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U.S. Pacific Fleet Commander visits Kwajalein and tours Roi radar assets

U.S. Pacific Fleet Commander Adm. Cecil Haney and his team visited Kwajalein July 18. They flew to Roi-Namur where they were given a tour of Kiernan Reentry Measurements Site by MIT and Kwajalein Range Services engineers, and U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll personnel. Accompanying Haney was Reagan Test Site Director Lt. Col. Dean Wiley.

Haney first visited ALTAIR, where MIT engineer Dr. Aaron Fleet explained to him the capabilities of the radar and the maintenance measures taken to keep the radar functioning in the Pacific climate. Next, MIT engineer Sean Winkler toured Haney around MMW. Finally, Haney visited TRADEX, where MIT engineer Jeff Shultz explained its history and tracking capabilities.

Haney and his team left Kwajalein that evening, heading to Saipan and Guam. Haney made his quick stop at Kwajalein after visiting Kiribati, where he observed Pacific Partnership 2013 events. Haney last visited Kwajalein in August 2012 with an U.S. delegation in order to meet with Republic of the Marshall Islands officials on Majuro and Ebeye.

Haney is a native of Washington, D.C., and a 1978 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in ocean engineering. He holds master's degrees in engineering acoustics and system technology from the Naval Post Graduate School, and a master's degree in national security strategy from the National Defense University.

Kwajalein Veterans' Hall is more than just a Saturday night hangout

The Kwajalein Veterans' Hall can commonly be associated with the words, "party" and "weekend." Many adults in the Kwajalein community visit the Vet's Hall to indulge in a drink or two while socializing. While the Vet's Hall does provide a relaxing hang-out to the adult community, there are ulterior purposes behind the establishment.

American Legion Post #44 is a non-profit organization that uses its proceeds to increase quality of life for residents in the Kwajalein community, as well as organizations abroad. The Vet's Hall covers the overhead costs of keeping inventory stocked, paying staff and maintaining the facility; all other proceeds are used to donate to veteran organizations, help community members in need and provide scholarships to high school graduates.

Most recently, the American Legion designed a campaign to raise money for the Helm family, long-time Kwajalein residents, as David continues his battle with cancer back in Alabama. Vet's Hall volunteers planned and sponsored a steak dinner that included a silent auction, raffle and live music. Bar profits and outside donations contributed to a \$10,000 donation to David for cancer treatment. While it didn't cover all costs, it was a huge help for his treatment in their time of need.

Currently, and once approved by the command, the Kwajalein Vet's Hall is looking into fundraising for a member of the Post #44 family, Don Serra, who was recently injured in a terrible motorcycle accident while vacationing stateside. He is currently in a rehab facility receiving treatment.

Donations are not just limited to local or known recipients. One of the main missions of American Legion Post #44 is to donate to veterans' charities. In the past, this has included Disabled Vets of America, Paralyzed

Kwajalein historical tour proves to be beautiful and thought-provoking

Hourglass Reports

Almost everyone agrees that Kwajalein is a magical, although sometimes “Kwajical” place. We have palm trees in our backyards, can walk to the beach whenever we feel like it, experience some of the best snorkeling in the world and can actually see the stars in our smog-free sky. But, there is an enormous aspect of Kwaj that people take completely for granted – if they’re aware of it at all. It’s our rich and eventful history.

“Sure, I know,” you’re probably thinking, “We were controlled by the Japanese before World War II, when the U.S. military seized control of the island in a relatively short but still bloody battle. What else is new?”

As anyone who has ever been on the

Kwajalein historical tour will gladly tell you, a whole lot more is new. Our island is teeming with fascinating little pockets of history that you might ride past every day and not even notice. To that end, two employees of the Hourglass staff who – like you, perhaps – have been here for a while and started to take things for granted, took the Kwajalein Historical Tour with the intention of learning just what our tiny island has to offer. What we discovered may surprise you.

The tour, which is typically taken unaccompanied, but is recommended with a group, starts with a pamphlet of information that can be picked up from the Community Activities office, in Building 805, upstairs next to the library. The pamphlet begins with a history of the island before WWII occurred, followed by the events leading up to the U.S. military force’s invasion of the Marshall Islands, code named “Operation Flintlock.” After reading the brief but intense history, we were ready to officially begin the tour.

The first stop was the Marshallese Cultural Center, located in the field across from the airport terminal. Unfortunately, we quickly discovered that the Cultural Center was closed for the summer, so we snapped a few pictures of the outside and were off again, this time to the Japanese Air-Raid shelter, which is a concrete, white-painted building located across the street

from the fire station. It didn't look like much, and when we read the pamphlet description, we found out why. At the time of the war, the Japanese High Command expected the U.S. military to concentrate their attack on surrounding atolls. Therefore, many of their defenses on Kwajalein Atoll were weaker than those on surrounding Japanese-controlled atolls.

The next stop on the tour was simply a marker installed to identify the area where the first day's fighting took place. After pausing a few minutes to look out at the field beyond the marker, we continued down the road to the intersection of Lagoon Road and Olympus Drive, where two towering trees crown the Japanese memorial. This memorial looks simple but actually is filled with small mementos which pay tribute to the Japanese soldiers who died during Operation Flintlock. The front of the memorial stone has Japanese characters on it, and the back reads, "In memory of those gallant men who fought and died for their country at the Marshall and Gilbert Islands during the Second World War. May they lie in peace."

Next we stopped to see the beaches used for the landing of our military forces. The island was significantly expanded on both the western and northeastern tips after the war, so the "beaches" are now all fields, but the significance remains the same.

Other stops on the tour included the area where Japanese forces attacked at night, an ammunition bunker, the only surviving Japanese Concrete Rifle Pit, the Island Memorial Chapel, Richardson Theater (originally built using volunteer labor in 1944), Ocean View Club, Bunker Hill and the Commander's Residence, which was actually first built as an officer's club.

Overall, it was a great tour that I would recommend to anyone who is new here, visiting, or whose knowledge of history might be a bit rusty. The only downfall is that the tour makes its way down to the end of the runway and back up to Bunker Hill on the north side of the island, so be sure to gear up for a somewhat time-consuming – and sweaty – ride. Or, think ahead and rent a golf cart!

10th annual Coconut Cup Race held at Surf Shack




