# Sixty years later, battle against hatred continues


On Tuesday, Jan. 20, 1942, 12 men met in the Wansee suburb of Berlin.

Their names were Lt. Col. Adolf Eichmann, Dr. Joseph Buhler, SS Maj. Rudolf Lange, SS Col. Eberhard Schongarth, SS Lt. Gen. Otto Hoffman, Martin Luther, Dr. Wilhelm Stuckart, Dr. Erich Nuemann, Dr. Wilhelm Kritzinger, Dr. Gerhard Klopfer, SS Gen. Heinrich Muller and Dr. Roland Freissler.

These 12 men produced an unfathomable document known as the Wansee Protocol which stated the "Final Solution" to the Jewish problem. Simply put, the Nazis meant to kill all the Jews in their occupied territories. The methods of murder were discussed including poison gas. They hailed the "Triumphant Vision."

How could such an incredible undertaking, the genocide of an entire people, millions, take place without the world's knowledge? The truth is, the world did know about it. Some dismissed it as propaganda rubbish, impossible to achieve, and some had the attitude that "it was only Jews."

No one outside German occupied territory really believed it. Behind the German lines, few were left alive to



believe it.

Almost every country in the world closed their borders to Jews when it was still possible for some of them to escape. Only tiny Denmark, in one night, ferried some 5,000 Jews to neutral Sweden so they could escape the Nazi's death plans. These plans were not confined to Jews. They included the infirm, the mentally retarded, homosexuals, political dissidents or anyone that did not fit the Aryan Master Race.

Yes, there were rumors. There were photos of the firing squads, mass graves and the crematoriums smuggled out of Russia, Poland and other places, and they were dismissed as fakes. Few believed even with this evidence. How could they really? Who would believe that any people could be capable of it?

Only when Allied armies liberated the camps and it was seen in all its horror did the world really believe. The names that became infamous – Dachau, Treblinka, Auschwitz, Buchenwald and many others – were places where death was dealt out with brutality. Men, women and children were worked to death, starved to death, shot to death and gassed to death.

Battle-hardened soldiers who saw death every day were sickened by it. A man as hard as Gen. George Patton threw up when he saw it.

The soldiers who liberated the camps, the victims who survived them, the people of that generation are passing away every day. Soon, there will be no one alive who lived it first hand.

Even now, there are people who say it was all a hoax, it never happened, it was all a sham by the Jews to gain world sympathy for a Jewish homeland in Palestine. One wonders what will happen when no one is left to bear witness to it.

The saying goes "Those who forget history are destined to repeat it."

It can't happen again? It already has in a dozen places or more – Cambodia under Pol Pot, Kosovo, Bosnia, Croatia and Rwanda among others.

I heard a guy I worked with in the states say, "I really hate Jews, man."

I asked him why, did he even know any Jews and what did they ever do to him. He said, "Well, I don't know any, but I really hate them."

Just change the word Jews to blacks or Latinos, Hispanics, Asians, Catholics or Protestants or Frenchman, Germans or maybe in Europe, Americans ... and on and on.

Is the human race doomed to live with hatred forever?

What's the best way to handle hatred? Does love and understanding stamp out hatred or do they make you look weak to those that hate you? Is self defense and force the only way to deal with it? An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth? Is it only when you have defeated those who hate you that you can worry about love and understanding?

Sixty years after the worst tragedy in human history, World War II, in which more than 50 million people died, the world is still haunted by the questions.

# Kwajalein experiences hottest March since 1952

Kwajalein has had a run of record or near-record monthly temperatures lately.

It started late last year with the hottest November on record, followed by the second hottest December, the hottest January and a tie for the hottest February.

Now, we have just experienced the second hottest March.

The average temperature for the month was 83.3 F, compared with a normal average temperature of 82.3 F. The highest monthly average temperature for March was just .1 degree warmer at 83.9 F, which occurred in 1952.

The high temperature for the month was 90 F, which occurred on the 24th, while the low temperature of 76 F occurred during a heavy rain shower on the 27th. The record low temperature for the month is 70 F, which occurred on March 27, 1985.

The record high temperature for the month is 91 F, set on March 3 and March 30, 1954. Interestingly, these two dates occurred shortly after two hydrogen bomb

tests were conducted in the Bikini Atoll on March 1 and March 26 of that year.

So, what may be causing the unusually warm weather lately? Simply look out the window — the ocean.

Because the ocean so vastly dominates the Earth's surface in our little corner of the world, the air temperatures here are highly regulated by its influence. A large degree of this recent warm weather, thus, is the result of warmer than normal ocean temperatures across the region.

Analyses reveal that ocean temperatures near the Kwajalein Atoll averaged about 1 degree above normal for the month of March, which corresponds perfectly with the air temperature anomaly for the month. Computer model forecasts suggest that this trend may continue for the next several months, perhaps lasting into the summer and autumn.

One may have noticed that even though we have been setting records or near records, the temperatures don't seem all that different from normal. In the U.S., average

monthly temperature deviations of 1 degree would be minimal indeed. Instead, temperature anomalies of more than 5 degrees are quite common. However, that is because most locations in the U.S. are landlocked and in the mid-latitudes, where temperature swings during a given day or month are typically much higher.

Here in the tropical Pacific, temperatures are moderated to a great extent by the ocean, and vary little from day to day. Therefore, while these differences may not seem that great, one must take into account the location.

Precipitation ran a little dry this month. The island finished the month with 3.32 inches of precipitation, which is .5 inches below normal. The rainiest day was the 27th when the weather station recorded 1.01 inches, most of it falling during the early morning hours. Thirteen days passed with just a trace or less of precipitation.

The records for the month of March are a whopping 24.33 inches, which occurred in 1951, and a scant .16 inches, which occurred in 1975.

## Residents, students deal with loss

Residents are mourning the loss of 15-year-old Robyn Clark, who died Thursday at Kwajalein Hospital apparently of an infectious cause.

Dr. Eric Lindborg, chief medical officer, could not discuss the case, citing doctor-patient confidentiality, but added the case presented "no evidence of any threat to the Kwajalein community."

Diagnostic testing would continue for the next few days, and Lindborg said he would keep the community informed of any relevant information.

Meanwhile, faculty, staff and students at Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School are going through the grieving process.

"It's the hardest thing we do, ever ... It's always traumatic for the staff and kids," said Superintendent Karen Ammann. "We offer counseling and opportunities for the kids to talk."

Counselor Bob Ammann and psychologist Marion Ruffing will be on hand after school today for counseling and a memorial service is set for 6 p.m. this evening at the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room, Ammann said.

# Island alumni look at atoll, past and present

One MIT/LL alum voiced a parting thought which summed up their whirlwind tour of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur.

“After two days back here, we felt like we never left,” said Richard Curry.

Curry along with Kent Kresa, Larry Lynn, Roxy Ernsberger, Dr. Richard Wishner and Robert Yost originally worked on the range during the 1960s. Now, 40 years later, they returned with their wives and some family members for a three-day tour of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur.

They arrived on Saturday and that evening a welcome beach party was held for them on Emon Beach.

On Monday, the alumni toured TRADEX, MMW, ALTAIR, along with a Roi-Namur historical tour and lunch at the Scuba Shack.

When they arrived on Roi, a group of Marshallese women adorned them with hand-made leis and *wuts*.

Floyd Corder, Roi-Namur operations manager, was on hand with a bus and a historical pamphlet about Roi.

The Roi tour started at Red Beach and proceeded around the island slowing or stopping at different historic locations.

Excited voices filled the bus as some of the alumni recognized different areas, such as the old pig farm, the overgrown tennis courts and the Japanese Air Command building.

The alumni visited TRADEX where they were shown a short slide presentation of how far TRADEX has come since the '60s and then were taken to the TRADEX roof to see the radar, again. Painted on the radar was “41 years of service.”

From TRADEX the men toured MMW and then they were off to the scuba shack for a catered lunch.

Hand-made decorations adorned the tables and chairs lined the edge of the lagoon.

After lunch, some of the alumni joined Corder and the Marshallese women and danced to Marshallese music.

The alumni then visited ALTAIR

and listened to a brief description of the radar.

During the tour of Roi and just before leaving Kwajalein, many of the visitors recalled special moments, then and now, of their lives on Kwajalein and Roi.

**Richard Curry**

Curry worked on TRADEX from 1962-64 where he implemented the first Ascope display recording system.

During his time on Kwajalein he learned to dive and became a dive master.

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Curry retired in 1999 from Science Applications International Corp., where he was a vice president.

“Everybody [on Kwajalein and Roi] went all out to welcome us,” said Curry.

For his wife, Nancy Curry, this was her first trip. She married Richard shortly after he returned

from Kwajalein. Over the years, she met many of the people he worked and lived with on Kwaj and Roi, but had never lived here. She said she had always wanted to see the place they talked so highly about.

“I am glad to finally see it,” she said.

**Kent Kresa**

Kresa spent from 1963-65 on Kwajalein and organized the trip.

He recently retired as chairman of the board of directors for the Northrop Grumman Corporation.

“[It was an] opportunity to come back after 40 years. All of us are recently retired, so it was the time to do it,” Kresa said.

“Many, many things are the same,” Kresa said. “We were surprised. [Kwajalein] is prettier than it has ever been. I was impressed with Roi-Namur,” he added.

According to Kresa, Roi used to be just a jungle. Now there are trees and a golf course.

“The feeling of the place is the same,” Kresa said. “The unusual story is the tremendous friendships [made here]. We have been friends [made here]. We have been friends for 40 years. There is something about this place that creates those friendships.”

“I’d come back,” said his wife,

Joyce Kresa. "I'd live here. It is so stress-free."

Kresa recalled there being many more fish and coral species in the lagoon. He said that was the only disappointing thing.

"The reef is depleted since I was here," Kresa said.

#### **Roxy Ernsberger**

Ernsberger worked at TRADEX from 1962-1965. He worked on the design of TRADEX's servo control and console operator during missions.

His daughter, Nicole Ernsberger Cook, was born on Kwajalein in 1964.

"[Roi] looks like a tropical paradise," Ernsberger said. "Roi is much more tailored [now]."

His wife, Claire Ernsberger, had visited Roi once a year during the then-annual open house, when wives and children could visit Roi.

"I don't think they will ever get us back on the bus," Claire said, during her tour of Roi.

At the Japanese Air Command building Claire said she used to walk through the building and pretend it was her home.

Claire also remembered there were special items sold on Kwaj similar to items such as Waterford crystal and rosewood furniture is now.

"They would come in and you'd

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better buy it because you wouldn't get it again," Claire said.

She added there was no fresh milk on Kwaj at the time, and "the fresh produce was not very fresh."

Their daughter, Cook, left when she only one year old and had not been back.

"I loved it," she said. "I didn't think I would ever get to come back."

Cook said she always wondered where her mother got the idea to serve rice for breakfast. When she went to college, she was shocked they didn't serve rice for breakfast, and now that she has visited Kwaj,

she knows where her mother got the idea.

#### **Dr. Richard Wishner**

Wishner along with his wife, Joyce, lived on Kwaj from December 1963 to July 1965. He made a short return trip in 1969.

While on Kwaj, he was responsible for computing and data reduction at TRADEX.

Wishner said they were able to fly free to Honolulu every six months. It was a 10-hour flight on a DC6.

He recalled on one such trip the plane had just taken off from Kwajalein and the alcoholic beverage cart had just passed and Wishner had declined a drink.

He said he looked out the window and saw the propellor. Then the plane banked hard. He looked out the window again and saw the prop. Then he looked out the window a third time and realized the prop had stopped.

"We'll take two scotches," he told the flight attendant. "At least we were not past the point of no return."

Wishner said the computers he used to work with were 790 machines and processed information at 1/10 of a million instructions per second.

"That was a big deal back then,"

he said.

As he passed ALTAIR, Wishner laughed and said he remembered when they used to play soccer there.

"We worked hard and we played hard," Wishner said.

#### **Robert Yost**

Yost spent from 1963 to 1966 first as the TRADEX radar engineer and then the head of TRADEX radar.

"Looks the same. I could have walked in the front door and right to my office," Yost said when he entered TRADEX.

During the historical tour, his wife, Lea Yost, walked around the historic Japanese Air Command building.

"I remember crawling through this," she said.

She added it seemed to have deteriorated more than what she remembered.

#### **Heading West**

After the morning tour on Roi, the group returned to Kwaj and their afternoon activities, which included a choice or either an Ebeye tour, snorkeling at Bigej, sailing on the lagoon or golf.

They departed on Tuesday for Pohnpei, the next stop on their journey.





# Engineers build chapel in Iraq

BAGHDAD — From the ground up, a 200-seat chapel in Iraq is being built to give U.S. Soldiers a place to worship.

Engineers from the Missouri National Guard, put their carpentry and masonry skills to the test.

"These Soldiers are hungry for services," said Lt. Col. David Moran, a chaplain from 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas. "When I got here a little over four weeks ago, it was a level concrete pad."

The structure will be ready to its full potential by April 15. Services will include Contemporary Protestant, Catholic Mass and Lutheran.

"We've been at a steady pace and everyday we make progress," said carpenter, Staff Sgt. Clifford Bailey, with the Missouri National Guard.

Even though the building isn't complete, the chaplains haven't let that get in the way of their services.

"We used a large cardboard box as a make-shift altar," said Maj. Grant Johnson, the deputy division chaplain for 1st Cav. "We also used a laptop so people could read songs, and we gathered in a circle for prayer and worship."





# Northwest WorldPerks miles can help wounded

WASHINGTON — Thanks to a partnership between Northwest Airlines and the nonprofit Fisher House Foundation, travelers can donate their miles from the airline's WorldPerks frequent-flyer program to help service members wounded or injured on the battlefields of Iraq and Afghanistan.

Northwest is providing travel through the use of donated WorldPerks miles for wounded or injured service members to take leave or pass from military hospitals, and for their families to visit them at their bedside. Jim Weiskopf, Fisher House spokesman, said the Northwest program is the second airline partnership involving the foundation. The first one, with American Airlines, uses donated "AAdvantage

Award" certificates donated by Anheuser-Busch employees.

Other programs using donated frequent-flyer miles are restricted to military members coming home from Iraq or Afghanistan on emergency leave, Weiskopf said. Proposed legislation would permit the military to use the services of a nonprofit organization to administer a program for family members, and that would involve all participating airlines.

Best known for its network of comfort homes on the grounds of all the military's major medical centers, Fisher House Foundation has been named a Northwest Airlines designated "AirCares" charity. Northwest announced this special program to accept frequent-flyer miles from its customers and allow Fisher House to redeem miles for free airline tick-

ets to support hospitalized service members.

The AirCares program depends on the support of the airline's WorldPerks member donations. To donate their miles, WorldPerks members can call (800) 327-2881, with their WorldPerks account and PIN numbers.

Although the Northwest program will continue through Dec. 31, mileage may be donated to the Fisher House Foundation only through Nov. 30. The minimum donation is 5,000 miles, and larger donations may be made in 1,000-mile increments. All AirCares mileage donations are final, officials said, meaning unused miles cannot be restored to members' accounts.

# Land Warrior System to improve Soldier's abilities

WASHINGTON — Although the complete Land Warrior System — a modular, integrated fighting system that includes everything an infantry soldier wears or carries on the battlefield — is not due to be fielded until 2007, troops in the field already benefit from several of its components.

The goal of Land Warrior, said Army Col. Ted Johnson, project manager for Soldier Warrior, Program Executive Office Soldier at Fort Belvoir, Va., is to improve a soldier's ability on the battlefield.

The original intent, said the colonel, was for Land Warrior to be fielded as a head-to-toe system, but that process has changed.

"A lot of it has to do with 9/11 and the advent of combat opera-

tions (in Iraq and Afghanistan)," said Johnson. "What we're doing now is spiraling out individual things if we can. If something is ready now, we'll get it to the force."

Examples include personal protection body armor, lighter-weight helmets and the commander's digital assistant, which provides situational awareness and mission planning capabilities.

"The close fight can now be prosecuted without worrying about having all small-unit members within sight or shouting distance," said Johnson. "(With the CDA) they know where they're going, they know where you are, and you know where they are."

While the Land Warrior System has proven its functionality, the challenge is making the system "rugged enough" to sustain the rig-

ors of battlefield operations, Johnson said.

"(You) have to make sure the cables and connectors you design are able to handle the stresses and strains of the 180-pound, 19-year-old private who is busting down doors, taking prisoners, getting in and out of combat vehicles, rolling in the dirt, falling into the dyke and scrambling up the other side soaking wet," said Johnson.

"The challenge is making the system rugged enough, reliable enough, durable enough to be out there in the streets of Baghdad, or in the hills of Afghanistan in January with two feet of snow, or in Haiti with the humidity and mugginess."

A prototype for the Land Warrior System is scheduled for testing in October.
