Air service continues after DoD mandate

Commuters who travel by air will go to work by helicopter Saturday, since the contract covering the Raytheon 1900Ds expires today.

But officials plan to get fixed-wing air service off the ground next week.

Berry Aviation, a sub-contractor to AirScan, will arrive early next week with a pair of Fairchild Metroliner aircraft, a Beech 1900C and pilots trained and certified to fly them, according to Maj. Matt Reed, director of USAKA Logistics and Community Services.

"Flight operations for duty personnel, Roi residents, perishable food and mail, will not be interrupted," Reed said.

But don't plan a dive trip to Roi this weekend. There are

TRADEX begins new life after modernization

TRADEX engineers wasted no time once their sensor gained initial operations capability status Wednesday by tracking items in space Thursday.

"Everything went really well and we're ready for [upcoming mission] GT-32," said Henry Thomas, TRADEX Kwajalein Modernization and Remoting Lead for MIT/LL.

"There's no real rest for the weary," said Mark Schlueter, TRADEX sensor leader. "We started fulfilling our commitment to U.S. Space Command for 10 hours of catalog tracking, and that started today."

The completion of TRADEX marks the last item on the checklist for KMAR, a five-year program to modernize the radars, optics and telemetry sensors on the range, though planning for the project dates back to 1997.

For the radars, the program acts as "an enabler," because it opens the doors for future operational options, said Mohamed Abouzahra, MIT/LL site manager.

"It's a new world, enabling us to do things we couldn't do before," Abouzahra said.

For example, "six years ago, a 'quick

Thanks, farewell, job well done, RSE; welcome KRS


Kwajalein is a great place to live and work. Today, on the eve of the contract changeover, I want to give special thanks to the people who've worked so hard to make it that way.

The next time someone tells you you're wasting your time on that video game, point to locals Steve Martindale and Gary John.



Roi historian and Supply veteran plan departures

TRADEX lost a 37-year veteran of both Kwaj and Roi on Saturday, while Supply loses a 42-year veteran on Saturday.

"A storehouse of knowledge"

Edward "Ted" Burris' love of history brought him to Kwajalein Atoll, it is what he was known for while he was here and history will be his initial focus when he returns to western New York.

"I was doing graduate studies in cultural anthropology at the University of Hawaii when I ran out of money. I hired on with Global, liked it and stayed," he said.

Throughout his stay — "four years on Kwaj and the rest on Roi" — Burris spent his off hours involved with local history and volunteer work including setting up the first two scout troops on Ebeye.

"He is a storehouse of knowledge and stories about the January 1944 battle of Roi-Namur and the history of development of Kwajalein missile range," said Kerry Young, Burris' co-worker. "He volunteered as a frequent tour guide ... He has escorted uncounted numbers of veteran groups and other VIPs around the historic sites of Roi-Namur."

Although called the island historian, Burris doesn't look at it that way.

"They are wrong, most of it was current events," he laughed. "The biggest thing was the population growth [of both Kwaj and Roi] ... the population peaked in 1972 at 7,800. In 1972, there were 25 flights a day to Roi on planes with 30 to 54 seats. Right now there are six flights a day, with 19-passenger planes."

Originally hired as a Retail Office administrator on Kwaj, Burris ran the Furniture Warehouse before transferring to Roi as a billeting supervisor. He moved to Canton in the Phoenix Islands in 1974. In 1976,

he returned to Roi and became the TRADEX senior logistician.

For the last 30 years, Burris said he has been gathering information for a book which he hopes will be published this June.

"It will include the war and the time shortly before the war ...and the fact that Roi-Namur was not considered part of the Marshalls, rather a territory of the U.S. ... until 1968," he said.

The book also includes a biography of Burris' experiences here.

"His memories of the early 1960s on Roi-Namur, the living conditions ... in the earliest months, he lived on-board ships moored in the lagoon ... and stories of the Old Jackeroo Club have entertained residents for years," Young said.

When Burris gets home, he has a plan.

"My first order of business is to get the book printed," he said. "My sister is doing the final edit."

When the book is published, Burris plans to send copies out here.

"Hopefully it will show up in the library and everyone can have a look at it," he said.

"It will be hard to replace him"

At first, world traveler Johnny Kina won't be going far when he retires

Kwajalein was smaller when Johnny Kina moved to Kwajalein in August 1961 from his hometown Kona, Hawaii, in his quest for a job. Now after 42 years of work on Kwajalein and Meck, his initial plan Saturday is to move to Ebeye and live with his wife, Aren, and be surrounded by his children and nine grandchildren.

Already a world-traveler, having traveled in the states and overseas to Berlin during his stint in the Army that lasted from 1951 to 1956. Kina took his camera on a trip to Europe in the late 70s and on frequent visits of PCS'ed friends in the states during the 80s.

"At the time I was really interested in photography — I have all of [my travels] in albums," he said. "Now I won't be able to do that kind of traveling. I have my family and it costs a lot."

Sports, including softball, tennis, racquetball, volleyball and golf, were

his hobbies from the 1960s to 1980s, he said "Then I busted my Achilles tendon on my left side in 1986."

Now Kina walks for exercise.

Originally a janitor for Transport Company of Texas, in 1964 or 1965, Kina started working in Supply's shipping and receiving department for Global Associates under Bell Telephone.

"We were called BTL support," he said. In 1975,

he worked on Meck. He moved back to Kwajalein to work at GSK when McDonnell Douglas left.


Then he moved to warehouse 702 and worked provisions,

finally moving to warehouse 993, near the power plant, when construction was finished five years ago. Kina retires as warehouse Supply lead.

"With all the work he does here, it will be hard to replace him," said supervisor Sue Salvador. "He is so knowledgeable with the warehousing operation."

As for the future, Kina is leaving the door open to where he will go and what he will do; but no matter where he finally ends up, it will probably be a warm climate. Kina said he had enough of the cold when he lived in Berlin for four years.

"The only thing I didn't like in Berlin was the cold weather," he said. "Somehow I survived the four years out there."

Credit card service down for a day; food credit delayed

Consumers will have to lay off the plastic tonight and possibly tomorrow due to the contract transition, and meal card holders will have to wait before using their cards beyond the Café Pacific.

As part of the switch-over from Raytheon to Kwajalein Range Services, the retail accounts that drive local use of credit cards have to shut down as they are transferred from one company to the next, said Lloyd Jordan, Residential Services manager. The credit card machines must also be re-programmed.

The machines initially shut down Thursday evening with the transfer expected to be completed today, and possibly some bugs to be worked out tomorrow, he said.

Meanwhile, meal card holders who planned to use their cards at Three Palms Snack Bar or the DSC will have to wait at least a month. The card readers and software that make the system possible are still enroute to Kwajalein, said Joe Marshall, KRS Community Services manager.

Under the system, those with meal cards will be able to use their cards for a specified, pro-rated amount, at the Café Pacific, snack bar, DSC and Yowke Yuk Club, when it reopens, Marshall said.

Officials hope to have the new system online in 30 to 60 days, he added.

no space available flights to Roi this weekend, he said.

Commuters may bring only small, hand-carried bags that fit under the helicopter seats and must wear closed-toed shoes to board. For seat reservations or more information call 56359.

The airplanes should be operating in time for Wednesday's town hall meeting on Roi-Namur, Reed added.

The measure follows a late-in-developing Department of Defense mandate that now requires Kwajalein to comply with existing FAA and DoD regulations regarding contracted air service. This mandate came down only recently, after new contractor AirScan, a sub-contractor for Kwajalein Range Services, had already developed its plan to provide air service, Reed said.

"This was at the 11th hour," Reed said.

"There's an awful lot of specific requirements to get [aircraft] certificated," said Chris Holloway, a spokesperson for AirScan. "It's a big change for us to bring that.

So AirScan partnered with Berry because the Texas company had the DoD-certified multi-engine aircraft and pilot training already.

"Berry comes to the table fully loaded and ready to go," Holloway said. "And we like them. They're a small company, like us, and they have highly trained pilots and crews, some from the Air Force."

Berry pilots and mechanics will continue the air service for up to 120 days in the Metroliner and 1900C aircraft.

The Metroliner is a 19-seat aircraft with a short, 57-inch-high, or 4-foot, nine-inch, cabin. Thus, the plane will offer passengers some discomfort from what they're used to in the 1900Ds, Reed said, but added it's a temporary measure.

Meanwhile, Kwajalein-based pilots, hired by AirScan, will fly helicopters and complete training assignments at Berry Aviation's training facility in Texas on the long-term aircraft.

With the new mandate, the Dash-8s, originally slated for service, or the Dash-7s, which served before the 1900Ds, won't be operating on Kwajalein, despite rumors to the contrary, Reed said, adding the long-term solution remains in the works.

Berry Aviation operates 16 aircraft total on charter flights for corporations, NCAA teams, private groups and other organizations, according to their Web site.

Pet owners must paws for thought

With the influx of pets on and off-island this week, veterinary technician Margaret Morrison has some reminders for pet owners.

A pet cannot be brought on island without a letter of approval. Sponsors of new residents wanting to bring pets with them need to contact Veterinary Services as soon as possible for information about pet importation and requirements necessary for the letter of approval.

PCSing pet owners

Owners must take their pets with them as stated in USAKA regulations. Only USAKA command can issue an exception to policy if extenuating circumstances do not allow a pet owner to take his or her pet with them.

Health certificates must be issued within 10 days of departure. Since flights can be delayed, pet owners

should schedule the veterinary clinic appointment as close to departure as possible.

Before leaving Kwajalein, one should call the Animal Port at Honolulu Airport to arrange pickup and transfer of the pet to the proper holding facility. The pet will be kept at the airport holding area if the layover is less than 24 hours and at the Honolulu quarantine facility, if the layover is longer.

Pet owner reminders

Cats need to be kept inside both day and night unless on a leash according to USAKA regulations and for the pet's own safety. Roaming, they can pick up worms, mange and feline AIDS which can be transmitted by a stray cat's bite.

Also, microchip IDs are required for all in-coming cats and dogs and are a good idea for those already on island. They are no available at the Kwajalein Veterinary Clinic.

Cohen's project blows away judges

Fourth-grader Isaac Cohen said he didn't expect to win so many awards at this year's annual science fair.

"I just wanted to try and do well," he said.

Cohen's project on wind-powered electricity, based on plans for a homemade wind turbine he modified from other plans on the Internet, scored the young man the Scientist of the Year award, Aeromet Atmospheric Sciences award, MIT/LL "Most Innovative" award and first place in his grade level.

"There's not enough natural resources for power so I was hoping to find something else," Cohen explained of his choice of projects.

He built the turbine with stuff around the house, a pair of paper sails mounted on a cardboard disk holding magnets with copper coils stationed below. As the wind spins the sails, the magnets passing over the coils create electricity, according to Cohen, who cited Faraday's Law.

Cohen then took his turbine around the island and recorded the most windy spots on Kwajalein.

But Cohen's was just one of 88 science projects varying in topics from wind power to tsunamis to what makes cat food taste good or which bubble

gum holds its flavor longest.

"Four years in a row, I've attended this and I always learn something new," said Dr. John Szczepanski, MIT/LL associate site manager and a judge for the event.

Range enters new age with 'enabler' ...

look' consisted of a couple Power Point slides in a few days," he said. "We can now give you a complete analysis and full briefing with movies in 12 hours."

The difference lies in uniformity.

With KMAR upgrades, engineers use the same data format for each radar and the same off-the-shelf tools to analyze the data, regardless of the source. Display screens will offer engineers a Windows-based, point-and-click ease as they monitor and track objects.

Some data goes to customers in "real time," or as it happens, Abouzahra said.

Furthermore, the same people can be used to analyze data from any source, because they're all trained on the format and tools. Also, components for one radar will work in other radars, should spare parts be needed.

The upgrades also allow engineers to track more targets than before, Abouzahra said, and remote many operations from the radar on Roi-Namur to the Kwajalein Mission Control Center. So much so, the number of commuters flying to Roi in the mornings has dropped dramatically, eventually to as few as 30, said Jeff DeLong, radars manager.

In addition, the "enabler" gives the range the option to market test beds, or experiments that operate along with, but don't influence the results of, a particular mission. In short, the range can have more than one customer per mission, and that is good for business, Abouzahra said.

As an enabler, too, "now we can do some really neat stuff," said Chuck Smith, radar modernization leader for MIT/LL, referring to smaller enhancement projects and upgrades.

"A lot of other things will spring-board from this," said RSE Site Manager John Wallace. "Some things we haven't thought of yet."

Thomas, however, already has some ideas including something regarding evaluating mission complexes and another for space tracking.

"Biting off a small project and working it through, you can see the rewards sooner," Thomas said. "The rewards for this [KMAR] are much greater, but so is the stress."

The radar is the fourth sensor in the KREMS complex on Roi-Namur to undergo KMAR upgrades.

"The thing about starting and finishing a project is you get to see what you did well and what you didn't do so well," DeLong said. "And there weren't many things, as a team, we didn't catch and fix."

KMCC underwent a facelift in the summer of 2000, paving the way for the remoting projects to come. ALCOR became the first radar remoted in October 2000, after 10 months work, followed by MMW in 2001, after 81/2 months on the job.

ALTAIR crews finished its KMAR upgrades in June after 81/2 months work. With ALTAIR, however, engineers had to add in space tracking capabilities, something they would later use with TRADEX, as well. But TRADEX had a few unique characteristics.

"In doing the other radars we learned a lot," Thomas said. "When we got to TRADEX, we were concentrating more on TRADEX-specific issues."

"We worked closely with our subsystems people in Lexington (Mass.). There was a lot of testing and debugging and more testing. It's a continuous cycle," he added.

Schlueter said for weeks the process involved the arrival of new software, followed by more tests before everything checked out.

"It's been a real milestone reaching this point, as quickly as we did," he said. "Part of that was anticipated because of the learning curve, but we had fewer people, too, and we had some resource limitations."

Timing affected the project, too.

"It provided some significant technical challenges because TRADEX has some unique waveforms and other aspects and there was the loss of people in dealing with the contract transition," Smith said.

"Everyone pulled together," said Thomas. "There was a lot happening, but there was always someone there to pick up the ball. It was a good team effort."

According to Wallace, the crews put the job first.

"People put their badges aside and worked side-by-side," Wallace said. "There was a lot of extra effort, and the credit goes to the people working on this project who didn't let the distractions get in the way."

The KMAR project will go down in

Kwaj history as one of the biggest since the construction of the radars, and certainly a project with one of the longer-term impacts, too, according to Abouzahra, Wallace and Smith.

"This will be a model program for years to come," Smith said.

And throughout the five-year program, supporters met some disbelief, too.

"There were a lot of people who didn't think it would work," Smith said, echoing Abouzahra and Thomas. "We won a lot of believers over after ALCOR and then we won a few more after MMW. After ALTAIR, everyone knew it would work, so by the time we started TRADEX, it was sort of anti-climactic because it was over in a lot of people's minds."

One of those original disbelievers was Wallace.

"I was skeptical at first," he said. "It's been successful beyond belief and made a lot of believers out of people including me. And it came in pretty much on schedule and on budget. That almost never happens. I think that's because it was well thought out, not a knee-jerk reaction. They really thought through the solutions before starting."

"And we did this in the worst of circumstances," DeLong said. "It's the most corrosive environment, with older equipment and more daily requirements than other radars in the world with little or no impact on missions. You can't touch that."

Abouzahra commented on the outstanding support that was provided by Raytheon and the government through the project.

"It was a pretty challenging process, but we were able to work together," he said. "This project was carried out during four range commands. It was conceived under the command of Lt. Col. Richard DeFatta, initiated under Lt. Col. Jerry Cornell, started to become operational under Lt. Col. Raymond Jones and completed during the Command of Lt. Col. Clarence Johnson."

Abouzahra said the next MIT/LL project would focus on upgrading the KMCC to handle all of the additional data streaming from the sensors.

"It's not at the same level [as the radars]," Abouzahra said. "[KMCC] has to utilize what the radars are giving them."






