## Building boom echoes across Kwajalein Atoll

It's no secret there's a building boom at USAKA/KMR. As brisk trade winds blow clouds of coral dust over Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, crews are making progress in what seems to be a never-ending series of projects.

In the Kwajalein road repaving project — which has turned into the road repaving and sidewalk repair project — about one-third, or 10,000 tons, of the asphalt expected to be used is already on the roads.

Two thousand linear feet of sidewalks and curbs are being installed, mostly on Lagoon and Ocean roads. Unlike in the states, where sidewalks are used to protect pedestrians from traffic, here on Kwaj they serve a different purpose.

"The main purpose is to support the gutters and swales which provide storm drainage and watershed, to make sure we're not having a whole lot of standing water," said Doug Vander Veen, construction project manager.

Eliminating standing water will keep the roads in better condition longer, according to James Landgraff, USAKA/KMR project manager.

With a few exceptions, only existing roads and sidewalks are being redone. "This is a repair project," Landgraff said.

The sidewalk crews are keeping up with the paving equipment, and that's keeping every-

## Indonesian cadets entertain Kwaj

Battling walruses marched down the streets of Kwajalein amid the thunder of drums and the blast of trumpets Thursday afternoon, as the island's favorite visitors, the Indonesian naval cadets of the tall ship *KRI Dewaruci*, once again entertained residents.

The parade snaked its way from the three-masted tall ship at Echo Pier, south down Lagoon Road, and across 9th Street to Ocean Road, before working its way to Brandon Field. The cadets were joined by scores of children pushing bikes, apparently in awe of the spectacle — particularly the trio of drumming walruses. The walrus is the Indonesian navy mascot.

The band featured drums, trumpets, and an acrobatic baton leader. It played a variety of different tunes, including "Auld Lang Syne" and "The

Star Spangled Banner."

The parade was the highlight of the *Dewaruci's* three-day visit to Kwajalein, which is only the beginning of a very long journey for its 78 cadets and 60 crew members.

After leaving Kwajalein today, the ship will make its way to Pearl Harbor en route to the Panama Canal, with stops at Alameda and Acapulco. Once through the canal, the *Dewaruci* will head up the east coast of the United States, visiting Miami, Norfolk, Baltimore, Boston, and New York, where it will participate in a July 4th parade.

Midshipman Yoni N. Kushmawan, conducting ship tours Wednesday evening, said the voyage is the first trip abroad for most cadets.

"I'm very excited," said the third-year cadet. "This is the final exam for us to be an officer."

She adds, "Do everything you did when you first arrived and everything was new. Time passes much too quickly, and you regret not having done those things more often."

## **KMR Photo Lab closed for improvements**

The KMR Photo Lab remains down for facility improvements after closing March 20.

FOM crews are replacing an antiquated motor control center, which is part of the electrical system for the building, and adding an air handler to the existing air-conditioning system. This air handler will pre-cool and filter air, in an effort to improve the environmental conditions at the Photo Lab.

The \$70,000 project will take 1,600 man-hours to complete, said Ed Black, FOM Mechanical and Electrical superintendent.

"It's a big job," Black said. "But it's not something out of the ordinary. We do these from time to time."

The plan is to create positive air pressure in the building, meaning that air from the outside is not sucked inside when doors are opened, said Jack Shipman, Photo Lab manager. That's important for the equipment used by the Photo Lab.

"With all the computers and optics systems, we need to have clean air flow into the building," Shipman said. "With the salt air coming in, you'll have internal corrosion."

During work on negatives, certain areas must be dust-free also, he added.

While the crews work on the building, Shipman's team of photography professionals will be draining chemicals from machines, cleaning the machines, and performing other needed maintenance, despite the frequent power outages and limited air conditioning.

## Kwaj ESL students have something to talk about

Kwajalein is a multi-cultural community with many languages spoken. Nowhere is this more evident than in the schools.

Children from cultures as diverse as Central America, Asia, and Pacific island nations enter Kwaj classrooms to learn the subjects and lessons that will mold their lives. The Kwajalein school system places students with limited or no English language skills into the English as a Second Language (ESL) program, which helps children from kindergarten through 12th grade.

The program's teachers, Judy Ryan and Rob Murphy, use a number of methods to teach language skills, including pictures, games, puppetry, videos, newspapers, and plays.

"The scope of the ESL program has

increased all over the world in virtually every country," Murphy said. "English has become *lingua franca* in most fields, including aviation, medicine, and technology."

There are about 50 students in the ESL program this year, a substantial increase from the five or six students of previous years. This is due to larger numbers of Marshallese residents on Kwajalein.

Last year, the Kwajalein school system started giving language proficiency exams. Each student who is being considered for inclusion in ESL or is already in the program is tested yearly until he or she reaches proficiency. A large number of students have already been weaned from the ESL program and are participating in the regular school curriculum.

"Students come in with varying degrees of knowledge of English," Ryan

said. "Our primary concern is language development. The four things we concentrate on are speaking, reading, listening, and writing, all of which are incorporated into the ESL program."

The goal for Ryan and Murphy, when teaching younger children, is the establishment of a good foundation in the English language. Concentration is on the general words and sentence composition used in everyday life.

For older kids, the necessary language skills must include more technical and specific language, since the students will be learning science, mathematics, and other complicated subjects requiring those linguistic skills.

Research shows that it takes about seven years for people to become proficient in a foreign language.

"By 12, a child has developed adult learning habits and will find it harder to develop proficiency in a second language," Murphy said.

The ESL teachers also stress that English is a difficult language to learn, filled with complex statements, slang, and intonation. For example, it is easy to change the entire mean-

ing of a sentence merely by changing the tone of voice in the proper place.

"Too many people communicate in too complicated a form of English with non-native English speakers," Ryan said. "Limited English does not mean limited intelligence, but that they simply have not developed their language skills in a second language. Easily understood words and sentences are preferable."

Ryan who also serves as art teacher for the Kwajalein school system, is a graduate of Wright State University, with master's degrees in education, Teaching English to Speakers of other Languages (TESOL), and art education. She has taught in the U.S., Germany, and Brazil.

Murphy is a graduate of Georgetown University with a master's in linguistics and a minor in TESOL. He has taught in the U.S. and Istanbul, Turkey.

Ryan, who has been on Kwaj for one year, and Murphy, with two years of island life, say they enjoy their jobs immensely.

They both teach in the evenings at the College of the Marshall Islands on Gugegue.

thing right on schedule, according to Vander Veen.

The asphalt equipment moves next to old housing on the east side of Lagoon Road, then to the mini-mall and industrial areas. Parking lots where crews have been laying underground cable and storm drains will be last to get a new layer of blacktop. Repaving is expected to be finished on Kwajalein sometime in June.

After that, crews will clean up and work on the shoulders throughout the summer. "Just because we're not there doesn't mean we're not coming back," said Vander Veen.

Once paving is completed on Kwaj, the asphalt equipment will be taken to Meck Island to redo the roads.

At the mini-mall, the improvement project that began last month is moving ahead toward its midsummer completion date.

"Most of what they're doing you can see," said Joe Loer, RSE project manager for the landscaping. The sidewalks are in, and the covered walkways are nearly finished. Once that's done, the asphalt equipment will be brought in to pave the mini-

mall.

Meanwhile, Loer and Roxana González-Ball, botanist for the Kwajalein Public Gardens, are working together to lay out an exact vegetation plan for the mini-mall planters that will be built in the coming weeks. Loer said at least 500 plants are going in. There will be a mix of hearty native plants and colorful ornamentals.

Behind Café Pacific, another very apparent change is in the works around Sunrise Bakery.

"We're transforming the area into a little sidewalk café," Loer said.

In addition, dumpsters will be eliminated or concealed.

In housing, two projects are under way on Kwaj.

As of March 18, the renovation of the Reef BQ, located directly across from the Yokwe Yuk Club, is about a third complete. The demolition is finished, and crews are starting to put in the interior walls, said Gene Dohrman, USAKA/KMR project manager.

San Juan Construction is doing the \$6.2 million renovation. When it's complete, about a year from now, the Reef will have 88 private rooms,

each with a private bath.

Renovation of the 30-year-old Reef began late last year. Residents have been relocated to temporary trailers until the work is completed. Next on the list is the Pacific BQ, pending congressional approval. That plan calls for converting 74 shared rooms to 150 single rooms.

Work is moving right along on 15 dome houses for Boeing employees, at a site on Ocean Road across from new housing.

Henry Duhay, project engineer for Dick Pacific Construction Co., said they have finished 10 of 15 foundations and patios for the homes.

Crews from Domes International began putting the temporary housing units together Tuesday. Domes will also finish the interiors of the homes. The houses should be ready for families to move in by September.

Despite the dust and noise, projects on Kwaj aren't the biggest under way at USAKA/KMR. On Roi, J.A. Jones Construction is building a new power plant. It's a \$35.2 million project, set to replace the current power generating plant, built in 1962.

"The old plant is long past its usefulness," Dohrman said.

The power plant is about 20 percent complete and should be finished by the end of 2001.

At Launch Hill on Meck Island, Dick Pacific Construction Co. is moving forward on the \$6.2 million National Missile Defense Ground-Based Interceptor project. This project to construct two new missile silos is about 40 percent finished.

According to Matt Lee of Dick Pacific, silo No. 1 is completely excavated and ready for a construction shaft to be installed. Once that is complete, the silo liner will be put in.

The silo liners, provided by Boeing/LSI, will sit in 76-foot holes on Launch Hill. Dick Pacific is using cofferdams to retain the coral and sand while it digs the holes 36 feet below sea level. The silo project and expansion of the missile assembly building on Meck is expected to be finished in June.

## Golfers off to the races for annual tourney

The Kwajalein Golf Association is hosting the 30th annual Coral Open and accompanying Horse Race in May, and it's not too early to start qualifying.


