## January rainfall misses record by two inches

Kwajalein's weather patterns in January were more typical of the rainy season than the dry, windy season.

Kwaj received 13.42 inches of rain last month, the third highest monthly rainfall for a January since 1951. The total was 8.82 inches above normal, or 294 percent of normal. The record January rainfall at Kwaj is 15.66 inches, set in 1951.

Kwajalein had five days in which it rained one inch or more — the highest being 3.31 inches on Jan. 3. In all, Kwaj had 23 days in which measurable precipitation was recorded — well above the normal average of 15 days.


Why the atypical rainfall in January? Normally, during the dry season the east-northeast trade winds are very strong and blow more or less unimpeded toward the equator.

Last month, surface winds along the equator were stronger than normal, blowing up from the southeast. These equatorial winds then collided with the normal northeast trade winds. This convergence of air along our latitude often forced air upward, producing clouds and increased precipitation. In meteorological jargon, this is referred to as a "trade wind trough."

Also for January: The average daily high temperature was 83.6 degrees — well below the normal average of 85.8 degrees. The average low was a near-normal 77 degrees. The highest and lowest temperatures recorded were 85.1 and 74.5 degrees, respectively. The lowest maximum temperature was a rain-cooled 81.1 degrees, and the highest minimum tempera-

## Liberation Day looks to past, present, and future

Marshallese students dressed in their school uniforms — youngsters in red, yellow, purple, and green shirts carrying signs — gathered on Ebeye's Lagoon Road, waiting to march.

Soon the order was given by the flag-bearing police, and, along with the Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School band, the group moved out toward the open-air grounds near the dock for the annual Liberation

Day festivities.

It was a day for a parade, speech-making, singing, and games.

The day marked the 56th anniversary of the U.S. invasion of Kwajalein Atoll, which expelled the Imperial Japanese forces that had used the islands as a base during World War II.

"Today we celebrate the liberation of the Marshallese people from the forces of tyranny and oppression," said Lt. Col. David Stoddard, USAKA/

KMR deputy commander. "We're here in a celebration of friendship."

Stoddard asked the audience to remember the soldiers and Marshallese who fought and died for

the freedom they now enjoy, along with the suffering all endured at the hands of their oppressors.

"We must never forget the tragedies of war that took place 56 years ago," he said. "If we forget, we run the risk of history repeating itself. We will never forget.

"Today, you are a sovereign nation," Stoddard concluded. "It is an exciting time for your republic."

"We have a bright future now after surviving World War II," agreed Wilmer Bolkeim, mayor of Ebeye.

Sen. Ataji Balos noted that the Japanese treatment of Marshallese worsened throughout the war.

"We were caught in the middle," he said. "They (Japanese) were going to kill all Marshallese, until the Americans came. But that's how war goes.

"It is important today to remember the history," Balos added. "But we should also think about now and tomorrow. What we're going to do about the problems here ... The standard of living should be coming up."

Leroij Neimat Reimers came from Majuro to represent her mother, Leroij Neimata Nakamura, of the northern Kwajalein Atoll.

## Band rocks Liberation Day

The Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School band rocked Ebeye on Kwajalein Atoll Liberation Day Monday. Playing contemporary rock numbers such as "Rock This Town," by the Brian Setzer Orchestra and "Zoot Suit Riot," by the Cherry Popping Daddies, the 51-member band participated in the annual parade.

The event, which is usually a special holiday during the workweek, was celebrated this year on the weekend because the mid-week holiday conflicted with work hours for Marshallese employees on Kwaj.

Band members had plenty of good things to say about their lively participation in Liberation Day ceremonies.

"I look forward to the parade because it's one of the only times I get to see and enjoy Ebeye," said band member David Zakeri, a junior.

"I like going to Ebeye and performing in the Liberation Day parade because it's such a unique experience," added junior Christina Hamill. "Just seeing the kids appreciating our music makes you feel real special inside."

Concluded senior Jennifer Padayhag, "It feels really good to be a part of the ceremonies. It bonds Marshallese and Americans and creates a sense of unity."

## **Familiar faces will be missing from Kwaj scene**

Some long-long-time residents depart this week, taking with them memories of Kwajalein that date back as far as "the really good old days" of 1961.

**Bob and Marcia Chrivia** are booked on the Feb. 17 ATI flight, heading home to San Diego for a brief stop before they take off to pan for gold, go rock hounding, RV across Canada, and, in general, "see everything and everybody."


The Chrivias have been on island 27 years on two tours, 1965-72 and 1980-2000. Bob worked in Project Planning and Control and its predecessor, Work Control. Marcia worked for 20 years in the Retail Office.

All three Chrivia offspring attended school at Kwaj, but only one was on-island for high school graduation—Suzy, Class of '81. She returned to Kwaj in 1990 after getting a degree in electrical engineering and plans to remain. Bob Jr. now lives and works in San Diego, while John runs a laboratory and teaches at the University of St. Louis (Missouri) medical school.

In farewell, the Chrivias said, "We've made a lot of dear friends, and we'll miss them. They are invited to visit us in San Diego — if we don't visit them first."

**Bear and Cindy Kapahu** are packing it in after nearly 40 years at the range for Bear, including 3½ years at Roi, and five years of TDY visits plus almost 13 years on island for Cindy. They depart on the AMC flight Feb. 19 for Oahu.

Bear, everybody's favorite driver for Santa, Christmas carolers, and junior high hayrides, arrived at Kwaj in August 1961, when the Navy was still in charge, and has worked for every logistics support contractor since: TCT, Global Associates, Pan Am, Johnson Controls, and RSE. Since 1963, he has worked in Heavy Equipment as operator, lead man, assistant supervisor and supervisor.

He was involved in nearly every construction job in the atoll.

In 1975, Bear married Carolyn Verret, nurse-anesthetist at Kwajalein Hospital. She died of breast cancer in 1987.

Cindy, X-ray technologist in Imaging Services at the hospital, arrived on island in 1988, after five years of TDY visits, to provide coverage in the X-ray laboratory. She and Bear were married in 1992.

Cindy started the mammography service on Kwaj in 1993, following the guidelines of the American College of Radiology. In 1994, she led the program to gain certification from the ACR and the Food and Drug Administration.

When long-time Kwaj resident German Rodrigues, a close friend of Bear's, died of cancer in 1995 (a year after his wife, Florina, passed away),

Bear and Cindy assumed legal guardianship of the three Rodrigues children on island: Nica, 17; Junior, 15; and Nani, 14. All three are now pursuing college degrees.

Bear and Cindy plan to build a home in Makaha, Oahu, and spend time with children and grandchildren. Cindy will do mammography in Hawaii, returning to Kwaj when needed to provide TDY coverage for Imaging Services.

"I have lots of happy memories of friends and good times on Kwaj," said Bear in farewell. "Now I want to get my children and grandchildren around me and enjoy them."

Cindy added, "I've really enjoyed my time here. I'm looking forward to filling in when they need someone in Imaging."

"The community has been terrific, and we'll miss everyone."

ture was 79.3 degrees. Surface winds were 4.3 knots below normal, averaging only 10.7 knots.

In February, Kwajalein is normally at the height of the dry season. Average monthly rainfall drops to a mere 3.23 inches and an average of 13 days with precipitation. Also, the trades remain quite brisk, averaging 14 knots from the east-northeast. The average high and low temperatures vary little from January, averaging approximately 86 and 77 degrees, respectively. The record maximum rainfall in February is 10.21 inches, recorded in 1996. The driest February on record is four-tenths of an inch, set in 1977.

## Lupton helps spruce up Mic Shop

It takes only a quick trip to the Micronesian Handicraft Shop to see the changes. It's brighter, better organized, and easier to shop in.

The shop chairman, Penny Stoddard, gives credit to "volunteer extraordinaire," Betty Lupton.

According to Stoddard, it's Lupton who has made the shop more appealing.

Co-chairman Laura Leeper said, "She's added her decorator touch, and made an ordinary place-of-sale into a boutique."

Shop officials haven't compared fall revenues to 1998 yet, but their sense is the changes, including new hours, have increased sales in the shop.

"How the items are displayed makes a big difference. That's why we're seeing more sales. A great presentation makes an item more desirable," Stoddard said.

"People want to stop by now to see what's new," she added.

More than 20 volunteers from the Yokwe Yuk Women's Club staff the Mic Shop. Most donate 2-4 hours a month. Lupton spends eight to 10 hours a week. Christmas week she was there 20 hours.

Lupton dusts, restocks, and uses her own resources to decorate the shop.

Despite her dedication, Lupton is reluctant to take credit for the shop's

success. She wants people to know that her friend of nearly 25 years, Judy Strobhar, works right beside her.

"I guess I get a lot of enjoyment out of it. It's for a good cause," Lupton said. "[Our] buying the products helps the Micronesian craftsmen, and the money is so important for them."

Strobhar added, "The big benefit [goes to] the children."

Last year, the shop donated \$26,000 to the club's Education and Assistance Committee. The money benefits educational needs throughout Micronesia.

The handicrafts come from craftsmen throughout the region.

Lupton said she thinks helping the children is a fantastic cause and sees her volunteer effort at the shop as a creative outlet.

This is not Lupton's first foray into turning a gift shop around. When she lived in Mississippi, her volunteer efforts brought a hospital gift shop from just breaking even to donating \$200,000 to the hospital each year.

Lupton said she likes doing the displays and decorating.

The Mic Shop is open Mondays 4-6 p.m., Tuesdays and Thursdays 10 a.m.-12 p.m., Fridays 6-8 p.m., and Saturdays, 12-2 p.m.

## Scoliosis screening for junior/senior high students set Feb. 19

On Saturday, Feb. 19, scoliosis screening will be conducted by hospital personnel on all students in grades 7-12 at the junior/senior high school.

Scoliosis is an abnormal, sideways curvature of the spine. Most curvatures do not progress to a level needing medical treatment. However, in a small percentage of people, the spinal curve may progress to a point requiring bracing, or, in advanced cases, spinal surgery.

By conducting a brief annual screening and detecting an abnormal

curve early, medical personnel can initiate treatment that will slow down progression of the curvature.

The screening involves careful observation of the student's spine while he or she is bending forward. Medical personnel check the shoulders, shoulder blades, hips, and arm length for symmetry. Any curve noted on the spine is measured with a scoliometer.

Screening results will be sent home for all students. Those with a positive finding for scoliosis will be notified by the school nurse to schedule a follow-up check with a physician.





# Science fair big on technology

Rube Goldberg would have felt right at home Monday and Tuesday evenings at the MP room.

Small cars, each loaded with a raw egg, raced pell-mell toward a wall of razor-sharp nails. Boats, powered by rubber bands or balloons, spun in circles or sat suspiciously too still to be classified as participants. Pingpong balls ran like rats through a maze of tubes and wheels. An ordinary school chair turned into a low-flying machine with the help of a vacuum cleaner and two pairs of strong 13-year-old arms. Finally, there was a graphic exploration of the past, present, and future of shoes, including jet sneakers resembling small hovercraft.

But this was not a home for Rube Goldberg wannabes. It was the Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School Science and Technology Night, organized by parents Jeff DeLong and Randy Razook.

"We want the kids to apply hands-on building skills," said Derek Brower, high school science teacher.

According to Brower, the students who volunteered to participate were given four competitions to choose from. Three were local contests; the fourth, called the ExploraVision National Contest, was offered by Toshiba and the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA).

One team of eighth-graders, Stephanie Flavin, Camilla Morrison,

Christina Padayhag, and Michelle Corder, entered the ExploraVision contest Feb. 2, with a graphically illustrated extrapolation of future footwear. If selected as one of 24 regional finalists, the team will receive a laptop computer to build a web page using its graphics and will travel to Washington for the final judging.

Of the three other competitions, the Mousetrap Race Car "Wall of Death" generated the most interest.

The Jets, with Justin DeCoster and Rachael Stepchew, and the Firebolts, with Meghan Cummings and Alyssa Reed, both elementary school teams, tied for first place.

"With more participation ... next year can be even better," Brower said.
