USS Paul Hamilton served in Operation Desert Fox last year

It's the kind of award one would expect of the U.S. Navy's most advanced destroyer class.

The *USS Paul Hamilton*, an Arleigh Burke class destroyer, pulled into Kwajalein Wednesday morning. An overwhelming metal gauntlet of modern weaponry and high-tech radar, the ship recently received the Battle E (for Battle Efficiency) commendation, in part for its support of Operation Desert Fox in Iraq last year.

"Everybody's pretty proud of that. It took a lot of work," said Ensign Lou Ebinger, public affairs officer aboard the *Paul Hamilton*.

According to Ebinger, one ship is picked out of each squadron for the honor. It is awarded based on a ship's operational readiness and success, as well as the results of its training cycle.

While in the midst of yet another training cycle, the *Paul Hamilton* was in Kwajalein waters this week in support of the TCMP mission on Tuesday. Ebinger was unable to give details on the ship's role because of its classified nature.

"It was a special project for CNO - Chief of Naval Operations," he said.

The ship left Honolulu Sept. 1 with the *Port Royal*, a Ticonderoga class cruiser which briefly visited Kwaj Monday while on the same mission. The *Paul Hamilton* left here Thursday and was expected to return to Hono Sunday.

While on the interdeployment training cycle, the *Paul Hamilton*

Canvasback volunteers keep an eye on Marshallese health care while on vacation

A twig of a Marshallese woman, her right eye still squinting and tearing from a post-operative examination by Dr. Art Giebel, pushes a rough hand into the doctor's and gives it a shake, thanking him for helping return her eyesight.

"Thanks," Daisy says again, repeating the gesture to everyone else in the post-op room at Ebeye Hospital. She lingers a moment longer and then shuffles off, watched with smiles by several members of the Canvasback International Missions group.

"It's addicting," Giebel said of the volunteer work performed by him and six colleagues operating an eye clinic and performing surgery on Ebeye for two weeks.

"Three people usually get helped when you help one person," he added, explaining the eye surgery relieves


the stress put on a patient's caretakers, as well.

An ecumenical, non-profit organization, Canvasback serves the health needs of Micronesia. This year's group includes two eye surgeons, two OR nurses and two optometrists. Kathy King, a friend to the organization's founders, accompanied the group as coordinator.

King explained the mission was founded about 15 years ago and is sponsored by USAKA. It was founded by Jamie and Jacque Spruce, who had traveled to this part of the world and saw a need for better medical care. The group is one of the very few which visits the Republic of the Marshall Islands and provides this kind of service, according to Dr. Paul Barney.

"It's very gratifying," said Barney,

generally spends each week out at sea with inspectors on board evaluating its performance, Ebinger explained.

"It's actually very frequent now. We're going to start going out on a regular basis," he said. "We're just kind of knocking the rust off, and getting ready to go out again."

Boasting a host of weapons, the centerpiece of the Paul Hamilton's arsenal is the Tomahawk missile.

"It's our main weapon," Ebinger confirmed.

The Tomahawk, along with the ship's other air, land and sea weaponry, is monitored and deployed from the Combat Indoor Center. The armed nerve center of the Paul Hamilton, the CIC is the modern naval war room: Computer consoles fill every space in the dimly lit room, like a multi-million dollar arcade with garish green lights spilling out of monitors and radar screens.

The ship also sports the nation's most high-tech sensors, such as the RCA

Spy 1D phased arrays, the 3D AEGIS and Raytheon SPS 49CVJ7.

"They built the ship around AEGIS. It's one of our main capabilities," Ebinger said. "The sensor radar can pick up a grain of sand out of a sandstorm."

The Paul Hamilton is also equipped to protect itself from more insidious forms of attack, such as chemical or biological weapons. The Collective Protection System (CPS) is a series of air locks that seal off the innards of the ship from outside air, filling the inside with an additional atmosphere of pressure.

"It's basically designed to keep the bad air out," Ebinger explained.

During the Paul Hamilton's last deployment, it hit such ports as Kwajalein and Hong Kong, and traveled to Thailand, the Persian Gulf and Australia, where it visited Perth, Albany, Melbourne and Sydney.

"The ship's been around," Ebinger said of its recent travels.

Home alone and baby-sitting policy guidelines enacted at Kwajalein

A new policy memorandum concerning the regulation of home alone child care has been enacted at Kwajalein.

Regulations now require that authorized baby sitters must be a minimum of 12 years of age in order to provide baby-sitting services on Kwajalein. Also, children may not be left in the care of a person ages 12 to 17 for more than 12 hours.

Parents are encouraged to ensure that their baby sitter has been properly trained in infant/child CPR, basic first aid, and proper caregiver techniques.

"Kwajalein has been working for some time now on a policy memorandum, but it is now official," said Trina Tiffany, director of Kwajalein Atoll Preschool (KAPS). Tiffany also directs training for child care services in courses on baby sitting, as well as home alone training. "Prior to this, we were operating with drafts of the final regulation."

All U.S. military installations that have dependents are required to develop and maintain such a policy, and it was from a number of

these installations that the guidelines for Kwajalein's policy were adapted. Civilian child care regulations also provided some of the guidelines.

The new policy also requires that children under the age of nine be adequately supervised by either parents, KAPS or school-aged services, a certified family child care provider, another responsible adult/authorized baby sitter, or that they be enrolled in a youth center program.

"Military child care facilities are widely recognized as being among the best in the world," Tiffany said. "This policy is only a small part of the overall policies that every installation must have for home alone care. We have been about as lenient in our policies as we can get."

Locally, courses in baby-sitting and home alone care are provided through KAPS in association with Community Education, with the possibility of a mother's helper course for younger children if sufficient interest were to be shown. KAPS also maintains a list of qualified baby sitters that is available to the mem-

bers of the community.

The president of the United States has placed a requirement for accreditation of all military child care facilities. To that end, a military/civilian team visits Kwajalein each year to evaluate KAPS and school age centers for standards. There is also a requirement by child care services for a home alone policy.

For those children aged nine and older, supervision is to be based on their age and maturity. At a minimum, these children must be able to articulate and follow an emergency plan, including emergency point of contacts, and carry out fire evacuation plans. Parents are accountable to ensure their children of this age have an available and accessible point of contact that can provide consultation and/or assistance when required.

Children and youth between the ages of nine and 17 who are not receiving adequate supervision are considered on a case-by-case basis for possible neglect.

Meteorological rocket launch from Kwajalein set for Tuesday

A meteorological rocket launch operation from Kwajalein is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 14. Caution areas for this MET rocket will exist in the ocean within an area defined by the following coordinates:


- 8 degrees 51 minutes north, 166 degrees 30 minutes east;
- 8 degrees 43 minutes north, 167 degrees 43 minutes east;
- 7 degrees 51 minutes north, 166 degrees 52 minutes east.

The Kwajalein ground hazard is that area contained within a circle having a radius of 400 feet from the Kwajalein rocket launcher.

All personnel and craft must stay out of the caution and hazard areas between the hours of 12:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 14, or until the restrictions are lifted. The ground hazard area must be clear of all non-essential personnel no later than 12:30 p.m.

Softball teams rearm for new season

The 1999 fall softball season opened this week, with promise for new competition as divisions shuffled and teams reformed over the off-season.

Most notably, Podunkers, the dominant A Division team for years broke up, with members scattered among other teams. That leaves only two A Division teams — Son of BOB and Sunrise — which will play exhibition games against the six B Division teams, before facing off again in the A Division World Series.

Son of BOB, managed by Gordon Jones, came out strong in summer tournament play, and Sunrise was a contender in last year's A Division.

B Division will see the addition of three tough C Division teams from last season — The Criminals, PTO and Guppies.

Last season's C Division champions, the Guppies, and PTO both moved up to test their mettle in the B Division, while The Criminals combined all stars from the two Water Power teams of last season before joining the ranks of the higher division.

The B Division teams will play a single round robin and play two exhibition games against each of the A Division teams. A six-team tournament will follow regular season play to determine the World Series contenders.

With nine teams total, the C Division counts as the largest grouping. KPD, C Division runners-up in the spring season, could figure highly into the mix, but they will face new blood in Senators, Bombers, and Ruk Jen Leen. D Division champions, Chapel, moved up to the C Division, along with Eleu, formerly Spam Eleu, and G-4, formerly Brotherhood, to round out the division.

Playing a single round robin, each team will play a single exhibition game with a D Division team to round out the 10-game schedule. The top two teams, based on the nine regular season division games, will face off in the World Series.

The D Division has become a high school division with three

teams — Queen of Peace High School, Spartans Blue, and Spartans White. The three teams will play a triple round robin, and face three C Division teams. The top two teams, based on their performance in the triple round robin, will play in the World Series.

In the Women's Division, long-time powerhouse Homeplate returns to face a new group of Spartans I Women and six other teams. Queen of Peace, Spartans II, Jab Eliklik, and Jab II also return to the division. Newcomer Thirty-something combines team members from last season's Chix with Stix and The Wrecking Crew, while Coconuts, led by the Olson sisters (Julia and Lynn, not the twins from television), incorporates new blood in the women's ranks.

The eight registered teams will play a single round robin. The top four teams will enter a playoff for the Women's A Division championship, while the bottom four teams will form the B Division and play off for the championship.


