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New lieutenant colonel among our ranks

Maj. Travis Cornett was promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel Tuesday during a ceremony held at the command conference room. U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site Commander Col. Joseph

Gaines conducted the promotion ceremony. Cornett's wife Catherine and three children, Logan, Gabe and Josie attended, along with other USAKA personnel.

This marks Cornett's fourth promotion in a 17-year military career. "It tells you how rare promotions are in the officer corps," said Gaines. He recalled Cornett's journey to becoming lieutenant colonel, highlighting accomplishments during his military career, including graduating from Eastern Washington University as a Distinguished Military Graduate, his training at Command General Staff College and his critical position as a Military Transition Team chief for the Iraqi Army in Diyalla province.

Maj. Stephen Parrish published the orders, recognizing Cornett's promotion to lieutenant colonel upon recommendation from the Secretary of the Army, who "has placed special trust and confidence in the patriotism, integrity and ability of Maj. Travis W. Cornett."

Gaines administered the oath of office.

Cornett thanked Gaines for the opportunities given to him here at USAKA. He thanked the entire USAKA team for making this place such an enjoyable environment to live and work in.

"This is a team sport," said Cornett. "The Army is an environment where you succeed or you fail as a group. I have had a tremendous experience throughout my career with people who have just set me up to succeed. It's no different here." He concluded by thanking his family for their support during relocations and deployments throughout his career.

RustMan Triathlon

There were a total of 13 teams and 21 individuals who completed the 33rd annual RustMan Swim-Bike-Run Triathlon Monday. The event was co-sponsored by Kwajalein Running Club and Kwajalein Range Services Community Activities department.

U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site Commander Col. Joseph Gaines addressed the swimmers with words of encouragement and sounded the start horn at the base of Echo Pier at 4 p.m.

Winds were light-to-none and bike times were subsequently fast; however, the run course was warm and muggy. There were 13 repeat solo contestants and nine of those had personal best times, some by large margins. It was a speedy year indeed. Interestingly, four husband and wife pairs competed as individuals.

Chad McGlenn was the overall winner in 2 hours, 8 minutes and 36 seconds – a new men's masters record. The old record of 2:14:16 was set by Tom Cardillo in 2008. This was only the third breaking of the 2:10 barrier in 33 competitions and an almost 10-minute improvement by hard training McGlenn over his 2011 time. McGlenn also marked a new men's individual fastest bike segment at 1:03:25; the old record belonged to Alan Calvert at 1:07:18, set in 2010. Nine-time RustMan veteran Cardillo finished second this year in a personal best of 2:11:42, the fastest non-winning

time ever. Cardillo achieving a personal best at age 44, after so many participations and welcoming a new baby in the last year, is remarkable.

Ladies winner Krystal Peterson broke the 2:20 barrier in 2:18:16 – a remarkable personal best over her last participation in 2006. That year, Peterson was first in 2:24:09. She is the only the third female to join the 'Sub-2:20 Club.'

Kendall Westhoff, an eighth grader, smashed the male junior high record with a 2:19:17 first-time performance. The old record was 2:28:57 by Dan Hillman way back in 1992. Fellow eighth-grader Michael Sykes turned in a very respectable time for his first participation.

Island visitor Ray Smead became the 'Most Mature' RustMan finisher ever (born August 1938). Smead returned to Kwajalein as a visitor to participate and reunite with friends. Smead participated in RustMan 1 in 1980 as a resident. This was Smead's 10th participation. Victor Langhans became the fourth Social Security Eligible solo finisher, born March 1944.

The winning team of Shawn Brady, Calvert and Shawn Hebert pushed the team record under the 2-hour barrier at 1:59:21. Calvert rode his bike at an unprecedented, blazing 9-minutes per airfield loop, lowering that segment record from 1:03:27 way down to 1:00:21.

All competitors finished and there were no reports of road rash. No IV fluids were required. The race support staff included around 50 community members.

Kwajalein Sports Association presented its highly anticipated Laser Tag gaming system Sunday in the MP Room. Kids and adults of all ages showed up to try out Kwajalein's newest form of entertainment. It was a hit!

The new Laser Tag set up was purchased by KSA and was supported by Kwajalein's Quality of Life Fund for the community's use. The game consists of 16 sets of equipment. Each set has a laser gun used to "shoot" your opponents to score points, along with a vest with laser receptors where opponents can "shoot" you.

Games are split up into 8-10 minute rounds, assuring everyone a chance at non-stop action. At the end of each game, an internal gaming program tallies up both individual and team point totals and sends them to a display where you await the results. The score count adds a sense of competition to each match.

Amnesty boxes now available

The Unexploded Ordnance Disposal team would like the community to know there are now 24-hour amnesty collection points currently located at the passenger terminal of Building 901, the Kwajalein Small Boat Marina and at the end of the Roi-Namur passenger terminal. Amnesty boxes are available to the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

There are currently two amnesty boxes located on Kwajalein and one located at the air terminal on Roi (Building 8035). The boxes are small because they are not intended for large UXO items. The boxes are primarily intended for expired flares, small arms ammunition or other prohibited items that may have been kept as a souvenir, found in a new house or brought accidentally in household goods.

EOD wants to remind everyone that UXO are never to be picked up, but we really want to emphasize that UXO should never be picked up for the purposes of being placed in the box. If UXO of any size is found, the area should be marked. Immediately notify Kwajalein Police Department, EOD or the Provost Marshal Office immediately.

Amnesty boxes are just as the name implies. No one will get in trouble for placing contraband into an amnesty box. It is the U.S. Army and EOD's intention to recover any potentially harmful materials so they can be disposed of properly with no questions asked.





USCGC Jarvis resupplies, takes liberty at Kwajalein

The U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Jarvis made a pit stop at U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll to resupply, refuel, and to the pleasure of the 170 crew members aboard, get some much-needed liberty time on land.

Jarvis arrived at Kwajalein Wednesday. The crew spent most of the day restocking the ship's supply, which included 5,000 pounds of food. Refueling is also essential.

Jarvis Captain Webster Balding said Kwajalein is a critical location for resupply and refueling quickly. The large ship can refuel here in just a few hours compared to over 12 at some ports. What he appreciates more, however, is to be able to come to Kwajalein, kick back and relax for a few hours.

The crew held a Hail and Farewell celebration at the Vet's Hall Wednesday night. Over 50 crew members, one-third of their total ship staff, will be moving on to different assignments. Chief Officer Brad Stevens is actually retiring after 24 years of sea time. Balding is also leaving for staff duty in Virginia.

Jarvis is finishing a 3-month patrol loop from Honolulu to the Marshalls, Guam, Palau, back to Guam, Nauru Island, Kwajalein and then finally back to home port in Hawaii.

USAKA Draft Removal Action Memorandum for Kwajalein Tank Farm Site and Roi Power Plant Site

Hourglass Reports

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards require proposed removal activities be described in a Removal Action Memorandum. The Standards also provide regulatory agencies and the public opportunities to review and comment on a Draft RAM.

The Draft RAM for the Kwajalein Tank Farm Site and Roi Power Plant Site, April 2012, provides a summary of information related to the proposed time-critical removals at these sites. The actions are the next step in USAKA's Installation Restoration Program to clean up soil and groundwater contamination from fuel spills at the Kwajalein Tank Farm Site and Roi Power Plant Site.

The public is invited to review and comment on this Draft RAM document. Copies of the Draft RAM and the USAKA Environmental Standards

are available for review at the RMI EPA Offices on Majuro, the Grace Sherwood Library on Kwajalein and the Roi-Namur Library. Computer users with internet access can view this information at the USAKA IRP website, www.usakacleanup.info.




