Team NMD counts down to Oct. 3 IFT-3

The folks on Meck enjoy their work. Never mind that distinguished visitors from the states will closely watch the National Missile Defense's Integrated Flight Test-3 on Oct. 3.

The men and women that make up "Team NMD" on Meck Island consist of 160 engineers, technicians, directors and staff. All simply want to "hit a bullet with a bullet in the Exo."

"There's a lot of people with their hearts in this," said Ron Meyer, Raytheon's deputy program manager for the Exoatmospheric Kill Vehicle (EKV). Meyer and his team of 28 EKV specialists are among them.

Raytheon built the EKV at the company's Tuscon, Ariz., plant and after a stopover at the Lockheed-Martin plant in Sunnyvale, Calif., delivered "the bullet" to Meck late last month.

The EKV sits atop a Lockheed-Martin Payload Launch Vehicle (PLV), which launches the payload, or EKV, into space. Once there, the EKV is designed to seek out and strike an incoming reentry vehicle. The EKV; the Battle Command, Control and Communications Center (BMC3); the Ground Based Radar - Prototype (GBR-P); and all the relevant sensors make up the National Missile Defense (NMD) program. Congress named it a national priority this summer.

"We're now a deployment program," said Jim Hill, government NMD site manager. "This (EKV) is the second prototype. We're trying to test the technology and what we need to do to deploy it."

The EKV program has already passed two data collection tests, but this month's shot will mark the first

Building bridges ...

Family Team Building to teach ABCs of military

Hungry? Head to the PDR. Tired? Go take a nap at your BQ. Want to have a little fun? Check out the UPRC.

The ABCs of Army life can sometimes leave the average civilian a little dazed and confused. Shouldn't there be a class that spells out the acronyms, or one explaining the difference between a first sergeant and a sergeant major - an Army 101 class? Well, there soon may be.

USAKA/KMR is recruiting individuals who will be instructed in the basics of military protocol and concepts to teach others on Kwajalein Atoll about what to many may seem like a foreign lifestyle, with a language that sits uncomfortably on the civilian tongue.

"It's a completely different language," conceded 1st Sgt. Ozell Robertson, who is seeking volunteers from Kwajalein and Roi-Namur

to teach the Family Team Building curriculum. Originally designed for spouses of military personnel, Family Team Building (FTB) is a program to make civilian personnel more fa-

miliar with the military.

"What we're looking at, because of our unique situation out here, is to get the civilian personnel more acquainted with the military personnel, so it will get rid of the us versus them mentality," Robertson explained. "A lot of people are afraid to communicate with us, or socialize with us."

The curriculum, which covers everything from military slang to the chain of command, is designed to demystify the military and build stronger relationships between the military and civilians on Kwaj and Roi, according to Robertson. He said one of the major misconceptions

Coast Guard cutter refurbishes Kwaj's navigation aids

One of the newest ships in the U.S. Coast Guard's fleet arrived at Kwajalein Sept. 14 to undertake the annual inspections and refurbishment of Kwajalein's maritime navigation aids.

The United States Coast Guard cutter (USCGC) *Walnut* replaced the USCGC *Sassafras*, which was originally scheduled to conduct the inspections, but was required for other duties.

The *Walnut* brought with it the Coast Guard's only portable test platform for the Differential Global Positioning System (DGPS), which is used in the placement of navigation aids in parts of the U.S. including Hawaii.

"Using surveyed locations, such as those established by the National Imagery and Mapping Agency here at Kwajalein, the machine calculates its exact location and transmits a DGPS signal, which provides a correction for the induced error in the system," said Lt. j.g. Matthew Salas. "Without DGPS our estimated position, even while tied up to the dock, moves by as much as 15 meters. It is accurate to 2 meters with DGPS. Kwajalein is a great place to test this system."

Computers are not only used to determine the ship's exact location, but perform many other necessary functions as well. The shipboard au-

tomated computer system monitors numerous systems throughout the vessel, including engine performance, generators, fire and flooding alarms and power throughout the ship.

"We found some glitches in the system, but we have a number electricians mates and electronics technicians on board," said Lt. Cdr. John Prince, captain of the *Walnut*. "They are well trained to troubleshoot any problems."

"The *Walnut's* crew of 40 compares to other buoy tenders that have been

to Kwajalein that had crews of 60," said Prince. "The ship we replaced is bigger and more complex."

The primary missions for the ship are in law enforcement, aids to navigation and rescue.

The *Walnut* can also serve in the capacity of an oil skimmer in environmental cleanup operations.

When servicing aids to navigation in water too shallow for the ship itself, a team of divers

is sent out in an inflatable boat to disconnect the buoy from the sinker and tow it to the ship for servicing.

Each buoy has its own maintenance log, which shows all the information concerning service history, type and due dates of inspections, as well as when the hull is due to be relieved. The buoys are inspected thoroughly to make certain that every part meets standards, and they are then cleaned and painted prior to being returned to the water in their original locations.

The *Walnut* and its crew are scheduled for 150 days a year underway. Most of this time is broken down into one- or two-week missions, though occasionally longer voyages due to transit time.

Built in Marinette, Wis., the *Walnut* entered Coast Guard service Feb. 22, and was commissioned on July 31. It is based in Honolulu, where it has been maintaining navigational aids in the Hawaiian chain.

In addition to the Hawaiian chain, the Coast Guard's area of responsibility also extends to Midway, Wake, Johnston, Guam, Saipan and Tinian. The *Walnut*, which departed today, has primary responsibility for Hawaii, while the *Sassafras*, which is based out of Guam, will be handling much of the western Pacific including Kwajalein.

about the military concerns the belief the Army makes up all the rules. Another myth: "Policies we don't have that people think we have."

The program may also teach work skills. For example, there is a class on Basic Problem Solving and a course titled Introduction to Effective Leadership.

One enticement for volunteers to the program is that the two-week training course involves overseas travel. USAKA/KMR will pay travel and lodging to Puerto Rico in November, Germany in December or Virginia in January for those who can get leave.

"[The trainers] instruct the person on how to be master trainers, give them familiarization with all the courses and tailor it to the needs in the community," Robertson said. "Anyone who has the time and wants to do it is the only qualification we're looking for right now."

So far, only one volunteer, a person from Roi, has signed up for the course, Robertson said. The program is expected to be ready to begin by the end of January 2000.

FTB is only one of several programs recently initiated by USAKA/KMR as the command works to improve the quality of life on Kwajalein Atoll, according to Robertson.

"Basically, it's trying to get a better community out here by implementing these programs," he said. "[The command's] goal is for this to be

a showcase range facility."

Another program attempting to build bridges in the community is the Family Action Plan, which draws upon the diverse groups on the two islands — Kwaj and Roi — to talk about problems and come up with solutions. Initiated in April, FAP held its first conference between volunteers in July and identified 83 different issues. One result of that meeting will be the construction of a day care center beginning in 2001. The facility will be able to care for more than 60 children, including infants.

"The things we are looking at are things that affect the whole community," Robertson said.

USAKA/KMR is seeking volunteers to be facilitators or delegates at the next conference on Nov. 5-6. Delegates will represent the different groups on island — teens, Kwaj and Roi bachelors and married couples.

"This time I would like to get two Kwaj bachelor groups," said Robertson, adding he is trying to quash the perception by bachelors that "everything is geared toward families."

Observed Robertson, "There are some bachelors who get heavily involved. And then there are some who have good ideas who don't get involved. We want those with the good ideas to get involved."

Soldiers rescue hundreds from Floyd floods

WASHINGTON — As Hurricane Floyd hit North Carolina last week, a National Guard soldier used his raincoat to drag an expecting mother under fallen power lines so police could rush her to the hospital.

That effort by Sgt. Scott Bloemers was one of many rescues by National Guard troops along the East Coast during the height of the storm and its wake.

Soldiers in New Jersey and North Carolina used trucks and helicopters to rescue hundreds of people from rooftops and from buildings that were surrounded by rising water.

By Friday, more than 2,100 Army and Air Guard troops were on state active duty in North Carolina, where the storm hit the United States hardest. Another 561 were on duty in New Jersey, and 925 had been called up in New York state, according to the National Guard Bureau.

Those numbers brought the week's total to over 10,800 National Guard troops called out in eight eastern states to help civil authorities deal with one of the largest storms to ever threaten this country.

"The spirit of cooperation between all of the various agencies has been tremendous," said North Carolina Army Guard Maj. Barney Barnhill. "Everyone is mission focused. I haven't heard anybody say, 'This is not our job.' Everybody is doing what they can to help out."

That included a massive search and rescue mission by about 30 military helicopters along the North Carolina

coast, said Maj. Robert Jones, that state's National Guard spokesman.

Helicopters from the Coast Guard, the Navy, the active Army at Fort Bragg and from four states carried stranded people to safety and looked for others who needed their help. Tennessee, Georgia and Florida each sent two Army Guard Blackhawks to reinforce North Carolina's fleet of utility helicopters.

"Everything that's not an Apache [attack helicopter] is out there flying," Jones explained.

A Blackhawk helicopter from the Tennessee Army National Guard's Medical Detachment responded to a call to pick up a pregnant woman in labor at the new Hanover Airport in Wilmington, N.C. Flooding precluded ground ambulance travel from her local medical center in Doshier, N.C. to the New Hanover Hospital. The crew, flying with night vision goggles, helped deliver the baby in the air. Twenty feet from the ground and 30 seconds prior to touchdown, the woman gave birth to Samantha Nichole in the helicopter.

In another incident, Sgt. Larry Dever, a medic with the North Carolina National Guard, administered CPR to a heart attack victim at a high school being used as an evacuation shelter for 700. During the same day, Dever aided a nurse on duty who went into a diabetic coma. He helped administer an airway procedure to revive the nurse.

Continental Airlines has altered its flight schedule. Flight 957, which was arriving on Kwajalein from Honolulu on Wednesdays (Kwaj day), now arrives on Tuesday (Kwaj day), and continues on to Guam. This is a return to the schedule in existence prior to July 7. Check-in times remain between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m.

Seats may be purchased with a credit card, and calls made three weeks in advance will allow Aloha to mail tickets to the passenger. Otherwise, Aloha tickets may be booked and purchased by calling or stopping by the Kwajalein Continental Travel Office. Prices are the same wherever the ticket is purchased.

Passengers on all local airlines are allowed two pieces of luggage, each weighing up to 70 pounds. Travel agents also suggest all passengers reconfirm reservations shortly before departure and arrive early for check-in.





IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER
Elevated Lead Levels on Meck Island

All U.S. Army drinking water systems on Kwajalein Atoll are regularly tested for lead at various locations in the distribution system. Drinking water may pick up lead from lead and brass pipes and plumbing fixtures as it travels from the treatment plant to the point of use. At the treatment plant, the water does not contain lead, but it may pick up lead as it travels through piping and fixtures within buildings. Thirteen samples were taken on Meck Island during July, and three contained lead in excess of 15 micrograms per liter (µ/L), which is above the EPA "Action Level" for drinking water. This does not mean the water is unfit for drinking; the EPA sets its Action Level based on chronic (lifetime) consumption of water containing trace amounts of lead. As a result of this Action Level, the Utilities Department has initiated corrosion control measures on Meck Island. These measures help prevent lead in the pipes from dissolving into the water.

You can take the following steps to reduce your exposure to lead:

- Flush your water faucet for 15-30 seconds before using it for drinking or cooking, particularly after the water has been standing in the pipes for more than eight hours, such as overnight. This flushes any standing lead from the pipes.
- Don't use hot tap water for cooking; instead, heat cold tap water on a stove. Lead dissolves more easily in hot water.

Infants and children who drink water containing lead in excess of the Action Level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink water containing lead levels above the Action Level over the period of many years could develop kidney problems, high blood pressure, or may be at an increased risk of getting cancer.

Renegade dishes out country music

Hawaii and country-western music. It's as unlikely a pairing as eating pineapple at a rodeo. But, if it works ...

It worked Tuesday night at the Yokwe Yuk Club as the Hawaii-based band, Renegade, took to the stage to play popular country-western tunes. A second concert followed Wednesday night at the Richardson Theater.

"It keeps us going," said lead vocalist Chris Spencer of the band's choice of musical expression. "We're pretty diverse."
