## Aviation maintenance program seeks edge over the elements

It's a classic battle, epitomized by such larger-than-life figures as Ernest Shackleton, who tried to become the first man to cross Antarctica, only to be defeated by some of the most severe conditions on the planet.

At the other end of the climatic spectrum is Kwajalein, where the elements pose an altogether different adventure for the Aviation Services Department and its ongoing battle with the salt air.

"Corrosion out here is very severe. Everybody knows it," said Steve Wallace, Aviation Services manager.

Lately, the problem has been compounded, with only one of three Dash-7 airplanes operational. A second plane is in Canada undergoing an exhaustive inspection and main-

tenance check, while a third aircraft awaits its turn for a similar overhaul. In the meantime, that plane, No. 341, is being used to supply the one operational aircraft, No. 702, with emergency parts.

"If we have an extra aircraft here that we can rob a part from, that keeps us from having down time, and we support the people from Roi better," Wallace explained. "We're trying to make arrangements, and we're going to work with a contractor to help us fix 341 here."

Under more ideal conditions, the department would rely on its maintenance program, Inspection and Repairs As Necessary (IRAN), as well as manufacturer guidelines regarding upkeep, to keep the Dash-7 fleet in the air.

## Old housing rewiring project charges ahead

A year-long project is in progress to replace the secondary feeder electrical wiring to all of old housing. Started at the end of the last fiscal year, the project was funded in this fiscal year's budget and is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

"We have had three separate quarters in the last two years where the secondary feeder power lines shorted together, rendering them useless," said Ed Black, mechanical/electrical superintendent in FOM. "This replacement project will improve the reliability and quality of power service to all of old housing."

There is no record that the original wiring, placed in the ground in the mid-1950s, has ever been replaced. Furthermore, there are no detailed maps showing the exact placement of secondary feeder lines going to each building. This has complicated the procedure for FOM Electric Shop personnel, requiring the use of electronic detectors to trace the path of underground lines.

Electric power at 4,160 volts is supplied from the power plant to step-down transformers in the old housing area. The transformers reduce the voltage to the required level for use in individual quarters. Then distribution panels in each vault directs the electricity through the secondary feeder lines now being replaced to service panels in the quarters. The vaults, located in small cement buildings in the old-housing area, can each service eight to 10 buildings.

It should take approximately two days of preparatory work and one

# IRAN program battles corrosion, improves safety ...

"[IRANs] are interim inspections that we've developed here to maintain these airplanes in better condition because of this operating environment," explained Jack Humphreys, Aviation Quality Control manager. "These only supplement what the manufacturer requires us to do."

The department started doing IRANs in 1995. The program calls for a complete inspection and maintenance check every two to three years, in addition to routine maintenance recommended by the manufacturer, de Havilland. Dash-7 No. 273 was sent to AvMax Group in Calgary, Canada, for an IRAN Dec. 16 and is expected back in mid-April.

The IRAN involves a complete evaluation of structural integrity and corrosion. The engines are pulled, the paint is stripped, and even the window frames are removed, as every inch of the plane is examined. According to Humphreys, all the planes have gone through an IRAN at least once. One IRAN took nine months to complete, he added.

In comparison, Humphreys said, the manufacturer recommends a less extensive inspection every 30,000

flight hours or 40,000 flight cycles, defined as one take-off and one landing. Only one airplane, No. 341, has hit that mark. It was built in 1981 and has been in service here since 1991.

More frequent inspections are carried out every 150 flight hours. With only one plane in operation, it accrues about 30 hours a week of flight time, meaning much more frequent maintenance checks.

"At most we get five weeks out of it before we put it down," Wallace said. "We're having to work scheduled maintenance around the mission."

In fact, No. 702 was down over the Valentine's Day weekend for the routine maintenance check because of the range mission scheduled for next week.

Humphreys noted, "[The public

may see it in the maintenance shop more often [since the other two planes were grounded], but that doesn't mean there's something wrong with it. That means we're doing the scheduled maintenance based on the number of hours it's been flying."

Aviation officials stress the Dash-7 is extremely safe to fly. Humphreys said that out of 113 Dash-7 planes constructed in the 1970s, about 85 or so are in service or still operational. He explained that the plane's four engines and short take-off and landing capabilities provide additional safeguards. Humphreys also noted no plane is allowed to fly unless all mechanical conditions are ideal.

"If there's something wrong with the plane, we don't fly," he said.

day of actual work for each of the quarters, though in some circumstances it may require additional time.

FOM personnel are making every effort to keep the inconvenience for occupants of the quarters to just one day. Underground portions of the wiring will require excavation of the old lines and replacement with new electric wiring. In some cases this will damage lawns, which will be repaired by FOM.

A portable generator will be connected to each quarters while the lines into the building are replaced. Two short power outages during the day will be required.

Any electrical code discrepancies encountered during the installation, such as feeder boxes needing replacement, will be corrected to meet national electric standards.

"Out here at Kwaj, with the extreme environmental conditions, wiring has a shorter life cycle than it would have back in the states," Black said. "The newer wiring has a much improved type of insulation, which should extend service life considerably."

The project has been divided into 12 sub-projects, which is the number of

vaults that are located in old housing.

FOM personnel are placing conduits under any roadways that may be affected by the upcoming road-paving project scheduled for later this year.

## Improving USAKA/KMR contractor workforce for Army is HR goal

USAKA/KMR is not only a testing ground for America's missile program. Over the last six years it has served as the backdrop for Range Systems Engineering's endeavor to execute its largest logistics contract, while continuing to support the range and its missions.

RSE is composed of two contracts: Kwajalein Logistics Support (KLS) and Integrated Range Engineering (IRE). There are 433 IRE employees, 726 off-island KLS employees, and 268 on-island KLS workers. Republic of the Marshall Islands citizens account for another 1,105 employees. That's more than 2,500 workers, not to mention families, who must be housed and fed, among a plethora of other needs.

One of the departments meeting that challenge as it seeks continuous improvement in the quality of the workforce — and, consequently, the quality of work at USAKA/KMR — is Human Resources.

"It's not the standard HR group you find back in the states," explained Paula Conley, who was recently appointed manager of the Human Resources Department. "That's what makes [the job] very challenging."

Few human resources departments must manage employees' housing needs or travel plans along with their compensation and benefits, for example. But with growing experience and changes underway, Conley said she expects the department to be more responsive to employees, and its customer, the Army.

"Any enhancement or change we make is to help attract and retain the best workforce for the range," she explained.

The changes started stateside with the recent transfer of the compensation department from Burlington, Mass., to Kwajalein. The recruiting office, also formerly based in Burlington, has been transferred to Huntsville, Ala. Three of the five primary components of the SMDC

command — the Space and Missile Defense Technical Center, the Space and Missile Defense Battle Lab, and the Space and Missile Defense Acquisition Center — are also based in Huntsville.

"We certainly want to make sure we're being responsive to our [employees and the Army], and we believe that's a step in the right direction. Huntsville is a very good location; [people there] are very familiar with Kwaj and the Kwajalein Missile Range."

Conley is familiar with Kwaj. She came out here in December 1994 as part of the KLS phase-in team. She brought a wealth of experience to the island, with 11 years in human resources and eight years in business management, financial accounting, and planning. Before her appointment in January, Conley served as the company's senior personnel administrator.

"When I heard about [Kwaj], it sounded intriguing," she said of her initial reaction. "When I heard there was this whole little city that needed support — it's amazing ... The logistics of running this island to me are absolutely incredible."

## RMI rep Malolo headed to Fiji

## Kwaj has tools to search for family history

It's the third most popular hobby in the U.S. — ranking behind only stamp and coin collecting. An estimated 19 million Americans were involved in it in 1995, and the numbers are increasing.

This rapidly growing activity is genealogy — tracing one's ancestry or lineage.

Genealogists living in the states have many resources available, such as county courthouses, historical societies, museums, and national record repositories. It might surprise you to learn that Kwaj residents interested in tracing their family histories also have a source available to them.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at Kwajalein sponsors and maintains a family history center, located in CRC Room 3. You don't have to be a member of the Mormon Church to use the center. Volunteers will help residents get started in the search for their ancestors or continue research begun in the states.

Kwaj resident LeRoy Sievers, who volunteers his time to maintain the center, said, "We are willing and anxious to have community members use the center. There's no charge, and, as an approved branch library of the Family History Library, we have access to materials from Salt Lake City."

The Family History Library in Salt Lake City, established by the Mormon Church in 1894, has become the largest of its kind in the world. The collection includes millions of microfilms, thousands of microfiche and books, and many other records.

In a program that began in 1938, volunteers film documents in churches, courthouses, and other archives. Copies of these materials are available by request.

If you borrow materials on microfilm or microfiche from the Family History Library, the only charge is for postage; a nominal fee is charged if you wish to keep the material.

The family history center at Kwaj has a directory of records that may be ordered from Salt Lake City, microfilm and microfiche readers, a computer, and family search computer files, such as Ancestral File and International Genealogical Index. Residents can make an appointment with Sievers for an introductory session to learn how to use the materials and then use the center for their research.

Software is available at the center for both MACs and PCs that lets you input the information you've found, organize it, establish a pedigree, and print it out.

The Mormon Church also sponsors a Web site that has the same files

and more, with search capabilities under a variety of categories, an International Genealogical Index, and a place to order materials. The address is [www.familysearch.org](http://www.familysearch.org). A number of other genealogical Web sites can be found on the Internet. Also, Grace Sherwood library has several books about genealogy and family history.

Kwaj resident Kent Duncan, who has used the family history center for researching his family, offers some tips for beginning a search.

Before using reference materials, it's a good idea to find out as much as you can about your ancestors from family members and records.

"Find out what you and your family know," Duncan said. "Relatives can help. Work from what you know to what you don't know," he added.

"Places are important [in searching for information]. Find out where your information ends."

After you identify a county or country where your relatives lived, you can start looking for records — marriage, birth, and death certificates, for example. Social Security records, military records, and the military death index may help. The family history center has a copy of this index, which lists military deaths from the Korean War to the present.

Every person who climbs the family tree has a different incentive. Some begin the search because they believe they have someone famous in their ancestry. Of course, there's a chance that the door may be opened to family skeletons as well as interesting family histories.

For some people, giving birth to a new generation triggers their interest. Some genealogists become interested because they want to know more about their family's health history.

Most genealogists believe that knowing where you come from helps you know who you are.





**Youth soccer goes international**

Youth recreational soccer has gone international on Kwajalein this year with the addition of five Ebeye teams.

"It adds flavor to the competition and goodwill between the two countries," said Susan Sasano, youth activities supervisor.

"They're (Marshallese) very athletic and bring a flair to the program," she added.

This is the first year Ebeye has fielded teams since Sasano took over youth sports in 1998. Mary Harris, Angela Corder, and Yoshi Kemem have made it possible by acting as sponsors to the teams, Sasano said.

The addition of five Marshallese teams boosts the program from around 200 players in 1999 to more than 250 this season. That means more teams, 30 total, and more games.

"We split the junior programs into boys and girls this year, adding another highlight for those fourth- through sixth-graders," Sasano added.

Sasano said the program gives all participants the fundamentals of the sport, along with sportsmanship and camaraderie. It also helps build self-confidence and discipline, which translate into skills off the field.

"It's a stepping stone, a foundation for building character," she said.
