bedroom.

Residents may choose to obtain the template and install the

antenna themselves or call and pay an installation team that will form between now and when the antennas become available.

In addition, for the do-it-yourselfers, AFN will shoot a video explaining how to install the antenna, McCarraher said. The video will aire on channel 9, which remains clear for every-

one, periodically, and copies of the tape will be available at the Grace Sherwood Library for check-out.

"It's important they're mounted correctly and uniformly," Southerland said. "If installed correctly, it should be good for years."

The antenna features what appears as a lightweight plastic box mounted on a pole. The UV-protected plastic should keep the antenna inside working despite the harsh corrosive elements. McCarraher and Southerland, however, both cautioned that the exposed metal bracket that attaches the antenna to the pole should be painted before and after installation, to ensure long-lasting protection.

McCarraher tested the antenna at seven different locations around the island, with three

located on North Point — in a trailer, Southerland's house, the furthest from the broadcasting tower, and a dome home.

The newly approved antennas come on the heels of a project to increase television offerings on the island, which began last fall. AFN then, using satellite signals routed through the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command headquarters in Huntsville, added additional AFN channels including AFN Atlantic, separate news and sports channels and AFN Spectrum. Broadcast over ultra-, or UHF, instead of very high, or VHF, frequencies as before, AFN encountered reduced reception quality on-island, and McCarraher, Southerland and others have worked since to identify a means to improve the picture.

"It's crystal clear," Southerland said of the new antenna tested at his house. "It's a tremendous increase to our quality of signal. The difference is getting it outside the structure of the house."

General explains missile defense funding request

WASHINGTON — The man in charge of safeguarding the United States against a ballistic missile attack warned members of the House Armed Services Committee's Strategic Forces Subcommittee on March 25 that in the coming years the country will face a ballistic threat from a variety of sources.

Air Force Lt. Gen. Ronald T. Kadish is director of the Missile Defense Agency, which has the task of building the nation's missile defense capability. He told the committee that intelligence estimates and Libya's recent admissions concerning its ballistic missile and weapons-of-mass-destruction programs show the United States is vulnerable.

Kadish was on Capitol Hill to detail and explain the Defense Department's request for missile defense funding in the department's proposed fiscal 2005 budget.

"Ballistic missiles armed with any type (of) warhead would give our adversaries the capability to threaten or inflict catastrophic damage," he said. President Bush, the general added, has called on the agency to aggressively develop the capability to defend the United States and its allies against all ranges of missiles in all phases of flight.

Kadish said the funding would continue an aggressive research, development, test and evaluation effort to design, build and test the elements of a single ballistic missile defense system in what he called "an evolutionary way," along with modest fielding of the capability over the next several years.

"We recognize the priority our nation and this president ascribe to missile defense, and our program is structured to deal with the enormity and complexity of the task," he told the committee. "We are capitalizing on our steady progress since the days of the Strategic Defense Initiative, and will present to our combatant commanders by the end of 2004 an initial missile defense capability to defeat near-term threats of greatest concern."

Kadish told the subcommittee the ballistic missile defense system his agency is developing is a layered defense that will help re-

duce the chances a hostile missile would get through to its target. The system, he said, would give the United States "better protection by enabling engagements in all phases of a missile's flight, and make it possible to have a high degree of confidence in the performance of the missile defense system."

The system's reliability, synergy, and effectiveness can be improved by fielding overlapping, complementary capabilities, the general said. "In other words, the ability to hit a missile in boost, midcourse, or terminal phase of flight enhances system performance against an operationally challenging threat."

However, all of these layered defense elements must be integrated, he said. "And there must be a battle management, command and control system that can engage or reengage targets as appropriate. And it all must work within a window of a few minutes," he added.

Kadish emphasized to the subcommittee that a layered missile defense will not only increase the chances that the hostile missile and its payload would be destroyed, but "it also can be very effective against countermeasures, and must give pause to potential adversaries."

The general further emphasized that the nation's missile defense capability is just beginning. "What we do in 2004 and 2005 is only the starting point — the beginning — and it involves very basic capability," he said. "Our strategy is to build on this beginning to make the BMD system increasingly more effective and reliable against current threats, and hedge against changing future threats."

DoD is asking Congress for \$9.2 billion in fiscal 2005 to fund and support initial configuration and activities to place the BMD system on alert. That amount is a \$1.5 billion increase over the fiscal 2004 request, Kadish said.

"The increase covers costs associated with fielding the first GMD, Aegis BMD, sensor, and command, control and battle management installations and will allow us to purchase long-lead items required for capability enhancements."

The agency is also asking for \$200 million in fiscal 2005 to develop advanced systems to develop laser

technology and laser radar, advanced discrimination, improved focal plane arrays, and a high-altitude airship for improved surveillance, communication, and early warning, the general told the legislators.

Another \$834 million is being requested to buy equipment and ramp up the testing of the Terminal High Altitude Area Defense program, a capability to engage in the late midcourse and terminal layers of missile defense. THAAD recently completed its design readiness review, and development hardware manufacturing is under way, Kadish said. The THAAD radar was completed ahead of schedule and rolled out this month. Flight testing is scheduled to begin in the first quarter of fiscal 2005 at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico.

Kadish said the Missile Defense Agency also will be able to begin assembly and integration of two tracking and surveillance satellites. The budget request for that program is \$322 million.

Also included in the budget are several science and technology initiatives to increase BMD system firepower and sensor capability and extend the engagement battle space of terminal elements, Kadish said.

He said one effort toward increasing BMD system effectiveness in the midcourse phase will be placing multiple "kill vehicles" on a single booster, thus reducing the discrimination burden on BMD sensors.

Kadish told the committee that congressional support for key changes in management and oversight have allowed his agency to execute the missile defense program responsibly and flexibly by adjusting the program to its progress every year, improving decision cycle time, and making the most prudent use of the money allocated. Periodic changes in the RDT&E program have collectively involved billions of dollars — "that is, billions of dollars that have been invested in more promising activities, and billions of dollars taken out of the less efficient program efforts," Kadish told the lawmakers.

"The ability to manage flexibly in this manner saves time and money in our ultimate goal of fielding the best defenses available on the shortest possible timeline," he said.

Minutemans soldier on as Peacekeepers retire

WASHINGTON — The U.S. military will upgrade its Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missiles while retiring its Peacekeeper missile force, a senior officer told a Senate subcommittee March 25.

The larger, multinuclear-warhead-carrying Peacekeeper ICBMs are being decommissioned as part of the Moscow Treaty brokered between the United States and Russia in May 2002.

“With Peacekeeper deactivation proceeding as planned, the Air Force has implemented an aggressive life extension program for the Minuteman III ICBM force to ensure

weapon system reliability through 2020,” Navy Adm. James O. Ellis Jr. explained to members of the Senate Strategic Forces Subcommittee.

Ellis heads the U.S. Strategic Command at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb., which oversees U.S. military global strategic planning, including nuclear deterrence.

Ellis noted “reliability upgrades” would be performed on the Minuteman III’s critical components. These, he said, include replacement of the missile’s guidance and propulsion systems.

The Reagan Test Site will play a part in the Peacekeeper decommissioning and Minuteman III reliability upgrades, according to Maj. Dennis Gaare, RTS ICBM test director.

The range will catch two last Peacekeeper Glory Trips before the summer 2005. Those missions offer the most visual display for residents with its nine RVs streaking across the sky.

Also, the range will see four tests over the next two years of the upgraded Minuteman IIIs, in addition to the three normally scheduled Minuteman missions, Gaare said.

“Bottom line, we should be in the ICBM testing business for many years,” Gaare said.

First deployed in 1986, the Peacekeeper is a four-stage rocket system designed to carry 10 nuclear warheads, according to a U.S. STRATCOM fact sheet. There are now about 50 Peacekeepers.

The Minuteman, a smaller, three-stage rocket system, has undergone numerous improvements since it was first deployed in the early 1960s, according to STRATCOM. The Minuteman III version, deployed in 1970, was designed to

carry three nuclear warheads, according to an Air Force fact sheet, but after a 1992 arms treaty the Air Force reduced its payload to one warhead.

About 500 Minuteman IIIs are in the U.S. nuclear arsenal, according to STRATCOM. Ellis said the Minuteman III will become America’s sole land-based nuclear-warhead carrying ICBM system after the Peacemaker is retired.

President Bush and Russian President Vladimir Putin signed the Moscow Treaty on Strategic Offensive Reductions, an arms-control agreement that called for the two countries to substantially reduce their strategic nuclear arsenals over the next 10 years, on May 24, 2002, in Moscow.
