June rains bring Kwaj out of drought; water conservation still needed

Recent rains have floated Kwaj out of drought status, but water conservation efforts remain necessary and in force.

According to Glenn Trapp, Aeromet site manager, Kwajalein has received 30.05 inches of rain this year, 73 percent of the normal rainfall at this time of the year and 11.01 inches shy of the normal total.

"Technically, 65 percent or below is representative of a drought," Trapp said. "We're barely out of it. The (water conservation) rules are in effect, and they should be."

On the plus side, the difference came in June, when Kwaj received 12.34 inches of rain. The island averages 9.62 inches in that month, so Kwaj gained 128 percent of its usual June total. It was the 12th wettest June since 1945, when U.S. meteorologists began keeping records on the island, Trapp said.

As a result, the 13 water tanks are filled to the rim with 12 million gallons of water, said Stan Jazwinski, Utilities superintendent.

Furthermore, water remains in the catchment, between the airport runways, because the storage tanks are filled.

"This is the first time we've had water standing in the catchment since last year's drought," Jazwinski said.

The Water Department shut down the reverse osmosis water purifica-

tion units on June 20, because there was no place to store the 180,000 gallons of fresh water generated every day. Forecasts indicate the ROWPUs may stay shut down for awhile.

"We're entering the rainy season," Trapp said.

Summer temperatures have warmed the Pacific Ocean waters to the north, where previously unusually cooler waters, attributed to a phenomenon known as La Niña, kept the weather dryer than normal.

"Apparently, the water temperatures have recovered enough to support tropical precipitation," Trapp said.

So much so, forecasters expect the island to receive 80 to 90 percent of normal rainfall over the next two to three months.

Despite the good news, Kwajalein's water supply remains a concern, and water conservation efforts remain in

force. The last 18 months of drought have reduced the water level in the island's freshwater lens.

Said Jazwinski, "We're doing better, but you'd need normal rainfall of six months or more to replenish the lens well."

Consequently, water conservation efforts remain in effect.

Average water usage levels increased from 283,857 gallons a day the week of June 18-24 to 295,129 gallons a day the week of June 25-July 1. Jazwinski said the Water Department traced that increase to a leak in the aged pipe system, and the leak was repaired.

The goal set by USAKA/KMR is 250,000 gallons of daily usage on average.

Residents may not fill private wading or swimming pools at all, nor use potable water on lawns and plants or to wash vehicles and boats.

Workers find WWII munitions buried near elementary school

Backhoe operator John Laninmij and driver Kelly Anjolak got an unpleasant surprise June 30, while they were digging a trench near George Seitz Elementary School. They uncovered some World War II Japanese munitions, including an unfused 81mm mortar shell and eight 50mm mortar shell casings.

The workmen were digging the trench in preparation for installation of fiber-optic cable to connect the school to the computer network.

Following standard procedures, Laninmij suspended work, and they called their supervisor. Floyd Corder, FOM Structures superintendent, contacted the Explosives Ordinance Disposal Section.

In response, EOD technician John Carter went to site and supervised workers in removal of the shell and shell casings.

The dangerous cargo was taken to the ammunition bunkers, where it is being stored pending disposal.

EOD reminds USAKA/KMR residents to avoid touching any ordinance they find. Even empty shell casings can contain dangerous and unstable explosive residues, they said.

If you discover ordnance on land or on the reef, do not touch it. Mark the location, and contact CIS at 54000 on Kwaj or 56000 at Roi.

One injured in vehicular accident on Ocean Road

The driver of a scooter was injured July 1, when a dump truck backed into the scooter on Ocean Road near Kwaj Lodge. The truck was carrying a full load of dirt for work at George Seitz Elementary School.

The truck driver stopped his vehicle and began backing up to pull off the road, without realizing that the scooter was behind him. Because the truck was fully loaded, the driver could not feel or hear the impact when he made contact with the scooter.

The front of the scooter was crushed under one wheel of the truck, and the scooter driver was caught in his vehicle. His left leg was crushed below the knee. After treatment at Kwajalein Hospital, he was medevac'd on a C-130 to Honolulu July 2 and is in Queens Hospital.

Julia Olson, safety engineer in the KLS Environmental/Health/Safety Department, said investigation into the accident continues.

She added, "We want to remind the community to be wary of heavy equipment at all times. Those vehicles have blind spots, and they can't stop as quickly or maneuver as easily as smaller, lighter equipment. In this case, the driver was not following proper procedures."

She said walkers, runners, and bikers, as well as operators of other vehicles, should be respectful of heavy equipment and keep a safe distance away from it.

Hono to Kwaj by sailboat: It's a big, empty ocean out there

The commander of the biggest navy in the Army brought a vessel of his own into the harbor June 27.

Col. Gary McMillen, USAKA/KMR commander, arrived at Echo Pier about 5 p.m., after a 17-day, four-hour voyage from Honolulu on his 41-foot ketch-rig sailboat, *TDY II*.

McMillen and his two-man crew were tanned and tired—and just a tad let-down that the big adventure was ending, but it was obvious that McMillen considered the voyage an excellent vacation.

Ron Riggs, a longtime friend from Washington, D.C., and Mark Brassfield, a new-found friend from Honolulu, made up the crew.

"I call *TDY II* my Kwaj boat," said McMillen, who purchased the vessel in Honolulu last fall. "It's Kwaj-condition. It was built in 1975, so it's kind of old and a bit rusty. But it's a great cruising vessel. We never had a wave come over the bow."

McMillen was in frequent touch with home and office. On board was an iridium phone, linked to a low-orbit satellite, with which he called his office at Kwajalein and the SMDC office in Washington, D.C., every morning. In the evening, the crew

stayed in touch with family, friends, and the Kwaj Ham Radio Club via a single sideband radio.

There were a couple of glitches at the start. McMillen tore the ligaments in his left knee while getting the boat ready to sail and had to rely on a knee brace and medication to get him through.

Strong winds ripped one of the sails just 14 miles out of Honolulu. The crew took a good look at the size of the rip, calculated how much hand-sewing would be required, and decided to find a professional to repair that sail and check out the others.

After that, it was extraordinary sunrises and sunsets, more stars than ever seen from land, and plenty of time to relax, read, and fish. They didn't see another vessel, an island, even an airplane, for 17 days.

A Floridian, McMillen learned to sail as a youngster on his dad's boat. He said his wife, Pam, is also enthusiastic about sailing, but they have a difference of opinion on the length of the ideal voyage. His is, "Head west until you run out of water." Hers is, "Let's sail until about 4 o'clock and then tie up for a dinner party."

The McMillens plan several short cruises in the Marshalls this year.
