Hopefully this conference will help us better quantify the measures of a Space Professional, and their contributions to our Warfighters, our COCOMs and our nation.

I’m sure each of you will find this conference productive, beneficial and educational. I can’t stress enough the fact that success depends on you. Your input and expertise are absolutely essential for this conference to be successful.
